> **RETEST OF INFECTED** AND SUSPECT HERDS

The herd in which reactor cattle are found will be retested at intervals of 30 to 60 days until two negative tests of the herd are taken and then followed by a negative test at 6 months from the last negative test. The herd is retested when suspect cattle only are found and additional tests as may be found necessary. When a




