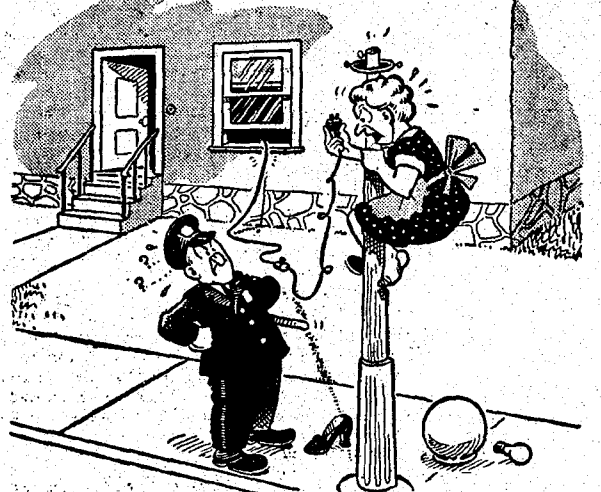

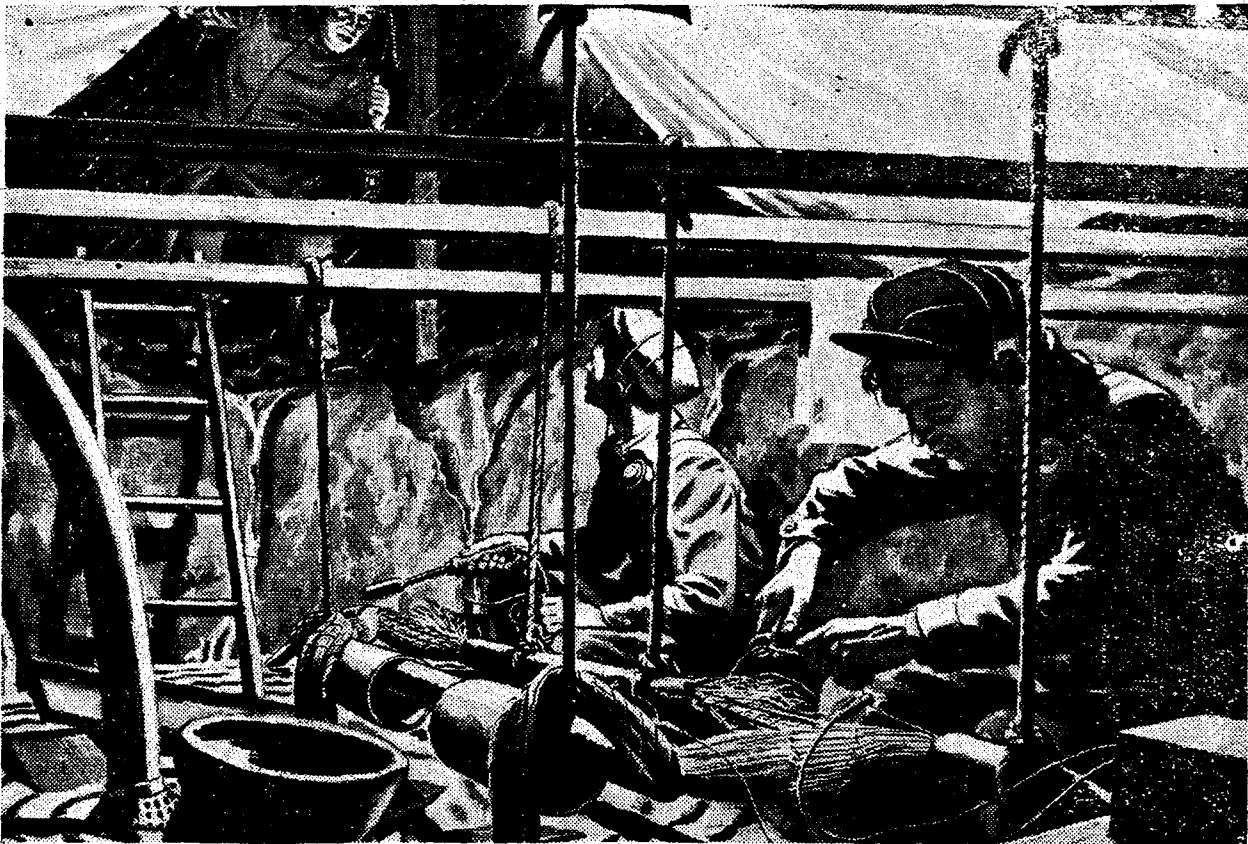

**Operation Underground**

It was about 10 A. M. on a dull, grey morning when the huge steam shovel accidentally hooked onto an underground telephone cable.

Tom, a Michigan Bell splicer, and Ed, his helper, were among the telephone men who arrived on the scene within minutes. The situation was bad. Out of 200 pairs of vital telephone wires inside the cable, 135 were broken. And, to make matters worse, a steady rain had started, threatening to flood the hole where the break occurred.

The first job was to make temporary repairs on the most important wires so that calls could go through. Working swiftly, Tom and Ed completed their part of this job by 2 P. M.

But then more trouble developed. Water from a nearby open-type

drain began spilling into the hole where the men were working. If the open cable were submerged, moisture would short circuit the wires.

Pumps were working furiously. Meanwhile, Tom and Ed began building a foundation of planking. Then, with another plank as a lever, they began prying up the cable to keep it above the water level.

Higher and higher the water rose . . . above their knees . . . up to their waists and beyond. By sheer exertion, they kept lifting the cable break up and up. Sometimes it was only an inch and a half above the rising water. But more pumps were put to work and finally the water began to go down.

The problem now was to restore service on the remaining wires in

the cable. This meant putting in a new section of cable ten feet long and making 400 wire splices at each end of the new piece.

Several times the foreman asked Tom and Ed if they didn't want to be relieved by another splicing crew. But they replied, "Look, this is an important cable. We don't want to quit until the job's done." The foreman agreed.

And that's how the precious threads of communication were restored between the outside world and the vital B-24 Bomber Plant at Willow Run, during the war.

IN COMPLIANCE with the Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Charlevoix County, Michigan, and in compliance with Act 14 of the Public Acts of 1926 (Extra Session), as amended.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a Special Election will be held on Monday, the 4th day of April, 1949 (same being General Spring Election Day), in every voting precinct in Charlevoix County, Michigan, for the purpose of voting on the question:— "TO AUTHORIZE THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO LEVY A TAX OF 2 MILLS EACH YEAR FOR A PERIOD OF 3 YEARS AND TO LEVY A TAX OF 1 MILL EACH YEAR FOR A PERIOD OF 7 YEARS NEXT FOLLOWING THEREAFTER, TO CREATE A SINKING FUND TO BE USED FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A NEW CO. COURT HOUSE". — all as prescribed in said Resolution of said Board of Supervisors (and a copy of which is hereto annexed).

**COPY OF RESOLUTION**

"WHEREAS the Court House of this County was constructed many years ago and has more than served its purpose, and WHEREAS said building is of such design and construction as to make it impracticable to attempt to remodel same, and WHEREAS said building has been repeatedly condemned by the Fire Marshal of this State as unsafe and a fire hazard, and there exists a very real danger of the valuable and important records of this county being destroyed by fire because of inadequate vaults and storage space, and at a loss to the public of many thousands of dollars, and

WHEREAS it is deemed essential that provisions be made for the setting aside of a fund, at interest, each year, for the construction of a new COUNTY BUILDING as soon as building conditions make the same practicable, and in such manner that the financing of a new building will not increase taxes, if possible, and to meet any situation that might arise;

NOW THEREFORE IT BE RESOLVED, that a tax of two (2) mills on the assessed valuation of the County of Charlevoix, Michigan, be levied each year, for a period of three (3) years, and that a tax of one (1) mill on the assessed valuation of said county be levied each year for a period of seven (7) years next following thereafter; for the purpose of creating a sinking fund to be used for the construction of a new county court house, the proposition of levying such tax to create such sinking fund to be submitted to the electors of said county and approved by a majority of those

voting thereon at the annual spring election for the year 1949, in accordance with the provisions of Act No. 14 of the Public Act of the State of Michigan for the year 1926 (Extra Session), as amended." (Adopted by the Board of Supervisors at the January, 1949, Session thereof).

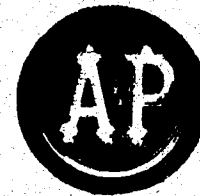


Taxes levied and spent by the State of Michigan, cities and schools seem rather insignificant when compared with the \$2,500,000,000 paid by Michigan-taxpayers to the federal government last year.

schools in 766 participating school districts. Total cost for the year is about \$4,000,000.

Best immediate hope for lightening this high tax burden will be found in the Hoover Commission task force reports now being issued from Washington at the rate of two or three a week.

Welfare laws are being given rigorous scrutiny by members of a Senate investigating committee. Senator Colin Smith, (R. Big Rapids) says that standards will be revised to emphasize that public assistance is a privilege, not a right, and to safeguard the interest of taxpayers.

Michigan now has 102 administrative agencies, but there is a good chance that one of these may be eliminated. A Senate tax investigating committee has found that the three \$6,000 a year members of the State Board of Tax Appeals have heard only 137 cases over the past 7 years.

Another new tax idea has been suggested by Representative William Romano (D. Van Dyke). He wants to place a ten per cent tax on the gross sales of professional football, hockey and basketball tickets.

Have trouble finding a place to park? Could be because 1948 Michigan motor vehicle registrations totaled 2,004,712, about 3.5 persons per car. This represented an increase of 181,111 vehicles over the 1947 level which is greater than the 128,000 population growth estimated by the U. S. Bureau of the Census for that period.

Robert F. Steadman, state controller, reports that "It will be a considerable surprise to many people to realize that 80 cents out of every dollar that it is anticipated the state will spend in 1949-50 will be in the form of financial aid to or for local governments." Are you surprised?

Many of us would find our income tax load lightened considerably if a proposal made by William T. Guinan of the Builders Ass'n of Metropolitan Detroit were adopted. He thinks every home-owner should have an income tax exemption of five per cent on his property for maintenance and depreciation.

More than 44,000 students are now enrolled in the University of Michigan, Michigan State College and Wayne University. These three institutions are said to be "crammed to the gills" though it is now 3 1/2 years since the end of the war.

Every session of the legislature there is much debate about adjusting workmen's compensation, unemployment compensation and old age assistance benefits to make them more equitable. Senator John B. Martin, Jr. (R. Grand Rapids) thinks the issue could be settled for some time to come if "escalator clauses" are adopted.

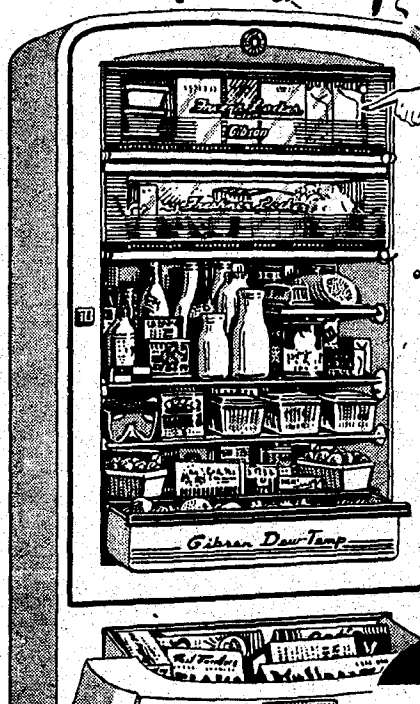
