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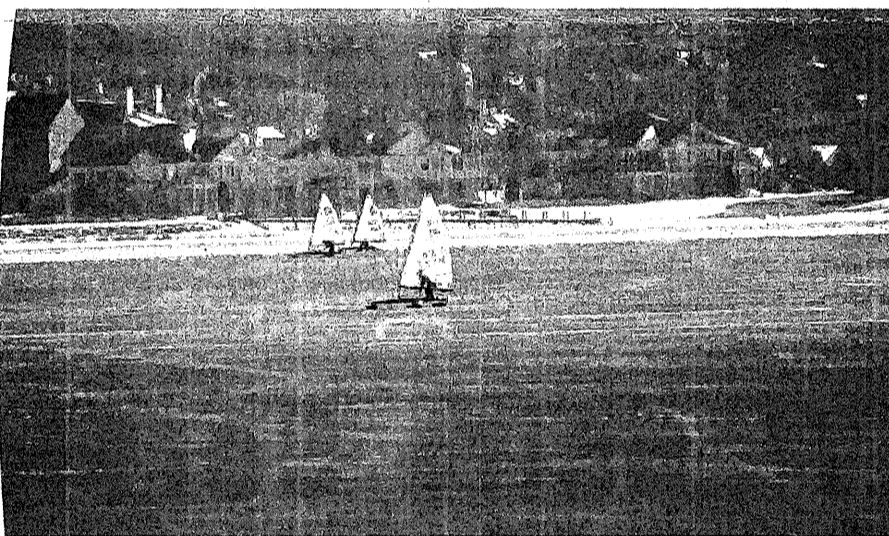
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"GOOD ICE" BRINGS MANY ICE SAILORS TO BOYNE CITY



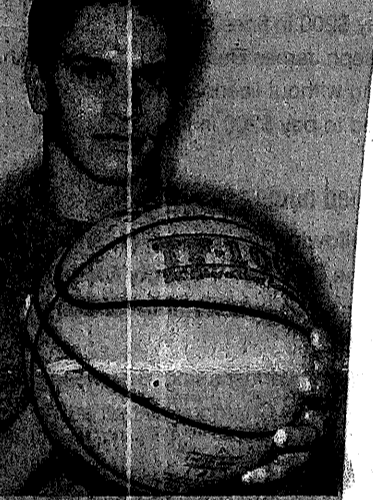

Danbert reaches scoring milestone

Ellsworth senior surpasses 1,000 points; Lancers keep winning

ELLSWORTH— It was only a matter of time. Senior Jared Danbert, the latest in a long line of exceptional athletes to wear the Ellsworth uniform, surpassed the 1,000-point scoring plateau on Tuesday, Jan. 12, against Northern Lakes Conference foe Mackinaw City. Danbert needed 23 points to reach 1,000 going into the game and hit for

Charlevoix Seeks EMS, Fire Agreement

CHARLEVOIX — The city presented EMS, rescue and fire service contracts to the boards of Hayes, Charlevoix and Eveline townships, but the townships sent the contracts back — unsigned.

The township boards did not approve of some of the language in the draft agreement, but they are interested in more discussions with the city of Charlevoix. At issue is the city's proposal to the townships that the city provide EMS, fire

and rescue services, for a fee to be determined. Charlevoix has the equipment and staff needed in emergency situations.

One of the issues for Hayes, Charlevoix and Eveline townships is that the contract is written to be in effect for a term of six years. The townships would like that term reduced.

Council member Lyle Gennett said people are not knowledgeable about the matter.

"I think one of the problems is there are people in the townships who don't understand the process at all. They need to be edu-

Municipalities Look To Future of M-75 Corridor

BOYNE CITY — The area along M-75, the state highway that runs east and west from the blinker light in Boyne Falls into Boyne City, hasn't changed much in the last 50 years or so. Now, local government planners and land consultants are eyeing the approximately 10-mile stretch and holding public input meetings to determine the best future use of the area.

A meeting on Jan. 13 brought more than 70 citizens out to participate in the first discussion centered on future use and development of the M-75 corridor. The general consensus among the group was a concern for safety and a desire for the area to look attractive. The zoning along M-75 varies from residential to rural to commercial and industrial, prompting comments about the need for well-planned landscaping.

Planning Commissioner Jane MacKenzie said

many of the citizens she talked with asked about a non-motorized recreational trail. It is unknown at this time whether a trail will be included in the plans, but the public will help with that decision by attending the public meetings or sending comments to the Boyne City Planning Director. The M-75 corridor involves three municipalities: Boyne Valley Township, Wilson Township and Boyne City and all three are actively involved in deciding its future. Most of the land is located in Boyne Valley Township. Boyne City Planning Director, Scott McPherson, who also advises Wilson Township, reported to the Boyne City Planning Commissioners on Monday, Jan. 18, that he expects to have three more meetings for comments. A meeting will be held in Wilson Township, in Boyne Valley Township and in Boyne City. No date has been set yet for the next meeting, but it likely will be in February. "After that (the three meetings) we'll have a wrap-up session in about June," McPherson said. A group known as Partnerships for Change, Sustainable Communities, recently awarded a service grant to the Boyne City community "to help clarify and organize potential cooperative planning options along M-75." Service grants provide for a defined number of an expert's time and advice, such as those of an engineering consultant. The M-75 corridor project was awarded service value of up to \$7,000.

The intent of Partnerships for Change is to create partnerships among adjacent municipalities. The overall mission of the program is to foster new and expanded cooperation among cities, townships and villages in developing and carrying out local land use policies that preserve cultural and natural resources. Partnerships for Change is a part of the Land Information Access Association based in Traverse City. The website is: partnershipsforchange.cc/. City Faces Deficit

Recommends Budget Reductions of more than \$200,000

As the East Jordan City Commission met Tuesday night for their regular scheduled meeting, concerns over a budget deficit took over much of the discussion. Although taxable SEV has risen 11.85% in the city over the past 5 years it held steady last year and it is expected to drop next year. Expenses on the other hand continue to rise and the city is facing what many people in the area are facing... costs are rising faster than income.

CPA, Douglas Wohlberg presented his report on the audit of the city's financial report. Wohlberg gave the city a "clean" opinion on the financial statements. This is the best possible rating. In his summary, he praised the city claiming their internal controls are properly designed and operating properly. He also commented they have a good budgeting process. He warned the commission that they and all municipalities can expect state shared revenue to decrease in the coming year.

Those properties include East Jordan Tourist Park and Beach, Municipal Harbor, Community Park, Memorial Park, Rotary Skate Park, Sportsman's Park, Civic Center, Elm Pointe, Watson Field, GAR Park, Murphy Field and adjoining Adult Softball Field, Basketball & Tennis Courts. Most of these facilities operate on a slim budget but are a tremendous resource for the city. The sore spot in the Parks budget comes from operating the Municipal Harbor. Costs are prohibitive and revenues fall far short of covering expenses. During the presentation Cannon offered ideas for increasing revenues and improving the parks and facilities.

The Municipal Harbor lost more than \$200,000 this year causing the City Commission to look at some difficult budget cuts in

the months to come. Commissioner Ray Fisher made a motion for department heads and the Interim City Administrator to cut over \$200,000 from their departments. Fisher's plan suggested cuts of \$20,400 in the Parks Department; \$87,760 from the Dept of Public Works and \$101,562 from the Police Department. Most of these cost reductions would involve staff reductions from the city payroll.

Commissioners agreed there are going to be some difficult cutbacks in the future but they must balance the budget or risk losing State Revenue Sharing funds. A special committee has been formed to research the best solutions and Interim City Administrator, Denny Jason will meet with department heads to work through this financial situation.

Charges dropped for former assistant prosecutor

CHARLEVOIX — The charges against a former Charlevoix county assistant prosecutor were dismissed on Dec. 14 for lack of sufficient evidence. Judge Richard W. May of the 90th District Court dismissed the case against Brian Seelye of Boyne City who had been accused of obstruction of justice when he allegedly advised a defendant on an issue in a 4th degree criminal sex-

ual conduct case. Seelye's attorney, Mary Beth Kur, said both she and Seelye were pleased with Judge May's dismissal. The Boyne City Main Street / Downtown Development Authority will be hosting a "Main Street Building Basics" presentation on Tuesday, Jan. 26, from 8:30 to 10 a.m. at the Boyne District Library Conference Room. The public, especially downtown property owners and individuals interested in historic preservation are invited to attend. The presentation will be a webinar conducted by Kelly Larson, Main Street architect for the State Historic Preservation Office. The presentation will focus on the history of downtowns and the evolution of older buildings over time. Also discussed will be good historic preservation principles and practices to maintain the unique qualities of historic buildings, while also making them functional for today's needs.

The presentation is a kick-off point for the Boyne City Main Street Design Committee to select downtown buildings to receive design services intended to facilitate the rehabilitation of a building's facade. Any building located within the downtown is eligible to receive the no-cost design services that include a schematic drawing of the proposed facade improvement, preliminary cost estimate, and paint samples. The design services are provided by the State Historic Preservation Office in the Michigan State Housing Development Authority. Any property owner interested in receiving the services must first attend a "Main Street Building Basics" presentation. An application, available at the

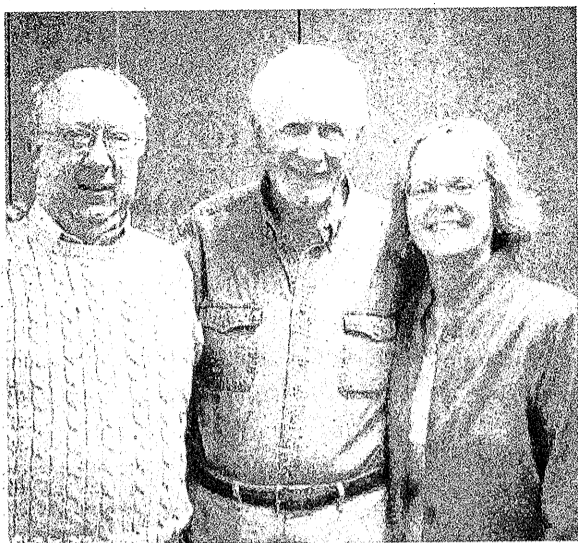

Delaney Retires from Dental Clinics North

Pediatric dentist helped launch the system of public health dental clinics for low-income, uninsured

James Delaney, DDS, practiced dentistry for nearly 45 years with the philosophy "people don't care how much you know until they know how much you care". After retiring in 1995 from one of the busiest pediatric dental offices in the Midwest, Delaney took a couple of years off until he started looking for a place to help needy children. On a family vacation, he stopped at an open house in Gaylord and met Gerald Chase and Linda Yaroch from the Health Department of Northwest Michigan.

It was not long before he was working part-time to assist in the development of Dental Clinics North—a system of public health dental clinics for people with low incomes, uninsured, or enrolled in Medicaid.

For the last 13 years, Delaney directed Dental Clinics North's Hospital Program, treating children, mostly youngsters under age four, whose severe dental problems required treatment in a hospital setting. He launched the "Healthy Smiles" program to educate, screen and identify early childhood tooth decay in pregnant women, infants, and children through health departments' maternal and child health services.

"Dr. Delaney has made significant contributions to the health of children in northern Michigan as both a pediatric dentist and leader within Dental Clinics North," said Gerald Chase, Health Officer for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan.

Delaney began his career as a pediatric dentist with specialty training in 1966, followed by a one-year fellowship at the Mott Foundation. The following year he joined the staff at Children's Hospital of Michigan in Detroit and treated hospital patients in an outdated clinic until 1971. That's when he was appointed Children's Hospital's Dental Director and assisted in the design of the new hospital in the Detroit Medical Center.

There he started an in-house group of pediatric and related dental specialists to care for children with special needs, such as cleft palate or multiple medical issues. In 1977 he helped develop a two-year specialty training program and was appointed Chief of the Dental Department. Over the next 10 years, more than 20 dentists completed the program and the majority stayed in Michigan to practice. He says he's proud they all finished the Michigan state boards and those that took the American boards passed those too.

In the early 1990's Delaney started rotations for dental students from the University of Detroit and University of Michigan. In 1994 he received grant funds from Delta Dental to start a school-based dental clinic in Detroit for high needs children; dental hygiene students did rotations to learn pediatric dental. After five years, all of the students had received dental care, including sealants to protect their teeth from cavities.

"It's been a pleasure to work with Dr. Delaney," said Linda Yaroch, Deputy Health Officer who developed 10 public health dental clinics for people with low incomes or with no dental insurance. "He treated his clients in such a kind and gentle manner. He has a sly sense of humor that helps him connect with children and their parents and colleagues. He was an important mentor for many of us."

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality health care, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties. Dental Clinics North locations include Mancelona, East Jordan, Cheboygan, Pétoskey/Harbor Springs, and Gaylord. I'm Walkin' on Sunshine,

and It's Time to Feel Good

Deciding to exercise is the first step in what should be a long-term commitment and lifetime journey. Determining what type of workout routine is right for you depends upon a number of personal factors such as age, health, fitness, time and expectations.

Walking is a very popular exercise of choice among participants of all ages. Not only is it good for you, but also walking is also preferred over many other fitness activities because it's easy to do and has several health benefits. Walking is an equal opportunity exercise that can be done almost anywhere. It doesn't require equipment or a gym. There are very few excuses why you can't do it.

Despite it being easy to do, walking provides health benefits of improved circulation, lower blood pressure, toned muscles and strengthened bones. Walking produces results of increased energy, weight loss and a healthy escape from stress.

Before beginning a walking program contact your medical provider for a check-up or consultation if any of the following conditions apply to you.

Not exercised for a year or more
Over 65 and do not currently exercise
Have been diagnosed with heart trouble
High Blood Pressure
Diabetes
Pregnant
Experience Chest Pain
Feel faint or have dizzy spells

WHAT TO WEAR

Start at the bottom. Selecting the right shoes is not only good for your feet, but your whole body as well. Having the proper shoes is essential before you begin your walking routine.

Feel – A well-fit pair of running shoes is an ideal choice for most walkers. Walking shoes should be replaced every six months or 500 miles which ever comes first. Over time

shoes lose cushioning and the ability to absorb impact.

Fit – Walking shoes should be a size to a size and a half larger than your dress shoe.

Your shoes must fit properly, but leave enough room so your feet can expand while walking.

Flat – Walking shoes should be flat, with little difference between the heel and ball of the foot.

Function – Select a shoe that is comfortable and will help you perform your best. As walking requires little expense, choose a shoe based on functionality rather than economy. Your body will thank you for it.

Selecting the proper dress is also essential to your workouts. Walking clothes should be comfortable and loose fitting, allowing you to move easily.

Dress in layers – If you live in a cooler climate dressing in layers will allow you to remove items as you warm up and put them back on if you feel cool.

Socks should be comfortable and made from high-tech fibers, which will help keep your feet from sweating and prevent blisters.

A hat is ideal for preventing sun exposure or allows your body from losing heat.

Apply sunscreen to the areas of your body, which are prone to sun damage, especially your face and hands.

Pack lightly so you aren't slowed down by extra weight. Carry water if you plan to walk more than a half hour and don't anticipate having fresh water available on your route. A hip pack with a built in water bottle may be a good investment.

WARM UP

Stretching before your workout will add flexibility and make your walking more comfortable. Warm up for five minutes at an easy walking pace before stretching.

Stretching cold muscles is not recommended, as you risk the possibility of injuring them.

Proper stretching involves warming up the muscles from head to toe.

Head Circles – Make ¼ circles with your head. Start with your ear near your shoulder on one side and rotate your head

to the front, ending with your ear near your opposite shoulder. Repeat 5 – 10 times.

Arm Circles – With one arm at a time, make backward circles with palm facing out, thumb pointed upward. Repeat 10 – 15 times with each arm. Then make forward circles with palm facing in, thumb pointed down. Repeat 10 – 15 times.

Hip Stretch – Stand up straight, take ½ step back with right foot. Bend left knee and shift your weight back to the right hip, while keeping the right leg straight. Bend forward to feel stretch move further down the leg. Hold 15-30 seconds, switch sides and repeat.

Leg Extensions – Hold onto wall or pole for support. Bend at knee, bring one leg forward, extend and swing back and behind. Repeat 10-15 times, switch legs and repeat.

HOW TO WALK

The health benefits of walking begin at the 20-minute mile speed with a target heart rate of 50-60% of your maximum heart rate.

The proper posture is important. Stand up straight, don't lean forward or slouch. Keep your head up, and focused fifteen feet in front of you. Keep chin parallel to the ground and ears above shoulders, hips, knees and feet. Arms should swing freely at your side. Hands should not rise above mid-chest or fall past the hips. Walk at a determined pace so that you are still able to carry on a conversation without being out of breath.

Be consistent with your walking before you try to add speed. It is recommended that you start our slow and increase your time and intensity by no more than 10% per week.

HOW MUCH TO WALK

Walking a ½ hour a day or 3 hours per week has been associated with a decreased risk of heart disease. Walking 7 hours per week is associated with a decreased risk of breast cancer and Type II Diabetes.

A good goal to work toward

is to walk at least five days a week, one hour per day.

At first you may want to start out at 15 minutes a day at an easy pace. As you build your new habit, the most important thing to remember is consistency. Don't push yourself too hard, too fast. The second week add 5 minutes a day to your routine and so forth.

You may prefer to walk first thing in the morning, or in the evening after dinner. It may be more convenient for you to split up your time into two or three walking sessions a day.



WATER

Drinking and walking do go together, as long as the drink is water before, during and after you walk.

Avoid caffeinated beverages before you walk, as they cause you to lose fluid faster.

Carry water with you and plan for water stops along your route. Drink a full cup of water every 20 minutes.

End your workout with another tall glass of water.

Before you hit the pavement for your next walk, be sure that you and your body are properly prepared. Dress appropriately, warm up your muscles, pack your water bottle and pay attention to your posture. Happy walking!

(how do I get started in real estate?)

Dear Dave,

I've always been interested in real estate, but the only experience I have has come through owning my own home here in Atlanta. I'm not sure I'm enough of a handyman to fix up houses to sell, but I've never thought of myself as a landlord, either. What advice can you give me?

Mark

Dear Mark,

Anytime you own real estate you're going to have to deal with repairs, whether it's fixing up a house to sell, a rental property or your own home. If you're not the handyman type, then you'll need to know some repairmen and have other connections in the building industry. I mean, if the house needs extensive work, or the central unit or water heater goes out, it's your job to make things right!

There are a few things you can count on when it comes to rental properties. We just talked about repairs, and that's a big one. Another one is a formula that goes something like this: on average, the cheaper the rent, the bigger the "character" you'll have to deal with as a renter. Now, if you run too high on the rent, you'll discover a different type of character. This type thinks you work for them, and it's never good to have confusion on this issue.

A good, solid, middle-of-the-road house in your area would probably cost about \$150,000 to \$200,000. A lot of people will tell you to take on debt to buy the place, but I want you to pay cash on this trip. It may mean a less expensive house and dealing with low-income renters to start with, and that can be a headache. The good thing is that you'd learn how to be a landlord from the bottom up. You'll learn how to be firm, but fair, and how to be gentle in the midst of a crisis. Believe me, you'll have a crisis or two—or 10 or 12—if you stay in the landlord business very long! You'll also learn how to handle evictions. But once you get some experience under your belt, you won't be intimidated by other, bigger, rental situations in the future.

So, either you'll be a landlord, or you'll be a person who buys and flips properties. Either way, make sure you do it with cash. Don't go into debt to make this happen!

I'm employed, and I've maxed out my Roth IRA. I also have a small business on the side, so can I do a SEP as well?

Dear Bill,

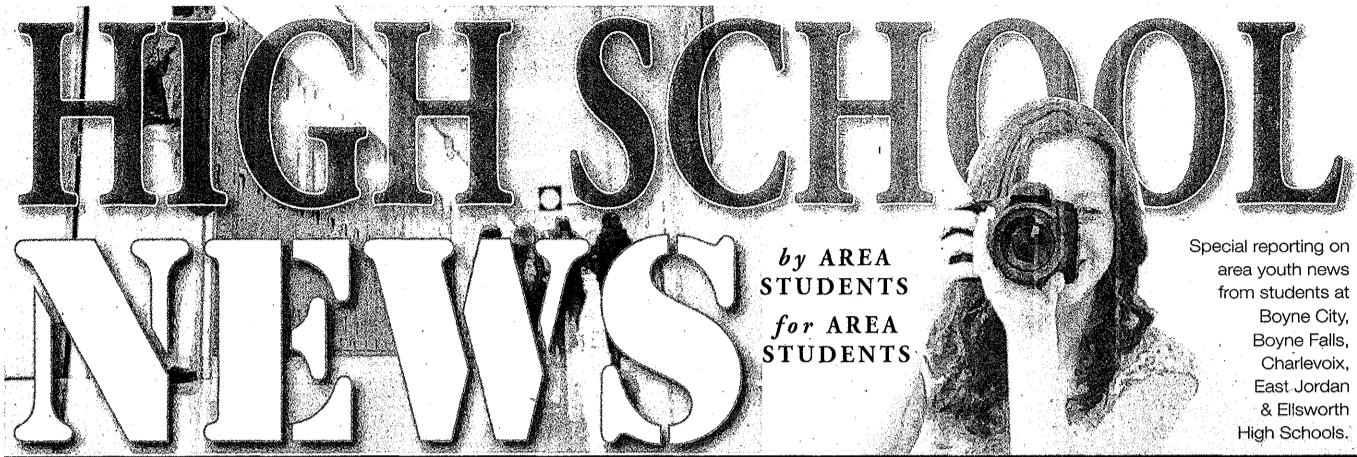
Sure you can! If you want, you can do a SEP (Self Employed Pension plan) along with a Roth IRA and a 401(k). There's no limitation to how many of these things you can have working for you.

The only limitations you're looking at would be in terms of income. If your annual household income is more than \$154,000, and you're married, filing jointly, you're going to run into issues with a Roth IRA. When it comes to a SEP, you have to provide it for any full-time employees who have been with you for three of the last five years at the same percentage of their income.

Children Deserve Plenty of Quality Time with Parents

QUESTION: I have very little time to spend with my children these days, but I make sure the hours we do get to spend together are meaningful. Do you agree that the quality of time you are with your kids is more important than the quantity?

DR. DOBSON: I'm afraid the logic of that concept is flawed to me. The question is: Why do we have to choose between the virtues of quantity versus quality? We won't accept that forced choice in any other area of our lives. So why is it only relevant to our children? Let me illustrate my point.

Let's suppose you've looked forward all day to eating at one of the finest restau-

rants in town. The waiter brings you a menu, and you order the most expensive steak in the house. But when the meal arrives, you see a tiny piece of meat about one-inch square in the center of the plate. When you complain about the size of the steak, the waiter says, "Sir, I recognize that the portion is small, but that's the finest corn-fed beef money can buy. You'll never find a better bite of meat than we've served you tonight. As to the portion, I hope you understand that it's not the quantity that matters, it's the quality that counts." You would object, and for good reason. Why? Because both quality and quantity are important in many areas of our lives, including how we relate to children.

They need our time and the best we have to give them. My concern is that the quantity-versus-quality argument might be a poorly disguised rationalization for giving our children -- neither.

QUESTION: What do you think of the phrase "Children should be seen and not heard"?

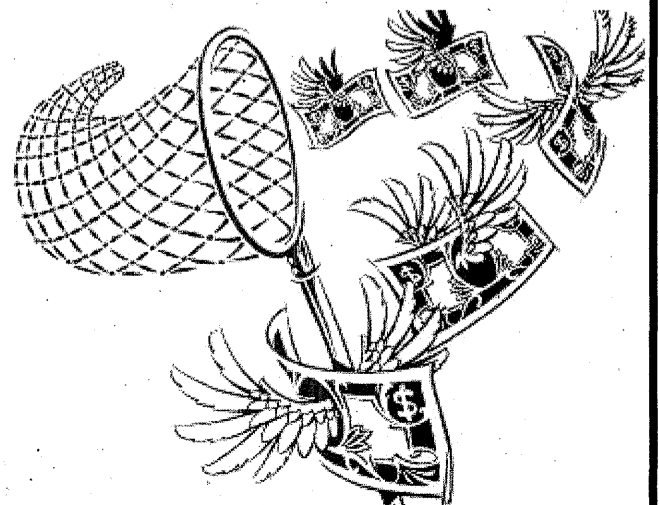
DR. DOBSON: That statement reveals a profound ignorance of children and their needs. I can't imagine how any loving adult could raise a vulnerable little boy or girl by that philosophy. Children are like clocks, they must be allowed to run!

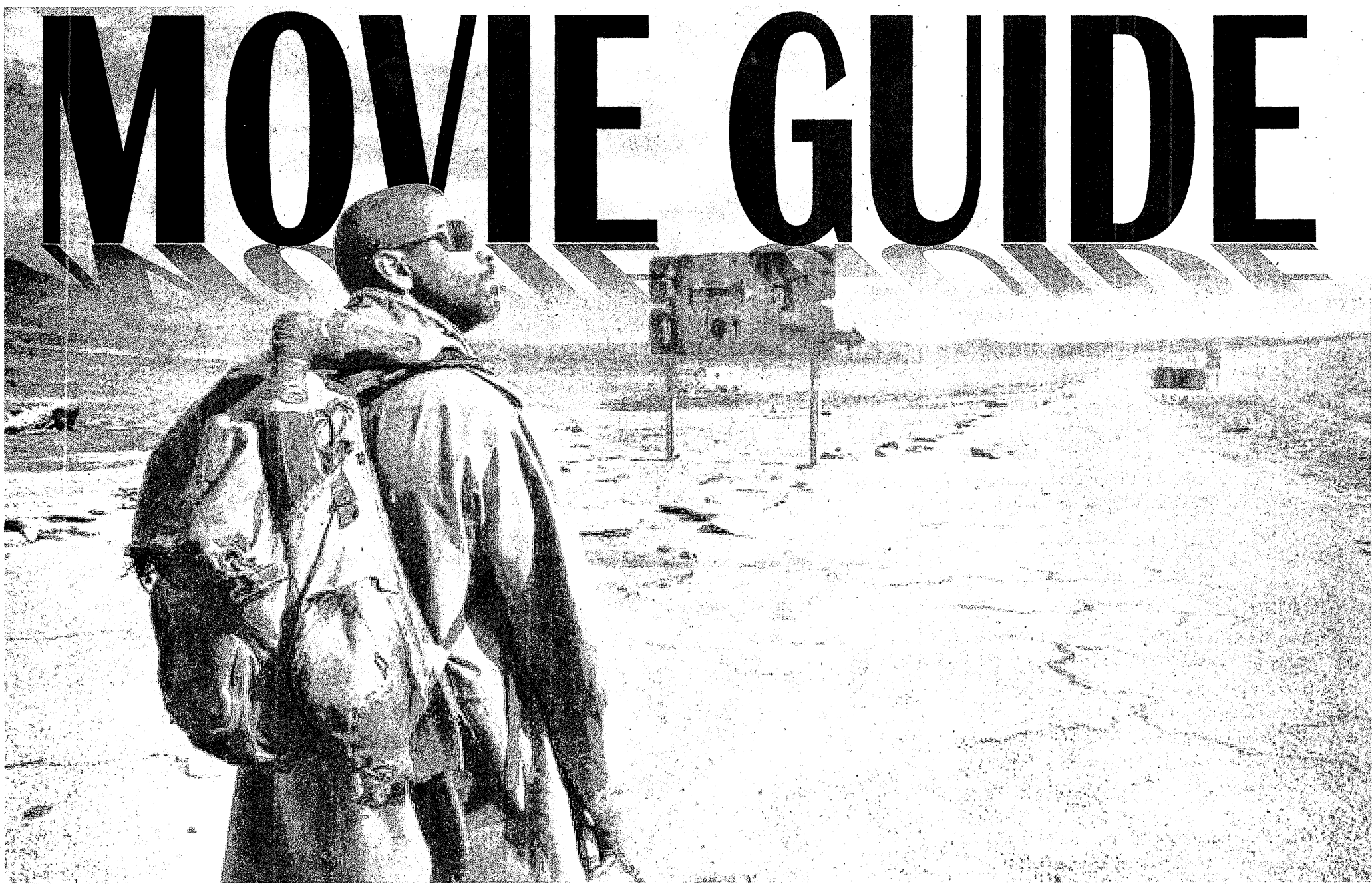


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KEEPING THE FAITH

Book of Eli a Beacon of Belief in a Barren World

Set thirty years after a nuclear apocalypse, *The Book of Eli* presents a dreary world in which those who managed to survive that earth-shattering blast, and their offspring, struggle against a gray landscape for daily sustenance, with nary a glimmer of hope in their eyes.

Enter Eli (played by Denzel Washington), a traveler with a startling determination to reach a westward destination unbeknown even to himself, and a faith that despite overwhelming roadblocks in his path, his journey follows the will of a power greater than the destruction and devastation surrounding him.

Much of *The Book of Eli* is centered around a settlement overseen by a tyrant named Carnegie (Gary Oldman), who has a fondness for literature. He suspects that Eli has a very special book that Carnegie has been searching for tirelessly and will stop at nothing until he possesses it.

Eli finds an unlikely ally in young Solara (played by Mila Kunis, aka Jackie from *That 70's Show*). Eli tells Solara of life before the bomb; "People once had more than they needed. They didn't realize what was truly precious, and threw away the things that people kill each other for today."

As dire as a post nuclear world may look, even thirty years after the event, the holiest book in Christianity may very well hold the power to transform the human experience once again. With Solara at his side, Eli's journey to deliver what may be the only surviving copy to a safe haven is a riveting, and often disturbing cinematic experience.

The Book of Eli is rated R, primarily for very graphic scenes of violence. These are "turn away from the screen" moments for the squeamish, and the material is definitely not



suitable for younger audiences. It sort of Quentin Tarantino's *Kill Bill* meets *The Planet of the Apes*...split second slashing action scenes contrasting a colorless, lonely world.

Life in a post apocalyptic world is a concept that is routinely revisited in literature and the arts, mediums used to conceptualize

humanity's worst fears and greatest hopes. Despite such warnings and omens, humans will be human.

God forbid a world like this should ever come to be, but if it does, let's hope someone like Eli comes around to help get us back on the path.

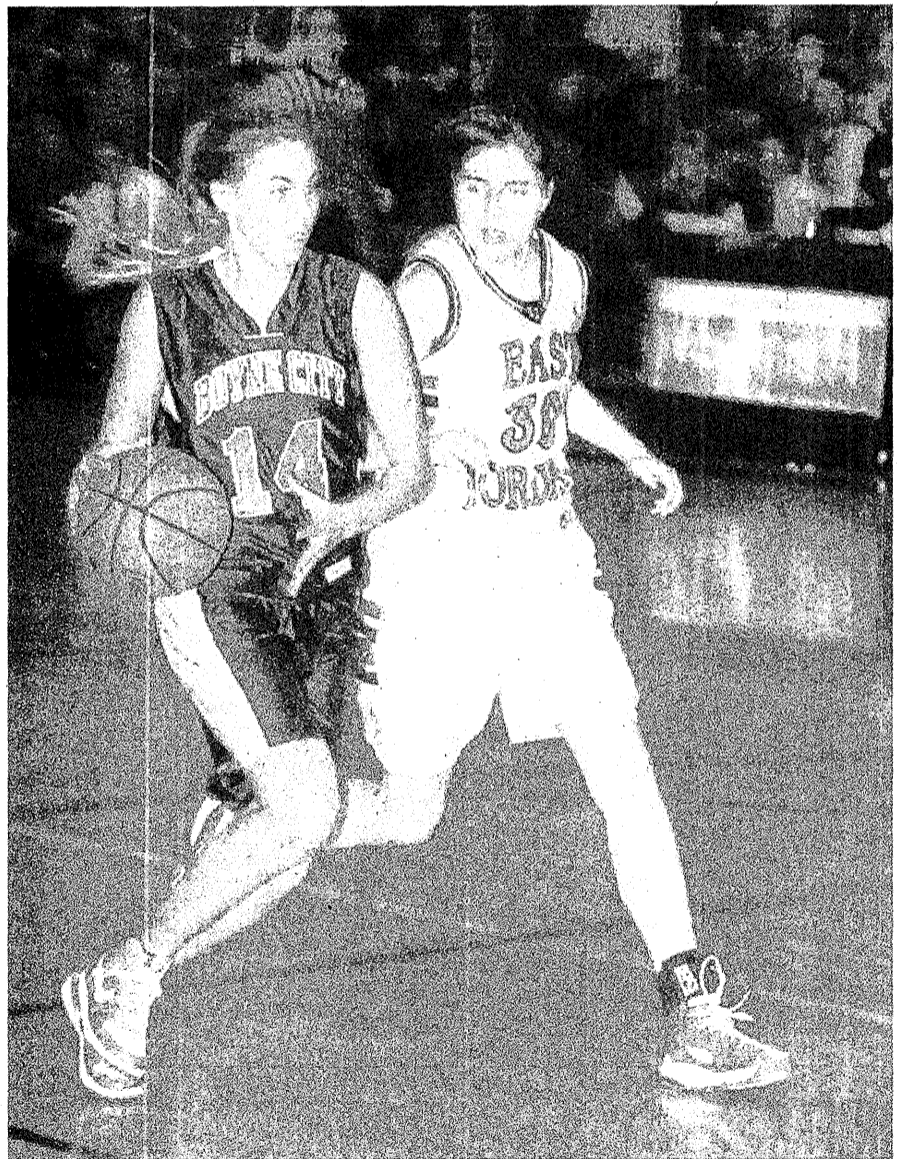

The Ramblers improved to

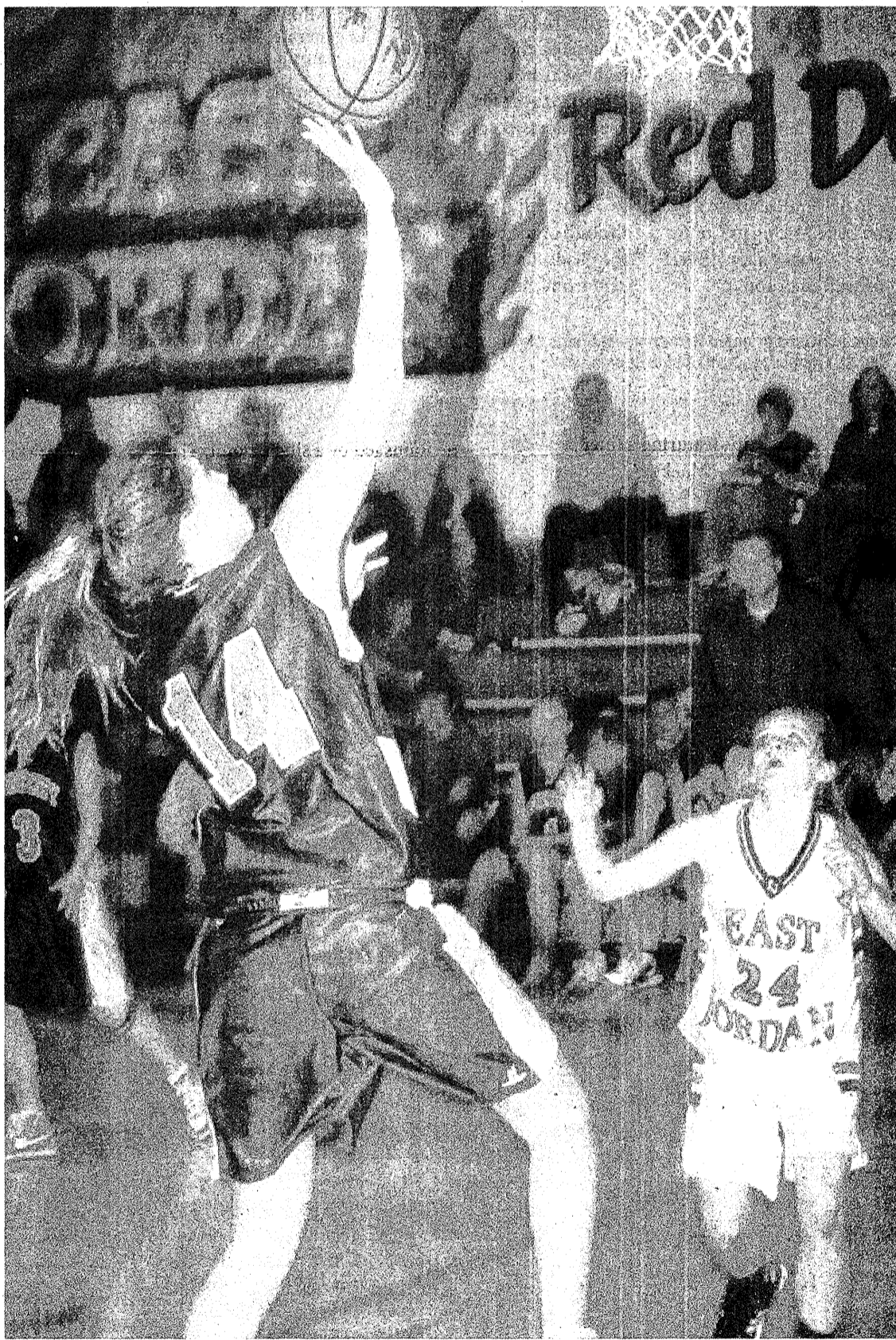

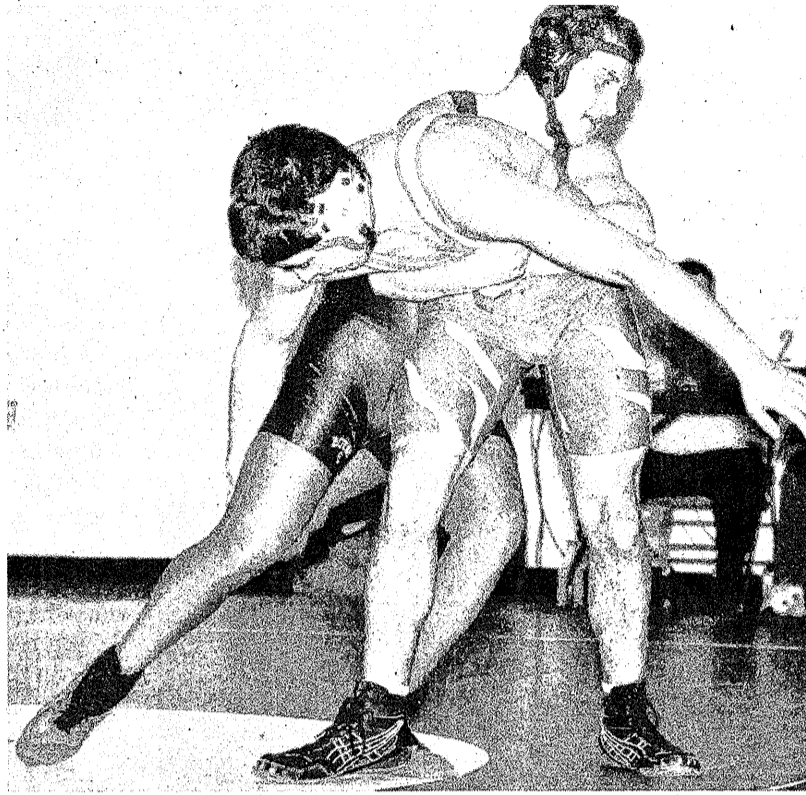

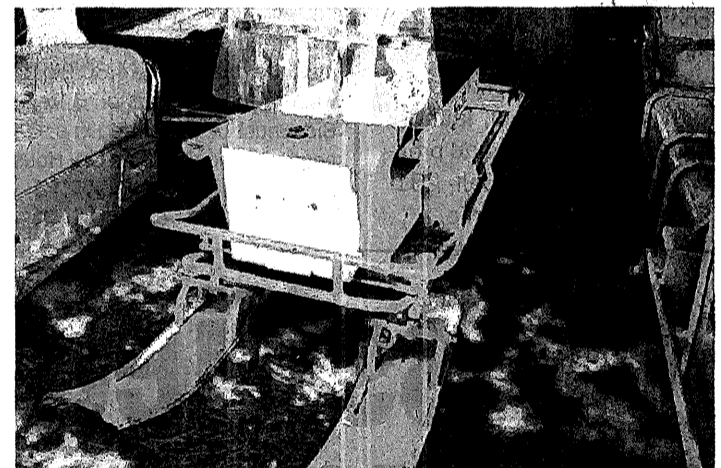

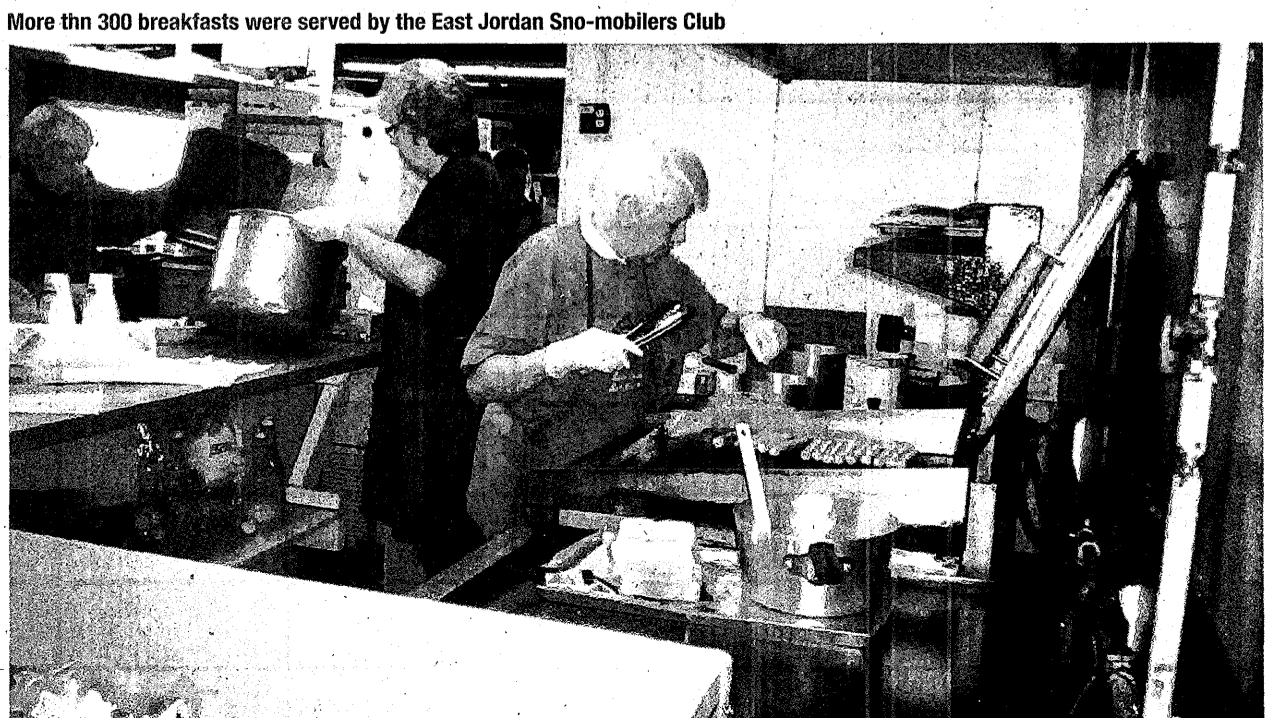
