Industrious Beavers Cause Damage

Beavers are noted as an industrious lot of creatures, and so far as the conservation department

During recent years, the department has serviced hundreds of beaver damage complaints, a costly, time-consuming operation. Landowners call on department ty of the busy animals because of damage through flooding of roads timber stands and field crops.

Then it becomes the duty of state troopers to live-trap the acgram's recommendations all will be cused fur-bearers for release in more remote regions. But there's the rub, for beaver live traps are large and cumbersome and much effort is required to catch one of the dam builders.

During the period-January 1 September 1, 1951, 78 beavers had to be trapped following complaints n the northern lower peninsula at an average cost of \$41 per beaver Throughout the state in 1952, a

total of more than 400 complaints were registered with the depart-ment. Over 500 beavers had to be live-trapped; cost of this work was nearly \$18,000, or an aver-



WATCH BEEKEEPING COSTS

The beekeeping business isn't all honey, and according to Jack Deyell, care should be used to keep costs at a minimum and efficiency at a maximum. Deyell is editor of the magazine, "Gleanings in Bee Culture," and a former beekeeper. He spoke at Michigan State College's Farmers' Week last week. Deyell cautioned against establishing too many outlying apiaries. "The only justification for the






