The Board of Trade is a corporation under the laws of the State of Michigan and can purchase and sell property and is responsible so far as its resources extend, and has a membership of over 50 citizens who wish the town to grow, and desires to add to its membership all who have the same feeling at heart.

If they can purchase for a few hun dred dollars a place which is destrable for a public park and sell it to the Village for \$5000, using the difference; which would be nearly the full amount to spend judiciously in getting new enterprises, it will make a straight deal for the Village so far as bonding for public park is concerned, and should result in getting a large additional amount of taxable property into the village.



No other American girl has received wedling presents so numerous, valuable or interesting as those which have been showered upon President Roosevelt's oldest daughter. Nelly Grant who, next to Alice Roosevelt had the most brilliant White House wedding received many costly gifts from all parts of the world but her trophies pale by comparison with those of the first White House bride of the present century. For one thing there were only two hundred guests at the marriage of Nelly Grant and Algernon Sartoris whereas nearly one thousand persons were invited to the White House wedding of 1906 and of course the number of presents in the latter case outnumbers those in the former instance in the same proportion.

Recognized as Great World Power. Then too, Uncle Sam was not near ly so much of a World Power in the days of President Grant as he has been since the Spanish-American War and consequently it is small wonder if the various rulers of the world have manifested greater interest in the nuptials of the daughter of the pres-ent Chief Magistrate than they did in the similar event a quarter of a cen. bride, by the way, has received sever-





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

Department of Agriculture says Farmers Use Cheap Material. bulletin setting forth the results of an investigation made by the Department of Agriculture into the corrosion of iron and steel wire fencing was sued recently to the farmers of the country. Many complaints have been made to the department in the last made to the department in the last year regarding the present quality of iron an steel wire used 2 encing, and to improve these conditions, with the hope f determining some remedy for the corrosion, Secretary Wilson ordered a thorough investigation, and the perts ame to the conclusion that the chief trouble is that the average arme insists on using the cheapest virior fencing, and the cheap wire naturally copyodes.

The department claims that some manufacturers hold that if it were pos-sible to make a better grade of wire at even a slightly higher price, it would be useless to put it on the market, as the American farmer would not buy it. because he desires cheapness above other consideration.

The result of preliminary experiments made by the Agricultural Department pointed to the manganese in the wire as undoubtedly being he chief cause of the corrosion, and it is stated that the more manganese there is pres ent in fence wire the quicker it will-rust or deteriorate.

Rapid Increase in Values Makes the Whole South Prosperous.

It also means that land will be more thoroughly cultivated, for the successful man, whether he be a farmer, a merchant, or a manufacturer is always better able to work to good advantage than the one who is fighting losing battle.




