



## **Invasive plant** found around Lake **Charlevoix**



A non-native, invasive plant has characteristics reminicent of something one would see in a horror movie. The characteristics are horizontal roots that produce new shoots that continue until the roots exceed 60 feet, that's 60 feet, in length, it reaches a height of more than six feet per year, and, if it is cut off, it readily grows a new plant.

It sounds like science fiction and it is science, but, unfortunately, it isn't fiction. The plant known as "phragmites" is invading Lake Michigan, Lake Charlevoix and other lakes in Charlevoix county. No one invited it. but the invasive, non-native phragmites (pronounced frag-MY-tees) is here. And it is a bully. It creates tall, dense stands, that crowd out native plants and animals, block shoreline views, and reduce areas people use for swimming, fishing and hunting.

## Summer Will Help Reduce State Spending

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If you picked Friday, June 19th as the day to get those license tabs renewed, you were probably surprised to find that the Michigan Secretary of State office you visited was locked and lonely.


The reason behind the "closed" sign on the door is that Governor Granholm recently issued an Executive Order that will shut down many Michigan state government offices for six days this summer, part of an attempt to help offset a projected \$1.3 billion budget shortfall for the state this year.

The closures are aimed at general state offices, with essential services, such as Michigan State Police, correctional and psychiatric facilities, veteran's and youth facilities,

emergency programs and the Unemployment Insurance Agency, remaining on a "business as usual" schedule.

Still, the closings will affect about 37,400 state employees, and will save the state nearly \$22 million. Overall, the Executive Order (2009-22) issued on May 5th is expected to achieve approximately \$300 million in general fund savings. Some areas targeted for spending cuts include adult Medicare dental and vision coverage, as well as a number of state employee layoffs including some Michigan State Police troopers.

"The cuts are necessary," Governor Granholm stated at the Executive Order's unveiling, "but they will not undermine our commitment to protect citizens and work to create jobs during these very tough times. Michigan government can

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
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

## Local Heros; Shirley Vollbach The "Amazing Mom V" is East Jordan Citizen of the Year

hirley Vollbach, affectionately known many as Mom V, found the tumor last hristmas Eve.

A trip to the doctor revealed that it had meastasized from some other cancer, and tests began to determine the source. It could be liver. It could be stomach. It could be lung. It could be breast cancer.

The wait was difficult and Mom V is proactive. When it took too long to get results, she called the head of radiology at Northin Michigan Hospitals and reminded him gently that she is in her 70's, doesn't have time to wait around, and is a very busy



lady. The next day, she and her family were celebrating breast cancer. Of the available options, it was the best.

In the testing process, it was discovered that the amazing Mom V had grown a new spleen after hers was lost in a 1995 accident. If one can grow a new spleen, what can one not overcome?

In January, Shirley was named East Jordan Citizen of the Year. She was grateful. She was just doing what she loves to do, she said. It was very nice that people appreciate it.

The timing was wonderful. Well-wishers fluctuated from, "I'm praying for you," to "Congratulations!" Either way, she was surrounded by positive, loving thoughts. The important thing, she was told, is attitude and appetite. Shirley would add, and positive people.

"I haven't quit doing everything I normally do, and I think that's the answer," Shirley said.

She began to lose her hair with the first chemo treatment and immediately had Dawn Zimmer cut it off. "People are used to me in hats anyway."

Shirley's daughter, Paula Vollbach, is the director of the East Jordan High School's spring musical, and Shirley is very involved each year. She told the kids immediately. They were very supportive, but they also got to ask her sensitive questions. "I could talk to them about it in ways fam-

ily members might not be able to," Shirley said, thankful for the students' support and also for the chance to educate them on a subject that will touch so many lives.

"You've got to surround yourself with prayer and positive thoughts," she added, seated in a lawn share on her shady deck, her bald head covered by a white baseball cap with the words, "I'm fine... Thank you for asking" in pink glitter paint.

"People say, 'You do so much for the community,' but the community never says no to me. I just return the favor," Shirley said. "Nothing is ever going to make me stop doing what I am doing."

Shirley moved 22 times while she was growing up and later as a wife and mother. As a child she lived with "whoever would take me in." She never felt like she had a home town.

"This has been home," she stated. "Everybody's been great about making us feel at home. Wherever I've moved, I've always said, 'OK, Lord, what can I do to make a difference? I never think I'm doing anything different than anyone else. I just love what I do. I love getting involved. If I didn't love it, I wouldn't do it."

Of the cancer, Shirley has never had any doubt she would beat it. But she doesn't feel like she will do battle alone.

"I have a lot of faith in the Holy Spirit, and He leads me. You've got to believe in people. You've just got to be positive all the time. There's so much goodness in the world if you look for it," she said, adding that "You've got to do something kind for someone every day."

Shirley made certain aspects of her treatment fun. She wore funky hats (nothing new), and she determined to liven up the infusion center.

"People were sad," she said, "and they didn't talk. I talked about it. I didn't force it, but it got people talking. Sharing is always helpful."

Chemo is done now. Shirley Vollbach looks forward to being able to taste again, and to having her snow-white hair back. She looks forward to enjoying the weather, reading some, and recuperating. Truthfully, she won't much. She will keep on truckin', just like she always has, not slowing down perceptibly.'

Now she has another thing to share: "Come to me," she invites other cancer victims. She'll let you talk, She'll support you in any way she can. She'll let you in on the things she's learned about how to get through the chemo and maybe even the fear. But no; not fear.

"I'm not scared. I feel that I've done what I wanted to do and will keep on for as long as I can. I've always told my kids – never regret," Shirley said. "We're going to beat it. But if something happens, I've had a good life...especially here, in East Jordan."



The 7th Annual Charlevoix/Emmet County Pink Ribbon Ride was held on Saturday, June 20, 2009. The possibil ity of rain may have deterred some, but we still had 205 participants show up and help us raise \$28,491. This is overwhelming considering the state of our economy. This money will provide both the Circle of Strength through: Charlevoix Area Hospital and Northern Michigan Re gional Hospital's Breast Health Fund with a substantial donation to help promote awareness, fund programs in early detection and education, provide support for wom en and their families, and make available mammograms and ultrasounds for under and uninsured women in Charlevoix and Emmet County.

In the past year these groups have provided mammograms to 61 women, with 12 of them receiving ultrasounds and MRI's. Additionally four women were able to get diagnostic biopsies. This was accomplished without the stress and worry of how they were going to pay for it. In these uncertain times when everyone is cutting back and downsizing, it is comforting to know there is somewhere to turn.







no longer afford to be all things to all people and just as businesses and families are being forced to cut back on spending so, too, is state government."

Now there's a novel thought.


Some of the offices that have qualified for the six unpaid "holidays" include the Secretary of State, The Lottery Bureau and MichiganWorks. A reduced number of DNR staff will be on hand during furlough days, just enough to keep state parks and recreation areas open and running. The Mackinac Bridge will also remain open so don't try using that excuse for extending a weekend trip to the Upper Peninsula.

"While it was very challenging," notes Bob Felt of the Michigan Department of Transportation office in Gaylord, "we made it through the first furlough day without a major incident. Our road projects were still active because it is more expensive to shut them down than it is to keep the crews working."

Dave Graham, office manager of the DNR office in Gaylord, states, "It definitely helps the budget. We all understand that we have to do our part."

Cindy Pushman, Otsego County Department of Human Services (DHS) director, observes, "Our staff completely understands that with the budget the way it is something needs to be done. Our biggest concern is that our caseloads have increased, (DHS has seen a 96% increase in cases statewide since 2002), and we have a new computer system we are converting to and are still adjusting to those changes. Our work is in assisting people's food and medical needs, so when we aren't there it directly affects them."







range from six to 15 feet in height, yet 80 percent of the plant is contained below the ground in a dense mass of roots that can penetrate the soil to a depth greater than six feet, according to the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality.

To top it off, if this invasive variety of phragmites isn't disposed of in a specific way, disposing of it may cause it to spread. For instance, disturbing the soil with a rake may contribute to rapid expansion by cutting through a root that will then start another plant system.

<sup>br</sup> In Charlevoix county the Lake Charlevoix Association is educating its members and the public about the plant that is becoming a serious problem. The association works closely with the MDEQ.

<sup>(2)</sup> "We need to control it now before it gets any more established," said Dan Mishler, a vice president of the Lake Charlevoix Association. "It could take over and that will dramatically reduce our enjoyment of <u>The</u> lake."

The Lake Charlevoix Association states that 110 stands of the invasive plant have been identified so far. A map that may be accessed through the Association's website indicates the locations. The Association issued an "alert" letter recently that explained the seriousness of the need to control the phragmites.

"A fast spreading plant is invading Lake Charlevoix and could dominate our shoreline in just a few years," it stated in part. "Imagine an extremely dense wall of reeds blocking the view of the lake and diminishing property values."

The letter asks members and the general public to refrain from any attempt to treat or remove phragmites, because the Association will use a treatment plan approved by the MDEQ.

The Charlevoix Conservation District, the Antrim Conservation District, MSU Extension and Little Traverse Bay Bands are groups joining together to attempt to control the plant, as well as government agencies such as the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and townships around Lake Charlevoix. Townships such as Norwood and Charlevoix have passed ordinances that address the need to control pragmites. Lake Charlevoix has 60 miles of shoreline and Mishler said seven townships have at least some frontage on either Lake Charlevoix or Lake Michigan.

The Lake Charlevoix Association is seeking volunteers from homeowners around Lake Charlevoix and from anyone concerned about Lake Charlevoix and other lakes in the county. Volunteers are needed to conduct a survey this summer, to be trained in the treatment of the plant control and to remove the dead plants after treatment without seeds spreading. 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
## **Amy Speace will open Aten Place on June 27th**


For those who have energy to burn, recreation activities may include biking, crosscountry skiing, snowshoeing, disc golf,

## Fish and Wildlife Service Seeks Proposals from **States for 2009 Endangered Species Grants**

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is seeking proposals from states and U.S. territories interested in obtaining federal grant assistance to acquire land or conduct planhing for endangered species conservation efforts. For fiscal year 2010, the President's budget request for the Cooperative Endangered Species Conservation Fund includes approximately \$100 million in grant funding for conservation planning activities and habitat acquisition benefiting federally protected species. Proposals must be submitted to the appropriate Service Regional Offices by August 19, 2009.

"These grants are among the Service's most important tools to build partnerships with the States," said Acting Service Director Rowan Gould. "They provide states and territories with vital funding, enabling them to work with local communities and private landowners to protect habitat and conserve threatened and endangered species."

The Cooperative Endangered Species Conservation Fund is authorized under Section 6 of the Endangered Species Act and provides grants to states and territories to support participation in a wide array of voluntary conservation projects for species on the federal list of threatened and endangered species, as well as for species that are either candidates or have been proposed for listing.

The Service is seeking proposals under the

following three Cooperative Endangered Species Conservation Fund categories:

Recovery Land Acquisition Grants - These grants provide funds to states and territories for acquisition of threatened and endangered species habitat in support of approved and draft species recovery plans. Acquiring habitat in order to secure long term protection is often the critical element in a comprehensive recovery effort for a listed species. One example from last year's recipients include a grant for \$840,593 to acquire a 1,242-acre tract that protects the ocelot, jaguarondi, northern aplomado falcon, and several state-protected species in Cameron County, Texas.

Habitat Conservation Planning Assistance Grants - This category provides funds to states and territories to support the development of Habitat Conservation Plans (HCPs). The purpose of an HCP is to ensure adequate protection of suitable habitat for threatened and endangered species, while at the same time providing for economic growth and development. These grants provide support for baseline surveys and inventories, document preparation, outreach, and similar planning activities. For instance, the states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado, and Texas received a total of \$1,080,990 last year to assist in the development of a landscape level, multi-species HCP designed to

avoid and minimize impacts to endangered and threatened species associated with wind energy development.

HCP Land Acquisition Grants - These grants provide funds to states and territories to acquire land associated with approved HCPs. They do not fund mitigation required of an HCP permittee, but rather, support acquisitions by the state or local governments of habitat that complement actions associated with the HCP. For example, one of last year's recipients was the state of Wisconsin, which received \$1.5 million to acquire 1,110 acres in the Quincy Bluff and Wetlands State Natural Area to permanently protect habitat for the Karner blue butterfly, which provided substantial benefits for the recovery efforts of the Glacial Lake Wisconsin Karner Blue Butterfly Recovery Unit.

For the first time, through this notice for fiscal year 2010, the Service is incorporating aspects of climate change when evaluating the proposals submitted through the Cooperative Endangered Species Conservation Fund. The Service will look at criteria that address concerns and methodological approaches to the emerging science and potential impacts of climate change on listed species.

By law, the state or territory must have a current cooperative agreement with the Secretary of Interior and contribute 25 percent

of the estimated program costs of approved projects, or 10 percent when two or more states or territories undertake a joint project The grants are expected to be awarded soon after federal appropriations are provided for fiscal year 2010.

## Certain Childhood Behaviors Are Nothing To Be Ashamed About

QUESTION: My four-year-old has recently "discovered" his penis and seems rather preoccupied with it. Do you think it's unusual or sinful for him to fondle himself so much?

DR. DOBSON: The answer to both of your questions is

FOCUS ON THE FAMILY The key to your approach is the avoidance of any suggestion that her body is dirty or "wrong" or evil. Such an implication might raise a whole host of other problems for your child that could carry over into adolescence and even adulthood.

QUESTION: My son is an outstanding gymnast. His high school coach says he has more natural ability than anyone he's ever seen. Yet, when he is being judged in a competitive meet, he does terribly! Why does he fail during the most important moments?

DR. DOBSON: If your son thinks of himself as a failure, his performance will probably match his low self-image when the chips are down. In the same way, there are many excellent golfers on the PGA Tour who make a satisfactory living in tournament play, but they never win. They may even place as high as second, third, sixth, or tenth. Whenever it looks like they might come in first, however, they "choke" at the last minute, and someone else wins. It is not that they want to fail; rather, they can't conceive of themselves as winners,

nificance to early fondling activity is in how you as a parent deal with it. I've received letters from mothers who say they have spanked their preschoolers for touching themselves. Some have described great concerns about this behavior, seeing it as evidence of an immoral nature that had to be crushed. That is a very dangerous posture to take. I suggest that you not make a big deal over it.

QUESTION: That's easy for you to say. My four-year-old daughter doesn't just fondle herself at home, where we ignore it. She rubs herself whenever we are in public, such as at church or at a restaurant. How should I deal with that?

, DR. DOBSON: You should respond as a teacher, not a disciplinarian. Take your daughter aside and talk about your concern. Explain that there are some things that we don't do in public -- not because they are wrong, but because they are impolite. Just as you wouldn't urinate in front of other people, you should not be touching yourself when others can see you. If she continues to fondle herself, other people will think she is strange and some may laugh at her -- something you're sure she wouldn't like. Your purpose in speaking this way is to sensitize her to the social implications involved in what she's doing. Show yourself to be firm and confident, not shocked or embarrassed.

I once spoke with a concert pianist of outstanding talent who has resolved never to play in public again. She knows she is blessed with remarkable talent but believes she is a loser in every other regard. Consequently, when she plays the piano on stage, her mistakes and errors creep into her performance. Each time this mortifying experience has occurred, she has become more convinced of her own unworthiness in every area. She has now withdrawn into the secluded, quiet, talentless world of have-nots.

A person's self-concept is instrumental in determining those who are "winners" and those who see themselves as "losers." Professional tennis players call this characteristic "tournament toughness," but it is really nothing more than confidence in action.





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
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# Jordan Valley **Triathlon is Saturday**







waterfront and access, residential home and condos, as well as vacant lots and land. If you're a buyer, these are great numbers - in every price range there are ample quality options.

We hear a lot about the flood of foreclosures, and I don't deny we're seeing some of that. But here's some good news: Of the 1,301 listings in Charlevoix County, only 35 are bank-owned properties (including 22 under \$100,000).

The reason this is good news is that it means "distressed" properties, or foreclosed homes, are not driving the real estate economy, especially in the mid-range to higher end homes. However, they are available, and if you are willing to wade through the process of purchasing a foreclosed home, there are some incredible opportunities out there.

In addition to a strong inventory, money is reasonably affordable. While loans are necessarily tougher to get than they have been in recent years, interest rates have come way down. In the past few months we saw record lows. These have started to creep back up, but as of 6/19, a borrower could still get a 15-year fixed rate loan for 5.25%. This was unheard of a decade ago!

The point is, there's no such thing as a "bad" market. While this may be an oversimplification, there are essentially two different markets – one favors the seller, the other the buyer. Each has its advantages and disadvantages.

It is a fact that today's market is exceptional if you want

to invest in real estate.

One final thought: Here in northern Michigan, inventory, interest rates, buyer's market, seller's market - all these fade in importance to some extent. We are fortunate to live in an area where we are all pretty much favored in any economic climate: blue skies, fresh water, cool breezes and deep woods combine to make this one of the most desirable places to live in the whole world. So the biggest problem a buyer should have in any market in our neck of the woods, is deciding which listing to call home!



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
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
