Boyne City's recently retired police chief plans to "kick back"

BOYNE CITY — The city's Chief of Police, Randy Howard, is retired as of the end of the day on Friday, Dec. 2.

But he didn't leave until he attended a retirement party put on by city staff. Looking relaxed, Chief Howard shook hands and exchanged hugs with a long line of residents and others who came to the party at City Hall.

Chief Howard has more than 35 years of service to the Boyne City Police Department. He began as a dispatcher.

"I've been here in the community and watched it grow," the chief said. "There has been a lot of different changes through the years."

His assistant chief, Jeff Gettel, re-

signed earlier this year and has moved out of state. The police department has five full-time officers and two part-time officers.

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Parents Pledge Helps Children

EAST JORDAN— Preschool and Elementary School students and their parents participated in the launching of a national reading program known as "Read Aloud" Tuesday, Nov. 29, at the East Jordan Elementary School.

Seventy-five children and their parents gathered in the cafeteria for pizza and an introduction to the philosophy behind Read Aloud. The literacy promotion program believes that 15 minutes of reading every day can make a lifetime of difference.

"The concept behind this is to show how reading aloud can be fun and engaging as well as a jumping off point for knowledge based activities or just a conversation starter, anything that stimulates the mind," said Bob Robbins, executive director of the organization and a Charlevoix County resident.

The Charlevoix County Community Foundation awarded East Jordan Public Schools the \$5,500 needed for implementing the program.


Charlevoix County Community Foundation and I would like to thank them for making this happen," Carla Winteringham, elementary school principal said.

Lasater said he would make a decision about running after the first of the year.

Salvation Army Bell Ringers carry on 120-year-old Christmas tradition

In 1891, a Salvation Army captain in San Francisco resolved to provide a free Christmas dinner to the area's poor. But how would he pay for the food?

From his days as a sailor in Liverpool, England, the captain remembered a large pot, displayed on the Stge landing, called "Simpson's Pot," where passerby would toss charitable donations. The captain presented his idea to city authorities and received permission to place a similar pot at the Oakland ferry landing at the foot of San Francisco's Market Place.

In its conspicuous position, the pot drew the attention of people going to and from the ferryboats. Another urn, in the ferryboat waiting room, also attracted donations. Thus, Captain Joseph Mcfee launched a tradition that spread throughout the United States and then around the world.

By Christmas 1895, thirty Salvation Army corps in the West Coast area used the kettle. That year, The Sacramento Bee published a description of the Army's Christmas activities and mentioned the contributions. Two young Salvation Army officers, William A.

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

Two injured in single vehicle accident in **Hayes Township**

On Friday December 2nd, 2011, the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office, along with the Charlevoix Township Fire Department and Charlevoix EMS, were called to an area on Maple Grove Road between Upper Bay Shore Road and Stolt Road in Hayes Township for an unknown injury accident. Upon arrival, crews found an early 1990's model Chevy Van had run off the road into a heavily wooded area. The van was at the bottom of a small ravine with no occupants around.

Shortly there after, the driver and passenger were brought back to the accident scene by the driver's parents. The driver, 20 year old Mathew Golovich of Charlevoix, was Southbound on Maple Grove Road, South of Upper Bay Shore Road, when it appears the vehicle made a hard right running off the road, down the small ravine and hitting several large trees. Both Golovich and the passenger, Trevor Blackwell age 19 of Charlevoix, were transported to the Charlevoix Area Hospital where they were treated and released.

The accident is still under investigation.

Handel's "Messiah" will be presented by the Great Lakes Chamber Orchestra at St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church in Petoskey on Thursday, December 15th and Friday, December 16th at 7:00 p.m. A quartet of outstanding soloists, Sarah Hibbard, soprano; Martha Hart, alto; David Theis, tenor; and Mark Goros, bass; will join the GLCO Orchestra and GLCO Chorus in this perform-

Handel's "Messiah" is the best known and most beloved oratorio ever written, combining recitative, aria, and dramatic choruses in a resounding affirmation of God's love. "Messiah" was written in 24 days, and was first performed in Dublin on April 13, 1742, as a benefit concert for the Society for Relieving Prisoners, the Charitable Infirmary, and the Mercer's Hospital. Handel made slight modifications in the work for almost every performance, tailoring the arias to his soloists and varying the number of voices in the choir. "Messiah" stands as an artwork which transcends period and cultural boundaries, and speaks in the most profound way to human spiritual aspirations. During the Advent and

Co-signing leads to Stupid Tax

Dear Dave, My wife co-signed on a loan for an ex-boyfriend five years ago when they were to-

gether, before we even met. Now a collection agency is after her. Our attorney has recommended we take Chapter 7 bankruptcy, but the debt is only \$5,000. Is there a better way?

Jeff Dear Jeff. You bet there's a

better way! It's just plain stupid to even consider trashing your financial life over \$5,000, because bankruptcy stays on your record for vears.

This is an old loan with very low expectations for collection. The collector probably bought it for next to nothing, and everything he gets will be profit. It's not uncommon for debts this old to be settled for fifty cents on the dollar, and sometimes even less. Haggle with them, and I'll bet you can talk them down to \$2,500.

Get an agreement in writing before you send them a dime, and do not give them access to your bank account. They'll threaten to sue, or ruin your credit and that kind of stuff, but my guess is you can work this out. It may take a couple of weeks and some patience, but that's nothing if it will save you \$2,000 to \$3,000.

You guys will have to pay some Stupid Tax on this one, but I hope it will teach you both a very valuable lesson. Never co-sign a loan!





McIntyre and N.J. Lewis, instrumental in the original use of the kettle, took the idea to the East Coast.

In 1897, McIntyre prepared his Christmas plans for Boston around the kettle. Other Army officers did not want to participate for fear of "making spectacles of themselves.' Nevertheless, McIntyre, with his wife and sister, set up three kettles on Washinton Street in the heart of the city. That year, the kettle effort in Boston and other locations nationwide resulted in 150,000 Christmas dinners for the needy.

In 1898, The New York

World hailed the Salvation Army kettle as "the newest and most novel device for collecting money." The newspaper also observed, "There is a man in charge to see that contributions are not stolen."

In 1901, kettle contributions in New York City provided funds for the first mammoth sit-down diner in Madison Square Garden, a custom that continued for many years. Today, families are often given grocery checks for food baskets so they can prepare dinners at home. The homeless poor are still invited to share holiday dinners and festivities at hundreds of Salvation Army centers.

Kettles now are used around the world, including Korea, Japan, Chile and Europe. Everywhere, public contributions to the kettles enable The Salvation Army to bring the spirit of Christmas to people who would otherwise be forgotten – the aged and lonely, ill, poor and disadvantaged, or inmates of jails and other institutions.

In the United States, The Salvation s Army annually aids more than 6 million people at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Kettles have changed since that first utilitarian cauldron in San Francisco. Today, some kettles have such devices as a self-ringing bell, a booth with a system that broadcasts Christmas carols, even the capability for donors to use credit cards! Though here in Northern Michigan, the familiar sight of a Salvation Army volunteer ringing their bell throughout the holiday season is a tradition that endures.

Whatever the innovation, though, the same message "Sharing is Caring" still supports this timeless enduring program.









First Christmas after Divorce not Very **Merry for Children**

Q: My ex-wife and I have had a lot of rough holidays together, but this is our first one since our divorce. Now, we're negotiating who gets the kids when, and it's terrible -- especially for our kids. How can we help them have a

'merry Christmas"? Juli: Some experts on divorce have described it as a death -- the death of a family, a marriage and a dream of happily ever after. As with any death, there is gut-wrenching grief associated with the loss, and learning to adapt to a "new normal." At no time is this more poignant than at the holidays. Your kids are grieving the loss of their family as much as you are. It's OK to let them express that and acknowledge that this Christmas will be difficult for every-

Although everyone gets hurt in a divorce, the children are the most obvious victims. They had no say in what happened, yet have to live with the painful aftermath. Research indicates that one of the top predictors of a child's stability after divorce is the health of the relationship between his parents. Whatever conflicts, wounds and feelings you have toward each other, put them aside for the holidays and give your children a conflict-free Christmas. I'd encourage

your former wife and you to do whatever you can to work together to make the holidays smooth for your kids.

If possible, share Christmas morning, celebrating together, or pitch in together to buy your kids gifts from both of you, instead of competing for who bought more gifts. I know these suggestions may sound far-fetched given the hostility that often accompanies divorce, but your kids deserve your effort toward peace. More than any shiny package under the Christmas tree, your children most want and need to know that Mom and Dad love them and are not going to fight over them.

Q: Every Christmas, my kids get caught up in the desire for the latest toys and electronic gadgets. Not only is this expensive for my husband and me, but it seems to miss the point of Christmas entirely. Without being preachy, how can we teach our kids that it's not just about get-

ting stuff? Jim: Children have a tendency to feel that the world revolves around them. Our culture encourages this problem by telling kids -- and adults, too -- to look out for No. 1. The materialism of the Christmas season only aggravates the problem.

In her book "Fun-Filled

Parenting," author Silvana Clark suggests that one of the best antidotes for self-centeredness is to volunteer as a family. It might be serving at a soup kitchen, or hosting a neighborhood bake sale and giving the proceeds to charity, or taking part in a church service project, or putting together Christmas care packages for the

According to Clark, volunteering helps children learn four valuable lessons. First, it helps them understand that they're not the center of the universe. Second, it enables kids to learn responsibility and gain self-confidence. Third, it puts them in touch with community resources and groups that depend on volunteers. And finally, volunteering helps kids build relationships with positive role models -- men and women who have invested their lives in reaching out.

Here's something that will really blow your kids' minds: have them go through their stuff and identify a few things (in good condition) to give away to a needy family or shelter this year. Or better yet, have them pool their allowance and buy a few new items! This kind of selflessness goes against just about everything they're hearing from the culture.

completed projects their kids bring home but now they can see the process and do that with their kids," Winteringham said.

When all three stations have been visited children and parents alike gather in the gym to take the Read Aloud Pledge and receive their Big Box of Books. Each child received a box of six beautiful new, age-appropriate books all related to this year's theme "Things that Go!'

"Because of the way the human brain processes words, reading to a child gives them an advantage at the elementary school level. By kindergarten, some children have been read aloud to as few as 25 hours while their peers have been read aloud to as many as 1,000 hours, "Winteringham said.

"If a child doesn't read at grade level at the end of first grade, there is only a 12% chance they will be reading at grade level by the sixth grade even with all the intervention," Robbins said. "Studies directly correlate not reading by third grade with graduation rates and future prison population rates."

The program launched the pilot for its Big Box of Books community outreach initiative in Mancelona in December of 2010. The program put books in the hands of families after providing learning sessions where children and adults alike were inspired to make reading aloud a daily part of their lives.

"If a student reads 20 minutes per night, five nights of every week, they will have read 3,600 minutes in a school year. If a student only reads 4 minutes per night, five nights of every week they, would have only read 720 minutes per school year. It is so important to set a goal for our students so they can be successful with reading. That is why we make the pledge to read at least 15 minutes every night at East Jordan Elementary," Winteringham said, "I'd love to see this branch out to other schools, it really promotes at home reading."

National program began in Northern Michigan.

Read Aloud.org believes that through reading aloud together, families can build literacy skills, reinforce knowledge-based learning, and enhance communication across generations. This national, nonprofit organization that works to ignite a passion for reading aloud in families got its start right here in Northern Michigan. Bob Robbins, Carolyn Robbins, Jennifer Liu Bryan, and Candace Kendle are a family that believes families that read aloud together will be stronger, smarter and more successful.

The program is the brainchild of the Robbins family. While researching together for family history that would provide the source of a book Liu Bryan was writing, 'The Cole Family Christmas', the family discovered that their grandmother had read aloud to her family nightly including to her husband who had no formal education, and all of them did very well in life.

'After publishing the book we discussed taking this on as a social cause, we started looking at the data and saw how compelling it was," Bob said.

The Robbins have been vacationing in Alden since 1980 and made it their home in 2000. "We are proud, we got to start it (Read Aloud) in our neighborhood we're the first and that makes me feel good, our kids got to get started first," Carolyn said.



Smokers Cough

Are you coughing even though you don't have a cold? This is the outcome of continuing to fill your lungs with nicotine, tar and other chemicals which are being acquired every time you smoke.

What is smokers cough?

A smoker's cough is a kind of disease that is usually found in every smoker and it is being cause by irritants that are entering the respiratory system.

An ordinary person is experiencing a cough mainly because there is a phlegm build-up in their windpipe and this phlegm would go out of their body on a natural process with the help of their body's cilia. Cilia are a fine hair like that line the pipes of your respiratory system and guide any irritants that are trapped inside your body to move and go out your respiratory tract. While smokers have built a problem with their cilia, they become immobilized and damaged so the phlegm could not go out of the respiratory system. That's why the cough of every smoker is quiet hard to relieve but here are some ways to cure smokers cough.

Boil one cup of water and then combine one tablespoon of anise seed. Cover and allow the mixture to stay for 15 minutes. Strain the mixture into a cup and add honey or lemon then drink it while it is still hot. Use as needed.

Drink fresh lemon juice every morning to provide the body with vitamin C and calcium which gets rid due to smoking.

Combine salt with warm water and gargle it at least 3 times a day to help clear the phlegm in your throat and heal your smokers cough.

Get a large pot with water and bring to a boil then inhale the steam from the boiling water, taking deep breaths, with a towel covering your head. This will calm your cough and remove the phlegm.

Veterans Affairs Office provides help to those exposed to Agent Orange

New Guys

Hey sailor, go get me twelve feet of water line.

Hey sailor, go get me a bucket of relative bearing grease. Hey sailor, go get me a 12"

water hammer. All hands topside to see the lighted Prudential Sign on the Rock of Gibraltar.

Hey sailor cut in the cooling water to the engine room handrails

Go get a bucket of steam from the boiler room.

Every service has its own set of go get me's for the newbie. This first test is usually given by the crew to see if you can take a little ribbing. God help you if you fail

There are other tests that you find out about after you have been out of the service for a few years. The series of tests that few people know about are the tests for the medical problems associated with exposure to the herbicide agent orange.

Contrary to popular belief there is no "I have agent orange". Agent Orange is just one of the defoliants used by the armed services. The main use was in Vietnam but, there are instances where defoliants were used in other places.

There was a rainbow of herbicides used by the military. The

various chemicals were labeled by color-coded stripes on the barrels. This arsenal of herbicides known by the colors of the rainbow, included Agent Blue (which contained arsenic), Agent White, Agent Purple, and the lethal combination of 2,4,-D, and 2,4,5-T, AGENT ORANGE, Agent Orange II (super orange), Agent Pink, Agent Green, Dinoxol, Trinoxol, Diquat, Bromacil, Tandex, Monuron, Diuron, and Dalapon.

The medical effects associated with the exposure to the chemicals are insidious and may not revel themselves for years. It could take fifty years or more.

The VA now uses the word presumptive. If you had boots on the ground in Vietnam between Feb. 28, 1961 and May 7, 1975, it is presumed that you were exposed to Agent Orange. The presumption has been extended to brown water sailors. (Servicemen who served on boats and ships within the country and its surrounding waters). The government is now looking into allowing blue water sailors to be included within the presumptive parameters. I guess the government still has a hard time believing the wind blows.

All Vietnam, in country, Vets are now eligible for free physical exams, through the VA, for exposure to these herbicides.

The VA provides: A pre-exam interview to determine when the veteran served in Vietnam.

A compilation of the veteran's medical history.

A physical exam. A series of basic laboratory tests, including chest X-rays (if appropriate), urinalysis and

blood tests. Consultations with other health specialists, if needed. A post-exam interview to dis-

cuss results. A letter explaining the find-

A follow-up exam or additional

lab tests, if needed. Notation of exam and test results in the veteran's permanent medical file and the

Agent Orange Registry.

DISEASES LINKED TO AGENT ORANGE (Herbicide) **EXPOSURE**

Chronic lymphatic leukemia, Chloracne, Diabetes type II, Hodgkin's disease, Multiple Myeloma, Non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, Acute and Subacute Peripheral Neuropathy, Porhyria Cutanea Tarda, Prostrate cancer, 'Respiratory Cancers, Soft tissue sarcoma, Spina Bifida, AL Amyloidosis, Chronic B-Cell Leukemia's, Ischemic Heart Disease, and Parkinson's Disease. From time to time the VA adds to this list.

AREAS OF EXPOSURE TO AGENT ORANGE IN AND OUT-

Exposure to Agent Orange in Vietnam:

Exposure on land in Vietnam or on a ship operating on the inland waterways of Vietnam between January 9, 1962 and May 7,

Blue Water Veterans:

Possible exposure on ships off the shores of Vietnam during the Vietnam War.

Korean Demilitarized Zone: Exposure along the demilita-

rized zone in Korea between April1, 1968 and August 31, 1971. **Thailand Military Bases:**

Possible exposure on or near

the perimeters of military bases between February 26, 1961 and May 7, 1975.

Herbicide Tests and Storage outside Vietnam:

Possible exposure due to herbicide test and storage at military bases in the United States and locations in other countries.


If you meet any of the above criteria go to your County Veterans Affairs Office. We can do some initial work for you and get you into the VA system for a medical appraisal.

SB 0826: This bill would require dogs that do not have a license be transported to an animal control shelter or an animal protection shelter. Further, the bill would authorize a sheriff to kill or cause to be killed unlicensed dogs if the sheriff determines that a dog is a threat to public safety. **Status:** Referred to Committee on Local Government and Elections on Nov. 29. 2011.

SR 0101: A resolution offered as a memorial to the life and accomplishments of Frederik Gerhard

Hendrik Meijer.

Status: Adopted on Nov. 29, 2011.

HB 4163: This bill would require schools to adopt a policy that prohibits bullying at school. It would be known as "Matt's Safe School Law." Under this bill, all school district boards, including the boards of local districts, intermediate districts and charter schools, would have six months from the effective date of this new law to adopt and implement a policy prohibiting bullying at school. Those districts already

having a policy that complies with the provisions found in this new law would not be required to adopt another, however, they would have to submit a copy of their policy to the Department of Education no later than 60 days after the bill takes effect. At least one public hearing would be held on the proposed policy.

Status: Bill ordered enrolled on Nov. 29, 2011.


SB 0502: This bill would allow the Liquor Control Commission to issue a liquor license to a com-

munity college or a public university that operates an accredited culinary or hospitality program for consumption at the program's location, under certain circumstances.

Status: Ordered enrolled on Nov. 29, 2011.

HR 0166: A resolution to commemorate the 70th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor and to declare Dec. 7, 2011 as Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day in the state of Michigan.

Status: Adopted on Nov. 30, 2011.

HB 5125: A bill to provide for the powers and duties of county road commissions to transfer to the county board of commission-

Status: Passed by the House on Nov. 30, 2011. Sent to Senate Committee on Transportation.
