

East Jordan State of the Community Stable

EAST JORDAN—Leaders from every dimension of the East Jordan community gathered Tuesday. November 13 to hear what each had to say about the issues the city faces in the future and the hurdles it has overcome in the recent past. New East Jordan City Administrator Chris Yonker proclaimed the state of the community is "Stable with growing enthusiasm and optimism!'

Yonker spoke to the crowd of eighty-four including sixteen senior Red Devils, about his six areas of concentration for East Jordan. He talked first about new leadership in the City that has led to a new opportunity for building new relationships with the

He talked about our continued need for collaborative thinking and how city staff have been working on a master plan for the city that not only encompasses the city but the entire community, "We're all part of the East Jordan community," he said.

His third area of concentration is the fiscal responsibility that he

and the city staff have embraced in spite of the difficulties caused by dropping property tax values and fewer state sharing revenues, "The good news is we did balance the budget," he said.

His fourth point was the city's need to make investments in the long term infrastructure of the city, "We need to get a little better handle as to what our infrastructure is," he said. "We have to take care of what we have and make that a priority."

Yonker stated transparency as his fifth area of concentration for the city and plans to make that a reality through the use of an easily maneuvered website.

Finally, clearly his favorite topic, Yonker talked about 'Placemaking and Sustainability' which are efforts to make East Jordan a great place by using the concept of the 'Power of Ten' and by creating an easy to get to, safe, clean, attractive place that is full of fun activities. He summed up his speech with a quote from Abraham Lincoln, "The best way to predict your future is to create it."

Ellsworth **Future Farmers** Address Village **Board**

ELLSWORTH—Newly elected village council member Karla Kamerer joined the board for the first time at the November 12 meeting and Ellsworth High School Future Farmers of America gave an update on the status of the community garden.

Justin Potter, Troy Vandenberg, Sierra Merrifield and Pable Oviebo addressed the board on the Ellsworth chapter of the Future Farmers of America's first harvest from the plot of land donated to them by the village and a generous resident. "We found out the good and bad of it," said Oviebo, Ellsworth FFA President. The students explained that water and weeds were an issue this last growing season but that they had diagnosed the weeds and were expecting a better garden next spring. "We had some problems with soil conditions and weeds but we think we've solved that problem,' said Powers. The students asked the board many questions including permission to place a chicken coup on the parcel. The coup would be built on a trailer so it would be mobile and constructed in the high school parking lot. Questions like whether there was a village ordinance preventing the placement of a chicken coup or mandating it's size showed that the students were taking into consideration issues they had not been considering when the project first begun. Issues like no power source at the site are now being addressed with the students working on a solar power solution. Village President, Hugh Campbell, did inform the students who plan to house 40 layers at the site, that there is a village ordinance against roosters. "Roosters crow," he said in explanation.

The Ellsworth/East Jordan Road is being more closely watched by the Sheriff's patrol. After many complaints about speeding vehicles the Sheriff's department placed the speed sign on the stretch of Lake Street east of town as a reminder during the late summer. When the sign was removed they had an officer sit and give warnings but complaints of ridiculously fast moving vehicles are still coming in. "You hate to give tickets but I don't know how else to get people's attention," said Sheriff Dan



Here are some helpful tips to remember when deciding how to best store your seasonal items.

FOR MOTORCYCLES:

- Top off your fuel tank and add high-quality fuel stabilizer designed for the type of fuel you use (gasoline or diesel)
- Change the oil and filter. Used oil contains contaminants which can create sludge and corrosion. For boats, also change the lower unit lubrication. Run your engine for a few minutes with the new oil and fuel stabilizer to distribute them in the engine.
- Remove the battery and store it in a dry, cool place away from children and pets. Check the electrolyte level on conventional batteries (on a flat surface). Add distilled water to correct levels if necessary. Charge the battery to the manufacturer's recommendations during storage

FOR BOATS:

- Make sure all the water is out of the engine and exhaust manifolds, fresh water systems and live bait wells. Winterize the cooling system using ethyl-glycol antifreeze (pink RV-type). If you're inexperienced,
- have a qualified shop do it for you.
 Boats stored outside may benefit from shrink wrapping or a canvas cover. In either case, adequate ventilation is required to prevent moisture entrapment.
- tion is required to prevent moisture entrapment.

 Inspect your trailer bearings. Replace the bearing seals and make sure they're well greased. While they're off check the tires for dry rot, and replace if
- necessary.

 If you have trailer brakes, make sure they operate and aren't worm excessively.

YEAR-ROUND TOYS

Even if you intend to use your motorhome or RV year-round, you could still benefit from some winterization.

- Reduce heat loss install double pane windows or use snap-on window panes or heat shrinkable window film.
 Check behind cabinetry for exposed air gaps
- and openings. These can be filled with caulk or foam sealant.

Fifty More trees

NOVEMBER 13 BOYNE CITY COMMISSION MEETING

for Boyne City

BOYNE CITY—Two resolutions, one to approve the purchase of fifty trees and one to begin engineering for marina improvements were passed at the November 13 Boyne City Commission meeting.

A resolution to purchase a minimum of fifty trees to be planted in city right of ways was passed after discussion on a bid received from Robinson's Landscape and Nursery of Boyne City in the amount of \$11,070. "If we have \$15,000 to spend on trees, I can think of many other areas that look bare and would be fitting to place a tree," said Commissioner Laura Sansom. The resolution to purchase twentyone Red Maples, seven Green Mountain Sugar Maples, two Northern Red Oaks and twenty Crimson King Maples was amended to add the ability of city staff to purchase up to the \$15,000 budgeted for the trees. The trees were bid at \$20 cheaper than those purchased last year with the Maples running \$230 and the Oaks \$265. Forty trees were requested by residents.

Both piers in the city marina have exceeded their twenty-five year life expectancy. "The marina is starting to look tired, show it's age," said Barb

brooks, executive Assistant Harbor Master. The cost of maintenance is starting to rise almost to the same cost as replacing the piers. A Michigan Waterways commission Grant has already been secured by the city to extend the Shoppers Dock and make repairs to the Fixed Pier and it needs to be used by June of 2014. A resolution that grants permission for city staff to work with Abonmarche Engineering Firm to begin renovation processes needed at the marina and secure the DEQ permit needed to begin using the Waterways Grant on the Shoppers Dock and Fixed Pier. "I am real excited to move forward on this," said Brooks.

City offices will be closed on Thursday, November 22 and Friday, November 23 in observance of Thanksgiving.

The façade projects on the Boyne Country Provisions and Radio Shack buildings will be going on for the next two weeks.

There will be a public information meeting to discuss the Douglas Street design project on Tuesday, November 20 at 5:30 P.M.

The next regular City commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 27 at Noon.





Shopping? Pay special attention to your Receipts!

This story is making it's way around the country via email. It is an important thing to know to protect yourself from cashiers and their friends who have found a new way to scam people out of their money. Please read and heed the message!!!!!!

"I bought a bunch of stuff, over \$150, & I glanced at my receipt as the cashier was hand-ing me the bags. I saw a cashback of \$40. I told her I didn't request a cash back & to de-lete it. She said I'd have to take the \$40 because she couldn't delete it. I told her to call a supervisor.

Supervisor came & said I'd have to take it! I said NO! Taking the \$40 would be a cash advance against my Discover & I wasn't paying interest on a cash advance!!!!! If they couldn't delete it then they would have to delete the whole order. So the supervisor had the cashier delete the whole order & re-scan everything!

The second time I looked at the electronic pad before I signed & a cash-back of \$20 popped up. At that point I told the cashier & she deleted it. The total came out right. The cashier agreed that the electronic pad must be defective. (yeah, right!) Obviously the cashier knew the



electronic pad wasn't defective because she NEVER offered me the \$40 at the beginning.

Can you imagine how many people went through before me & at the end of her shift how much money she pock-

Another friend was at another big box store and had the following happen to

She had her items rung up by the cashier. The cashier hurried her along and didn't give her a receipt. She asked the cashier for a receipt and the cashier was annoyed and gave it to her.

My coworker didn't look at her receipt until later that night. The receipt showed that she asked for \$20 cash back. SHE DID NOT ASK FOR CASH BACK!

My coworker called Wal-Mart who investigated but could not see the cashier pocket the money. She then called her niece who works for the bank and her niece told her This is a new scam. The cashier will key in that you asked for cash back and then hand it to her friend who is the next person in line.

Please, please, please check your receipts right away when using credit or debit cards! This is an early warning before the holidays when we are all in a hurry and not paying as close attention as we might normally. By checking the receipt before you leave the counter, you can fix the problem. If you leave the counter and walk away or get home before you check, there is nothing the store will do for you and you are out the cash and being charged for a cash advance on your credit card.

Be warned and beware while shopping!

Winter Safety Tips

As winter weather approaches, following are some timely safety tips courtesy of the Michigan Committee for Severe Weather Awareness.

At home:

 \square Keep handy a battery-powered flashlight, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) weather radio and portable radio, extra food (canned or dried food is best), can opener, and bottled water (at least 3 gallons per person).

☐ Make sure each member of the household has a warm coat, gloves, hat and water-resistant boots. Ensure extra blankets and heavy clothes are available.

 \square Keep on hand items for infant, elderly or disabled family members.

 \square Keep on hand items for your pets. Animals feel the effects of wind chill. Be sure to have suitable shelter with

 \square Be aware of potential fire and carbon monoxide hazards if you plan to use an emergency heating source such as a fireplace, wood stove or space heater. (See Heat Sources Safety page later in this packet for more information.)

Outside:

☐ Avoid overexertion, such as shoveling heavy snow, pushing a car, or walking in deep snow. Sweating could lead to chill and hypothermia, and abnormally low body temperatures. Cold weather also puts extra strain on the heart, so the elderly and those with heart conditions should be especially cautious when out in the cold.

☐ Walk carefully on snowy, icy sidewalks.

 \square Wear loose-fitting, lightweight warm clothing in layers, with a waterproof outer layer. Wear a wool hat and

☐ Keep your clothes dry. Change wet socks and clothing quickly to prevent loss of body heat.

 \square Understand the hazards of wind chill. As wind speed increases, heat is carried away from a person's body more rapidly which could lead to severe hypothermia.

Automotive preparedness:

 \square Be sure the vehicle is winterized by late fall. This includes having the proper mix of antifreeze and water in the cooling system, topping off the windshield washing solution, and checking the tire treads. Have a mechanic check the belts, hoses, tires, battery, and coolant.

 \square Keep the fuel tank near full, as low fuel levels can cause condensation to form, degrading fuel quality and possibly causing the fuel line to freeze. Additionally, gas stations may be closed during a severe winter storm, so it is wise to fill up if storm warnings are being broadcasted.

☐ Your car should always be equipped with emergency supplies. Keep the following items stored in a portable container:

- A small battery powered radio (AM is sufficient) and extra batteries
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- Cellular phone
- Windshield scraper - Jumper cables
- Fire extinguisher
- Shovel - Blanket and extra clothes
- Flares

Bottled water and non-perishable, high energy foods (granola bars, canned nuts, raisins, hard candy, trail mix, peanut butter and crackers)

- First aid kit
- Tire repair kit and pump
- Tow chain or rope
- Phone book and phone list - De-icer and extra antifreeze
- "Call Police" or other "Help" sign

Health Department lifts final Bay Harbor health advisories

BAY HARBOR - Dangerous pH levels - similar to those of a strong bleach solution - first prompted the Health Department of Northwest Michigan to issue a public health advisory when the problem was detected in waters along the Bay Harbor shoreline in 2004. In subsequent years, five more health advisories were issued for areas at East Park and the Bay Harbor development. But this fall, following eight years of intensive clean-up and monitoring, the Health Department has lifted Bay Harbor's last remaining health advisory.

"Our removal of the final advisory is a major milestone in a long, difficult journey," said Scott Kendzierski, the Health Department's Director of Environmental Health.

The high alkaline levels were the result of leachate from Cement Kiln Dust (CKD), left behind when the former Penn Dixie cement plant

ceased operations at the site in the late 1980s. CMS Land Company, a subsidiary of CMS Energy and a partner in the redevelopment of the old plant site in the 1990s, accepted responsibility for the environmental clean-up. The company has been working with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) ever since a pretreatment plant failure caused leachate to enter Little Traverse Bay in 2004.

Though the final advisory has been lifted, Kendzierski added that the CKD leachate continues to be collected, and that other engineering controls have been installed to prevent leachate venting into Little Traverse Bay. "Ongoing monitoring is critical to assuring the effectiveness of capture, and the safety of public waters," he explained.

"I'm very pleased that monitored pH values in Bay Harbor continue

to remain safe for human exposure," said Dr. Linda Dykema, toxicologist for the Michigan Department of Community Health. "The Michigan Department of

Community Health supports the decision of the Health Department of Northwest Michigan to lift the remaining public health advisory for Bay Harbor."

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality healthcare, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties. Mitchell Hill Farm Producing Unpasteurized **Apple Cider under Unsanitary Conditions**

ANTRIM COUNTY - The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is warning the public to avoid unpasteurized apple cider provided by Mitchell Hill Farm or its proprietor, Jim Ruster. Last week, health officials obtained a search warrant to inspect Mitchell Hill Farm, located on Toad Lake Road in Ellsworth. They found evidence that Ruster had been producing adulterated food, or food prepared under unsanitary conditions that fails to meet health and safety standards as a result.

Anyone who believes they may be in possession of cider from this source should dispose of it immediately, according to Joshua Meyerson, M.D., Medical Director for the Health Department. Dr. Meyerson adds that anyone who has consumed the cider should consult a physician immediately if they experience health problems, such as abdominal pain, vomiting and diarrhea.

"What we know is that Mr. Ruster produced unpasteurized apple cider without a license, in an unsanitary facility." Meverson said, "People should avoid any cider he has produced." He added that consumers should be suspicious of apple cider that is unlabeled.

The Health Department of North-

west Michigan will continue to collaborate with The Michigan Departments of Agriculture and Rural Development and Community Health in ongoing investigation of Mitchell Hill Farm and any products that may have been distributed to the public.
