## Vote YES On Amendment No. 2

Michigan has come to a dangerous crisis in its care for the mentally ill. The Legislature voted unanimously to place the proposed amendment for a bond issue of \$65,000,000 on the November ballot. This is to be paid over the life time of the buildings to be erected, and will be no burden for anyone—four dimes a year is the per capita cost.

Do you know that Michigan ranks 40th in having acceptable facilities for the mentally ill? Snake Pits in Michigan is an ugly charge.

At the Traverse City State Hospital conditions are greatly overcrowded with no more room for any but so-called violent cases. One cottage containing 110 beds is so overcrowded they are placed end to end. It has wooden stairways, and in case of fire, the loss of life would be heavy. Many small single rooms have four and five beds. The old buildings were built in the 1890s, and are regular fire traps.

A Yes vote on Amendment No. 2 will allow many more mentally ill to be sent to the hospital for help. Dr. Sheets says if he can have them sooner, many of them may be cured. It will also benefit patients now in over-crowded conditions. It will remove the blot of inhumane treatment, because of lack of equipment, of our most unfortunate citizens.

## E J H S Trounce Ironmen 32-0 Under the Lights

### CHALK UP ITS SIXTH WIN OF THE CAMPAIGN AT MANCELONA

Playing under the lights for the first time this season, the East Jordan High School football team chalked up its 6th win of the campaign at Mancelona last Friday evening by trouncing the Mancelona "Ironmen" 32 to 0.

East Jordan scored less than four minutes after the game got under way after a pass interception by Elwin "Red" Evans gave the locals possession of the ball on the Mancelona 31. Six plays later, Evans went over from the three on a hand off from Boring. Max Sommerville hit off tackle to add the extra point and East Jordan led 7 to 0.

Mancelona came right back with its only serious scoring threat of the evening, taking the local kickoff and advancing it to the 1 yd. stripe before giving it up on downs as the 1st quarter came to the close.

Quarterback Boring engineered a 99 yd. sustained drive that ended near the close of the 1st half with Max Sommerville diving over from the three. Sommerville's attempt to add the extra point was stopped at the line of scrimmage and East Jordan held a 13 to 0 halftime lead.

The "Red Devils" lost no time in scoring as they marched the second half kickoff down the field and over. This time it was big Don Whiteford who went over standing up from the 5 yd. stripe, leaving a string of would-be tacklers behind. Don also added the extra point and East Jordan led 20 to 0. A long pass Sommerville to Milstein was good for 46 yds. to the 4 yd. line, setting up the Jordanites 4th touchdown. Again Whiteford lugged the leather to the pay dirt. Looze, substitute left half, failed to add the extra point and East Jordan held a comfortable 26 to 0 lead at the close of the third quarter.

The final Jordan tally came midway in the 4th frame when Whiteford scooped up a blocked Mancy punt on the 40 yd. stripe and went all the way to score. Sommerville's off tackle slant failed to add the extra point and the final score read East Jordan 32, Mancelona 0. Boring and Milstein teamed up to block the Mancelona punt, the only blocked punt by the Red and Black this season.

Coaches Saxton and Downing substituted freely throughout the last half as a number of youngsters got in the first playing time of the season. The Jordan forward wall outcharged the heavier Mancy front line and the tackling of Sommerville, Whiteford and Boring lacked nothing to be desired. Elwin Evans undoubtedly turned in his finest performance of his four year career as his timely blocking time and again put other backs in position for

### long gains.

East Jordan will bring its 1950 football campaign to a close at Boyne City Friday evening when they meet the Gaylord "Blue Devils" at Brotherston Field at 8:00 p. m. The game was originally scheduled as an afternoon clash to be played at Gaylord, but work on the new Gaylord athletic field has necessitated the change.

Seniors who will be playing their last game of football for the "Red Devils" are: Max Sommerville, Elwin Evans, James Milstein, Bryan Boring, Donald Danforth, John Looze and Larry Huckle.

Charlevoix's "Red Rayders" practically clinched the conference title with a hard earned 18 to 12 victory over Pellston at Charlevoix last Friday. It was the 40th game in a row without a defeat for the high riding Charlevoix mgn. Not since East Jordan beat the Rayders in 1944 have the county seaters tasted a football defeat.

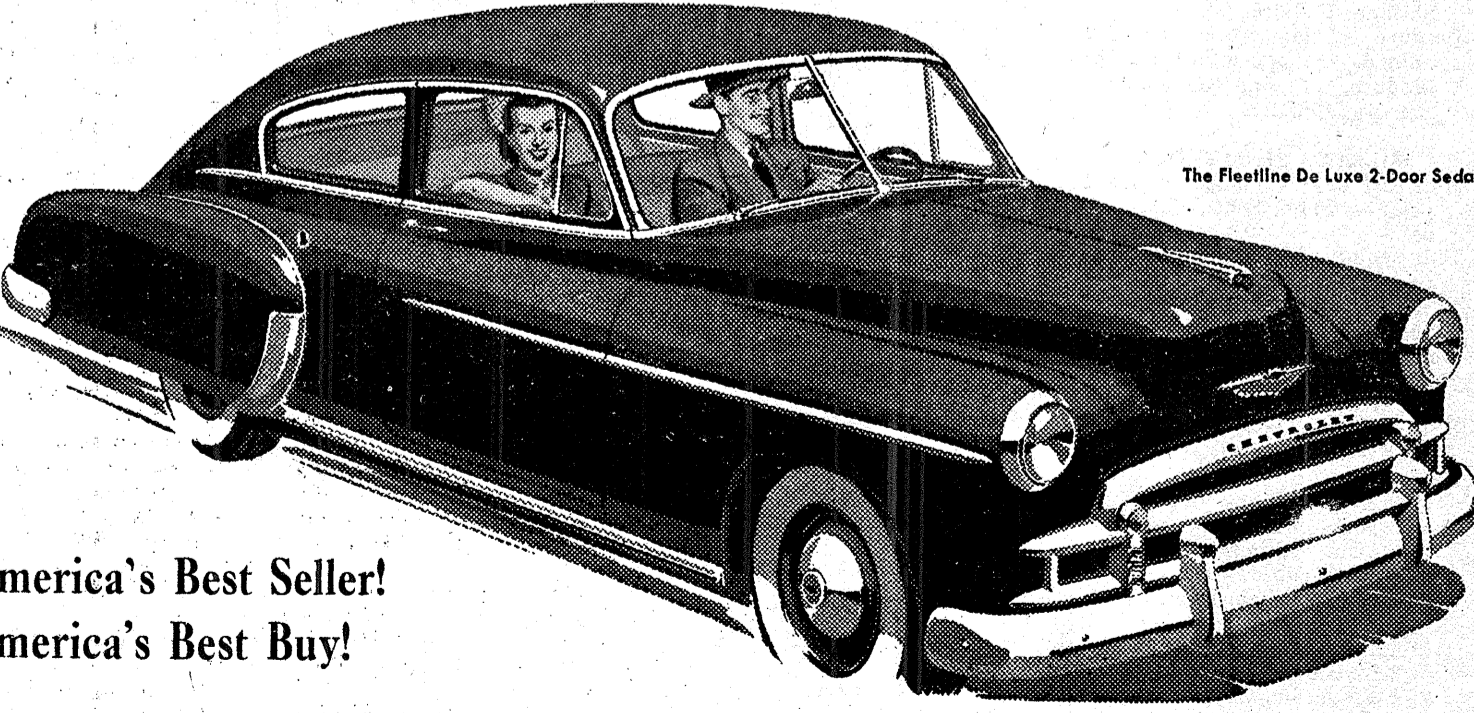

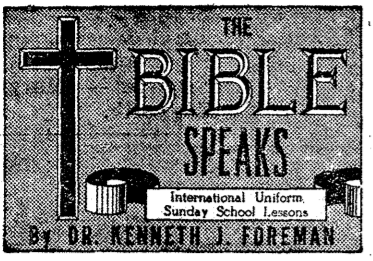

**Your Worst and Best**  
Lesson for November 5, 1950

"Within my earthly temple there's a crowd: There's one of us that's humble, one that's proud; There's one that's broken-hearted for his sins, And one that, unrepentant, sits and grins. From much perplexing doubt I could be free, If I could once be certain which is me."

FROM some anonymous rhymester comes this complaint, which any of us might have truthfully written if we had thought about it. Which is me, anyway? I seem to have three selves. One is a good deal better than my everyday or ordinary self. On rare occasions he will do something or other so good it surprises even my best friends — it "isn't like me." On the other side is another self, much worse than my everyday personality. He too surprises me by acts or thoughts so dreadful I am afraid of him and ashamed too. Yet both these "other selves" are "me" too.

**Life is a Fight**  
THE TRUTH of the business is that life, when a man takes it seriously, is a fight. It is a war between your best and your worst self. Your two other-selves are there every moment, like ghosts, or rather like a bright angel and a dark one.

It is always possible to become a better man than you are; also, alas, it is possible to become far worse than you are. No man stays the same through life. He is continually pressing upward, or plunging downward, or varying between the two. There has been only one person, Christians believe, who actually fulfilled all the good that was possible for him. The possibilities for evil in his life remained only possibilities—he never let them come to pass.

The possibilities for good, on the other hand, became real. His dark angel remained only a ghost; his good angel was simply his real self. At no point in his life was he forced to say to himself, "I wish I had . . . I wish I had not." And yet, even for him life was a struggle. We do not believe he sinned. We do believe he was tempted; and if the temptation was real, then he could have sinned. No man can be really tempted to do what he cannot do. Yes, the Master had his fight. But the point is: he won.

**The Way to Win**  
CHRISTIANS are not exempt in this war of good against evil. We are not "carried to the skies on flowery beds of ease" any more than Jesus was. We do not drift into the Promised Land. We have to fight our way uphill.

Yet Christians are expected to win. That is, God stands beside each Christian in his fight, and God's power is for the Christian's use. As Saint Paul says, with each temptation God provides a "way of escape." Our prayer "Lead us not into temptation" can always be answered. Sometimes it can be answered by ourselves. That is, we cannot leave the fight to God. But we can win as Jesus won: sometimes by standing and doing battle where we are, sometimes simply by leaving temptation behind. For often the best thing to be done is to retreat. Get as far as you can from whatever tempts your worse self. Don't stand debating between right and wrong when you know which is which. Turn your back on the wrong . . . run, don't walk, to the nearest exit!

**Is Alcoholism a Disease?**  
ONE OF the common temptations of millions at all times is alcoholism. It is popular to speak of this as a "disease;" and yet it is the only disease of which victims have actually cured themselves. Dr. Brady, whose medical column is well known, reminds us that nobody ever got over migraine headaches, or heart disease, simply by deciding to be well. But men and women have got over alcoholism, essentially by deciding to be well, and sticking to that decision. Alcoholics Anonymous, that well-known group of former victims, who have been very successful in helping slaves of this habit to become their best selves, use much the same methods we find in the New Testament: (1) staying out of temptation's way; (2) overcoming evil with good; and (3) laying hold of the "Power, not ourselves, that makes for righteousness."
