Vote "YES"

On Proposition to Borrow Money for Park Purposes.

While there is no contest that we have heard of on at the Annual Village Election this year, it is important that every voter should express himself on the bonding question, and particularly that he should express it in the affirmative. The directors of the East Jordan and South Arm Board of Trade have been working hard and spending much time in trying to induce new industries to locate at East Jordan, and while there is one they feel very confident of securing, they feel there are several more which they have a good chance of getting, if something more than a site could be offered. Almost every hamlet in the country which has any push, is offering liberal inducements for industries and questions of bonding for from \$10,000 to \$50,000, are noticed frequently in the papers—usually for "park" purposes or some other improvements.

Our "Board of Trade" had a committee appointed to look up means by which they might secure funds to back up some offers they wish to make to some manufacturing industries, and that all interested may stand the expense proportionately, the bonding plan was decided upon, a petition laid before the Common Council and favorably acted upon in time to submit to the citizens at the regular Election—that's Monday—the 12th.

The Board of Trade is a corporation under the laws of the State of Michigan and can purchase and sell property and is responsible so far as its resources extend, and has a membership of over 50 citizens who wish the town to grow, and desire to add to its membership all who have the same feeling at heart.

If they can purchase for a few hundred dollars a place which is desirable for a public park and sell it to the Village for \$5000, using the difference, which would be nearly the full amount to spend judiciously in getting new enterprises, it will make a straight deal for the Village so far as bonding for public park is concerned, and should result in getting a large additional amount of taxable property into the village.

This is a small amount as compared with other towns, but as we have many other inducements to offer, which other small towns don't possess, it is possible to make a good showing with this—try it out anyway. Vote Yes.

Constitutional Convention.

At the election to be held on the first Monday in April, 1906, the question of calling and holding a convention, for the purpose of making a general revision of the Constitution of this State, will be submitted to the qualified electors.

The ballots upon which this question will be submitted will be separate and distinct from all other ballots used at this election.

If a majority of the qualified electors, voting at such election, shall decide in favor of calling a convention for the purpose of revising the Constitution, it will become the duty of the legislature at the next session to provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention, whose duty it will be to prepare a general revision of the Constitution, which shall be submitted to the qualified electors at some future time for adoption or rejection.

Warehouse to be Built.

Stroebel Bros., agents for the Everett B. Clark Seed Co., are in receipt of a letter from them, under date of March 1st in which they definitely state that the proposed seed warehouse here will be built. The full number of bushels required—2000—have not yet been secured but everything points to securing the full amount before planting time. Contracts are being made daily, and any of our farmers who have not already contracted should investigate the matter as soon as possible.

Below is an extract from the Seed Co's letter to Stroebel Bros.:

"In reply to your inquiry as to whether these contracts which you have written for us are to stand, we will state that inasmuch as either of the sites is available for us, as you state, and provided that we are at liberty to choose and have furnished us the site which we prefer, you may consider all the contracts written to be good, and we will carry out our part of the agreement. There is going to be a little difficulty in getting the seed delivered at East Jordan, but we will do our best to get it there as early in the season as the opening of navigation will permit. Of course, the quantity of seed contracted is very much less than what we were looking for, but we are deciding to come to East Jordan on the basis of the prospects. Our record shows 1232 bushels of peas contracted. Added to this 1232 we note you have 200 to 300 bushels immediately in sight, and presumably more will show up in the future. We must, if possible, make it 2000 bushels. We note your desire for Nott's and American Wonders. We have secured 50 bushels of these two varieties which we consider to be good enough for seed purposes, so that you may on receipt of this accept the most favorable of your opportunities for writing contracts on these varieties, 24 bushels American Wonders and 26 bushels Nott's Excelsiors at \$2.00 per bushel.

You need not fear about your farmers being left to disappointment and to black-balling you, for we will use them right and their contracts with us will be fulfilled, provided only we are properly provided for as to place for location, etc."

East Jordan Boy's Success.

The enterprising grocer, Clink & Wolfson, of the Leader Grocery, are enjoying much prosperity. Business has so increased that they have put in a large stock of goods, taxing the capacity of their store and in order to accommodate their constantly increasing trade, they are putting in over 300 additional room linear feet of shelving, as well as new tables and painting and calsoning the premises, until the establishment presents a striking appearance. These gentlemen are hustlers and they are building up a big business by giving the people bargains and by treating them right.



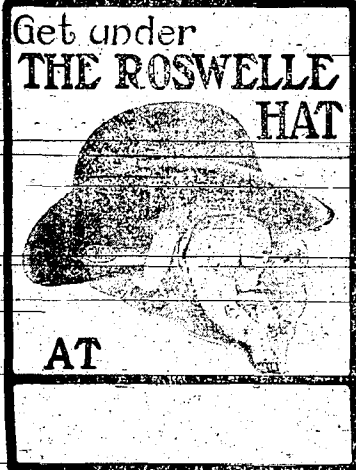

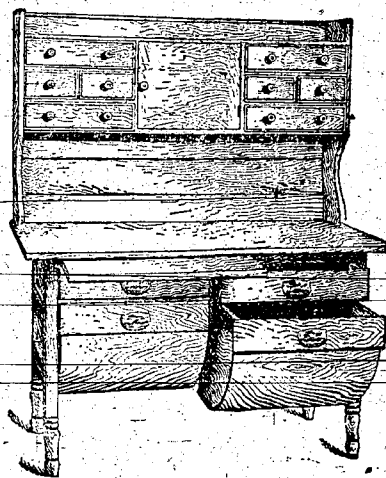

W. A. McCool of Traverse City, has invented and patented a machine which converts milk into dry powder. Says the Daily Eagle: "This powder, when restored, make normal milk. From this powder nearly everything from bread to cold water paint can be produced. Whole milk contains 13 pounds of this powder to every 100 pounds of milk. Skimmed milk will produce 9 pounds to every 100. Heretofore skimmed has been practically considered a worthless article, bringing about 20 cents per 100 pounds for feeding purposes. After it is converted into the dry form it is worth from 12 to 16 cents per pound." Already there is some demand among bakers for milk in this form, and McCool will try to establish a plant for the manufacture of the product on a large scale. The cost of such a factory will run from \$100,000 upward, and it is of course imperative that it be located in a section of the country which has large dairy facilities.

Flint Convention Next Week.

Methodists of Michigan are planning an important State Missionary Convention, to be held at Flint, Mich., March 13-15. The purpose of the Convention is to bring together Conference and District officers of the different organizations of the Church, the pastors and representatives from the local churches and young people's societies within the bounds of the Detroit and Michigan Conferences, for the consideration of some of the problems fundamental to the Christian occupation of the unevangelized nations, and also for prayer, fellowship, and discussion of methods and the best helps available for fulfilling the great missionary purpose of the Church.

The Convention is under the management of the Rev. Dr. J. C. Floyd, Field Secretary of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, assisted by a competent and active Executive Committee. The Convention will be a delegated body. A special feature of the Convention will be an elaborate Missionary Exhibit.

The Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church, under whose auspices this Convention is to be held, was organized in 1819. During the first year of its history the receipts were \$223 as compared with \$1,768,692, the total receipts for 1905. Foreign missionaries are working under the Society in Africa, Borneo, China, Europe, Federated Malay States, India, Java, Japan, Korea, Mexico, Philippine Islands, and South America. The Home Mission Work, done in every state and territory of the Union, besides in Porto Rico and Hawaii, includes that among the following peoples:—Welsh, Swedish, Norwegians, Danish, French, Germans, Spanish, Portuguese, Italians, Bohemians, Hungarians, Finnish, Japanese, Chinese, Koreans, and American Indians, besides the negro and native white people of the United States. According to the latest compiled statistics, there are in the foreign field 33 Conferences and Missions, 498 missionaries, 3,463 native preachers, 216,802 church members, and 237,675 Sunday School scholars.
