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Charlevoix County road construction almost complete

BOYNE CITY/CHARLEVOIX— Now that the gravel is smoothed, covered and painted and there are no longer workmen stopping traffic on the Charlevoix Boyne City Road, side streets in both communities have become the focus of infrastructure improvements. Both Hannah and Park Streets in Boyne City are dug up well below street level to replace pipes underneath.

"South Park has been a street we've been wanting to do for some time, it was real bad on the surface and the pipes below it were in poor shape and need to be replaced," said Michael Cain, Boyne City, City Manager.

The Park Street construction was possible due to a \$504,000 Federal Community Block Grant the city received from the **Economic Development** Corporation for downtown infrastructure improvements. "When the grant opportunity became available, I took it (Park Street) from our 'want to do' to 'shall do' project list," said Cain. Total reconstruction of three blocks of the street

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Charlevoix County Waves Right to Collect Millage

CHARLEVOIX—Charlevoix County Commissioners approved a request by Jack Messer, Executive Director of the County's Commission on Aging to not collect a portion of the millage that taxpayers voted in to support senior citizen programs last August at the September 26 County Commission meeting.

"We are very grateful the peo-

ple voted up to .65 mills this year but we don't need it right now, so let's leave it with the taxpayer," said Messer. The budget process requires each department to look at their projects for the upcoming year and compile project costs. In the past the Commission on Aging had more deficits than it had revenues and as a result the then new Director, Messer, held four public meetings and established four focus groups holding numerous

discussions on how to balance the budget and best serve the people he was employed to aid. Out of those meetings came what he calls the three legged stool the department now stands. Focus on essential services, give priority to those with the greatest need and improve the senior millage.

When Messer inherited the deficit budget in March of 2010 he

EAST JORDAN—The author whose book, MASH, inspired the hit television series of the same name once said, "Change is not made without inconvenience, even from worse to better." Playwright, George Bernard Shaw

wrote, "Progress is impossible without change." Yet nothing stirs the pot of discourse more than the introduction of some changes.

New East Jordan Superintendent Jon Hoover found himself at the center of a great deal of discussion concerning new initiatives he is enacting in the school

system. In response to the many questions that have arose over the last month he sent a letter to every home in the district, published it through the Chamber of Commerce e-capsule and left copies at East Jordan restaurants and gas

EAST JORDAN-Two introductions to amend zoning codes for the city were approved and introductory discussions on zoning changes and collaborative shoreline protection strategies were discussed at the Tuesday, October 2 meeting of the East Jordan City Council.

Introductions to two ordinances that would amend the zoning codes for the city of East Jordan were approved by the city commission Tuesday. Ordinance #143E and #143F came before the council for the first time. The amendments would allow the addition of senior housing to the professional office district of the city. "A senior housing project was bid into this area and this was done to clarify the city's position," said City Attorney Scott Beatty in reference to the minor changes made to the ordi-

set out to create a sustainable model so that services to seniors would not be interrupted. He has been striving to provide the no frill service they asked for and as a result Messer has cut \$300,000 out of the budget over the last three years and has a 2013 budget smaller than that of 2012 and a plan that will end the year with money to provide nine months of services in savings. "Thanks to a Herculean effort of both the staff and seniors we've balanced the budget and this year you don't have to levy the entire amount," Messer told commissioners.

The decrease in levied taxes will save taxpayers roughly \$100,000 this year. "We are not in the business to make money. We're in the business to provide services," he said. Messer did clarify that the unlevied .05 of a mil will be needed in the future. He told the commission there are 10,000 people turning 65 every day. "We will need the funds to address future needs just not this year," he

This past August taxpayers voted on a .65 mil, it was the first time in 12 years the senior millage of Charlevoix County was raised. The state average is .7mills. The maximum allowed millage rate for county commission on aging is 1 mill. One of the changes to the department that has aided in the successful budget is the initiation of a fee based structure compared to donations the commission used to request. "By everyone paying their fair share we can stretch the millage money further," he said. "We can help the people who need the help the most. We don't turn anyone away and there is no waiting list."

will cost \$704,000.

Boyne's Mainstreet group has also allocated another \$2,000 to put utility lines underground along Park from River Street to Pine Street and along Ray Street from Lake Street almost to East Street. "It's going to make a huge visual difference," said Cain. Utility wires were placed underground around Old City Park along River Street a few years ago. Cain said that the improvements have been getting addressed as resources are avail-

Hannah Street is also a complete road reconstruction project but the funds to rebuild it are coming out of the city's Road Fund. The three-block project is costing a little over \$400,000 and runs from M-75 at the south end to Vogal Street at the north end. The road

has been stripped down to nothing and underground utilities and waterlines are being replaced as well as curbs, gutters and a pedestrian sidewalk on the west side of the street, none of which was previously there. Adding, extending and improving sidewalks are consistent with one of the community goals to make Boyne City a pedestrian friendly community.

Charlevoix's Clinton Street has been down to the dirt, guarded with orange cones, for weeks now. The project is not part of any other road improvements and is simply the city's efforts to keep up with a deteriorating infrastructure. The project is being funded through the City Infrastructure and Road Funds.

Both community projects will be fully completed by mid to late October and are on schedule and within budget. "This project was scheduled to minimize any impacts to the downtown area," said Rob Streabel, Charlevoix City Manager.

stations.

In the letter Hoover explains the philosophy and belief system that he has come to embrace as a leader. The first, "Yes, as soon as" vs. "No, can't because" combined with a belief that we are to "expect a return on investments made in our students, vs. spending money to simply pay off indebtedness."

In the six page letter he informed the community of the many ideas he has been setting in motion over the last two and a half months and answers the many question of how all of his grandiose plans for East Jordan students will be paid for. "I'm glad the community cares about their schools," said Hoover.

Hoover saw the community's outcry for answers as a positive sign that they were interested and willing to step forward for the good of the students. "I'm surely not offended by that. It is human nature to question changes," he said.

The community's response to the letter has been overwhelmingly positive. "The number of people that want to see the seniors get to Peru and have pledged their support is nothing short of remarkable," he said. Focusing on the

senior class by giving them the responsibility of being leaders in the schools which culminates into a humanitarian trip to bring much needed text books to a school in Peru is one of the first initiatives Hoover has focused on as superintendent. "The students have decided that the culture at the high school is fun and safe both emotionally and physically and one in which they know they will get the best from the staff every day and in response they are giving their best," he said.

After a clear explanation of his vision and how he intends to make it happen in East Jordan, Hoover says he is experiencing a "Let's make these things happen" attitude from the community and that after one month of school there has been only three student referrals to the principal's office and those for minor behavioral correction. "The early results are in and it's working," he said.

"We are really working hard making sure the standards we set for the students are matching the standards we set for ourselves," said Hoover. "We can't yet quantify our results but we can qualify them," he said. He expects excellent quantifiable results in May and June.

Community participation sought for Boyne District Library's strategic planning process

The Boyne District Library has begun a multilevel strategic pianning/visioning process and organizational review, which will be used to help guide the Library's Board of Trustees and staff in planning for the future. The impetus for the planning project comes from the library's receipt of a gift of \$250,000 from the Mary Peabody Foundation in 2011. The foundation specified the purpose of the gift is "to provide support for special capital improvement projects of the Boyne District Library."

The planning process will rely heavily on local involvement through a community survey, focus group sessions, and interviews with key community leaders. "This is a tremendous opportunity, and we want as much community input as possible to make the best use of it," said library director Cliff Carey.

Marianne Hartzell, Joseph

Mika, and Robert Raz of Hartzell-Mika Consulting, a library consulting firm based in East Lansing, are facilitators for the project. The consultants spent two days at the Library in mid-September, including meeting with trustees at their September 12 board session. Library board members are enthusiastic about the planning process and eager to learn the results of the information that will be gathered from the community, especially in the areas of library growth, potential future services, and possible expan-

sion.

"This gift will allow us to improve our resources and services to our patrons, so we are very interested in their input," said library board president Jane MacKenzie. "Having a strong plan will help the board, staff and community immensely as we look to the future."

All members of the community are invited and en-

couraged to complete a survey, distributed through the library's fall newsletter, the Boyne Area Chamber of Commerce, and available at tinyurl.com/BDLsurvey. 





How to Talk So Kids Will Listen

The workshop is based on the bestselling book, "How to Talk So Kids Will Listen & Listen So Kids Will Talk," by Adele Faber and Elaine Mazlish. The authors wrote the book to come to the aid of parents looking for practical and sensible approaches to raising children. "Parents are on the firing line seven days

a week. Yet, few of them have had any training for this demanding job. No wonder even the most well-intentioned parents often find themselves feeling frustrated, bewildered, guilty, and alone," said Faber and Mazlish.

"This workshop gives parents a chance to learn practical, new skills and exchange ideas and experiences with other parents. While the techniques are scripted for use with children, they can be used to communicate effectively with friends, partners, co-workers, supervisors, relatives—just about anyone," said Townsend, who has led many parenting workshops over the

Hundreds of thousands of parents and professionals have benefited from the How to Talk So Kids Will Listen workshop. Studies in Wisconsin, Colorado and North Dakota show attending parents developed skills that significantly and lastingly improved the quality of their family

Interactive "Ages and Stages" Web tools help parents track child development

Have you ever wondered if your young child is having trouble with speech, emotional development, social skills, physical coordination or problem solving? It can be difficult to know for sure, especially for firsttime parents and for those without easy access to healthcare providers.

To that end, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, in collaboration with Great Start, has launched a portal to "Ages & Stages," an interactive online screening tool to help parents connect with professionals and assess the development of their children, from birth through age five. The program is a confidential, free service that can be completed from the comfort of home.

According to Natalie Kasiborski, coordinator for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan's Early Childhood Behavioral Health Initiative (ECBHI), Ages & Stages is more than just a questionnaire. "It's an opportunity to spot and address problems before they inhibit a child's development," she said. "Parents take about 15 minutes to answer specific questions about what they have observed in their child. We review their responses confidentially, and provide personalized follow-up at no charge.'

Ages & Stages doesn't end with the initial screening. Additional screens may be provided at two, four or sixmonth intervals; parents can log in periodically to complete a new screening. The program can also be a critical step in preparing for preschool and Kindergarten programs, which often require developmental screening by the time children are enrolled.

"The first five years are incredibly important," said Maureen Hollocker, Director of the Char-Em Great Start Collaborative. "By using Ages & Stages to monitor simple behavioral attributes during this time, parents are giving their kids a much better chance to excel in school, and later in life."

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality healthcare, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties. Alcohol and the Aging Senior

It is New Year's Eve. You have one drink, then another, then a third. You used to be able to chug down 6 drinks without consequences. But lately, you've noticed that things are a bit different. Before dinner is over, you are wobbly; your speech slurs. Before the night is over, you are spread out on the floor.

You've only had 3 drinks. What happened?

Research shows alcohol has a much stronger effect in the senior population than in younger people. As you age, you absorb alcohol more readily. So what used to be standard twenty-something fare is way too much for you now.

There are reasons for this change. 1. Your body's ratio of water to fat

- water to dilute the alcohol. 2. Your aging body does not metabolize alcohol as easily as it did in your youth; your body produces less liver enzymes that help break down
- 3. If you are on prescription or over-the-counter medication, alcohol can compound the risk of collapse and falls: in fact, alcohol can produce an impaired effect with about half of the 100 drugs used frequently by sen-
- 4. The aging body has more body fat which does not absorb alcohol.

Changes in body chemistry that accompany the aging process can certainly be seen as one factor to explain the prevalence of alcoholism in seniors. The AMA estimates that about 3 million Americans over the age of 60 have a drinking problem. At least 10 percent of patients who go to an emergency room with alcohol related problems are over 60 years of age. As

much as 20 percent of elderly patients(55 and older) in emergency rooms exhibit symptoms of alcoholism. And in many nursing homes, the problem of drinking is even more acute—as high as 49 percent in some studies.

In fact, researchers feel that these statistics are much lower than what they are in reality. Because alcohol problems in the senior population are usually mistaken for other conditions associated with the aging process, very often, alcohol abuse and alcoholism in the senior population may go undiagnosed and un-

Yet studies have also shown that moderate drinking confers benefits to the aging population. Alcohol consumed in moderate amounts can raise HDL levels of the so-called "good" cholesterol: it can also pre vent blood clots, heart attacks and ischemic strokes. Studies have demonstrated that men who drink one alcoholic beverage a day have a significantly lower risk of death compared with those who rarely or never drink. A French study completed in 2002 also shows that moderate drinking can lower the incidence of dementia in the aging population.

Despite these benefits, the dangers of alcohol are considerable. The incidents of driving problems are high in the elderly population. Any potential benefit of alcohol is more than cancelled by the dangers in alcohol-related diseases such as addictive alcoholism, cirrhosis of the liver, high blood pressure and depression. Alcohol has also been shown to produce deficits in intellectual and behavior functioning. It may accelerate normal aging or cause premature aging of the brain. Magnetic Resonance Imaging techniques have

shown more extensive brain tissue loss in subjects with alcoholism than in those without alcoholism. And research also shows that shrinkage of the frontal lobe increases with the consumption of alcohol.

So what can seniors do to understand their own threshold of alcohol consumption?

Here are a few guidelines: 1. If you don't drink, don't start.

- The risks far outweigh the benefits. 2. If you do drink, limit yourself to one drink a day (4-5 drinks over the course of a week).
- 3. Do not engage in binge drinking which can bring about irregular heartbeat, elevated blood pressure, increased risk for heart disease and
- strokes. 4. If you are on medication, do not drink at all. Even over the counter drugs such as ibuprofen or aspirin when taken with alcohol, can damage stomach lining and cause liver problems. Alcohol, taken with antihistamines, is known to increase drowsiness and can lead to impaired driving or accidents.
- 5. If you feel you have a drinking problem, consult your physician and be proactive about getting treatment options. Call your local chapter of Alcoholics Anonymous or Rational Recovery for help.

'Building Better Bones' program Focuses on Osteoporosis Prevention

Osteoporosis can be a silent disease, one that causes the thinning of bones, which then causes bones to become fragile and more likely to fracture. "It's a disease that people often don't realize they have until they fracture their hip, wrist, or ankle," said Linda Linari, RN, BSN, ONC, an orthopedic nurse clinician with McLaren Northern Michigan.

Linari will share information on osteoporosis prevention and treatment during the "Building Better Bones" class. It will take place from 6 – 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday, October 10 at the John and Marnie Demmer Wellness Pavilion and Dialysis Center located at 820 Arlington Avenue in Petoskey.

The program is free and open to all individuals interested in the prevention, early diagnosis, and treatment of osteoporosis. Bone biology, bone density testing, treatment options, nutrition instruction, exercise, and fall/fracture prevention will be discussed.

Linari, who will provide an overview of osteoporosis, will be joined by presenters Janet Havens, a registered dietitian, and physical therapist, Anne

"(Anne) will go over exercises you can do to strengthen muscles, which strengthens bones and increases bone density, and ways to keep yourself safe so you don't injure your back, or slip and fall," Linari

Havens will educate attendees on making proper dietary choices to increase calcium intake. "And she will go over reading labels. There's a lot of information on food labels and it can be confusing. She will discuss how to read the labels appropriately," Linari

Women and men, particularly the elderly, can both suffer from osteoporosis, she added, though it does more commonly affect women.

"It's a disease we can prevent, or one that we can halt the progression of with appropriate medications and education," Linari said.





DNR remembers two slain officers

In 1926, conservation officers were shot to death in line of duty in **Marquette County**

MARQUETTE COUNTY — Saturday, Sept. 29, marked the 86th anniversary of the deaths of Michigan conservation officers Arvid Erickson and Emil Skogland, the Department of Natural Resources announced last week.

Erickson, 30, and Skogland, 36, were killed Sept. 29, 1926, when they encountered an unlicensed hunter near the Sand Plains area in Marquette County.

During the course of the arrest, the offender pulled a hidden .22 caliber revolver and fatally shot both officers. When the officers failed to return home, a massive search and investigation led to the offender. The suspect eventually confessed to the murders and disclosed the location of the officers' bod-

Both CO Erickson's and CO Skogland's weighted-down bodies were recovered from Lake Superior near Marquette. The offender, who had recently been paroled from prison for another murder, was convicted of first-degree murder for the officers' deaths.

"Conservation Officer Arvid Erickson and **Conservation Officer** Emil Skogland were killed in what might be called a routine license check," said DNR Law **Enforcement Division** Chief Gary Hagler. "Law enforcement then, as now, has no routine contacts. We will always remember those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty."

This year marks the 125th anniversary of conservation law enforcement in Michigan. Officers Erickson and Skogland are two of the 12 fallen conservation officers commemorated by the DNR earlier this year on May 15, when the department dedicated a memorial to conservation officers who have died while protecting this state's natural resources and the citizens who enjoy them.

Park Ownership Still Not Resolved

ELLSWORTH-As a result of an ongoing investigation into ownership of the Banks Township Park, township board members voted to withdraw their application for a grant they had applied for last March at the September 24 meeting.

The Michigan Passport Grant was intended to address drainage issues, beach enhancement, and reinforcing the slope at the park as well as other amenities like picnic tables, grills and a host of handicap accessible improvements while allowing the park to maintain its secluded, rustic nature.

"We are still working on ownership issues, because of that, we had to withdraw the grant," said Donna Heeres, Township Clerk. When the platted subdivision that surrounds Banks Township Park off Old Dixie

Hwy on Lake Michigan was formed in the mid 1940's, it was a requirement that when establishing a subdivision, one lot was to be deeded to the township. However, there was then a period of time in the 1960's when the townships were required to deed the lots back. To everyone's knowledge Banks Township never deeded the property back to the subdivision. When the township applied for the grant this past March the question of ownership arose and has been difficult to resolve.

The board put a great deal of time into the application process and they scored high on the grant's preliminary review making it all the more unfortunate. "It's just a muddy issue and we need to get it clarified," said Heeres.

Other topics discussed at the meeting included the new cost efficient furnace and heat pump installed at the

Township Hall. The \$7,000 furnace is expected to pay for itself within three



The Jordan Valley District Library now has a downloadable music service for its patrons. Freegal is a free legal music download service sold to libraries for its registered cardholders. There are hundreds of thousands of songs available through the Sony Music Entertainment catalog.

All cardholders need is their library card to use the service. Cardholders can download three songs per week. The download counter

resets each week at Monday 12:01 a.m. Every song has a sample clip to listen to before you download a song. This service will work with any MP3 player, including iPod, and can also be loaded into iTunes. It works on both PCs and Macs.

Here are some helpful tips to remember when deciding how to best store your seasonal items.

FOR MOTORCYCLES:

- · Top off your fuel tank and add high-qual ity fuel stabilizer designed for the type of fuel you use (gasoline or diesel)
- · Change the oil and filter. Used oil contains contaminants which can create sludge and corrosion. For boats, also change the lower unit lubrication. Run your engine for a few minutes with the new oil and fuel stabilizer to distribute them in the engine.
- Remove the battery and store it in a dry, cool place away from children and pets. Check the electrolyte level on conventional batteries (on a flat surface). Add distilled water to correct levels if necessary. Charge the battery to the manufacturer's recommendations during storage.

FOR BOATS:

- Make sure all the water is out of the engine and exhaust manifolds, fresh water systems and live bait wells. Winterize the cooling system using ethyl-glycol antifreeze (pink RV-type). If you're inexperienced, have a qualified shop do it for you.
- Boats stored outside may benefit from shrink wrapping or a canvas cover. In either case, adequate ventilation is required to prevent moisture entrapment. Inspect your trailer bearings. Replace the bearing seals and make sure they're well greased. While they're off check the tires for dry rot, and replace if
- If you have trailer brakes, make sure they operate and aren't worn excessively.

YEAR-ROUND TOYS

Even if you intend to use your motorhome or RV year-round, you could still benefit from some winterization. · Reduce heat loss - install double pane win-

- dows or use snap-on window panes or heat shrinkable window film.
- Check behind cabinetry for exposed air gaps and openings. These can be filled with caulk or foam sealant.
- · Improve circulation to areas susceptible to freezing by leaving cabinet doors and drawers slightly ajar where water lines are

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
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
