#### BETTER COWS RAISE INCOME FROM HERDS

East Lansing, July 8.—Records kept in herd improvement associa-tions in Michigan show that it is much more profitable to keep a few good cows than a larger herd of low producers.

One herd in the South Chippewa charge of the State Tuberculosis County association produced 3.7 Eradication Campaign has been aptimes more profit above feed costs pointed as Extension Specialist with than another herd in the same association. It cost more money to feed Wm. Bashaw, making tax roll 216.67 the good herd but the cows produced 391 pounds of butterfat per cow and 7.95 the return above feed cost was \$184 for each cow. This was \$91.00 more 30.00 than the average return for all cows 16.71 in the association.

Two herds in the Ogemaw association each produced about 100,000 ings for the purpose of discussing Moved by Alderman Williams, supported by Alderman Maddock, that herd contained eight cows and the other 16. The profits for the owner of the small herd were three times as nigh as those for the owner of the larger herd.

Good cows are not confined to any one locality. The highest producing association in one month this year vas located in Cass county. The best producing herd was in Macomb Co., and the highest producing cow was wned by a Missaukee Co. farmer.

Good production and increased profits are determined by the breeding and feeding of the cattle. records show that the real profits are made by liberally feeding only those animals that have the ability to produce large amounts of milk or butterfat.

No medicine is known which will cure Contagious Abortion in cattle, out the serious losses in Michigan herds have led many owners to purchase remedies which are advertised to cure. The owner not only loses the money paid out, but many times loses valuable time, which could be utilized to clean up his herd with proper control measures.

The known methods of control are to make frequent tests of suspected herds o find which animals are affected, the isolation of diseased cattle, and the proper sanitary methods in the dairy farm. Constant research work at the

Michigan Station, other stations, and n the laboratories of the U.S. Pept. of Agriculture is being carried on to find other or better control measures.

#### Mementoes of Famous Scotchman in Museum

Watt, the famous mechan ician, inventor and civil engineer, was born at Greenock, Scotland, in 1736, and died in Birmingham, England, in 1819. It is not generally known that the contents of his garret workshop are in the Science museum at South Kensington. The garret was used by Watt in his house in Birmingham. and was shut up for thirty years after his death. Various descriptions of the opening of the garret, in 1853, are given in a pamphlet issued by the museum. Samuel Smiles, who was one of the party, recorded that "The ashes of the tast fire were in the grate, the last bit of coal was in the scuttle. . . Many objects lay about or in the drawers, indicating the pursuits which had been interrupted by death. . On the shelves are minerals and chemicals in pots and lars, on which the dust of nearly half a century has settled. The moist substances have long since dried up, the putty has been turned to stone and the paste to, dust. On the shelf we came across a dish in hich lies a bunch of withered grapes.

#### Point Adjusting Quite Easy If Car Is in Gear

One of the things that slows up the work of adjusting breaker points is the difficulty of turning over the engine until the points just open. It seldom can be done with the startermotor, since the engine has a tendency to stop in the closed position

The hand crank is the usual doing the job, but sometimes the own er does not have his crank handy and getting it out at best is always nuisance. In repair shops, therefore they have figured out a way to accomplish results with a minimum of delay and effort.

The trick is to place the car in gear, with ignition off, and move it a little, forward or backward. This turns the engine very slowly until the noints break.

Usually in their open position the points should space somewhere be tween .015 and .020 inch. It varies somewhat with different makes.

#### Several Important Hints For Automobile Repairs

Here are several important precau tions for car repair work. One, disconnect a lead from the storage battery while working. This prevents anyone from starting the engine. Two use blocks under a wheel, to avoid the axle toppling of a jack. Three, watch out for gasoline. A broken ex tension light may produce a spark which will ignite the gasoline. Four, do not hold the head directly under the work in hand. Dirt in the even or a slipping wrench striking the face may result. Five, use gloves as far as possible when handling piston Ugly cuts can result sharp edges. Six, take no chadces with light chain or rope garage hoists. Seven, put good blocking under the raised axie.—Science and Invention.





This longest conveyor of them all is development of the Ford policy that nothing should be done by manual labor that could better be done by machine.

In the early days of his manufacturing career, Mr. Ford devised the as-

#### worst Pests of Chicken Raiser

#### Coccidiosis and Lice Cause of High Mortality of Fowls.

(By E. ALLEN LUTZ.)

Newspapers, magazines, poultry journals and other miscellaneous books dwell, perhaps, more on this subject than any other for the small and large poultry breeders and raisers, yet little or no attention is paid to the profit-eating parasites, especially by the small or amateur poultry man.

The expert poultry advisers connected with different state poultry departments and universities are sent out each year for the express purpose of informing the poultry keeper how to ward off different chicken diseases, and coccidiosis and lice are the backbone of every talk. The instructors generally attend all poultry shows as far as possible and their contention is that 50 per cent of day-old chicks die before two weeks old through the glaring carelessness to handle these two important subjects before they get beyond control.

#### Coccidiosis Cure.

Coccidiosis can be cured if started in time. It is really white diarrhea caused by lice, though sometimes it is caused by parasites picked up off the ground. Giving a dose of saits either in the drinking water or by force to flush the liver out good will prevent it. from spreading, taking care to clean the premises thoroughly. Different poultry remedies may be used to good advantage, but if neglected and left to spread will oftentimes wipe out half the flock before it is checked. Quick action at the start will avoid the loss of day-olds.

Watch the baby chicks from time of hatching, cleaning utensils daily and also coops in which you keep them and your battle against disease will be practically won. Treatment at the start will save not only the infected ones but the entire flock. The first signs of coccidiosis are: Lack of pep, standing around as though asleep with head up, and bowel movements white and loose, at times sticking to the vent.

#### Control Lice.

Lice may be controlled and completely annihilated by the use of the different poultry sprays. One that is good is nicotine, easily obtainable and "sure cure." For small chickens use nicotine diluted half and half with water, putting it on as you would whitewash or spraying just before roosting time. For the main flock use it straight. It will not burn or pol-son chickens and if applied just before chickens go to roost will entirely free them of parasites in one night. To tell results lay a newspa-per over the dropping board after applying the nicotine and if the hens have lice you will see them fall off. One application is sufficient, but it is good plan to repeat it every month, thus assuring you a clean hen house and healthy, happy chickens.

Cheap pipe tobacco used one pound to a hundred pounds of mash, mixed thoroughly, will improve the flock as it rids the fowls of any intestinal worms they may have, and most of them have some though they may never be noticed. Hanging tobacco stems in a henhouse is claimed by some poultry raisers to keep the premises free from lice.

#### Corn and Barley Right

for Hogs on Alfalfa.

Corn and barley are the two best grains to be fed to pigs on alfalfa pasture though some oats or some mill feed can also be used to good advantage. It it is intended to make the growing pigs on alfalfa pasture ready for market at the earliest possible date, they can be fed to very good advantage by putting corn or barley and oats or middlings and tankage each in separate compartments of a self-feeder and be allowed to eat as much as they care for each of the feeds.

A good slop can be made by first making a dry mixture of 50 per cent ground corn or ground barley, 40 per cent middlings or reddog flour, and 10 per cent tankage, then making this into a swill by mixing it with sistm milk, buttermilk, or water. It should not be necessary, however, to feed any swill to pigs receiving grain from a self-feeder while on alfalfa pasture, unless one is desirous of getting the most rapid gains possible, rather than the most economical rapins.

GERMS INACTIVE IN FRESH MILK

### Bacteria Do Not Become Active for Five Hours Later.

Bacteria are not active in milk freshly drawn from the cow and may not become active until three to five hours later even if the temperature is at 70 degrees, says Prof. J. D. Brew of Cornell university.

The period of readjustment, or germicidal period, varies according to conditions. Milk with a low bacteria count will stand longer without increasing the number of bacteria than will milk with a higher count. The addition of large numbers of bacteria from utensils or from dirt will shorten the period.

It is safest to cool the milk to 50 degrees at once and remove all doubt, but this period of inactivity explains why many deliverence an deliver warm morning's milk to grade A plants and still have a low count. Most of this morning's milk is about two hours old.

Stirring the milk in the can is good practice, but there is no reason to stir it more than once and that not until after the can has stood in the vat at least a half hour. In an unstirred can the center will remain warmer than the outside layer. But, if the water in the vat is sufficiently cold, this warm cone in the center of the can need cause no worry, because the germicidal action of the milk will retard growth and any cooling lengthens the period of that pro-

Whatever the length of the germicidal period, when it disappears it is gone permanently. It one should warm milk to 70 degrees for separation it should be cooled quickly for bacteria growth may start at once.





#### Tree Planting Worthy of Special Attention


