

### Method of Sleeping Like a Child

- It is a sad but true fact that few men or women are able to enjoy the careless, dreamless sleep of a child. It is also a fact that if men and women would do good work and have pleasure in the doing of it, sleep, and plenty of it, is essential. And it is another and more serious fact that, probably owing to the strenuous life of the world to-day, insomnia is more prevalent than it ever has been before.

How to defeat this bugbear is the question and it is one that has been answered by authorities in numbers of ways. But when technical terms and learned treatises

are all simmered down they may be confined within a few simple rules that, if carefully followed out, are most effectual when sleep is desired.

In the first place, the sleeping room should be away from noise. It should be an airy room and one in which there is but little furniture and few rugs. It should have neither artificial light, flowers, nor animals and with the electric furnace, the natural should be well ventilated, as much air being admitted in winter as dur-

The bed should be slightly inclined from head to foot and a moderately hard mattress is desirable. If any pillow at all is used it should An automatic book vending machine be a thin one. The heavy, downy affairs into which the head sinks are undesirable for more reasons than one. They tend toward making a person round shouldered and the position they give to the neck interferse with circulation.

There is much diversity of opinion as to whether one should or should not eat before going to bed. Usually it is better to retire an hour or so after eating. It is never wise, however, to attempt to sleep when hungry. In a case of this kind a cracker and a cup of warm milk are desirable.

The limbs should always be outstretched—never cramped or folded, and one should sleep on the right side. Sleeping on the back is apt to produce nightmare and sleeping on the left side stops digestion and is bad for the heart. It is not good for the lungs to sleep on one's stomach .-

Often a cold shower bath followed by a vigorous rub down with a Turkish towel will induce sleep when a person is inclined toward insomnia.



The farmer is a producer of agricultural necessities which enter into daily consumption and to concentrate all his energies and capital to produce a single crop leaves him part of the season without employment. The farmer is his own employer and does not have to divide the profits of his prodicts, and therefore should arrange his system of husbandry to insure steady production of some agricultural output that enters into daily consumption.

Unquestionably specialization farming is profitable in favorable seasons, but occasionally there is a partial ortotal failure of the crop and the farmer wants some reserve product to tide him over a disastrous season of special crop exploitation. In some localities the soil is admirably adapted to onions, and still another to horticulture. When any of these lines of husbandry are followed they pay large profits in favorable seasons. Another class of farmers are interested in wheat or corn production, both of

The farmer engaged in specialization crops finds himself unemployed a part of the year. If his labors are reasonably rewarded for time devoted to and using three horses instead of raising and marketing a crop of wheat, four. corn, potatoes or fruit, it should be his ambition to add to his agricultural operations the production of other things that will pay a profit the balance of the year. To obtain the largest possible recompense from agriculture the farmer should arrange for steady employment the year around.

Special crops can be exploited in conjunction with live stock husbandry. If the farmer raises a crop of clover if leaves the soil in elegant condition for a crop of potatoes, while the clover will make excellent feed for live stock. in prime condition for wheat seeded down to clover. 



While but 18,000 feet in height, Mount St. Elias, as well as McKinley and many other Alaskan mountains, presents difficulties to the mountaineer not usually encountered. Unlike the majority of difficult peaks which have been conquered, where the first few thousand feet of altitude are traversed over roads or trails, the entire 18,000 feet demand extreme exertion and present many obstacles to be overcome. The journey throughout its entire length being over glaciers, the unique problem of combining arctic exploration with mountain

climbing is experienced. Glaciers and Snow Fields.

The eastern part, especially the coastal slope of the St. Elias and Fairweather ranges, is the only portion of Alaska which bears outthe popular belief that the territory is covered with ice and snow. Here in the high mountains there are many Alpine glaclers and snow fields, but the Malaspina glacier is the largest single ice field and, indeed, the most extensive on the North American continent. This great piedmont glacier spreads out over the coastal plain, presenting a front of 85 miles to the sea and, including the neve fields which feed it, covers an area of 5,000 square miles.

This ice field is most vividly described by Russell, who viewed it from the upper slopes of Mount St. Elias, as "a vast, snow-covered region, limitless in expanse, through which hundreds and probably thousands of barren, angular peaks project.
