

Gregory bound over to circuit court on murder charge

CHARLEVOIX - When the district court judge called for Sandra Gregory's case, the sheriff, who was in the courtroom, walked over to assist her in getting up out of her chair so she could appear before the judge. As she slowly walked to the podium where another chair had been placed she looked frail. Dressed in her bright orange jumpsuit with "Charlevoix County Jail" stamped on the back she seemed oddly out of place.

At a hearing on Tuesday, June 28, Judge Richard May was told by Gregory's attorney Kraag Lieberman that she would like to waive the preliminary examination. Judge May asked Gregory if she understood that she would be bound over to circuit court and she answered that she did.

Gregory, 74, was arrested on March 27 when police were called to her residence in Charlevoix to find Gregory's 94-year-old mother, Amelia Gregory, dead. Gre-

CT Scan shows no worsening in plane crash victim's condition

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

Two investigators from the Federal Aviation Administration began an investigation after arriving in Charlevoix from Grand Rapids. One is suited to prevent exposure to chemicals. The fatal crash occurred on Friday, June 24, about 7:30 p.m. One person survived the crash, but is in critical condition at Munson Medical Center in Traverse City. The survivor is Austin Hatch, son of Dr. Steven Hatch, the pilot, who was killed along with his wife, Kim.

CHARLEVOIX - A future basketball player for the University of Michigan who was in a plane crash in Charlevoix on Friday, June 24, is "holding his own" say friends of 16year-old Austin Hatch who are holding a vigil at Munson Medical Center.

A high school junior at Canterbury School in Ft. Wayne, Ind., Austin was critically injured when the airplane

slammed into the garage of a home in a neighborhood near the Charlevoix Municipal Airport. No one was in the house on Carpenter Street at the time of the crash. As of Monday, he was listed in critical but stable condition. A recent CT Scan shows no worsening in his condition.

His father, Dr. Stephen Hatch, was piloting the Beechcraft A36 single-engine airplane and his stepmother, Kim continued on pg. 4





motor." This is a great opportunity to see everything from vintage vehicles from the early 1900's, classic cars and trucks from the "golden age of the automobile," to contemporary sports cars, racing machines, and trucks. All proceeds from this event, which is sponsored by the East Jordan Firefighters Association, will go directly to the annual scholarship fund awarded to East Jordan High School seniors.

Local vintage vehicle enthusiast, Tom Sheridan, will have a replica he built of a 1901 experimental horseless carriage on display at the Car Show.

Sheridan, who was an automotive class instructor at East Jordan schools for 30 years, relates, "I debuted it during the Freedom Festival parade this year. It is a replica of Henry Ford's experimental car from 1901. The person I got the plans from did some research on the vehicle and got the idea for the design from a photo of the vehicle that was in the archives of Henry Ford's first cars. It was built after the Quadra cycle."

The horseless carriage boasts a 5.5 hp single cylinder engine capable of

producing speeds approaching a whopping 18-mph, It has a metal frame, plywood body, and Sheridan fabricated and welded the entire vehicle himself.

While sauntering along Main Street, take some time to view "Art Jordan" in the windows of downtown business, and don't forget to vote for your favorite piece of artwork at several voting boxes located in the downtown area.

gory told police she had killed her mother.

Since that day, Gregory has either been in the county jail or in mental health facilities where she underwent forensic psychiatric tests to determine if she was competent to stand trial and if she was insane at the time she killed her mother. One report from doctors found her competent to stand trial.

Lieberman asked the court to amend its order denying bond, saying that Gregory was emotionally and mentally better, was no threat to anyone and "certainly not a flight risk." She would stay with her sister, have a GPS tether and her sister and niece would arrange counseling for her.

Charlevoix County Prosecutor John Jarema told the judge that with the parameters Lieberman mentioned, he had no objection to the arrangement. The decision lies with Judge Richard M. Pajtas of the circuit court and it was scheduled for a hearing on July 8. *reporterbjh@gmail.com* Boyne City's manager has much to do with the increase in businesses, tourists, events and even a six percent increase in the population.

But Michael Cain is the first one to say it's not one person but the community working together that makes the city a success. It's easy to see he has boundless energy, even when he is walking he seems to be running, and he tackles demands with the best of the multi-taskers.

Cain has been the city's manager for eight years and has helped to make many changes for the better, such as new water wells, the wastewater treatment plant ("people don't have to worry about sewage going into the lake,"), the marina improvements, downtown building renovations, park improvements, infrastructure improvements and downtown activities and events.

He says that qualifying for the Main Street Program has made a great, positive impact on the city.

"Main Street has led to so many other accomplishments," Cain said. "Boyne City is unique. Look at our downtown with the small, unique businesses."

An estimated five new or expanded businesses have made downtown Boyne City the place to settle each year for the past three years, according to the Chamber. A developer chose Boyne City to program that assists cities in Michigan in designing and implementing plans to restore downtown areas under strict criteria, such as maintaining the history when restoring a building. It funds qualified projects with grants.


Cain said when he was first considering applying for the Main Street Program someone said not to do it.

"It was the best advice I didn't take," Cain said.

The tight economy has affected Boyne City as it has cities across the nation. The city's 2011 budget expenditures are \$9.7 million, down from 2010 when it was \$10.8 million. The city has not refilled positions when an employee retires, but no one has been laid off, Cain said.

"It's been one economic challenge after another since I've been here. For us to be where we are I think is pretty good. Things remain strong in Boyne City."

Cain's method for employees is to give them what they need then leave them alone, he said,

adding that his door is always open to them.

"I try to find strong people who can get things done, and who can communicate."

He describes himself as a team builder who builds alliances to make things happen.

"I look at myself as a facilitator," Cain said and smiled. Then he was off to a Lions Club luncheon meeting. "You want to go? I'll sponsor you, come on, let's go, I don't want to be late." And he was gone.

Residents fill county meeting

CHARLEVOIX - County commissioners met before a full house, with a full agenda that included a proposed non-motorized trail discussion, which was much of the reason for the full house, a discussion of the state's requirements for planning commissions and retirement and hiring matters.

The meeting on Wednesday, June 22, was dominated by the long debated recreational trail. Most of the citizens who spoke at the meeting favored the construction of it.

"I urge commissioners to support the trail," Steve Van Dam of Bay Township said.

John McCahan from Boyne City said he also favors the trail. And Bob Waldie of Hayes Township said that most of the people he's talked to want the trail, but he added that the people who want it don't live on the road. The proposed trail route is the county road that runs from Boyne City to U.S. 31 at Charlevoix, known as the Boyne City-Charlevoix Road.

One of the issues that has stalled the county board of commissioners is that some of the residents along the road do not want the trail to cut through their property. Roger Conaway who lives near Horton Bay said he is concerned about violation of property rights.

"We need to protect our property rights and we'll fight this in court if we have to."

That prompted commission chairman, Joel Evans, to speak about property rights.

"The county can't take people's property," he said. "No one is going to construct a trail through anyone's living room," he said, referring to the rumors circulating.

Evans said the county would ask permission and if residents did not want the trail on a portion of their property the users of the trail would cross over to the other side of the road as needed. Evans ended by addressing the audience.

"All you bicyclists out there, I want you to know, we're going to make this work."

Ross Maxwell is the director of parks and recreation for the county. He asked commissioners to give approval for him to apply for a grant to help pay for the construction of the trail. He was told that a resolution to approve would be drafted and presented for approval at the next meeting, which is a special meeting scheduled for 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, June 29. reporterbjh@gmail.com


Hatch, was seated alongside her husband. Austin was in the back of the plane.



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



Cut the sweet potatoes into quarters, then into thin slices. Steam or boil potatoes until soft, about eight to 10 minutes. In a medium-sized bowl, combine marinade ingredients. Add hot potatoes to marinade and mix gently. Steam broccoli until bright green and just tender, about five minutes. Rinse broccoli under cold water and drain well. Lay broccoli spears on top of potato-marinade mixture. Cover tightly and refrigerate for several hours. About 15 minutes before serving, stir broccoli into potato mixture. Serve garnished with green apple slices, if desired.

Stir in garlic and continue to sauté for three minutes. Transfer mixture to a bowl. Stir in vinegar, pepper and basil. Versatile: This salad can be served warm, cold or at room temperature.

lobacter, or E.coli. Pasteurization kills these harmful bacteria that cause food borne illnesses.'

In most cases of food borne illnesses, symptoms resemble intestinal flu and may last a few hours or even several days. Symptoms can range from mild to serious and include abdominal cramps; nausea; vomiting; diarrhea, which is

sometimes bloody; fever; and/or dehydration.

Food borne illnesses are especially dangerous to pregnant women, infants, young children, the elderly, and people with weakened immune systems, Meyerson said.

"If you think you've developed a food borne illness from drinking raw milk or dairy products, call your doctor right away," said Meyerson. "Early antibiotic treatment of suspected cases can prevent serious illness."

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality healthcare, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties.







The Dream Team pitching staff is lead by the Charlevoix Rayder duo of Hannah Hybl and Kristen Mielke along with Kaley Aown of Boyne City. Hybl went 11-5-1 in 95 2/3 innings of work fanning 115 batters with a 2.63 ERA. Mielke finished with a record of 11-2 and struck out 66 batters in 70 innings with an amazing 1.54 ERA. Aown showed great senior leadership for the Ramblers this season, tossing 141 2/3 innings of ball and striking out 88 in the process.

Those three also boasted some big numbers at the plate; Hannah Hybl batted .429, delivered four home runs, 35 RBI's and had a slugging percentage of .774. Mielke hit .395, with seven doubles and 28 RBI's. Aown batted .287, scored 25 runs and finished with 19 RBI's.

With a strong field of catchers to choose from in the area, it was a difficult to pick only one, so in addition to Katie Hybl of Charlevoix; Haley Drenth of Ellsworth has been selected. Drenth batted .388 with an on-base-percentage (OBP) of .490, knocked in 20 RBI's while scoring 22 times and sported a .930 fielding percentage.

The infield positions belong to East Jordan's shortstop Val Peters and first baseman Emily Crick, Kristen Matelski of Boyne Falls, Abbi Fair of Boyne City, and Kari Steenwyk of Ellsworth. Peters hit .423, with an OBP of .500, and she was as solid as they come in the field with a .952 fielding percentage, committing only five errors in 106 attempts. Crick batted .338 with a .413 OBP and a fielding percentage of .956. Matelski hit .552, having 21 hits; including six doubles, three triples and two home runs and 14 RBI's for the Loggers. Steenwyk was the Lancers leadoff hitter and batted .361, scored 23 times, and knocked in 10 runs.

The outfield is comprised of Jen Archey of Charlevoix, Morgan Skop of East Jordan and Stephanie Munk of Boyne City. Archey hit .359 for the Rayders, Skop batted .366 and had 16 putouts in centerfield for the Red Devils, while Munk finished the season with a .368 batting average to lead Boyne City and also finished with 17 putouts in centerfield.

Coach of the year is first-year coach Ken Hoffman of Charlevoix. Hoffman led the Rayders to a 24-7 record and collected the Lake Michigan Conference and district crowns along the way.

Bovne Citv's monofilament work of monofilament recyrecycling bin for unwanted fish line is located near the mouth of the Boyne River, just off Lake St. near the day dock/fishing pier. If this bin

is successful, others may be added at our boat launches. Users may deposit tangled, unwanted monofilament (i.e. fishing line) in the bin. Staff or a volunteer periodically empty the bin and ship the

monofilament to the program's recycling facility. The Michigan Clean Marina Program is a local spon-

sor of BoatU.S. Foundation's "Reel In and Recycle!" campaign to recycle monofilament. The program was designed to make proper disposal of monofilament more accessible, by creating a net-

cling collectors. Why Recycle Monofilament? Because it is strong,

thin, durable and nearly invisible, monofilament is widely used by anglers. But those same qualities can make it extremely hazardous to wildlife when left behind.

Inappropriately discarded monofilament often accumulates in popular fishing areas and may tangle around boat propellers and aquatic life, while taking over 500 years to decompose. This poses threats to fishermen, the fish they catch and important fish habitat and breeding grounds. Abandoned line can "ghost fish" by continuing to catch aquatic species (e.g., fish, turtles and birds) in makeshift

purchase offer. A creative sales associate will consider the cash, income and tax situation of the home seller and the buyer when constructing an offer. For instance, if the buyer is short of cash, the agent may ask the seller to pay the buyer's loan points up front in exchange for some other concessions from the buyer. In this scenario, the buyer and seller benefit and both get what they want.

4th of July Fun Facts

The Fourth of July is right around the corner! It is a holiday celebrating our unique way of life, rooted in history that began 235 years ago when the Continental Congress approved the Declaration of Independence, setting the 13 colonies on the road to freedom as a sovereign nation. Independence Day is commemorated with parades, fireworks, and backyard bar-

becues across the country. As you prepare for your own celebrations, take a minute to learn a little more about this most American of holidays with our 4th of July trivia.

The actual vote on the resolution for independence was made on July 2nd, 1776, not on July 4th.

John Hancock was the first to sign the Declaration of Independence. It wasn't until August when the 55 other signers got the chance. Hancock signed his name very large on the center of the document, so everyone else had to sign around his name in very small print.

France played a vital role in helping the United States to win independence. France provided a navy, troops, and 90 percent of the gunpowder that the Patriots used.

Independence Day was first celebrated in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776.

The first Fourth of July party held at the White House was in 1801.

The Fourth of July was not declared a national holiday until 1941. The U.S. imported \$3 million worth of American flags in 2009, of which \$2.5 million was for U.S. flags made in China.

\$197.3 million worth of fireworks was imported into the United States in 2010, \$190.7 million of which was imported from China. By comparison, U.S. exports of fireworks came to just \$37.0 million in 2010, with Japan purchasing more than any other country (\$6.3 million).

More than 74 million Americans will barbecue on the Fourth of July, and they will consume an estimated 150 million hot dogs.
