

Apple Pie Baking Michigan Mirror **Champion Tells** How She Does It

You too can bake an apple pie -an apple pie that may well earn a blue ribbon.

Mrs. Harvey Rutherford, wife of a Decatur dairy farmer and mother of six children, was recently acclaimed Michigan's apple pie baking champion in a contest at the annual meeting of the

Michigan State Horticultural Society in Grand Rapids. Her entry topped 61 other pies

entered by county winners from all parts of Michigan. It earned her \$50 of top prize money furnished by the Michigan State Apple Commission. It was acclaimed by the judges as a "truly outstanding achievement in culinary art." Now Mrs. Rutherford tells how

she did it-gives out all her secrets so you too can bake a championship pie.

Here is her recipe:

Crust: 1½ cups unsifted flour; one teaspoon baking powder; onehalf cup lard; one teaspoon salt; six tablespoons cold milk. Cut lard into dry ingredients and add milk. Mix with serving knife. Divide for crusts and roll.

Filling: Enough thinly sliced Michigan Northern Spy apples to fill slightly more than level full a 9 inch pie dish; one cup sugar; one tablespoon flour; one-fourth Brown, 2 mysteries; Mrs. Frank | teaspoon nutmeg; one-half tea-Woodcock, 2 mysteries and a spoon cinnamon; one tablespoon western; Mrs. Thelma Evans, 5 butter. Mix dry ingredients tomysteries; Eugene Teichman, 2 gether, placing half on bottom crust. Place sliced apples on dry mixture and sprinkle remainder of mix on top. Dot top with butter. Moisten edge of .crust with water; seal with pastry decorator; coat crust with cream. Bake at 450 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes and 325 degrees for 45 minutes.






