Miles J. Gilmore, a Grand-Traverse fruit grower, reports that the cherry harvest from 63 trees this season, was marketed for \$636.70. This is an average that is a trifle better than ten dollars to the tree. A single Windsor tree produced ten cases of cherries. Seven of the ten cases were sold at three dollars each and three of the cases at \$2.40, making a total for the cherries from this one tree of \$28.20. Last year this tree produced 16 cases of cherries which sold at \$2 each, and in 1908, 15 cases of fruit were harvested from the same tree.
About as good a way to study human nature is when you are driving on the public road. If a man is willing to observe the laws and the courtesies of the road, he will duly give his share of it when meeting another, and shows he is willing to do the gentlemanly thing about it. But when you meet one who takes every advantage of those he meets, and holds the road for his own selfish self, often to the great discomfort of those he meets, or will not allow them to pass, we are almost sure to think of pork in connection with such drivers of teams.
Three more deaths occurred in Michigan saloons in two days of the past week, and at least two suits for \$5,000 each have been started by wives against saloon keepers; for the death of the husband in one case and for his total ruination in another. The saloon death list in Michigan this year is attracting more attention than ever before because of the fact that forty counties of the state have had absolutely no share in it, forty counties of the state that have not one open saloon within their borders. "Saloons don't earn anything for the community, they don't declare any public dividends or give any pay envelopes, but they do add pepper and snap to city and village life." Such was an explanation recently made in their behalf by a liquor traffic worker. Saloon history in Michigan this year suggests that uncertainty is their principle contribution to village and city life. If however their relations to life are uncertain their connection with death is surely becoming entirely too regular and well established.
