The increased financial bur-den that it must shoulder for welfare is 25 percent. The state of Michigan formerly paid 60 percent of welfare aid to the county. It now pays only 50 percent, because the "surplus" indicated that it could shoulder more In other words, assuming that \$100. 00 was spent per year in the county for welfare, then the county's increas ed burden would be \$10,000 when the change was made from a 40-60 basis to a 50-50 basis. \$10.00 is one fourth or 25 percent.

The general welfare of the county has suffered because of the illegal fi nancial manipulations of its county government. Anytime the public. funds are "pinched" for special purposes, someone suffers. That "some-one" is the man who put it in - you Mr. Taxpayer. There is little doubt but what the

difference in welfare payments alone would have been ample to pay for the increased cost of operating the Ironton ferry or of helping the county's schools when they are direly in need of funds or of providing aid for coun-ty road maintenance or of giving the taxpayer a deduction of one or two milla.

Other counties in this area are receiving more state aid than Charlevoix county simply because their governments practiced good government instead of manipulating funds to satisfy special interests.

Could it be that the sinking fund is merely subtle manipulation by the west end "masterminds" to establish a firm foothold for the construction of the court house without submitting its proposed location to a vote of the people of the county?



seem rather insignificant when com-pared with the \$2,500,000,000 paid by Michigan-taxpayers to the federal government last year. With a State population of more than six million, this figures out to about \$4,000 for every person in Michigan.

Best immediate hope for lightening this hugh tax burden will be found in the Hoover Commission task force re-ports now being issued from Wash-ington at the rate of two or three a week. These reports analyze the operation of each federal bureau, expose the red tape, and, more impor-tant, make recommendations for eliminating it. If these recommendations are followed, an estimated \$3,000,-000,000 a year may be saved.


Michigan now has 102 administrative agencies, but there is a good chance that one of these may be eliminated. A Senate tax investigating committee has found that the three \$6,000 a year members of the State Board of Tax Appeals have heard onweek. The Board has been labeled a "luxury the State cannot afford."

> Welfare laws are being given rigorous scrutiny by members of a Senate investigating committee. Senator Colin Smith, (R. Big Rapids) says that standards will be revised to emphasize that public assistance is a privilege, not a right, and to safe-guard the interest of taxpayers. Sen-

ator Smith also believes that greater stress should be placed on rehabilitation and that a well-planned program should be formulated to justify appropriations.

Another _new tax idea has been suggested by Representative William Romano (D. Van Dyke). He wants to place a ten per cent tax on the gross sales of professional football, hockey and basketball tickets. He estimates that this tax would raise approximately \$1 million a year for the state. Such a tax is now collected on boxing



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Robert F. Steadman, state controler, reports that "It will be a considerable surprise to many people to realize that 60 cents out of every dollar that it is anticipated the state will spend in 1949-50 will be in the form of financial aid to or for local governments." Are you surprised?

Many of us would find our income tax load lightened considerably if a proposal made by William T. Guinan of the Builders Ass'n of Metropolitan

Detroit were adopted. He thinks every home-owner should have an in-come tax exemption of five per cent on his property for maintenance and depreciation. Many landlords, Guinan said, already have such an exemption and it is only fair to give this help to other owners

More than 44,000 students are now enrolled in the University of now enrolled in the University of Michigan, Michigan State College and Wayne University. These three in-stitutions are said to be "crammed to the gills" though it is now 3 ½ years since the end of the war. Officials, who see no end to the enrollment boom, say more high school students feel it is necessary for them to go to college, junior colleges are funneling more students to the universities, many veterans are taking advanced courses and more students than ever before can afford to go to college.

Every session of the legislature there is much debate about adjusting workmen's compensation, unemploy-ment compensation and old age assistance benefits to make them equitable. Senator John B. Martin, Jr. (R. Grand Rapids) thinks the is-sue could be settled for some time to come if "escalator clauses" are adopted patterned after the General Motors-UAW contract. His immediate proposal is that workmen's compensation maximum benefits be established at \$28 per week (as compared with the present \$21) and that this figure should fluctuate every year based on a report by the State Labor D'epartment of change in the cost-ofliving.
