### Masonic Temple To Be Erected At Boyne City

Boyne City.— A new Masonic temple is scheduled to be erected at the site of the former Boyne City Masonic temple which was destroyed in a disastrous fire last October 29, 1951, the Boyne City Masonic Building Association disclosed today.

Members of the lodge, who have been holding meetings in the I. O. O. F. hall here, are now busily engaged in a fund raising campaign to finance the construction of the building. The building, as planned, will be two stories high with stores on the first and the temple on the second. The second floor will also include a library, game room, dining room with a stage, a kitchen and preparation rooms for new members. Plans for the new structure were prepared by Architect Richard Lawson of Cheboygan.

The association hopes to have sufficient funds through their current fund drive, to start construction in the spring.

Last year East Jordan raised \$1700.00 for an increase of \$700.00 over the year before. Lets aim to better that mark in 1953.

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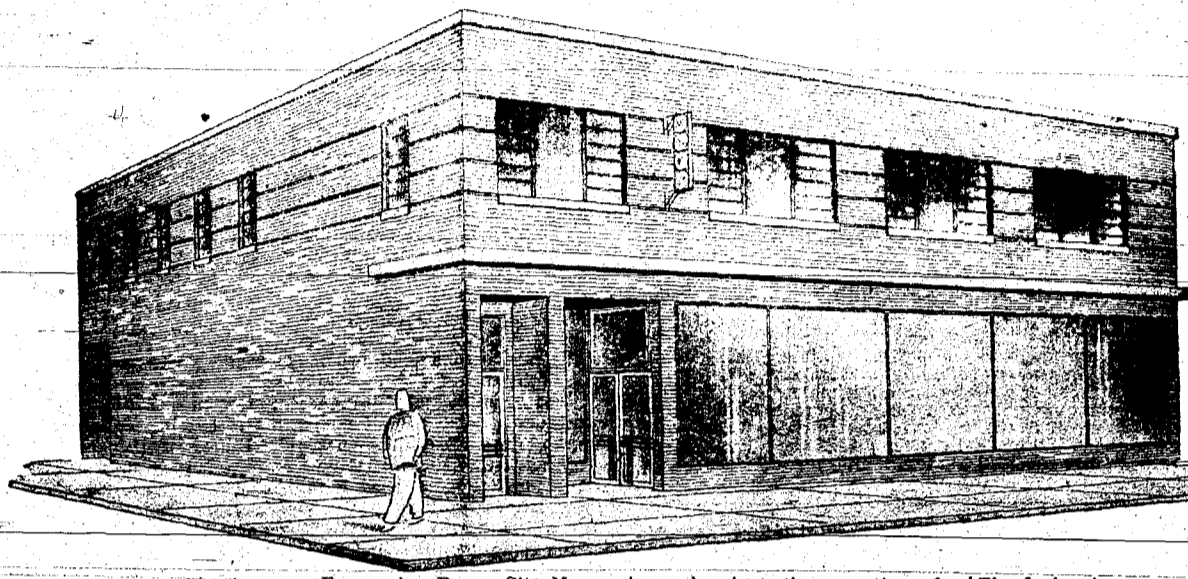

### Red Devils Win 5th and 6th Victories in Basketball

East Jordan High School chalked up its sixth win of the season here on Tuesday evening of this week as they scored a 55 to 53 overtime victory over a scrappy and smooth-functioning Reed City quintet.

It marked the third game in a row that the "Red Devils" were involved in a close hard-fought contest and this time it took an overtime for them to pull a victory out of the fire. The 2 teams were deadlocked at 51 all at the end of regulation play.

East Jordan started fast and were out in front at the end of the first stanza 13 to 10. Reed City caught fire in the second period with a 19 point scoring spree and held a 7 point advantage at halftime, leading 29 to 21. The Jordanites narrowed the gap during the third period and were trailing 39 to 37 at the three quarter marker. Both teams battled furiously during the final frame with the lead changing hands several times and as the final horn sounded ending regulation play the score board read 51 to 51. A pair of free throws by Evans and a field goal by Darbee offset free throws by Simon and McDade as the locals wrapped up the victory in the overtime period.

Keith Evans with 23 points, 15 from the foul line, was high man for the "Red Devils". Allen, capped Reed City guard, copied the scoring honors for the evening however, dumping in 26 counts for the losers' cause.

The Jordan quintet will tangle with a strong Onaway aggregation here tomorrow evening (Friday), the first of two contests scheduled to get under way at 7:00 p. m. To date Onaway has been defeated but once, a narrow loss to Class-B Rogers City.

East Jordan High School chalked up its fifth victory in seven starts this season here last Friday evening as they edged the Boyne City Ramblers 45 to 43 in a thrilling contest that saw the lead change several times.

Coach Dixon's visiting Ramblers jumped into an early lead largely on the efforts of big Don Arner, who tallied 10 of his teams 11 points in the opening stanza. Quick field goals by Warren Frank and Steve Hayden at the close of the 1st quarter knotted the count at 11 all. Both teams battled on about even terms during the second quarter with Boyne leading 19 to 18 at the intermission.

East Jordan worked its way to a 30 to 29 lead at the three quarter marker and managed to stay out in front through the final stanza although Boyne threatened time and again with a pressing defense.

Don Arner, senior pivotman, topped the visitors scoring column with five field goals and six free throws for a total of 16 points. Evans with 13 and Frank with 12 led the locals offensively.

Boyne City's Seconds scored a 30 to 22 triumph over the Jordan Reserves in Friday night's opener. Northrup tallied 10 points for the winners. Allen Sommerville scored 8 tallies for the locals.

Onaway High School's once beaten Red and White will be here tomorrow (Friday) evening to meet the Jordanites in a non-conference tilt. Only Class B Rogers City has downed the Onaway quintet this season.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Education of East Jordan Rural Agricultural Dist. No. 2, County of Charlevoix, Michigan, held on the 12th day of January, 1953 at 9:30 o'clock p. m., the following resolution was presented by Wm. A. Shepard, who moved its adoption.

WHEREAS, it is hereby determined that it is necessary to borrow the sum of \$9,500.00 in anticipation of the undistributed State Appropriations for the school year 1952-53 under Act No. 26 of the Public Acts of 1948 First Extra Session, as amended, for the purpose of obtaining funds to continue operation of the East Jordan Rural Agricultural School District No. 2; and

WHEREAS, Act No. 26 of the Public Acts of 1948 First Extra Session, as amended, authorizes such borrowing;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the district borrow the sum of \$9,500.00, or such sum as may be legally approved by the Municipal Finance Commission, for the above purposes, and issue its notes therefor in anticipation of the receipt of said undistributed State Appropriations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the secretary be and he is hereby authorized to file a certified copy of this resolution with the Municipal Finance Commission of the State of Michigan for and on behalf of the district as an application for an order approving such borrowing; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the proposed notes be dated January 21, 1953; be due September 1, 1953; bear interest at not to exceed 4 percent per annum; and be subject to redemption prior to maturity on the first day of any month at par and accrued interest upon written notice to original purchaser.

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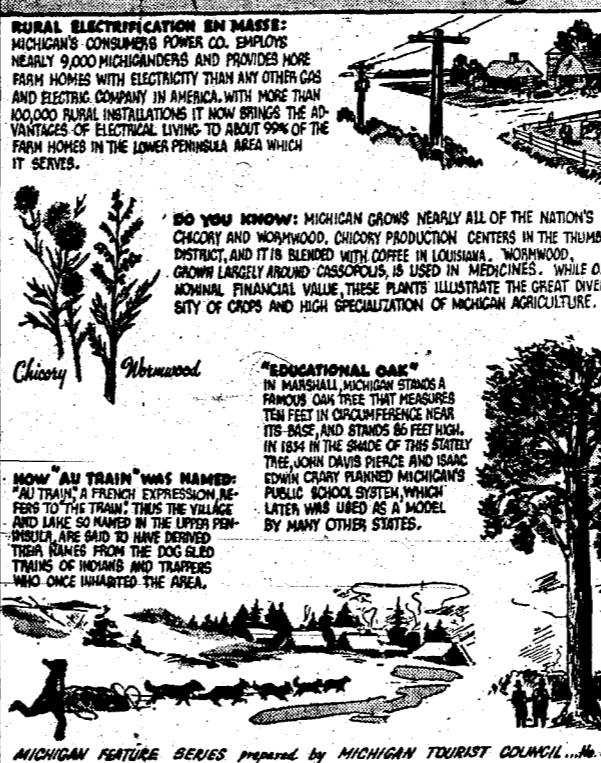

Here's one of last week's letters. One from Fred Burbank dated January 4, 1953. He writes, "Seeing as how it is a new year, I guess I had best turn over a new leaf and get a little done in the line of writing letters. Certainly am glad to see that you haven't fallen down on your writing, though.

"As usual it is raining here again in Norfolk. As it has been for the past month, off and on. More on than off I believe. I hear by the radio that a bit of snow has fallen up that way. I wish that it would get good and cold here and snow a little too. Prefer that much more than rain.

"They say don't make too much of a good thing and I guess that is what we must have done. We leave for Cuba tomorrow. Only a two weeks cruise this time though. It seems as if a bunch of reserves want to take a boat ride and of course you know the Navy is more than happy to accommodate them. Now don't take me wrong. It's not that I dislike reserves or anything, but I wish they would take their cruises on the Ironton Ferry. Sure would save a lot of time and trouble.

"I was lucky enough to get a leave this past Christmas but did not get as far as East Jordan. I spent my time in that little hick town south of the East Jordan Metropolis which is known as Lansing. At any rate I had a wonderful time. Hope that you can boast the same.

"Well Jake they just passed the word for supper, so guess that I had best go and partake of my evening meal. Here's hoping that this note finds you well and happy. May I extend to you and to all the good people of East Jordan a wish for a happy and a prosperous New Year. Fred Burbank SN,

Unemployment Insurance paid to these seasonal workers exceeds employers contributions to the Insurance Trust Fund.

### FARM FACTS

from your County Agricultural Agent

Ed. Rebman, Co. Agr'l Agent

Do you have woods with trees at least eight inches in diameter? Are the trees growing so densely they need to be thinned? Do you want income from these woods while they grow into saw-timber? If so, you are interested in the boltwood market, advises Ed Rebman, county agr'l agent.

Michigan has joined forces with Minnesota and Wisconsin to gather, check and publish information on producing boltwood—usually sold to mills in cords of 100 inch length or less. A bulletin, "Producing Boltwood," has been prepared and published at the University of Wisconsin by F. E. Trenk. Trenk's manuscript was approved by the Michigan State College forestry department. The bulletin is available at MSC's Bulletin Office, Department of Information Services, as Extension Bulletin 311.

The county agent points out that boltwood can be used for paper pulp, box boards, excelsior, roofing felt, barrel headings, bowling pins, mine props and other items, depending on the species and lengths. By harvesting out some boltwood, farm woodlot and other forest owners can give trees room to grow into lumber.

Extension Bulletin 311 covers the sizes and species that manufacturers want for certain items, tools used in the job, proper felling of the trees, bucking and peeling, skidding, time factors, piling, transport, marketing methods and other points in producing boltwood. County agricultural agents— "Take it easy with urea," advise distribution.

"Take it easy with urea," advises Ed Rebman, county agricultural agent, explaining that urea—sold now as "Two Sixty Two"—should be fed to dairy cows with caution.

Urea may be wasted, he explains, as rumen bacteria may not be able to convert the nitrogen from urea into protein fast enough to use it all. Over-feeding of urea can cause death of cows. The safest source of urea for dairymen is in commercial concentrates with not more than 5 percent urea and they should suspect higher urea percentage where crude protein is 50 percent or more of the concentrates.

Money is wasted feeding high-protein concentrates—urea or not—to cows that have a liberal feeding of hay that is at least one fourth legumes, notes the agricultural agent. Good legume hay and farm cereals usually are adequate feed.
