Yet making resolutions is better than not, as persons who explicitly make resolutions are ten times more likely to attain their goals than those who do not make them.


The start of a new year has become a traditional starting point

East Jordan High School Implements One-To-One iPad program

EAST JORDAN—At the December 17 meeting of the East Jordan School Board an initiative to implement a one-to-one iPad mini program was approved. Students will be equipped with the electronic devices starting in January.

"The order has been placed and the students, staff and families are thrilled at what this will mean in helping students take greater charge of their learning and the pace of that learning," said School Superintendent Jon Hoover.

Every high school student will receive an iPad mini with a wireless Bluetooth keyboard in January. Students whose parents choose to purchase a nominally priced insurance policy on the devices will be permitted to take them home.

"Our kids and our staff are extremely excited about this. It gives them an opportunity to take ownership of their own learning. It also presents challenges because teachers are going to need to wrap their mind around allowing more open ended projects so students can provide their own answers instead of just being the receiver of information from their teachers," said Mary Standerfer, Technology

teacher. East Jordan is doing things a little differently than some of the schools in the county by using the

iPad Mini with its seven-inch screen as opposed to the regular iPad with a nine-inch screen. The decision to use the mini was made by a control group of students who tested the devices for two weeks. The high school and fifth grade students preferred the ease of transporting the smaller devices and school decision makers liked the cost savings.

The devices are being paid for through a Technology bond the school received last year that was dedicated for technical upgrades. The bond was divided in two with one portion earmarked for the iPads and one portion set aside for the upgrade of the school infrastructure and groundwork that needed to be in place. All of that has been completed and paid for.

In this technological age learning tools such as iPads are used to enhance education through applications such as graphs, calculators, access to text books, research and interactive programs.

"In order to prepare students to be competitive globally, we must expose them to the kind of technology that is a reality in the world in which they will live. An iPad is just one example of the type of technology student's will use in their daily function. East Jordan High School students are some of the finest young adults you will meet. They deserve the best we can give them," said High School Principal Tammy Jackson.







For Auld Lang Syne



The Tale of a New Year's Anthem

Forget about Hey Jude, My Way or even Goodnight Irene, one of the best known songs in English speaking countries, particularly as New Year's Eve rolls around, is the hearty refrains of Auld Lang Syne.

It's surfacing is brief, typically just after the stroke of midnight on December 31st and then it is safely tucked away amid the noisemakers and party hats for the next 364 days, 23 hours and 50-odd minutes. But it's presence during those celebrated moments as the year changes faces is HUGE...it seems that everyone instinctively knows the words and melody.

Well, some of it anyway. Actually, there are five stanzas to the poem penned by Scotland's Robert Burns back in 1788. Typically, crowds gathering on New Years Eve sing verse one and the chorus, and while venturesome spirits sing a shortened version of the full song comprised of verse one, five and the chorus. Seldom do the other versus resound with voices.

There is some serious contention to the claim of Mr.

Burns having been the originator of the piece. A letter written by Burns to an acquaintance named Mrs. Agnes Dunlop suggests that he restored the piece based on fragments of an old ballad dating back to the 15th or 16th century. It is generally agreed that at least two of the versus, (3 & 4), are directly attributed to Burns writing style.

The melody for Auld Lang Syne (which translates to "old long since") is commonly credited to composer William Shield who originally used it in his 1783 opera; Rosina. The tune, with Burns words, quickly became popular as the last song sung as evening gatherings broke up. A ritual developed where the group stood in a circle, each person crossing his arms in front of his chest and clasping his neighbors' hands, and all arms swung forward and back in time with the music as the song was sung.

Give that a try when the clock strikes twelve this New Year's

Perhaps you are interested in changing more than a specific behavior. If you are ready to become happier in 2013 and are willing to explore what would make you happier, consider starting a happiness project, as de-

scribed by Gretchen Rubin. Gretchen, a lawyer-turnedwriter and mother of two living in New York City chose a different focus to improve her happiness for twelve consecutive months. 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

Survivalists are looked upon with suspicion by law enforcement. That should tell us all we need to know about the Connecticut massacre. Consider: rugged individual, based intrinsically on the American Indian brave, stands his ground, his poltergeist alter-ego miscreant psychotic acts out the alternate bizarre morbidity, the nation weeps, demands, the establishment postures, the dichotomy remains in limbo. With 300 million guns for 300 million people, guns are not going away. More come every day, both guns and people, unending multiplicity of enfilade.

Suicide by cops. Think not that school teachers in Colonial and Old West times did not have a shotgun handy in school. Vigilantism by school children? Kids in rural areas still receive their first rifles at age 10-12 and they learn proper handling of guns. Yet there are people in prison for life for defending their selves and homes. This is known as "killing the messenger", for imparted message it is to defend one's castle though the conflicted law says yea but nay

This is the Martin/Zimmerman conflict conundrum. America cannot decide: to shoot or not to shoot, to attack or not, to drill or not, to tax the rich or not, Capitalism vs. Socialism, an escalating schizophrenic befuddled cultural imbroglio. The denouement comes to a mishmash of "whimper & die" or "shoot the bastards", unresolved in typical jurisprudent Gordian knot.

Switzerland. All Swiss citizens are mandatorily armed, serve in the military, keep weapons at home, update capability annually, had no hassles from Hitler accordingly with the help of the Swiss Alps a redoubt heavily armed and ready. Perpetrators of massacres are always cowards stalking the weakest prey. Idealists/altruists enter the fray with zealous compassion.

As the American Indian was reduced to conquered or dead status through inexorable legal imperialist white man conquest labeled "Eminent Domain/Manifest Destiny", his legend lives on taken up by the rugged individual with gun. Legal forms of this are

myrmidon local and federal troops, illegal emulations are criminals and psychotics. "Going postal" is nothing new but more frequent. The crescendo seems not to have quite fully transpired but leads us on to cliffhanger intensity in repetitive synopses, each more horrendous than the former.

As the famous tear from an Indian shed on television, acted by a Mediterranean immigrant, conveyed, the nation and President expressed the proper maudlin affectation but the resolve cannot be forthcoming because the issue defies rationale. Justification comes down to court and legislative split decisions. Casting national vote on justifying gun control vs. deregulation would beget the same dichotomy of opinion. Naivety vs. cynicism equals enantiodromia, the ancient Greek term for conflict of opposites, compounded by cognitive dissonance, i.e. guilt and remorse, and stares decisis, the tendency of the court to go with former decisions. Guns cannot be outlawed; guns are the law. Misguided rhetorical sentiment. sensationalist propaganda, pre clude logical syllogism.

The simplistic reduction of this formulaic is portrayed as: Guns don't kill people; people kill people and the more familiar, If guns are outlawed; only criminals will have guns. Well, there are all those lawmen and soldiers too but they're never around when you need them. The realistic interpretation devoid of claptrap has it that guns are made to kill animals and people; guns cannot be fully regulated thus are misused; hence deregulation works. Abuse thereof can be no more disastrous than it already is. Juxtaposed to Switzerland, we are free to not own weapons. Freedom to do so, like medical marijuana, is dubious even when so legislated by vote.

Survivalists viewed as dangerous psychotics bear this burden of indecisiveness by public and public servant alike. Indeed the subliminal gist is to shoot the messenger. The message nonetheless has been delivered in blood.







Don't Fall Victim to Influenza This Year

Older adults are an important part of the Charlevoix County community, and making sure they stay healthy this and every flu season is a top priority for the Charlevoix County Commission on Aging. Influenza is a serious and potentially life threatening disease that can cause severe complications, and the best way to help protect against it is through annual vaccination.

No matter how healthy or youthful we feel, as we age, our immune system weakens, leaving people 65 and older more vulnerable to influenza. In fact, each year in the United States, about nine out of 10 flu-related deaths and roughly six out of 10 flurelated hospital stays occur in people over the age of 65, making influenza vaccination for this population especially crucial.

That is why the Charlevoix County Commission on Aging has joined the Na-tional Council on Aging's Flu + You campaign to help educate adults 65 and older about the seriousness of the flu and the importance of vaccination.

The good news is adults over the age of 65 have two vaccine options avail-able to help protect against influenza – the traditional flu shot, as well as a higher dose flu shot designed specifically for this age group to address the age-related decline of the immune system. The higher dose flu shot prompts the body's immune system to produce more antibodies against the flu virus. Antibodies are the soldiers of the immune system that help protect against infection when exposed to the virus.

Both vaccine options are covered by Medicare Part B with no copay.

East Jordan School Renovations Foster Pride and a Sense of Belonging

EAST JORDAN - At the December meeting of the East Jordan Schools Board of Education the remodeling of the existing High School cafeteria into a cafe, college style Commons area was approved.

Administrators hope the new cafestyle common will be a place where students will be able to congregate before, during, or after school and into the evening with free internet access to power their new iPad mini's, where fresh baked goodies are created and dispersed and a sense of belonging is fostered.

"The idea behind this is that a

commons area will be a place where kids can gather throughout the day, have a cup of coffee or hot chocolate and a muffin from the bakery and work on a project together. It's going to be a great place for kids to be," said Gretchen Bender, Food Service Director.

A council of students was assembled and they decided that they wanted some booths and some areas where they could gather. They chose long countertops with tall stools equipped with outlets behind them so they could be on their laptops. The students toured other schools and gathered ideas to see what would implement best in East

Jordan. "They picked out fabric for the booths, colors of table and chairs, they did all of it right down to the last bit of paint," said Bender.

The renovations are being paid for primarily from sinking funds set aside for building improvements with some supplemental funding from the food service budget which is dedicated only for food service related expenses. No general fund dollars are being used for the project and the expected completion date is February 1.

"I'm very excited about the opportunities we are providing East Jordan high school students," said Jackson.

Students Complete Training, Ready for Work Force

Thirteen adult students graduated December 6 from a "Just in Time" Basic Machining Training program organized by the Northwest Michigan Council of Governments (NWM-COG) and delivered by North Central Michigan College. The 190-hour curriculum was designed by manufacturing employers in Charlevoix, Emmet and Antrim Counties. The training focused on the fundamentals of machine operation, a technical skill in high demand by local employers.

"It's a good course," said Milt Kniss, operations manager at Precision Edge in Boyne City. "It gives them all the basics they need to get a good start."

The students are adult residents of northern lower Michigan who are currently unemployed or underemployed, and are learning new skills for a new career. They have participated in 160 hours of training, most of it hands-on at the Charlevoix High School machine shop, and have completed an additional 30 hours of job shadowing at local manufacturing facilities. The students are proficient in print reading; shop math; measuring and use of calipers, micrometers and gauges of all types; safety; metallurgy; and milling and lathe machine operation. They have also received introductory instruction in Computer Numerical Control (CNC), statistical process control, and Kaizen continuous quality improvement.

"Knowing all of the skills makes you more valuable at your job," said Jonah Duncan, a student who is already working at Precision Edge.

With the resurgence of manufacturing, the machining occupation is in high-demand. Some of the demand is from new jobs, while much demand is from an aging workforce, with no young talent pool to fill the gap. Manufacturers have visited the class to hand out job applications to the students.

"The manufacturing employers that I serve are really excited about the job candidates emerging from this class," said Angie Ross, Northwest Michigan Works! Business Liaison. "Some of these students qualify for additional on-the-job training incentives, which will help employers to continue training them on company-specific tasks and will

Manufacturing employers in northern Michigan are seeking to hire skilled workers for positions that range from \$9 - \$14 per hour. Most manufacturing employers also provide health and retirement benefits. Besides getting students ready for those jobs, the Basic Machining Training has also prepared them to start down the career path to becoming CNC machinists, with opportunities to earn \$15 - \$25 per hour.

"There are huge opportunities for us out there so we're all looking forward to the end of class and being able to shop ourselves around," said Dave Armstrong, one of the students.

The program offers shortterm, intensive occupational training opportunities to unemployed and underemployed adults. Each "Just in Time" training session is designed to meet the immediate hiring needs of local employers; the curriculum is uniquely targeted to teach the most in-demand skills. Northwest Michigan Works! managed a "Just in Time" Welding Training in Charlevoix County earlier this year, and plans to run additional training sessions in Traverse City and Cadillac in 2013.


