Save Our School of Primary Importance

EAST JORDAN SCHOOLS FACE CLOSING

Following the annual meeting of the school board of East Jordan Rural Agricultural School, a group of interested citizens discuss the critical situation facing our school for the approaching year.

The state legislature passed House Bill 407 this spring requiring each school district to fur-nish at least 5 mills toward its support in order to receive aid from the state. As it now stands, the schools in our county have been allocated 4 mills, the same levy as last year. Thus, it is necessary for our school district to raise the tax limitation in order to permit the board of education, necessary, to levy an additional mill to operate for the ensuing

This amount of one mill means, in money, to the taxpayer, that if his valuation is \$1,000.00, he will pay \$1.00 more for one year. This amounts will qualify us to receive state aid and thus enable our school to operate for the year 1951-1952. Unless this money is made available, our school will close about December 1951.

To explain this further, you will note the followng facts from the annual school report:

Approximately 6% of the total cost of operation was received from local taxes, 40% was received from other sources which includes primary fund, sales tax diversion, rural agricultural aid, tuition, hot-lunch program, etc. and 54 % was received from State

Aid. This 54% for total operation expense is the amount that will be withheld unless we raise the additional mill within our district.



Other fine artificial baits for both pike and pickerel include the old stand-by fluted spoons (red on one side and nickel on the other) with feathered hooks, double nicket spin-ners with pork rind strip, the pearl kidney spoon baits with feathered hooks, and the new Minnow Pike Spoon.

ROP STORAGE INCREASES PROFITS

Now that farmers produce more crops per acre, the crop storage problem is of prime im-portance. Bumper crops may be stored for feeding livestock or held for sale after glutted harvest markets have settled. Government figures show that in nine out of ten years it is profitable to store grain after the harvest season. Profits from cron storage can

Profits from crop storage can be lost, however, if storage build-ings are not properly constructed. Dampness can ruin as much as 25 bushels of grain on the floor of a 1,000-bushel bin. One rat alone will consume one bushel and con-taminate three additional bushels.



4-in. concrete slab is placed

A 4-in. concrete slab is placed over the moisture barrier. This slab is made of quality concrete mixed in the following propor-tions: 1 bag of portland cement 2% cu. ft. of small aggregate (gravel or crushed rock) 5 gal. of water when the sand is damp. After making a trial mix of the above materials, adjust to a mushy, workable consistency by varying the amounts of sand and gravel. Do not change the amount

varying the amounts of sand and gravel. Do not change the amount of mixing water. After the concrete floor is placed, the surface should be kept damp for at least five days. This curing may be done by covering with a waterproof paper, an inch of sand kept moist, or other ma-terial.

For a dry bin floor:

The most economical material for floors and foundations is con-crete. If properly constructed, a concrete floor will remain dry in all kinds of weather and will pro-tect the grain from rodents and rotting.

 Use quality concrete for the 4-in. watertight floor.

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PEACE IS POSSIBLE __ Events of the last few days have created a belief throughout the world that there is a possibility of peace in Korea. The first move for possible peace talks was made by Jacob Mallk, Soviet representative at the UN. U.S. Ambassador Alan Kirk later called upon Soviet Deputy, Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko in an attempt to get

a clarified version of Malik's bid. Kirk reported that Gromyko suggested that in the first stage negotia-tions for a truce should be conducted by military representatives in the field, with political and territorial questions left for second stage disposition.

Then, acting on instructions from Washington, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, commander of the allied armed forces, broadcast proposals to the Reds for a meeting aboard the Danish hospital ship Jutlandia in Wonsan harbor in North Korea.

After 29 hours of waiting, the Communists answered the broadcasts with a proposal for a meeting at Kaesong, just below the old Korean boundary on the 36th parallel. They suggested the meeting be held be-tween July 10 and 15.

No official reaction to the Communist proposal was immediately available. Most observers, however, believed the delay as proposed by the Reds was a face saving device, so important in the Orient. But the Communist reply was an indication that the Chinese and North Koreans desire peace. The 10 day delay will also permit the Chinese and North Korean leaders to seek further contact with Moscow.

As expected, the Communists made propaganda use of Gen. Ridgway's proposed peace talks. Communist broadcasts began to pound away at the line that the allies asked for peace talks because the "armed aggression line that of the United Nations forces has ended in failure."

There was one other indication that the talks may not be fruitless. The Communists failed to mention their repeated demands of admission to the United Nations and control of Formosa as a price of peace.

A sincere desire for peace remains uppermost in the minds of every American, from home town to the largest city. Whatever the results of the peace talks, it must be an honorable peace before it will be acceptable to American people. And it must be made clear to every American that a Korean settlement will not justify a slowdown in this nation's defense

A MONTH TO ARGUE-Congressional action in economic controls week caused considerable comment in the home towns of the nation.

According to the average American's concept of government, the congress of the United States is supposed to reflect the will and desire of the people. With this basic principle in mind, plus the fact that congress rushed through a bill extending the nation's economic controls for 31 days, but slapping an absolute ban on price rollbacks and most new price cell ings, it began to look like the average man on Main Street approved the high prices that prevail today.


Two main facts caused most of the nation's reporters and analysts to this conclusion: (1) The cost of living for the average family is higher today than ever before, 8.9 per cent above that of June 25, 1950 (see story below); and (2) the refusal of congress to pass a bill to hold back this rising spiral-in fact, specifically forbidding rollbacks and new price ceilings

The administration charged that the congress had allowed itself to be intimidated by special interests, pointing to the activities of the beef and textile industries, the national association of manufacturers, and the realestate lobby in recent weeks

Michael DiSalle, OPS administrator, put it like this: "Enemies of price control magnify errors and twist facts. They urge business-as-usual in un-usual times. They deliberately confuse free enterprise with irresponsible license. They misconstrue and misstate OPS action to the point of outright dishonesty."

Presenting the other side of the picture. Senator Taft of Ohio, said: "There is no reason for rationing businessmen outside the defense pro-gram," and price rollbacks "are dangerous economically because they upset all normal business relations. They are a step toward socialism"

The next month will be one of bitter debate on price, wage and rent legislation. What form it will finally take is anyone's guess at the moment. But it is a fantastic supposition that says the average American favors the

The Church and Its Own

ONE practical thing that Chris-tians can do for their communities is to see to it that no Christian suffers want. However much we may disagree with the Mormons, there is one feature of the Mormon church which the rest of us might take to heart: in all the depression of 20 years ago, there never was a Mormon on relief.


