



Initially denied, bond now granted to Gregory, with conditions

CHARLEVOIX - A Charlevoix woman who admitted to police that she had killed her 94-year-old mother. Amelia Gregory, has been

granted bond and will stay with relatives in Greenville for now. Sandra Gregory was initially denied any bond.

Circuit Court Judge Richard M. Pajtas set the bond on Friday, July 8, at \$100,000 and

Gregory was required to pay 10 percent of that amount in order to leave the Charlevoix county jail. The \$10,000 has been posted and she is no longer in jail. The conditions of

the bond imposed by the court

include weekly sessions with a mental health counselor and that she wear an electronic tether.

Gregory, 73, cared for her mother for many years, having moved into her mother's house after her father died. Friends who have known her since high school in Charlevoix say she was devoted to her mother and would deny herself time with friends if her mother

Boyne City may receive Historic Preservation designation



BOYNE CITY — The city has been selected for a Certified Local Government grant by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority, Department of the State Historic Preservation Office.

At its Tuesday meeting the city commission discussed the portions of downtown Boyne City to have the city listed on the National Register of Historic Places as a district. If the designation is approved it would open up opportunities for individual property owners of contributing structures, while not imposing any general restrictions on development or use of property, assistant planner Shannon McMaster stated in a memorandum to city manager Michael Cain.

National Register designation is also an award that Boyne City can use in marketing and other grant applicatons, McMaster said.

Commissioner Mike Cummings asked if the district would include houses as well as downtown businesses and was told there are home with the designation.





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

Prostate Prevention is About Living Healthy

Over half the men in the United States will develop some form of prostate problem making a prostate prevention a major topic for men of all ages. Because prostate cancer and disease are becoming increasingly more common, taking care of yourself now can help you avoid problems later.

Prostate cancer, while very curable if detected early enough, is incurable once it has metastasized outside the gland itself. What this means is that as long as the cancer is confined to the prostate it can be treated and in most cases cured. Once these cancerous cells break away from the malignant tumor and enter the blood stream or lymphatic system they will grow and multiply in other parts of the body. Prostate

cancer cells normally metastasize to the skeletal system, which is extremely difficult to treat. This is why it is important that all men get regular checkups by their doctors once they hit 40 years of age.

Aside from regular doctors visits prostate prevention comes down to living a healthy lifestyle. This means cutting out bad health habits and starting to adhere to healthier lifestyle principles. In fact men who want to avoid prostate problems should actually forget about the prostate and look to improve their overall health, particularly their heart.

In healthy bodies, inflammation occurs acutely in response to threats such as infection. Prostatitis, and infection of the prostate, is one such inflammatory response. Inflammation is linked to oxidation, because

unhealthy levels of inflammation feed the oxidation chain reaction and help push it to unhealthy levels, too. If we don't get sufficient antioxidants in our diet, or if we eat poorly, or expose ourselves to too much stress or certain oxidation-promoting pollutants, we get unhealthy levels of oxidation in our bodies.

Medical advances and further understanding of the human body has led to an increased awareness of how the prostate becomes damaged and more importantly, new ways of prostate prevention. One of the major breakthroughs in this area has been the development of the Prostatic Specific Antigen (PSA) blood test that detects possible prostate cancer before it has a chance to grow.

Other research that focused on men who eat high quantities of vegetables verses men that don't have led researchers to believe that a high-vegetable diet is essential to prostate prevention. While the research is not concrete, it is reasonably safe to assume that maintaining a healthy diet, exercise, limiting junk food, alcohol and the consumption of red meat can help prostate prevention. Prostate cancer prevention strategies require changing patterns of the way men live to work toward prostate cancer prevention.

According to studies, if men in the age range of 30 to 40 would check for the early signs of prostate cancer, they would have a 90% chance of surviving cancer, if and when they would be found to be suffering from it, without any complications.

Michigan School Immunization Rules (and many colleges) require meningitis shots for kids age 11 to 18

Beat the rush—appointments available now at Health Department offices

Though summer just started, local public health officials are encouraging parents to think ahead to get children the immunizations they need for school year, especially adolescents age 11- to 18. Appointments are available now at Health Department offices in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties by calling 800-432-4121. Medicaid and private insurance accepted; no one is turned away for inability to pay.

"Immunizations are not just for young children anymore. Thinking about shots for pre-teens and teenagers is new for many parents," said Pat Fralick Director of Family & Community Health for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. "Getting kids protected against diseases, including meningitis, is very important."

"Even though meningitis in not very common, it can be very serious. Unfortunately, we see about one death a year from the disease, in high school or on a college campus."

Meningitis immunization is required statewide for 11- and 12-years to go to school. Now, a booster dose should be given at age 16. Adolescents, who received their first dose at age 13-15, should get a one-time booster, preferable at 16-18. That way, they will be protected from disease when they are at greatest risk of contracting meningitis.

"Keeping track of your children's immunizations can be difficult," Fralick said. "Just call the Health Department or your health care provider –we can check their immunization record on Michigan's statewide registry and let you know if they need a meningitis immunization, or any other required immunizations.

For parents of students heading to college in the fall, Fralick recommends making appointments for meningitis immunization soon. "Since rules for adolescent meningitis immunization just went into effect last year, most high school seniors have not been immunized" she said. "So families need to plan ahead to protect their teens heading to a college dormitory, or to the military, or any other communal living situation"

Did You Know? Blood Pressure

Arteries carry blood from the heart to all parts of the body. Blood pressure is the force that pushed along the arteries every time the heart beats. So, blood pressure is a measure of how hard the heart has to work to pump blood.


This process is known as systolic pressure. The process where the heart is at rest, between beats and the blood pressure falls is known as diastolic pressure. Blood pressure is measured using a blood pressure cuff and recorded as systolic pressure over diastolic pressure. The top number indicates the systolic pressure and the bottom indicates the diastolic pressure. Normal blood pressure must be lower than 120/80


Blood pressure varies during the course of a day. It is lowest when the person is resting and gradually rises as the person gets up. Blood pressure usually rises when the person is tense, agitated, or generally energetic, even though it stays pretty much the same. Blood pressure in children is comparatively much lower than in the adults since pressure rises as a person ages.

The systolic and diastolic reading of 140/90 or higher indicates high blood pressure. This usually results in faster heartbeat as the heart tries to pump blood faster, and this might result in a stroke, heart attack, and kidney problems due to the pressure on the arteries.

Severe medical problems also cause blood pressure to rise. Also, arteries become hardened and narrowed with cholesterol plaque and calcium, resulting in the heart having to pump harder to make blood pass through these arteries. When the heart pumps harder, blood pressure tends to automatically increase.

High blood pressure is linked to hypertension, which leads to heart attack. With a reading higher than 180/110 the patient required immediate medical attention since the risk of heart attack is greatest.

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Sheriff's Dept. Responds to **Multiple Accidents**

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office investigated a watercraft accident with injuries on Lake Charlevoix near Ferry Beach in Charlevoix at approximately 1:48 p.m. on Wednesday, July 06, 2011.

An 11 year old male from Holt, Michigan suffered a laceration to his arm while climbing off the stern of his parent's vessel to go swimming. He was treated at Charlevoix Area Hospital.

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office was assisted at the scene by Charlevoix EMS.

On July 8, 2011 around 19:21 hours the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office responded to a 3 vehicle accident on U.S. 131 at the entrance to Boyne Mountain Resort. Lagene Dillon-Pea, age 37, of Lake Orion, Michigan was traveling North on U.S. 131 in a 2008 Chevrolet Malibu. She made a lefthand turn onto Boyne Mountain Road, but failed to yield to a 2003 Ford Explorer traveling Southbound on U.S. 131 driven by Eleanor Potter, age 68, of Johannesburg, Michigan. The front of the Explorer struck the passenger rear of the Malibu causing the Explorer to lose control, turn onto the roof, and strike a 2008 Jeep that was waiting at the stop sign of Boyne Mountain Road and U.S. 131. The Jeep was driven by Angela Secor, age 33, of Cedar Springs, Michigan.

There were five occupants in the Malibu driven by Lagene Dillon-Pea, her husband, who sustained minor injuries, and their three children. Their 7 year old twins, one male and one female, and their 11 year old daughter were all transported to Northern Michigan Hospital with minor injuries where they were treated and released.

There were three occupants in the Jeep driven by Angela Secor. The front passenger, Lynnette Wolfe, age 30, of Cedar Springs, Michigan was transported to Northern Michigan Hospital for evaluation due to being 30 weeks along in pregnancy. The driver and third passenger did not sustain any injury.

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office was assisted on scene by the Boyne Valley Fire Department, Boyne Valley EMS, Boyne City Fire Department, Boyne City EMS, East Jordan EMS, Michigan State Police Motor Carrier out of the Gaylord Post, and Boyne Mountain Security.

On July 9, 2011 around 11:02 hours the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office investigated a one vehicle roll-over accident on Behling Road in Wilson Township. The

driver, Nicole Doughert age 18 of East Jordan, was traveling East on Behling Road when she left the road to the South and entered a very steep embankment. Her car went down the bank, eventually striking the bottom, causing the vehicle to overturn onto its roof. The vehicle came to rest in a small creek at the base of the ravine. She exited the vehicle and walked to a neighbor's residence

for help. Nicole was transported by East Jordan EMS to the Charlevoix Area Hospital where she was treated for a broken collar bone as well as a fractured scapula.

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office was assisted on scene by the East Jordan Fire Department and East Jordan EMS.

At approximately 9:05 a.m. on Sunday morning July 10, 2011, 58 year old Charlevoix seasonal resident Steven Pitzer was out on a pleasure ride on his Honda motorcycle on Ellsworth Road in South Arm Township when a deer ran in front of him. Steven collided with the deer causing him to loose control of the vehicle. The motorcycle and Steven skidded across Ellsworth Road. As a result, Steven sustained injury to the left side of his body most notably, a cut on his left hand. Steven was transported to Charlevoix Area Hospital by the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department where he sought treatment to the injury to his hand. Pitzer was wearing a helmet at the time of the accident.







pect that eighty-one years later that lighted boat parade tradition would continue as the closing ceremony for the annual Charlevoix Venetian Festival.

Saturday, July 16th will kick off with Venetian Games, including a Beach Volleyball and Horseshoe Tournaments at Ferry Beach starting at noon. Another opening day highlight is the Venetian Aquapalooza Boating Party.

"This is the 3rd year we have held the Aquapalooza party," Barron states, "and we continue to refine the event. This year the Caribbean Blue Band, featuring reggae, calypso and R&B will perform, and people can enjoy the music from shore or from their boats."

There will be more live music on Sunday evening, at Chicago-based reggae band Roots Rock Society takes the stage at the Performance Pavilion in East Park starting at 7 pm.

A highlight event on Monday, July 18th is one of the Venetian Festivals newest events; Venetian Vision. It features the showing of a yet to be announced children's movie at the Performance Pavilion in East Park starting at 8 pm.

"This event has an old-fashioned drivein movie feeling to it," notes Barron. "Prior to the movie, we will have a performance by juggler/comedian Tommy Tropic. For older kids we have the Battle of Bands event taking place at Lake Michigan Beach during the evening, complete with professional light and sound production."

The "Tiki Tent" comes alive on Tuesday, and will be a favorite destination for music lovers for the remainder of the Festival, with several live 'Venetian Rhythms' performances taking place each day, representing a full gamut of musical styles, and there are also a selection of adult beverages available at the Tiki Tent. The Vermeers will perform at the Tiki Tent next Tuesday, and the Charlevoix Community Band followed by the Navy Band Great Lakes will play at the Performance Pavilion starting at 6:30 pm.

Wednesday, July 20th, the Venetian Festival hits full stride, as the carnival, brought to town by Arnold Amusements, sets up downtown Charlevoix offering thrilling rides and challenging games until 11 pm each day through Sunday.

There is a vast array of activities including Pony Rides, Craft Opportunities, Ragamuffins Theatre, and approximately two dozen assorted activities taking place from 10 am to 3 pm."

Thursday evening the Jason Elsenheimer performs at the Tiki Tent, and headliners at the Performance Pavilion included Charlevoix's Pine River Jazz Band, the country sounds of Lansing's Brian Lorente and The Usual Suspects, and David Nail brings his brand of country music direct from Nashville.

Next Friday and Saturday brings much more music, games, athletic events, a grand parade, some amazing fireworks displays, and the annual boat parade that started it all. Attorney for the city Scott Beatty reminded the commission that the commissioners previously said Breakey could discuss, but not vote.

Breakey addressed Mayor Paul Timmons saying he wanted a decision from the mayor. Timmons then said the commission would allow Breakey to discuss but not vote, basing his decision on the former ruling by commissioners.

· The city administrator Bob Anderson gave an update on the Maple Street construction at the July 5 meeting at City Hall. He said every effort is being made to keep Maple Street passable to businesses and residents. The deadline for completion of the project is July 28. He reminded city residents that Thursdays at 9 a.m. at City Hall the construction representatives, engineers, chamber and the city representatives are available to answer questions and discuss concerns.

Bids were opened for the 2nd Street reconstruction project. The lowest bid out of five bids was \$206,375 from Tri County Excavating of Harbor Springs and commissioners awarded the bid to that company. 





I love classic rock. On long road trips I get a bit goofy. Our kids usually watch a movie wearing head phones, while at some random moment in time I'll turn on the stereo and press seek until I hear the classic rock tunes. Then I'll crank up the jams. We're talking CCR, John Mellencamp, Boston, The Who, Don Henley, Lynyrd Skynyrd, and on and on. So many great tunes from these bands and others carry me back to my younger free-spirited days of sun and fun; less respon-

My wife just laughs when
I get in my own amped-up
karaoke zone. I get wide crazy eyes and act out the whole
band with loud obnoxious vocals, banging drums all over the
steering wheel, or an air guitar half way out of the window. I
think she lets it go because in some odd way she knows that
it brings memories and sweet comfort to my soul.

There's another writing genre I've found that has a similar effect. It's a hidden ancient genre of Scripture called the poetic Psalms. These are lyrical lines of written songs too. They're simply from a different time, originally written in a different language with a slightly different purpose. Psalms is the longest book of the bible containing one hundred and forty five songs. It's also interesting how these psalms are found right in the very middle of the Bible

I love how most of them are raw with emotion. It is a mingling of the writer's heart with thoughts about God or even with the heart of God himself. Some of these ancient songs ask some bold questions. Psalm 13 asks, "How long O Lord will you forget me forever?" Translated, "Where in the heck are you God!? I need you. I've been asking you for things and talking to you for a long time, but it feels like my words are just hitting the ceiling. Don't you care?" This psalmist's heart is heavy. I love that, because sometimes I want to complain and shout out to him. Do you know what I mean?

Today, many of us have a lot of big complaints and questions. Aren't you going to help me find someone so I don't have to be alone? Why can't you lead me to the right job? God I'm working my tail off. Where are you God?

The psalms connect deeply because they don't hold back any real feelings. These songs contain openness and clear-hearted communication with God and about God. They're not shielded with political pretense, but portray a sincere wrestling match. If each of us is truly honest, I believe we all face this God-wrestling match.

Other psalms are full of passionate declaration. The writer tells us just who God really is to them and leaves us with the choice whether or not to believe what the psalmist is writing might be true for us as well. For example Psalm 62 says, Find rest, O my soul, in God alone; my hope comes from him. He alone is my rock and my salvation; he is my fortress, I will not be shaken. My salvation and my honor depend on God; he is my mighty rock, my refuge. Trust in him at all times, O people; pour out your hearts to him, for God is our refuge.

That's classic Rock. After hanging out in the psalms lately, I'm realizing just how refreshing they are, because I can relate. I'm an emotive person. I can be up. I can be down. I can have a circumstance spin me around. So I go to the psalms and see others up, down, and spun around. I watch and listen to how they go to the Rock. They go through the gate, behind the strong walls, and into a Fortress. They seek refuge underground climbing into the heart of God, relentlessly choosing to trust him, and praise him for who he is and all he's done. I see them wrestle the way I wrestle.

Ultimately, this practice forces my heart upward. From the pit of my soul, my mouth is pried open and I cry out to My God, Who is my salvation. He invades this broken world – my broken world. He helps and heals. It lightens me up and refocuses my life on all the positive good. He helps me answer or maybe just become at peace with some of my biggest questions. It's soothing. Through the classic Rock of the psalms God touches my soul.

I want to invite you personally into the psalms, and out to our next summer series called Classic Rock. Each week we'll examine one: Psalm 46, Psalm 23, Psalm 51, and Psalm 25.

Upcoming visit making wife anxious

Q: My husband's parents are coming for a visit, and I'm concerned there may be trouble. My mother-in-law is fond of giving oceans of unwanted advice. How can I politely shut her down before the comments start flying fast and furious?

Jim: Sometimes it's hard enough to get along with the people living under your own roof. When you bring inlaws into the mix, the results can be downright scary!

Hopefully, your mother-in-law's "advice" is given in love, rather than mean-spiritedness. Either way, you might want to talk to your husband beforehand about ways to set boundaries with her in a manner that won't insult or offend.

In the end, though, you can't control what your mother-in-law says. But you can control your response to it. Before she arrives, find the book "Loving Your Relatives Even When You Don't See Eye to Eye" by David and Claudia Arp and John and Margaret Bell. The authors suggest that the majority of in-law conflict can be defused by following a few simple rules of civility.

For example, always remember to smile -- and not through gritted teeth. People always respond better to someone who's smiling.

Even if your mother-in-law is acting nosy and intrusive, make sure that you're considerate, that you practice restraint, and that you never raise your voice. Have the courage to admit when you're wrong, and don't ever ridicule or demean her. Give her the benefit of the doubt, and try to see things from her perspective. Be accepting and understanding of her shortcomings, and recognize that you have your own faults and hang-ups as well.

These are good rules to keep in mind when dealing with difficult people in any situation, not just in-laws. But they're especially important when in-law conflict rears its ugly head and you feel like tearing your hair out. No matter how frustrating things get, just remember to be civil!

Q: Our only grandchild is 4 years old. We cannot agree with our daughter-in-law on how often we, as the grandparents, should be allowed to see our granddaughter. Can you tell us how we can approach this without causing too much conflict and what would be a reasonable compromise on how many visits would be appropriate?

Juli: I can imagine how frustrating it must be to not be able to see your only grandchild as much as you'd like. Unfortunately, this is not the kind of situation in which you can find a "compromise." Your son and daughter-in-law are the guardians of their daughter and have the ability to choose unilaterally how often you see her

All of your frustration and effort to

reach a compromise are likely to backfire. If you fight for more time with your granddaughter, you are making yourself an adversary instead of building trust with your daughter-in-law. Instead, direct your energy toward trying to understand why she is hesitant to let you spend more time with your granddaughter. Most moms of young children are happy to have an extra set of hands or an on-call babysitter. Why doesn't she view you in this light? You may want to ask your son this question directly.


Ask yourself, "What can I change to be more supportive of my daughter-in-law?" Young moms are hungry for affirmation and support. Sometimes, in-laws are viewed as threatening and critical. If this is the case, be very careful to encourage your son and his wife. One word of criticism speaks louder than 10 words of praise.

Remember, you can only be as effective a grandparent as you are a mother-in-law. The more you pour support and encouragement into your children, the better equipped they become to raise the next generation, and the more you gain the credibility to invest in your granddaughter.





Buy and burn firewood locally

When packing the trailer for a weekend up north at the cabin or a favorite campground, there's one item on everyone's checklist that should actually be left at home: firewood.

Incredibly destructive invasive species and forest diseases - such as emerald ash borer (EAB), oak wilt and beech bark disease - are all too happy to hitchhike to new parts of Michigan on that bundle of firewood. Department of Natural Resources forest health specialists can't stress enough how important it is for firewood to be bought and burned locally.

"Whether the wood came from a fallen tree in the back yard, or from the convenience store down the road, it should not be transported outside of the immediate area it came from," said Bob Heyd, a DNR forest health specialist. "Forest pests and diseases are often undetectable until it is too late. Keeping firewood close to the area it came from is the only reliable way to prevent the spread of these hitchhikers."

Though regulating the movement of firewood depends greatly on voluntary cooperation from the general public, the state has taken some steps in recent years to prevent the spread of invasive species and forest diseases on to state land.

For example, it is illegal to bring ash firewood onto any DNR-managed lands, including state parks, recreation areas and state forest campgrounds. Additionally, transporting hardwood across the Mackinac Bridge and outside of quarantine areas in the Upper Peninsula is also prohibited by law.

"We've all seen the pictures of neighborhoods in southern Michigan where emerald ash borer killed all of the ash trees lining residential streets," Heyd said. "Many of those trees were cut into firewood that was moved up north by campers and hunters. This is the primary way that emerald ash borer has been moved to new parts of the state, resulting in millions of dollars of damage to Michigan's timber resources."

The movement of ash and the spread of emerald ash borer to other parts of the state is just an example of what state officials are hoping to prevent by asking people not to move firewood from any type of tree, not just ash.

Many species of trees found in Michigan's forests and residential yards can be affected by pests and diseases such as, gypsy moths, beech bark disease, oak wilt and many other tree killers - ash and EAB aren't the only culprits.

en't the only culprits. "Beech bark disease has removed American beech from many parts of the state," Heyd said. "This is another example of an exotic test that was most likely introduced to Michigan from infected firewood. Oak wilt is a fatal disease of red oaks that that continues to spread to locations in Michigan through the movement of infected firewood."

Though a fallen tree in the back yard may be an attractive source of free firewood for an upcoming camping trip, the cost to Michigan's forests if that firewood were to spread pests or disease is just too high a price to pay.

"When a tree dies, it's good to know the cause," Heyd said. "It may have been diseased, or weakened by an invasive insect. Taking that firewood along when you go to camp could put your favorite vacation place at significant risk for a devastating loss of trees."

Those who wish to cut their own firewood for local use are encouraged to cure that wood if it won't be immediately burned. To cure cut wood, stack it in loose piles raised off the ground for at least two years. This process encourages the wood to dry and helps rid the wood of any pests.

Campers who follow the advice to leave their firewood at home are still able to have their campfires; locally cut firewood is available for sale in or near Michigan's state parks, recreation areas or state forest campgrounds. Campers are asked to buy manageable bundles that they will be able to burn while camping, and to not transport any surplus wood back home or to the next campground on their itinerary.

"Regulations regarding the movement of wood and wood products by the commercial timber industry are already in place, but our efforts to stop the spread of forest pests and diseases hinge entirely on cooperation from the millions of Michigan residents and visitors who use firewood at camp or while camping each year," Heyd explained. "Similar to what Smokey said about forest fires, only you can prevent the spread of forest hitchhikers by leaving that firewood at home."

The following are general guidelines for

safely using firewood:

* Buy and use only locally cut firewood.
* Do not transport firewood across county lines.

* Know and observe the state's firewood movement quarantines.

* Burn excess firewood; do not bring it home.

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


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
