#### Fire Hazard Is Mounting

Hard rain, and plenty of it, would relieve anxiety of conservation department field men now watching the forest fire hazards mount as the number of hunters afield reaches the season's peak. Rain would be welcomed by the hunters also, as they have found the going unusually tough in dense ground vegetation, and shooting difficult because of leaves still clinging to the trees.

The fire hazards is reported highest in the upper peninsula and in northern lower Michigan, but warm sunny days of the prolonged Indian summer have produced a dangerously dry condition in the southern zone also, where pheasants bring the heaviest hunter concentration.

Conservation department men are repeating once again the warning that forest fires is not exclusively a hazard of the northern pine country. A year ago, they say, more wooded acreage was burned over in the southern third of the state than in the entire upper peninsula.



#### ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Charlevoix County's extension personnel will spend the week of October 27 at Michigan State College, East Lansing at the thirty-fourth annual conference of Michigan Extension Workers.

Attending from the county will be: Ed Rebman, county agricultural agent; Emma J. Fero, home demonstration agent; and K. C. Festerling, 4-H club agent.

The conference will bring together 270 people employed in agricultural and home economics extension program in Michigan. #### **MSC BOTANIST FINDS SPRAY TO** KILL GRABGRASS

Spray material that gives promise of killing crabgrass and does not damage bluegrass, clover, and other lawn grass has been found by Dr. B. H. Grigsby, Michigan State College research botanist.

The spray isn't on the market and perhaps will not be for a year or more. Further tests must be made to determine the recommendations for ts most effective and practical use. Articles Repaired. Wood turning, Preliminary tests were promising enough to indicate the oil base spray material may answer the previously unsolved problem of crabgrass eraing and Soldering. — HARVEY'S dication by chemical means.

The oil base spray is an experimental material developed by the Standard Oil Company (Indiana) which is upporting part of the research conducted by Dr. Grigsby for the Michigan State College Agricultural Experiment Station.

Young crabgrass dies in from 5 to 10 days when sprayed with this product. So do other grasses like foxtail. But the perennial grasses — the ones you like in your lawn are practically undamaged. The killer has shown no indications of lasting effect on bluegrass, bermuda, fescues, red top, orchard grass, clover, bent grass, or perennial ryegrass. Merits of the spay on crops have not been determined but experiments are under way to find it can be used in killing crabgrass in nursery crops, cotton, and corn without damaging the crops. Dr. Grigsby has found the oil base compatible with broadleaf spray weed killers, of 2, 4-D.
