A Detroit girl was injured fatally and three other teen-agers were hurt in an auto mishap two miles north of here, near Ed's Boats, on M-66 at 1:30 a.m., Saturday as reported by Police Chief Harry Simmons.
Dorothy Walsh, 17, daughter



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



Plan To Pamper Pullets: Payoff -'52 Profits

(Continued from page 1) and disinfected. It should be eady when pullets start laying. Deep litter should be used in laying houses now, and it should be six to eight inches deep. Cut straw is better than long straw. Shavings, sawdust and corncobs are satisfactory. Litter should be stirred regularly and any crusted,

matted material thrown out. When the pullets are housed, feed should not be changed. If County Herald doesn't like to growing mash is being fed, continue it two to three weeks while pullets become familiar with new surroundings. If a shift to laying mash is planned, farmers can start the laying mash the last two weeks pullets are out on range.

Housed pullets should not be startled as they are wild and shy at sudden motion such as someone entering the pens. Get acquainted with the birds and they will settle down to work.

Plenty of fresh air in housing will prevent birds catching colds but it should be fresh air without drafts. At first, the pullets will need teaching to go on perches, and setting them on perches will help. Birds will have more fresh air and suffer less from crowding when they learn to perch.

Pullet egg-laying is directly benefitted by longer days and poultrymen should start in September to use lights to gradually lengthen the pullets' "days" to 13 hours. This will maintain later

high production.
Pullets are the profit-makers from now until January, when old hens go back on full produc-tion again, and deserve some pampering, according to Moore.

FOR OUTDOOR FILM FANS

Let's get on with our lesson in outdoor photography—or how to increase your patting average in those snapshots. Just to refresh those snapshots. Just to refresh your memory we mentioned the importance of natural action rather than posed shots in last week's column. And we pointed out the essentials of good lighting when using color film.

Now let's tackle a big word—"composition." How does it apply in outdoor photography? It con-

"composition." How does it apply in outdoor photography? It concerns the light and shadow balance in your picture, and the artistic symmetry, or framing. For instance you may be taking a picture of a fisherman casting from a rowboat. How can you "compose" your setting to make it most effective?

Watch the Background

The background or horizon is very important. Unless it's a silhouette shot an all-sky background is too monotonous. Find a bit of the shoreline with puetty trees growing in an irregular pattern. "Frame" your fisherman in the wiewfinder so that his head in the wewfinder so that his head and shoulders may be outlined against the sky while the rest of the body contrasts against the trees or distant shore. Then re-lease the shutter at a moment that captures the feeling you get from the scene. If it's action you

want you must get the angler in the process of casting or battling a fish. If it's the peaceful serenity of a lovely lake that impresses you, snap your fisherman while he's lazily reclining on a boat

Foreground Atmosphere

To give depth to your picture it's often a good idea to frame part of it through a leafy bower, or over the shoulder of someone close to the camera. Don't let this foreground material dominate. It should merely give atmosphere and depth contrast. Professional and depth contrast. Professional photographers who go for those "salon" shots often use archways in the foreground to point up some distant scene. You can do the same thing in effect, shooting over the stern of a speeding boat to get the pattern of a swirling wake, climbing a hill and using the corner of a jagged rock in the foreground to shoot your campsite far below, standing on a straight wooded trail, catching your companion in the distance your companion in the distance waving, while the trees meet overhead to form a natural arch

overhead to form a natural arch in the foreground.

Shots like this are memorable keepsakes of wonderful trips, and while they often take a little more time in planning and prep-aration they're more than worth it in recapturing fun of another vacation in Michigan Outdoors.


