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East Jordan Community Mourns the Loss of Two Young Men

Twelve years ago in a reading buddy program at East Jordan Elementary School. then-third grader TaiLee Jordan Fick walked into Mathew William Warrington's first-grade classroom to help the younger kids with their reading skills. That moment marked the beginning of a lasting friendship between the two boys.

Fick preferred the outdoors as a boy, whether he rode his bike, fed fish in his grandfather's pond or caught frogs in the creek behind his family's house. Sometimes, he threw those frogs in jest at his older sister BobAnn.

Like Fick, Warrington was dedicated to his football-loving family. He was protec-

tive of his two sisters. Ashlev and Natacsha, especially when he and his sisters played on the high school football team to-

Fick is survived by his parents Stephen and Deborah Fick; brother Rodney Black; sister BobAnn Fick; nieces Lilly, Katey, and Anny; nephews

Isaac, and Mason; paternal grandfather Joe Fick, all of East Jordan; maternal grandmother Norma Black of Palmer,

Storm Water Management, Kirtland **Products Hot Topics** at City Meeting



The Charlevoix County Broadband Team met last week, Wednesday, August 22 at Boyne City High School to announce completion of a broadband certification program, offered by Connected Nation. More than 40 people attended the event, including community leaders, the Michigan Public Se Commission chairman and the president of Connected

Rick Diebold, superintendent of the Charlevoix-Emmet Intermediate School District, expressed satisfaction with Charlevoix County's achievement.

"We're proud of this accomplishment. We're proud of being recognized as a connected community," he said. "We're honored to receive this status but more importantly I think that we are invigorated as we move forward to continue to serve our friends, our neighbors and our constituents as we work to make Charlevoix County the best place in the country to learn, to work and

to live." A national non-profit organization, Connected Nation aims to expand broadband Internet and technology access in formerly underserved or overlooked communities.

ELLSWORTH—After an extensive nationwide search where contestants were chosen based on a wide range of skills, Ellsworth native Scott Heeres has been selected by Sears to compete as one of the country's most tal-

ented handymen on an HGTV program where 10 Handymen and Handywomen test their skills each week through a series of challenges hoping to win the title of 'All American Handyman.'

"It's all good, we'll make something out of it," says Dave Heeres,

Scott began working with the men when he was two. "They asked him to measure something for them and he ran in the house demanding a tape measure, he couldn't even say tape measure," said Donna Heeres, Scott's mother.

Scott's grandfather, Ken Staley who has lived in Charlevoix since 1927 and even served as Mayor for a time, spent many hours with Scott in his garage on Sherman Street in Charlevoix.

36 year old Scott graduated from Ellsworth High School and earned his Associates degree from Northwestern Michigan College in Traverse City.

The ten week long competition which began on August 19 airs Sundays at 10p.m. /9 Central. Each week Scott and his competitors will be faced with





MEDICATION AND SENIORS

Whether you are a senior citizen, or the caregiver of a senior citizen, be-ing aware of the risks of accidental medicinal poisoning is very impor-tant to ensuring safety. If you are aging and beginning to have numerous prescriptions, the various medica-tions can be confusing, leading to mistakes in taking the medication which could cause poisoning through improper combination or overuse. While you may have a schedule by which to take your medication, the various types can still become quite confusing, and taking numerous medications at once can still be a bit dangerous. It is important to under-stand just what you should do to re-main safe from medication poisoning.

Identify Medical Interactions If you have any side effects to the medi-cations you are taking, or with the combination of medications that you don't feel is right, you must write it down so you are able to remember and inform your physician. Having complete control also means maintaining a source of contact in case there are any issues or emer-gencies in which you need help.

If you feel that you are suf-



fering from even minor medication poisoning or an issue with medication you are taking, inform your caregiver or physician im-mediately. You should do all you can to prevent accidental harm due to medications.

Following Important Guidelines To avoid medicinal poisoning, you can follow several im-portant guidelines that will ensure you are taking the medicine you are intended to take, at the time you are supposed to take it, and with the medication it is safe to be taken with. Following these guidelines is an option, but if you want to avoid accidental poisoning, you will be wise and follow these guidelines to ensure proper taking of medication.

Keep a Medicine List Keeping a list that details and describes each medication that you are taking, whether generic or name brand, will ensure that you are always aware of just what you are taking, or administering if you are a caregiver. You can keep this list with your medication in order to have it there if you aren't sure if you are taking the right pill or other type of medication.

Maintain Constant Doctor

Contact You should maintain constant communication with your doctor or pharmacist to ensure that they are aware of medications you may be allergic to, or any side effects you have experienced. It is very important that you keep contact to ensure they are aware of what you are taking at all times, and just how you are reacting.

Understand Your Meds Of course you aren't going to be able to know just what medication is for what and how it is going to react to you, but taking the time to learn your medication can ensure there are no accidental mix-ups. If you are aware of what you are taking and how you react to it, you will be able to understand when something goes wrong and just why.

Use a Primary Pharmacy If you are only interacting with one pharmacy and be-come well-known and familiar with that pharmacy, you will get much better and comprehensive services. As you are prescribed medication, and as your prescriptions are being filled, you want to know that there are professionals ensuring that you are getting the right and safest medica-tion.

Resident's React to Kirtland Products Zoning Reassessment

Boyne City—The city commission met August 14 and decided to send the Kirtland Products, LLC conditional permit back to the planning and zoning department for reassessment.

The Kirtland Products plant manufactures wood pellets at its location in Boyne City's Industrial Park, 1 Altair Drive.

City residents' complaints about Kirtland Products operations include noise and emission issues as well as reduced home values for those who live close to the plant.

CEO of Kirtland Products, Leon Tupper, spoke at the city commission meeting to discuss

the company's progress in receiving findings that afternoon from Kodiak Group, an industrial engineering and computer IT services company. The Kodiak study presents recommendations for Kirtland Products to reduce noise problems. Tupper said the Kirtland Products plant planned to examine the results of the study. provide a timeline for the issues and present answers within a month.

City commissioners still moved to remand the plant's conditional permit to the planning and zoning department. The planning and zoning department's decision could result in the plant's closure if the Kirtland Products permit is not approved.

We asked a few Boyne City residents to tell us their reaction to the situation. Their responses appear below.

Four Elected To Great Lakes Energy Board

The four winners in the annual election of Great Lakes Energy directors are incumbents Paul Byl of Shelby, Mark Carson of Boyne City, Robert Kran of Free Soil and newcomer Paul Schemanski of Petoskey.

Seven candidates vied for four open board positions. All are three-year terms. Incumbent Dale Farrier of Kalkaska was defeated in his bid for reelection. Other candidates were Triston Cole of Mancelona and Benjamin Harris of Bitely.

Byl is a farmer who has served as director for 28 years. Carson, who has been a director six years, is store manager for Gordon Food Service in Petoskey and an adjunct business instructor for Spring Arbor University. Kran is a dairy farmer with 10 years of director experience. Schemanski is an analyst at McLaren Northern Michigan Hospital.

Winners were announced today at the cooperative's annual business meeting in Boyne City.

Sports Lounge with his older brother Rodney.

Fick also cared for his five young nieces and nephews, taking them out to walk down the road, ride bikes, catch frogs and play basketball or baseball. He tended a bonfire while surrounded by the children almost every summer night, said his sister BobAnn.

Wearing cowboy boots, his favorite Mountain Dew shirt and blue jeans, Warrington was the first to greet classmates and teachers when he walked down the hallways in high school and the first to stick up for a classmate who was being picked on. An outgoing young man with blue eyes and brown hair buzzed into a military haircut, Warrington always cracked jokes, his freckled face lighting up whenever he laughed with a distinctive chuckle.

TaiLee Fick

Fick was born November 11, 1990 in Tahlequah, Oklahoma, attended East Jordan Public Schools and graduated from high school in 2009. He played defense on the soccer team during all four years of high school, earning varsity letters.

Considered friendly and reliable by former high school soccer coach Peter Elliott, Fick worked hard, kicked hard and played with heart.

"He was a nice kid to have on the team. He was cooperative. You could count on him. All those things come together to make a player that fits with the group," Elliott recalled.

Fick worked in the lumber business with his grandfather Joe Fick and at the McDonald's in East Jordan.

His other interests included swimming in Lake Charlevoix, snowboarding and snowmobiling.

Fick will be remembered as a loving son, brother and uncle, said his sister BobAnn.

"Everybody's going to miss him, his family especially," she said. "He was just always here for all of us."

Mathew Warrington

Warrington was born December 16, 1992 in Charlevoix, attended East Jordan Public Schools and graduated from high school in 2011. Growing up, he loved to play kickball, baseball and football with his sisters as well as snowboard down the hill in his family's backyard during the winter months. He enjoyed hunting and fishing as well.

Warrington played football—his greatest passion—all four years of high school as offensive guard and nose guard on defense. During that time he also set records for weight lifting.

After enjoying Auto Technology, his favorite high school course, Warrington continued to pursue work in mechanics. His projects included work on wheel bearings, oil and brake changes along with various other automotive specialties. He was willing to help people with their cars at any time, sometimes working late at night in order to finish.

Like Fick, Warrington worked at the Mc-Donald's in East Jordan. He moved to Plainwell for a brief period to work in the construction business.

Frequently, he rescued stray animals and gave them a home. His assorted mix of pets in the Warrington household included dogs, bunnies, cats, mice, a snake, a tarantula, a scorpion, a rat and—kept in the backyard, unbeknownst to his mother—a possum.

"He was a wonderful kid with a huge heart," his mother said in a Facebook message late last week. "The last words I heard my son say to me were 'I love you too, Mom' and I will cherish those words for the rest of my life."

TaiLee and Matt's Friendship

Fick and Warrington were close as they grew up and attended school. They worked together at McDonald's in East Jordan for awhile. Recently, the two saw each other almost every day, two-tracking and mudding with friends in the East Jordan area. Together, they helped people in the community, with everything from offering car rides to moving heavy furniture.

Families, friends, former classmates and the entire East Jordan community grieve the loss of these two young men.

Fick received fire and EMS escorts to his burial site at Mount Bliss Cemetery in Jordan Township. Memorial contributions in his honor may be made to the American Cancer Society, PO Box 22718, Oklahoma City, OK, 73123-1718.

Warrington received police, fire and EMS escorts to his burial site at Sunset Hill Cemetery in East Jordan.

The Fick and Warrington families expressed appreciation for the support they continue to receive from the East Jordan community.

"Everyone has stuck together in this town. We really appreciate everything that everyone has done for us," Matt Warrington's sister Natascha said.

Boyne City & Charlevoix Featured in Pure Michigan YouTube Commercial

A statewide Pure Michigan sing-along video showcased Charlevoix and Boyne City as filming locations last Saturday, August 25.

Last weekend's spotlight on northern Michigan originated with Status Media cofounders Jeff Barrett and Rob Bliss. In 2011, the two men featured the city of Grand Rapids and attracted almost five million views on YouTube with their first filming excursion, "The Grand Rapids LipDub." Continuing their successful promotion of Michigan tourism, Barrett and Bliss collaborated with the Pure Michigan organization and automaker Chrysler Group, LLC to organize a second lip dub, filmed in 50 cities across the state in seven days.

Their weeklong trip began Sunday, August 19. Revamping the song "Good Time" by Owl City and Carly Rae Jepsen with retooled Michigan-themed lyrics, the video will showcase various people, businesses and natural landscapes that are unique to the state. Filming locations for the singalong were organized ahead of time and open to the general public for participation.

Driving in an "Imported from Detroit" Chrysler vehicle, Barrett and Bliss began the 50-city trek at Sugarloaf Mountain in Marquette, making their way to the Lower Peninsula and driving south down I-75 with various stops on the east side of the state. After filming Detroit locations that included Comerica Park and the Detroit Institute of Arts, the film crew then traveled up the western shoreline, heading to northern Michigan destinations. Their stops in our area also included Petoskey, Harbor Springs and Traverse City.

In Charlevoix, 40 people boarded the Keweenaw Star last Saturday, August 25 for filming of the Pure Michigan sing-along video. A camera crew followed the cruise ship as it glided through Round Lake, under the drawbridge and toward the lighthouse on Lake Michigan.

Amanda Wilkin, director of the Charlevoix Area Convention & Visitors Bureau, organized the event in Charlevoix and highlighted its contribution to tourism and economic development through the city's inclusion in the project.

"It's very, very good for Charlevoix," she said. "Especially being a tourism-based community where everything revolves around tourism, it's really important to get our name out there as much as possible and to keep people seeing that it's fun in Charlevoix and we've got a lot going on."

Boyne City participated in the 50-city tour as well. Hugh Conklin, manager of the Boyne City Main Street Program, said the town was included as a last-minute filming destination on Saturday. Last Saturday, Status Creative co-creator Rob Bliss emailed Boyne City officials when a scheduled community unexpectedly cancelled. Bliss had visited Boyne City this past March when he

spoke at a Boyne City High School assembly:

In a short period of time, the city assembled more than 30 people to participate. The group gathered on a rooftop above the building that houses Alpine Chocolate Haus, Cafe Santé and the Michigan Community Dental Clinic. They sang for the Pure Michigan film crew with the downtown streets of Boyne City as a backdrop.

"It's great. It can't do anything but be a great thing for [Boyne City] to be a part of a lot of other great towns in Michigan and to show the world what a great place Michigan is," Conklin said.

The three and a half minute sing-along video will be available on YouTube and the Pure Michigan website sometime next week. A specific date for the video's release was unavailable at press time.

New Pavilion Open at Whiting Park

Boyne City—Whiting Park officially unveiled its new pavilion in a dedication ceremony Monday, August 27.

15 people attended the event to celebrate completion of the project, including members of the Charlevoix County Parks and Recreation Committee, executive directors from the Boyne City and East Jordan chambers of commerce, Charlevoix County commissioners as well as representatives from Petrie Construction Company, the contractor for the site.

The former pavilion, built in the early 1940s, was torn down three years ago. The Charlevoix County Parks and Recreation Committee began

planning construction for a new pavilion in 2010.

Petrie Construction Company of East Jordan finished

construction in less than two months, breaking ground at the end of April and completing the structure in early June. Ross Maxwell, parks and recreation director at Whiting Park, thanked everyone involved with the project and expressed satisfaction with the new structure.

"It's a fine building here at Whiting Park," he said. "We're very happy of course, and already we're using it."

After a ribbon-cutting ceremony followed by refreshments for all guests, the Parks and Recreation Committee convened for its monthly meeting.

Whiting Park is located on Lake Charlevoix at 05820 Lakeshore Road. The 160-acre recreation park includes a campground, half-mile beachfront and several rental facilities, such as the new pavilion, for large groups and events.

Walking Tour of Camp Sea Gull open to Public Saturday, September 1st

Hayes Township, Charlevoix County is holding an open house walking tour of Camp Sea-Gull on September 1 from 1-4 p.m. This is the public's opportunity to see this pristine property. This property and the need to preserve it will speak for itself. It may not look that impressive from the road but once you tour the property you will be awed by its grandeur.

Hayes Township representatives will be on site to answer questions and give tours. Golf cart rides will be provided for those unable to walk the property.

In response to the many questions received regarding the development of the park the Township would like to state "If we are fortunate enough to acquire this property we will be holding public meetings to get everyone's input on what amenities to provide".

The Township has a conceptual plan with a wish list of amenities;

The Township envisions a launch for small boats of the type that Township residents might use for fishing, as an example. There is no plan to compete with large commercial boat launches but only to provide a place for the use of modest craft. The Township is seeking engineering information on exactly how a small boat launch could be created. Hours of operation would be established along with other park rules by Township ordinance.

The Township wishes to preserve as many of the existing cabins and buildings to be rented out for overnight and short term visitors. At some time in the future rustic camping may be discussed.

The Township plans to use the year-round residence on the property to house an individual who will be present to manage the property. This is practiced in many other parks. The use of the residence would be a substantial part of the resident manager's compensation. This would be implemented as soon as possible after acquisition of the land.

Regarding land preservation, the Township has received a wetland delineation for the property, and all plans will involve protection of

those wetlands.

We understand people's desire for more specific information. It is a tough balancing act because on one hand, the Township wants to provide as

much information as possible to residents. On the other, there is no guarantee that the grant for acquisition will be approved and so we don't want to spend too much money on a detailed site plan that might be premature. The Township has drawn on the experience of other jurisdictions in the area which have parks, to look at budgets, relations with neighbors, etc. regarding the feasibility of the project, and has gained a lot of information from other jurisdictions who have created and who operate parks. This is not an uninformed effort.

Though development of fa-

cilities such as a boat launch would take time, the Township plans to open the property to the public as soon as possible if it is acquired for recreation and nature study. We anticipate access for beach use, walking trails, and similar activities very soon after acquisition. Access in winter for ice fishing and other recreational uses can be made of the property as planning and funding is secured for more development. The park is envisioned as an ongoing community project.



Last February, Charlevoix County collaborated with the Northern Lakes Economic Alliance to participate in Connected Nation's community engagement program. Over 36 community leaders led the Charlevoix County Broadband Team, representing municipalities and chambers as well as business, economic development, healthcare, library and education sectors.

Connect Michigan, the statewide Michigan branch of Connected Nation, helped the team to assess the area's current state of broadband access, use and adoption as well as formulate plans for further development.

Results and future plans were unveiled at the August 22 certification announcement. The Connect Michigan assessment includes a technology action plan, presenting recommendations for projects such as digital literacy programs, website and social media classes for local businesses and an improved presence of government online.

Several broadband team members spoke to discuss the program's impact on different areas of operation in Charlevoix County.

Mary Faculak, executive director of the East Jordan chamber of commerce, said she considers "Con nected" certification a recruiting tool to attract entrepreneurs to Charlevoix County, as well as a way for industries such as the East Jordan Iron Works to remain in the

"These industries have to stay connected. They have to be able to operate on a global network," Faculak said. "We're keeping these industries here and we're allowing them to be able to grow in an area where they do want to stay and where they want to live and where their roots

Eric Frederick, state program manager for Connect Michigan, said Charlevoix County's success could motivate other municipalities to participate in the program: "Our hope is that Charlevoix's success here today will inspire other communities to take a closer look at their broadband landscape and help their families, businesses and institutions to really increase their quality of life through a span of broadband access adoption use."

My wife wants to write it all off and just give her the house and title, but I think she owe us something for putting a roof over her head. What do you think?

Thomas Dear Thomas,

Honestly, I think you handled this situation poorly from the very begin-

ning. From what you're telling me, you put her there originally on a charity basis, and now you want to change the deal. You didn't say anything about giving her a house, but you didn't set up a rental agreement either. And now you're acting like she owes you 17 months of back rent. I don't think so. I think that's on you.

Now, you have some decisions to make. Were you providing free housing to someone who was struggling. or were you providing a free house to someone who was struggling? I understand this lady has experienced a terrible tragedy, but even with that, I'm not hearing lots of evidence that she's moving toward gaining control and getting her life back together. You may be giving a drunk a drink, if after 17 months of this situation she's not back on her feet again and out on her own.

If it were me, I'd sit down with her and have a gentle talk. Let her know the last 17 months were a gift, but you want to see her making her way and winning at life again. Set a reasonable time limit, whether it's six months or even a year, and tell her you'll be selling the house at that point. This is fair to her and to you guys as well.

grounds that they were uncomfortable with the county enforcing their ordinances. Council members could have scheduled the ordinance for a second hearing with the intention of passing the ordinance but not sign an agreement with the county to enforce it but there were some concerns voiced by an engineer with C2AE, an engineering firm utilized by the city which raised questions about the pertinence of the ordinance to the city. Although City Manager Michael Cain was in favor of the collaboration the agreement with the county would foster, he reminded the council how Boyne City has gone above and beyond what is required concerning environmental issues especially in regards to storm water. "There's a lot of unintended circumstances with outside control," said Mayor Ron Grunch. Towne and Neidhamer voted in favor of the ordinance.

City Manager Michael Cain gave the council copies of petitions concerning Kirtland Products that his office has received since the last council meeting two weeks ago. "We've got people speaking out on one side or the other of this issue," said Cain. The petitions came in several different forms but

in total 99 signatures represented people who wished to have the plant shut down and 610 signatures represented those who didn't want to see the company closed. The petitions were only informational and city staff is looking at where residents who signed the petition live in respect to the plant.

Kirtland Products CEO, Leon Tupper, filled council members in on the progress the company is making to curb the noise and air quality issues that resulted in their conditional use permit sent back to the planning commission at the last city council meeting. Tupper said that the company was looking to resume production upon completion of the first phase of recommended changes from Kodiak, the engineering firm that was hired to help Kirtland solve the undesirable issues it has been facing, has recommended. The first phase is expected to be complete by next week. At that time a measure of the noise impacts which will require the plant to resume 24 hour a day operations for at least three days will take place.

expressed disappointment at the petition movement stating that she felt it was "divisive" and "ugly," dividing the community. The Planning Commission will be considering whether to revoke Kirtland's Conditional Use Permit at their next regular scheduled meeting on September 17 at 5:00.

The City of Boyne City has two land division ordinances, both of which read closely to the same thing. In an effort to clear up city regulations, City Planning Administrator, Scott McPherson asked the board to eliminate one ordinance and amend the other. Presently, in order to divide a piece of property in the city a landowner must petition the city staff, take their request to the planning commission and then the city council. "All the City Council does is see if the criteria is met and then say yes if the requirements have been met or no if they haven't," said McPherson. The amendment would shorten the process by having petitions considered by staff only since they are the entity that makes sure all requirements are met anyway. "This is an example of creating efficiency for the city," said Councilman Derek Gaylord.

The next City commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 11 at 7:00 P.M.

The stroll is some 26,372 feet (about five miles) across the bridge to Mackinaw City, which takes about two hours at a leisurely pace, and the second half of the trek is all downhill. Keep in mind that baby strollers and wheelchairs are allowed, but wagons, skateboards, bicycles, pets, smoking, signs and banners are not. Remember; there are no restrooms on the bridge - so you may want to reconsider having that morning cup of coffee.

Having made this journey several times, I can attest that it is an exhilarating opportunity to see this majestic structure up close, marvel at the incredible engineering involved, extraordinary workmanship, and an indescribable beauty which merge into the half-century old masterpiece known as the Mackinac Bridge.

It is Michigan's foremost landmark, having been selected by the Michigan Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) as "Michigan's #1 Civil Engineering Project of the 20th Century" in 2000. It is also a national landmark, being named a National Historic Civil Engineering Landmark by the ASCE in August of 2010. It is a testament of faith, ingenuity, bravery and perseverance; representing decades of dreams, determination and diligence as the concept of uniting Michigan's two peninsulas evolved from a notion in the late 1800's to the first vehicle crossing on November 1st, 1957.

Connecting Michigan's peninsulas took quite a while. After many decades of debate regarding the financial and physical feasibility of bridging the turbulent nearly three-hundred foot waters and unpredictable fourseason weather patterns of the Straits area, the Mackinac Bridge Authority received the green light on financing and construction from the state legislature on April 30th, 1952. Utilizing a design conceived by internationally renowned bridge engineer, Dr. David B. Steinman, and funding in the amount of \$96,400,033.33 construction began on May 7th, 1954.

Steinman's vision was not only of a bridge that incorporated engineering and construction for the ages (the design is purported to last for at least 1,000 years), but also become a beautiful creation that would be a marvel to all who would see it for generations to come. At a center span of 8,614 feet, is was once the longest suspension bridge in the world, and continues to hold the title of the third longest in the world today...over a half a century since it was built.

Those gleaming white, 6,500ton towers stand 552 feet above the water, and were actually built

500 miles away in the town of Ambridge, Pennsylvania, where they were assembled and disassembled before being transported to the Straits area. The unique grid system in the roadway across the center span is an innovation devised by engineer D. B. Steinman; designed to relieve wind pressure from beneath the bridge thus stabilizing the structure even under the extreme gales of the north.

Approximately 350 engineers focused on the design, 3,500 workers were on the bridge site, and another 7,500 at quarries, machine shops, mills and other support services during the three and a half year project. Their efforts included the installation of nearly 5 million rivets and over 1 million bolts in the structure, 42,000 miles of cabling in the suppnsion system, and 931,000 tons of concrete in piers reaching as far as 295 feet below the water surface.

These are among the many "fascinating facts" one can ponder during a Labor Day stroll across the bridge. It is the allure,

however, of the stunningly beautiful 360 degree grand vistas of the Straits area; with Lake Michigan to the west, Lake Huron, Mackinac and Bois Blanc islands to the east, Mackinaw City and the lower peninsula to the south, and historic St. Ignace and the upper peninsula to the north, that will fill the heart and soul with memories certain to last a lifetime.

So take a walk across the "Mighty Mac" this weekend, and get ready for a Labor Day journey of a lifetime.
