Planning of the program, which involves over 50,000 mechanics through date for the entire job is September out the country, included counseling with selected dealer service managers and mechanics. The training course is built around a series of instructional kits, one of which Benson's Service received every month from the DeSoto-Plymouth home offices. Each kit is devoted to a "tell, show, and do" presentation of a basic service problem selected from surveys of dealer requests for information. For the "tell" part of the training session, the first item in the kit is a 20-minute sound slide film outlining basic principals of an automoblie service operation, how to recognize the problem and how to make the necessary corrections. In the "show" part of the session, large blow-up charts and full information as to procedure for the instructor is supplied, together with a list of parts and tools required for a demonstration. The mechanic is then allowed to perform the service operation himself, representating the "do" part of the session. Finally, a reference book summarizing the entire subject is supplied for the mechanic's personal reference.

At the end of each service session, the mechanic checks his progress by means of a series of questions. Questionaires, when filled out, are returned to the factory for review and grading and become a permanent record at the factory, acting as a basis for future awards of certificates to the dealer and mechanic.



THE GOVERNMENT was sending some marines to Chinese troubled spots, but these were to do only sentry duty.

United States action came despite admittedly great provocation. The Chinese Communists, in their triumphant surge across China to Shanghai, had invaded the home of U.S. Envoy J. Leighton Stuart in Nanking and hinted he was to be held in custody.

Meanwhile, the Chinese Reds broadcast a demand for American and British officials to evacuate all their "aggressive forces" from China.

Already British warships had been fired upon and it was assumed American fleet elements had fled Shanghai in order to avoid any such predicament as was experienced by the British vessels.

THE COMMUNIST threat to Shanghai was increasing hourly and despite Nationalist decision to battle to the end, it appeared the city's plight was hopeless.

Communist victory in China would put all the western nations in a ticklish position. For, with the Reds in control of all China, those who opposed communism would be helpless and hopeless in event of a western-powers move to apply economic sanctions, if such a step should be taken. If this procedure were not to be followed, the western powers would be put in the paradoxical position of recognizing and trading with proponents of an ideology with which they were struggling in a cold war.

Are Eased Again

Developments were shoving Pres-STATE OF MICHIGAN FOR THE ident Truman's demands for price control power further and further

into the realm of absurdity. THE FEDERAL reserve board, after looking the situation over, decided that installment buying controls could be lowered again safely. And this it did. It set out that on household appliances such as refrigerators, radios, electric washers, etc., the down payment would have to be only 10 per cent of the cost of the item, instead of the previous 15 per cent. On automobiles, the down payment remained at 30 per cent; but on autos and household appliances, too, the time of payment was extended from 21 to 24 months.

THIS ACTION brought both commendation and criticism. That element in the federal government which would recoup all the wartime controls for the President, was aghast at the action, terming it dangerous. Others who had watched prices continue their downward spiral-especially merchants who were facing a buyers' market and difficulty in moving goods off sales floors-saw the action as a boon to business.

SULLIVAN:

Quits Navy Post

There was little else that J a L. Sullivan, secretary of the navy, could have done but resign after "multi-million dollar reprimand" he received from Defense Secretary Louis Johnson.

SULLIVAN, as navy chief, had gone ahead with plans to construct the 65,000-ton U.S. aircraft supercarrier, the United States, despite lack of congressional authorization for the project.

It was no particular secret that abandonment of the carrier and Sullivan's resignation were all a continuing part of the apparently hopeless fight to unify the nation's armed forces. The congressional act calling for such a step has never been carried out, and the navy's attempt to go ahead with building the huge carrier without any legal authority was another example of high-handed service tactics that have tended to make unification appear impossible of realization.

DEFENSE SECRETARY Johnson, commenting on Sullivan's resignation, said, "I regret very much that my old friend and colleague . . has joined the aircraft carrier

DAIRYMEN:

Will Push Sales

According to the experts, milk prices would be tumbling again this summer, but American dairymen wouldn't be cheering about it. In fact, dairymen were getting

set to launch a 1.5 million-dollar campaign to promote the sale of dairy products and, at the same time, wage war on oleomargarine.

Most dairy leaders were said to believe that a promotional campaign to boost consumption was the only way to check a nose-dive in milk and butter prices that has caught producers with their income down and their costs up.

In little more than seven months, according to a federal dairy specialist, dairy prices had dropped 33 per cent. Butter, which not long ago was at almost prohibitive prices, had dipped to the government support level. Milk prices also had been falling off a cent or two at a time on retail markets.

The federal specialist pointed out that domestic unemployment has contributed to the drop in consumption of dairy products.





Start Early Weed Control With 2, 4-D

While your lawn is getting a good start this spring, don't lea the weeds do the same thing. Dr. Buford H. Grigsby, weed control specialist in the Michigan State College botany department, advises spraying lawns with 2,4-D for weed control.

When the weather is generally warm is a good time to make a thorough application of the spray. Young weedlings will be susceptible to the spray. Although spraying with 2.4-D will not kill crab grass, it may reduce the stand.

A few words of advice include following manufacturers' directions, avoiding spray drift into into shrubbery and flowering plants, thoroughly washing sprayer and hose after use, and not spraying young seedlings of

Recipe of the Week BY MARY LEE TAYLOR

Marble Cake Broadcast: May 14, 1949

1½ teaspoons melted vegetable shortening 1½ tablespoons cocoa 1½ tablespoons warm water
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons sifted cake
flour

3/4 cup sugar

1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
¼ cup soft vegetable
shortening
¼ cup Pet Milk
¼ cup water
½ teaspoon vanilla
1 unbeaten egg
⅓6 teaspoon baking
soda

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Grease a medium loaf pan. Mix melted shortening, cocoa and warm water. Sift flour into bowl with sugar, baking powder and salt. Add soft shortening and 3/3 of a mixture of milk, water and vanilla. Beat 2 minutes with spoon or electric beater at medium speed. Add remaining ½ of milk mixture and egg. Beat 2 minutes longer. Pour about ½ of batter into greased pan. Stir soda into cocoa mixture. Beat into remaining 1/3 of batter. Spoon over light batter. Cut through batter in zig-zag pattern with knife. Bake 40 minutes, or until cake shrinks from sides of pan. Cool. Spread with chocolate frosting, if de-



Curley Lawson's cousin from back East and a few of us got talking when he was here visiting, and I couldn't help noticing how different he said things.




