per cent to 15 per cent of the sing. Use of a hormone spray may help your tomato plants produce ripe fruit two to three weeks earlier, reports Ed. Rebman. He says hormone sprays have been working well in counteracting the effect of low night temperatures. Fruit set, he explains, depends on the presence of a hormone or growth controlling chemical. There isn't enough of the chemical in the tomato flower at temperatures below 60 degrees. S.H. Wittwer, Michigan State College horticulturist, advises plant flowers while they are open. applying the spray to the tomato Ordinary household sprayers can be used on small plantings. On commerical plantings special onequart sprayers are used in applying the hormone. The chemical is available at many seed stores. Wittwer suggests going through the plantings once every three to maximum passenger capacity tag five days and spraying all blos- issued, which fee shall be used to soms showing color. Bids Accepted by Charlevoix Hospital **Board Until June 24**

The Charlevoix Hospital board of directors are accepting bids for the new area hospital to be built on the Trailer Park site overlooking Lake Michigan at Charlevoix, Fred W. Willis, chairman of the board announced recently.

Sealed bids for general con-struction, plumbing, heating and ventilating, laundry equipment, food service equipment and elec-trical work will be accepted until 2:00 p. m. June 24 when they will be opened at a public meeting at the city hall.

Construction is expected to begin as soon thereafter as the contractor can bring his equipment to the city, Mr. Willis said.

Final approval of the plans for the area hospital by the Michigan Office of Hospital Survey and Construction made it possible to advertise for bids at this time.

The hospital, which will have a maximum of 44 beds and 10 bassinets will cost an estimated \$600,000 when completely equipped. It will be financed by funds raised by public subscription and a federal grant made available through the Hill Burton act.

It will be constructed of concrete with steel re-inforcements and brick facing.

Gordon Cornwell and Co. of Traverse City are the architects. The one story structure will be constructed in the shape of a modified Greek Cross. The north arm will house only rooms for patients as will the north side of the west wing. The westerly section of the wing will contain the maternity ward with nursery and formula room, while the south section will house the labor and delivery rooms, operating rooms, central supply station and an emergency room.

The eastern section of the cross, where the main entrance will be located, will also hold the waiting room, radiology and laboratory and related rooms to the north and business offices, pharnacy, record and administrative offices to the south.

The southern extension will house the maintenance department, including the kitchen, laundry and heating plant, nurses and staff lounges and administrator's department. . .

'Dear Mr. Anderson:

We understand that a resolution or a bill has been presented to the Legislature which provides that no state funds of any kind be used for the principal, interest, maintenance or other expenses incidental to the bridge project. We are in agreement with this legislation and respectfully ask that you give it support.

Newspaper reports quote that Bridge Authority has asked the Legislature for \$500,000 or more annually for maintenance of the bridge. It follows that whoever assumes the expense of maintenance assumed the risk for the entire structure.

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



In deciding he would permit the bill to become a law without his signature, Governor G. Menmen. Williams raised a question of the measure's constitutionality. He declared the bill "is full of inequities and obscurities. Some of its language is positively ungram-matical and other sections may be bnconstitutional."

A Supreme court test, if prolonged for months, would toss a monkey-wrench into prospects of immediate tax relief. The act becomes effective July 1.

Governor Williams' barrage that the bill was ceived in secrecy, drafted in haste and adopted in ignorance" drev immediate answers from Republi-

Senator George N. Higgins, chairman of the Senate Taxation committee which sprung the bill law to at the 11th hour, said "it was the Governor fairest tax bill presented to the Legislature." Senator Carlton H: Morris of Kalamozoo, Republican floor leader and House Speaker Wade Van Valkenburg defended the bill staunchly and derided the

governor's criticism. Republicans did not defend the 11th hour methods employed to get the bill through the House Suspension of rules, explanation of the bill by lobbyists on the floor, and application of gag re-

strictions. In fact Senator Higgins said that if changes in the law were needed, "I ,am sure the majority of the Legislature will stand ready to make needed cor-rections."

The active part played by repre sentatives of the Ford Motor Company and General Motors Corporation in drafting the bill drew editorial criticism from the three Detroit daily newspapers. Ford and General Motors are Detroit - centered manufacturing companies.




