A modern day tale of David and Goliath. the East Jordan High School quiz bowl team topped Class A ranked school, Midland High last week in the Quiz Central grand championship game, earning the smaller Class C school a state championship title.

The Central Michigan University Quiz Central tournament began last fall with 48 teams from across the state of Michigan vying for the coveted top spot.

Schools were initially placed into four divisions based on school size. East Jordan competed in three matches within their division, defeating teams from White Cloud,

Mio, and Meridian, which qualified them to compete in a semi-final game against Onekama. With another win, the red devils earned their place in last week's grand championship round against Midland High, where they defeated their opponent with a score of

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

#### 220 - 290.

First year coach, Devin Brown attributes the win to the team members' overall general knowledge and speed.

"They were really quick and knew their stuff," said Brown.

During the "final countdown round," teams face up against each other to answer rapid-fire questions. They have two minutes to ring in and answer correctly as many questions as possible, with each correct answer being worth 10 points.

During the final countdown, our team wasn't afraid to ring in early, said Brown. Our opponents barely had a chance to even ring in.

This year's competing team members were Joel Liesenberg, Donny Miller, Rachel Harden, and team captain Tyler Hines.

Joel Liesenberg, the team's only competing junior, is a member of National Honor Society and student council. He plays alto saxophone in the high school band. Brown describes Liesenberg as knowing a little bit about everything, but especially geography and history, much like team captain Tyler Hines.

Hines is a senior at East Jordan High School and is a member of the National Honor Society and chess club. He also plays on the varsity golf team.

Senior Donny Miller works at True Value, where he is a jack-of-all-trades, serving as janitor and cashier and everything in between. He also plays trombone in the high school band. Miller's strengths are music and pop culture, according to Brown.

Rounding out the team is senior Rachel Harden. Harden is president of the school book club and chess club, making her knowledgeable in the areas of arts and literature.

"This experience has been incredible," said Liesenberg. "It's really nice that a team that isn't involved with sports is getting this much recognition."

And it is a recognition that is well-deserved, as three team members, including Hines, Liesenberg, and team alternate Destiny Honeysette, have earned one-time \$2,500 scholarships to attend Central Michigan University for their team's divisional win. On top of that, the team has a trophy, a title, and bragging rights for months to come.

CMU Public Television airs Quiz Central competitions on Wednesdays at 7:30 pm and repeats on Saturdays at 11:30 am. East Jordan's divisional final is set to air May 1, their semi-final May 22, and the grand championship game May 29.

## **Seeking Savings**

#### County board OK's new recycling contract with American Waste

CHARLEVOIX - For a majority of the members on the Charlevoix County Board of Commissioners, their vote came down to whether they could save county taxpayers money.

Commissioners split, 4-2, in voting to approve a 10-year recycling contract with the Kalkaska-based American Waste, effectively opting out of the final two years of an existing contract with Emmet County. District No. 1 Commissioner George Lasater and District No. 6 Commissioner Larry Sullivan cast dissenting votes.

According to board documents, American Waste will provide recycling services, both hauling and processing, for costs not to exceed \$175,000 in the first year of the contract, with a 2.9-percent increase added annually over the final nine years of the deal.

County officials estimate the new deal with save Charlevoix County an estimated \$80,000 or more in the first year. In what was the third round of bids to provide recycling services, American Waste was reportedly the only bidder when bids were opened by a subcommittee a week earlier.

'We're talking about a full 28-percent savings of the tax collection (on the recycling millage)," said District No. 2 Commissioner Chris Christensen. "I'm not worried about the fund balance (for the recycling program). I'd like to give it back to the taxpayers."

Christensen, who paused before casting the final vote on the issue, said the decision to opt out of the contract with Emmet County was about the financial advantages of the bid submitted by American Waste. The company operates locally from an office in Charlevoix.

"I have a world of respect for Emmet County," Christensen said. "I'm challenging us to look at this in the best interests of our residents.

"It warrants this discussion. It warrants this investigation," he added. "I think we need to take a hard look at the numbers.'

After talking with constituents about the issue, District No. 3 Commissioner Ron Reinhardt said he came to much the same conclusion that the potential savings were worth the change in providers. "We have to look out for the taxpayers of this county," Reinhardt said. Sullivan, however, said he questioned the amount the county could save, with that total possibly being as low as \$5,000 to \$7,000. And, Emmet County recycling director Elisa Seltzer said the county might even save money by continuing on with the existing contract, adding Charlevoix County might see savings no matter what. "If you're seeing savings from American Waste, the savings from Emmet County would be even greater," Seltzer said. Sullivan was also concerned about the longevity of the county's recycling efforts, when provided by a private contractor. "They don't seem to pass the test of time," Sullivan said. "And, recycling doesn't always make for a moneymaking business. But, we're protecting the environment.'

"I think it will put our credibility right down the sewer," Sullivan said. Lasater said he felt much the same way as Sullivan.

"We do have a relationship with Emmet County that's gone on for years," said the former sheriff. "To maintain our credibility is important to me ... to honor this contract."

### **Officials seek review of** county bidding process

"This recycling thing over the last week has almost given me ulcers," added District No. 3 Commissioner Ron Reinhardt, agreeing to the need for such a procedural review.

Denny Jason of Ironton, also chairman of the county's Planning Commission, said commissioners might want to look even further and consider the need for a county manager or controller.

"It just seems what we're doing isn't working," Jason said. "We need some kind of management system that does it in a professional way." But, Reinhardt said he doesn't believe having a county manager or controller would have altered the outcome of last Wednesday's vote. And, Joel Evans, commissioner for District No. 4 and the board's chairman, said he thinks the county is served well by its various department heads, making the creation of such an administrative post unnecessary. "We've got great department heads," Evans said. "(And) I think we've learned some lessions. We're not going to make everyone happy with our decisions.



#### Medicare and the Shingles Shot

The following information is taken from a publication called Dear Marci based in the Medicare Rights Center.

Medicare Drug plans are required to cover all medically necessary commercially available vaccines on their formu-lary that are not already covered by Medicare Part B. This includes the shingles vaccine. The plan will pay for the vaccination itself and for a provider to give you the shot.

BEFORE getting the shingles shot, you should first check with vour Medicare Drug Plan to see where you can get the shot for the lowest cost. If you receive the shot from one of the plan's in-network pharmacies, you should only need to pay the approved copay amount at the time you are vaccinated. If your doctor provides the shot and cannot bill your Part D plan, you may need to pay for the shot yourself, then follow your Part D plan rules for getting a refund. Keep in mind that you will only be refunded the amount that your Part D plan approves for the shot, no matter

what you paid for it, so you may be responsible for the difference between the doctor's charge and the approved amount.

If you receive "Extra Help" in paying for your medications, you will only be responsible for the Extra Help co-pay. However, depending again on where you get the shot, you may have to pay for it yourself and request reimbursement.

In order to avoid having to request reimbursement, the easiest way to have the Medicare Drug Plan pay up front is to get the shot from a provider who can directly bill your Medicare part D plan.

The Medicare Medicaid Assistance program (MMAP) is the state-wide program which pro-vides free health benefits counseling to Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers. Individuals with

#### FOOD SAFETY Without proper license, Northern Michigan caterers may be violating food laws

As wedding and graduation season approaches, officials with the Health Department of Northwest Michigan are advising caterers and catering businesses that they must obtain their own food license, rather than simply operating in a food preparation kitchen that is licensed by another entity. Because food licenses are location-specific, some catering operations may be in violation of the law by preparing food at a remote location without the proper license. The public is also being warned about food that is prepared under these illegal circumstances, and catering customers are advised to verify caterers' licensing status.

"Proper inspection and licensing are necessary to protect public health," said Mike Jones, Environmental Health District Supervisor for the Health Department. "Caterers committed to providing safe food simply take the necessary precautions and get licensed." Jones added that caterers must obtain a separate license to operate a special transitory food unit or mobile food unit if they need to prepare food away from their main facility. Otherwise, all food must be prepared at the licensed kitchen and taken to the serving location in "ready-toserve" form.

Michigan Food Law requires that each separately-managed business must have its own food license. This may mean that more than one licensed food or catering business operates from a shared kitchen. Further, the law says food preparation – cutting, slicing, mixing, washing, peeling, chopping, cooking, heating, re-heating, thawing, assembly or portioning of food items – is not allowed anywhere other than the licensed location.

In addition to keeping foods safe for the public, Jones said these laws protect individuals and facilities from being liable if something does go wrong. "If a licensed kitchen facility lets an unlicensed caterer prepare food there, then that facility is incurring substantial risk," he cau-

## Brain Injuries happen quickly and can be life-changing

Life can change in an instant. This is certainly the case in brain injury. According to the Brain Injury Association of American, an estimated 1.7 million children and adults in the U.S. sustain a traumatic brain injury (TBI) and another 795,000 individuals sustain an acquired brain injury (ABI) from non-traumatic causes each year. More than 58,000 Michigan residents sustain a TBI annually, according to the Michigan Public Health Institute. More than 3.1 million children and adults live with a lifelong disability as a result of TBI and an estimated 1.1 million have a stroke-related disability.

Medical and indirect costs of TBI, such as loss of productivity, in the United States are in excess of \$76 billion annually. Children from newborns to 4 years age, adolescents aged 15 to 19 and adults aged 65 or over are most likely to sustain a TBI, according to the Center for Disease Control. Persons aged 75 and older have the highest rates of TBI-related hospitalization and death. They are 4-5 times more likely to be admitted to a long-term care facility following a TBI. Persons in this age group also recover more slowly and are more likely to die from their injuries than younger persons. In all age groups, TBI rates are brain injury (ABI) includes all types of traumatic brain injuries and also brain injuries caused after birth by cerebral vascular accidents (commonly known as stroke), and loss of oxygen to the brain (hypoxic brain injury).

Mild traumatic brain injuries (MTBI) account for a majority of brain injuries reported annually. MTBI occurs when a sudden impact or forceful movement of the head results in an altered mental state, such as confusion or disorientation, loss of memory for brief periods immediately prior to or after the event, or brief loss of consciousness. More severe TBI result in a loss of consciousness of more than 30 minutes and/or longer periods of memory loss, more than 24 hours. Many MTBIs are not reported. The actual incidence of MTBI is considerably higher than 1.25 million annually.

Brain injury is classified as mild, moderate or severe using the Glasgow Coma Scale, a measure of coma and impaired consciousness. The term Mild Traumatic Brain Injury does not describe the severity of the outcomes of MTBI. A brief period loss of consciousness or memory loss as the result of a blow to the head can affect the ability to complete routine, daily activities and the ability to return to work. Following an MTBI, individuals can ployment rates three months following injury among previously employed MTBI victims as 34 percent.


Sports-related injuries account for approximately 20% of TBIs reported in the United States. Injuries can be prevented or reduced in severity through wearing helmets, but repeated impacts to the brain can lead to serious negative consequences. A number of lawsuits have been filed against the NFL by former players and their family members. In January, the family of Junior Seau, filed a wrongful death suit against the NFL for failing to protect Seau from the dangers of brain injuries. Seau, was an NFL player for 20 years, committed suicide last May by shooting himself in the chest. He was 43 years old. Examination of Seau's brain indicated that he had CTE, a brain disease related to blows to the head, which can result in depression and dementia.

In 2012, the NFL introduced stricter guidelines regarding when players could return to work after suffering a concussion. Last week, the NFL and General Electric announced a four-year \$60 million initiative to develop imaging technology and other approaches to aid in the prevention, detection, and management of TBI. The frequency of TBI can be reduced through prevention. Knowing the symptoms of TBI and getting immediate treatment can reduce the severity of and assist individuals in coping with the long-term consequences of TBI.

The leading causes of TBI are: Falls (35.2%), motor vehicle/traffic accidents (17.3%), struck by/against events (16.5%) and assaults (10%). Falls are the leading cause of TBI among children aged 0 to 14 (50%) and accounted for 61% of TBIs among adults 65 years and older. Motor vehicle crashes and traffic related incidents result in the largest percentage of TBI related deaths (31.8%).

Traumatic brain injury (TBI) is defined as an alteration in brain function, or other evidence of brain pathology, caused by an external force. Motor vehicle accidents and gunshot wounds are common causes. Sports injuries, assaults, or falling and striking your head can also results in TBI. TBI is common to many returning soldiers as a result of an improvised explosive device or a rocket hitting a vehicle. They may have no outward signs of injury, but the pressure of the blast itself could have rattled the brain resulting in a TBI. About 75% of TBIs are considered Mild Traumatic Brain Injury (MTBI). Acquired experience: Problems with memory, concentration, and emotional control, headaches, fatigue, irritability, blurred vision or seizures. Researchers report unem-

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## News Is it Spring Yet?

While it may not look like it. spring has officially arrived. The vernal equinox (Latin for "spring" and "equal night") took place at 7:02 in the morning on Wednesday, March 20th, once again marking the onset of the spring season here in the Northern Hemisphere. That's because at the time of the vernal equinox the sun is directly over the equator - making the length of daylight and darkness pretty much equal. As the calendar days move forward, the amount of daylight here in the north will be increasing (until the summer solstice in June), bringing much welcome

"We are fast approaching a time period when average temperatures will increase about one degree every third day," states National Weather Service in Gaylord Meteorologist Jim Keysor. "And while last March brought extreme weather change, with two feet of snow at the beginning of the month and 80-degree temperatures by midmonth, we don't expect to see those extremes coming this year. It looks to be a slower start to spring this year, with snow systems moving through over the next few weeks before warmer temperatures arrive in mid-

April."

Yep. That sounds typical for northern Lower Michigan. However, Keysor has some potential good news lurking inside that weather forecast crystal ball.

"Indications are that the second half of spring; in April and May, we could experience above normal temperatures. Typical temperatures run in the 50-degree range in April and 60's in May. We may be a bit warmer than that, and at this time it also looks like this may be a warmer than normal summer.'

I certainly hope those indications are on target. Like many fellow northerners, I have a lot of outdoor fun planned for that brief stretch of the year between

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
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
