

Am. Legion Auxiliary Urges **Members** Cooperation


Capt. Alexander The American Legion Auxiliary Passes November 17



Areas in the north half of the ower peninsula where losses of deer from starvation have been heaviest include Oscoda, Crawford, Roscommon, and parts of surrounding counties, running north through Montmorecy county into the southern edges of Presque Isle and Cheboygan counties and including the Pigeon River country in Oscoda county and, farther west, taking in the northern part of Newaygo county, all of Lake county, and running northward into Wexford and Manistee counties.

Michigan's deer are a valuable asset. They represent a good many million pounds of edible meat-on-the-hoof, they attract close to a half million deer hunters annually who spend a good many millions of dollars in their pursuit.

What threatens the herd is a threat also to Michigan's economy.

Michigan has been slow in applying standard farm practice to the control of its deer herd. 



Areas in the north half of the lower peninsula where losses of deer from starvation have been heaviest include Oscoda, Crawford, Roscommon, and parts of surrounding counties, running north through Montmorecy county into the southern edges of Presque Isle and Cheboygan counties and including the Pigeon River country in Oscoda county and, farther west, taking in the northern part of Newaygo county, all of Lake county, and running northward into Wexford and Manistee counties.

Michigan's deer are a valuable They represent a good asset. many million pounds of edible meat-on-the-hoof, they attract close to a half million deer hunters annually who spend a good many millions of dollars in their pursuit.

What threatens the herd is a threat also to Michigan's economy

Michigan has been slow in applying standard farm practice to the control of its deer herd. No farmer who hopes to keep solvent with a twelve ga, shotgun near the Pinney Bridge. 
