Pete Lundy checked in from Ft. Knox by letter this last week. "Jake, I'll be dropping in to see you next week sometime. I'll be home on leave starting the 12th for six days before I report back here at Fort Knox. Then I'll be here until August 20th. I've got Armored School so I'll probably be seeing a lot of 1st Lt. Nelson as that's where he is. Out of 94 of us there were 10 that got Far East orders. Mine was in that bunch too, but they changed them to Armored School and that makes me feel better."  
I hope the weather up there has been good. Down here in Kentucky, it's been cold for the past 2 weeks. It snowed some and rained a lot. This was almost the first snow I've seen down here all winter.

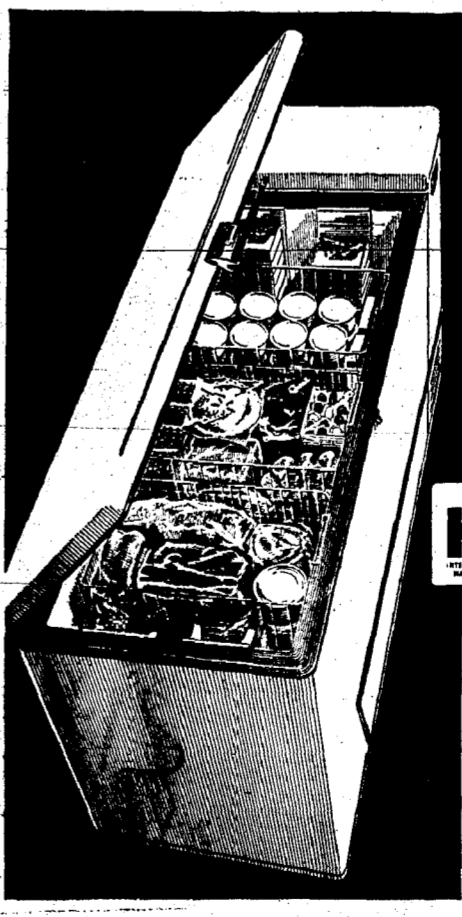
