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Charlevoix School to Close

Declining enrollment and cuts in funding lead to decision by school board to eliminate one school.

CHARLEVOIX - With more than 100 people in attendance, the Charlevoix Public Schools Board of Education made the tough decision. The board decided to close one of its school buildings beginning school year 2013-2014.

Currently, the district operates an elementary school, a middle school and a high school. The district will end the year with just \$40,000 in savings after declining enrollment and cuts in state aid decimated its fund balance.

The plan would shut down one of those buildings and save the district an estimated \$200,000. The plan would put grades K-6 in one building and 7-12 in another building.

The board heard from the administration team that had studied the budget cut proposals. The administration team is made up of school principals, Suzanne

The Charlevoix Public Schools Board of Education decided Monday night to close one of the schools in Charlevoix beginning with the 2013 – 2014 school year.

Klinger, Travis Garrett and Doug Drenth. Suzanne Klinger, Charlevoix High School Principal, told the board that the administration team felt that the best solution was to make the move now and close one of the buildings. The two building model will maximize resources, teacher schedules, support staff and school services. "We want you to know that whatever the board decides, we will make sure that it works well for all the students," Klinger said. "The second floor of the high school could be cordoned off for the seventh- and eighth-grade classes, and the students would have to travel downstairs only for life science classes and lunch. Lunch would also be separate, with the possibility of combining with the pinth graders."

with the ninth-graders." Between teacher layoffs, cuts to athletic budgets, and administration, the district would save a little more than \$1 million. School board president, John McLean, Jr. said, "No one wants to see this happen, but it is reassuring that we are making the best decision after hearing the recommendations from the administration team."

First, the board voted

on a plan to keep three buildings open through school year 2013-2014 and then move to a two building plan beginning with school year 2014-2015. That motion failed. Next a motion to move the district to a two building plan beginning with school year 2013-2014 was passed. Dick Joseph, Valerie Snyder, John McLean and Nancy Allison voted in favor of the motion. Mike Pearsall, Glen Catt and Kevin Pearsall voted no on the proposal. The motion passed.

Currently, the administrators aren't sure whether the elementary or middle school would be closed. But the administration did present options for using the middle school building, which included moving the

central office, where some administration has offices, to the middle school and renting out the current central office. North Central Michigan College and Baker College have both expressed interest in renting classrooms, said Gendron. The building could also operate as an early childhood education center or house an alternative education program.

School board member, Glen Catt said, "This could be a very positive move for the school district. It is important to bring students, staff, administration, board members and the community together."

The school board heard from parents and staff in the audience that they are concerned about class size. The board agreed. They will be focused on making Charlevoix Public Schools a great place to learn.

Here Comes Peter Cottontail

Why are bunnies, baskets, bonnets and eggs part of the Easter celebration?

Easter is one of the most reverent of Christian holidays. A celebration of the resurrection of Christ, it is also a day that has become steeped in traditions of colorful eggs, baskets brimming with treats, fanciful bonnets and of course, the bounding, goodies-bearing bunny that literally brings visions of sugar plums to children's imaginations each Easter morning.

How did these seemingly unrelated traditions become such an ingrained part



celebration?

The egg has long served as a symbol of fertility and rebirth. Long before Jesus walked the earth, ancient Greeks, Chinese and Egyptians would dye eggs to symbolize the rebirth of the spring season after the starkness of winter. Early Christians adopted this practice of using dyed eggs to symbolize the resurrection of Christ, and in transforming the ancient Pagan holiday of Eastre into the observance of Easter, the decorated egg became a part of the celebration.

In Medieval Europe the consumption of eggs was strictly forbidden during Lent, so they were often boiled in order to preserve them until they could become a staple of the Easter meal. In early England and Germany, the practice of rolling these hard-boiled eggs down a hill was established as an Easter morning game for children and was said to symbolize the rolling away of the rock from Jesus tomb. The practice was brought to the United States in the early 19th century, and a short time later Dolly Madison, wife of President James Madison, started the tradition of holding an "egg roll" for children on the White House lawn, which continues to this day.

Also a timeless symbol of fer-

tility, the "Easter Hare" seems to have originated in Germany, where this fabled bunny would lay eggs (rabbits must have been quite different back then) on Easter morning for children to find. This tradition emigrated to America as part of the German culture, becoming a popular part of the Easter celebration shortly after the Civil War.

Placing Easter eggs into "one basket," along with many other treats, is a custom that has evolved from the early Christian practice of bringing large baskets of food to church to be blessed by priests after the Lenten fasting period. The "grass" at the bottom of those baskets heralds from a Dutch tradition where children would place eggs on Easter Sunday in "nests" of colored grass, which actually was grass in earlier times.

Since the 16th century, donning a new set of clothes has been a part of the English Easter celebration. The idea of an Easter bonnet was popularized the legendary songsmith, Irving Berlin in his 1933 hit song; Easter Parade. Soon, "all hat's were on" during the Easter Holiday, and women and girls would put on wide brimmed, lavishly decorated bonnets to celebrate the joy of Easter season. The Easter bon-

net, however, is a tradition that is slowly fading as society becomes increasingly casual about such fanciful things.

Let's not forget the Easter lily. Said to symbolize the purity, innocence and virtue of the Virgin Mary, the lily has been called the "white-robed apostles of hope," and were reportedly found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ's crucifixion. Churches have traditionally surround altars and crosses with Easter lilies to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus. This beautiful, bright, trumpet-shaped white flower is a reminder that above all, the celebration of Easter is about rebirth of life and spirit.

"Easter morn with lilies fair fills the church with perfumes

as their clouds of incense rise sweetest offerings to the

Stately lilies pure and white flooding darkness with their light,

bloom and sorrow drifts away on this holy hallow'd day.

Easter Lilies bending low in the golden afterglow,

bear a message from the sod to the heavenly towers of God." -Louise Lewin Matthews

Why does the date of Easter Sunday change each year?

This coming Sunday, March 31st, is Easter. In 2012, Easter Sunday fell on April 8th, on April 24th in 2011, and it will occur on April 20th in 2014. So why does Easter Sunday vary by nearly a month over the course of a few years while holidays such as Christmas, Valentines Day and Veterans Day remain the same every year, and Thanksgiving, Father's Day, Mother's Day, Memorial Day and Labor Day usually fall within the same week each year?

Turs out, the date of Easter Sunday is calculated to occur on the first Sunday following or on the first full moon of spring, a season ushered in by the vernal equinox. This "moveable" date of Easter was established back in the 4th Century by the First Council of Nicaea; a council of Christian bishops convened by Roman Emperor Constantine. The logic was that Jesus was crucified just before the Jewish Passover, and that holiday occurs on the 14th or 15th day of the first month of spring. Back in those days, Jewish months started when the moon was new, so being about two weeks later, Passover would coincide with the first full moon of spring. So that seemed like the proper time to set for Easter Sunday.

There it is; the date of Easter is tied to the cycle of the moon. A simple look at the calendar, however, is a much simpler way to keep track of the everchanging date of the celebration of Easter Sunday with each new year.



Give the Gift Gift Sight

National Eye Donor Month was initially proclaimed by President Ronald Reagan for March 1983. This month represents the 30th annual National Eye Donor Awareness Month, intended to raise awareness of the need to donate eyes, to recognize donors and their families and to celebrate corneal recipients, as stated by the Eye Bank of America

Eye donations provide corneas needed for transplant. The cornea is the clear front window of the eye that covers the iris and the pupil. Light is focused by the cornea and lens to allow us to see clearly. If the other parts of the eye are functioning correctly, sight will be limited if the cornea is scarred, cloudy or wrinkled. A cornea transplant is necessary if vision cannot be corrected with glasses or contact lenses or if swelling cannot be relieved through medication or special contact lenses.

The cornea can become damaged through scarring after infections or injury. Cornea failure can be caused by eye surgery, such as cataract surgery or




Image depicting the three main layers of the eye. COURTESY IMAGE

other eye surgery, or through a hereditary condition. A cornea transplant is also necessary to restore sight if a first cornea transplant leads to rejection. Rejection happens in approximately 20 percent of cornea transplants.

About 40,000 cornea transplants are performed annually in the United States. Corneas

used in transplants typically come from deceased donors. Unlike many organ donor procedures that require the donor and recipient have matching blood types, cornea transplants do not requiring matching by blood type. Also, eye donations can be stored in eye banks for up to five years. Donated eyes do not need to be transplanted within a mat-

ter of hours, as is common with most donated organs. Persons requiring cornea transplantation generally do not have a lengthy wait for a donor cornea. The first human cornea transplant was performed on in 1905. Cornea transplantation is a common outpatient procedure with extraordinary impact for the donor recipient, as Sharon Owen would agree.

I met Sharon Swoboda in 1981. We have been friends ever since. Now Sharon Owen, she celebrated 25 years of marriage in 2012. Shari has a lengthy and varied medical history, including periods of paralysis and a sinus infection lasting nearly three years. She first experienced an infection in her eyes in 1975. She was told this type of infection rarely affects both eyes and was not serious.

In 1990, she developed cataracts. Her son, Jesse was three and she was pregnant with her second child. Typically cataracts develop slowly. In Shari's case, the cataracts developed quickly, requiring surgery. The surgery was delayed, however, due to her pregnancy. Cataract surgery was performed three months after she gave birth to Andrew, allowing her to see her son for the first time.

Surgery to her right eye restored her vision. In her left eye, surgery corrected a clogged tear duct, removed a cataract and implanted a cornea. That cornea failed and she required another transplant. However, the left eye became infected when the stitches were removed. Improvements in medical technology now make it possible to use stitches that dissolve instead of being removed manually. Shari's eye was removed, the socket was cleaned and another cornea was implanted. That cornea was a poor match and a third transplant was required. Glaucoma developed next, causing intense pain. Surgery eliminated the pain, but drops failed to stop the infection. The eye was removed in December 1994, and Shari was fitted with a prosthetic.

In 2001, another infection created a corneal ulcer. It was removed, but her vision did not return. The cornea was wrin-

kled, but her vision was correctable with a special contact lens. Surgery in October 2003 rebuilt the eyelid (using skin from her mouth) over her prosthetic. Repeated infections further damaged the cornea and no additional treatment was possible. In 2010 she was declared legally blind.

Cornea transplants allowed Shari to participate fully in raising her children, Jesse and Andrew. Jesse is now 25 and Andy is 22. Both are college students. Jesse will marry on April 6. Shari will be there to enjoy it, with 20/200 vision. She is not able to see detail without significant magnification.












Established in their present location in Downtown Mio approximately eight years ago, Strawberry Patch ReSale-Consignment store offers area residents an excellent opportunity to sell their quality used items, and purchase a wide variety of clothing and household goods at very reasonable prices. The shop, which was founded by Sharon Gardulski, Pastor of the Freedom Worship Center, is operated by a dedicated group of thirteen volunteer from the Mio area.

"We have many different types of items in the store," states Gardulski. So this is a convenient, local spot where people can make some extra money selling items, and shop for a wide assortment of clothing and household items."

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Air Transportation Board considers exercise friendly revisions to moving walkways in airports

The national Air Transportation Board (ATB) is considering modifications to moving walkways in airports that would make them more exercise friendly. On the heels of government controversy surrounding the proposed purchase of treadmill desks for federal employees, which would allow them to "walk while they work," the ATB came up with another plan to promote exercise.

"We thought we could expand the basic idea of using treadmill technology beyond the scope of just federal employees," stated ATB representative, Peter

Youout. "This simple innovation could be implemented at all airports in the country that currently have moving walkways, and that would make it available to virtually anyone who travels by air."

The idea is indeed simple. Rather than have travelers use walkways moving in the direction they are heading within the airport terminal, those travelers would be routed to moving walkways that rotate in the opposite direction they are going.

Youout notes, "The only added cost would be having airport employees stationed at the former walkway exits to channel those

travelers who do not appear to have difficulty walking onto the counter-rotating walkways."

He adds, "We would also recommend that travelers arrive at the airport three hours before their flight departs, rather than the current recommendation of two hours, as this change may increase the time it will take them to get to their gates."

Youout also stated that if the federal purchase of the approximately \$1,000 treadmill desks is approved, ATB may consider purchasing similar desks for gate waiting areas.

Mackinac Bridge "Light It Blue" campaign begins April 2

The Mackinac Bridge Authority (MBA), in partnership with Corner Pieces, DTE Energy, Kewadin Casinos, the Autism Alliance of Michigan, and the Autistic Children's Treatment Network (ACT), will hold a ceremony at the Kewadin Casino in St. Ignace on Tuesday, April 2, in honor of Global Autism Awareness Day. The Mackinac Bridge will be lit blue at sundown on April 2 for the entire month, to kick off this year's campaign. More than 5,000 individuals have autism in Michigan; approximately 16,000 are children.

Brian Calley, whose young daughter suffers from autism, is expected to speak at the event. Other speakers include: ACT President and MBA Board Member Murray D. Wikol; Dr. Colleen Allen, president of the Autism Alliance of Michigan; Anthony Ianni, a former MSU basketball player who has been diagnosed with autism; State Representa-

tive Frank Foster; and Ben Duff, founder of Corner Pieces.

BOYNE CITY COMMISSION MEETING

Commission moves forward with riverfront property grant application despite confusion over terms of offer

At the Tuesday, March 26th Boyne City Commission meeting, Commissioners voted to move forward with a grant application process for property located along the Boyne River, despite confusion over terms the Moody family proposed for transferring the property to the city.

After Leslie Meyers, Boyne City Assistant Planning and Zoning Administrator, made an excellent PowerPoint presentation about the many attributes of the property, which is situated at the end of Spring Street and features 575 feet of frontage along the Boyne River, Mayor Ron Grunch opened the floor for a public hearing to listen to comments about moving forward with a grant application to the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund, which would potentially fund 75 percent of the property purchase price. About 25 people were in attendance, and all comments were in favor of the property purchase. Several letters of support were also presented, which included the Lake Charlevoix Association, Friends of Boyne and the Boyne City Chamber of Com-

Near the end of the public hearing segment of the meeting, Marty Moody, who owns the property with seven siblings, which was inherited from their parents, stated that it was never the family's intention to sell the property to the City, rather, he had proposed to Boyne City Manager Michael Cain back in the fall of 2010 that the family was interested in donating the vacant property to the City in honor of his parents in return for a tax abatement on the portion of the property containing

his late parents home. The Moody family's proposal was for an abatement of up to 25 years, which would terminate if he and his siblings sold the home at any time during that 25year period.

During the Commissioner discussion that followed the public hearing, Commissioner Derek Gaylord expressed his surprise and disappointment that this was the first time he had heard of the original offer. City Manager Michael Cain said that he and the City Attorney had discussed the offer and determined that it did not appear the City could legally offer such an abatement, and that in his subsequent research had found the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund grant, which he felt would be a possible way to purchase the property and provide the Moody family with revenue from the sale instead of a tax abatement.

In a vote to proceed with a resolution to apply for the grant, Commissioners voted in favor, with Commissioner Gaylord dissenting. He stated that while he was in favor of the City acquiring the property, he would rather have the City Attorney and City staff look further into the possibility of legally pursuing the Moody family's offer to donate the land in return for a tax abate-

After the vote, Marty Moody stated he wanted to clarify that his family was not obligated to sell the property as his siblings had agreed to proceed with the original offer, but not the proposal of an outright sale. Michael Cain replied that the resolution was only to pursue the grant application, and if that process was successful a formal

offer would be presented to the Moody family for their considera-

While City staff has estimated the property value at \$62,500 - an official appraisal must be made as part of the grant process. Currently, the vacant portion of the property under consideration has an annual property tax of between \$300 and \$450. If the property is transferred to the City, a portion may be utilized for the school system "Build a House" program, and the riverfront area would be utilized as a park, wildlife and wetlands preserve. During her PowerPoint presentation, Leslie Meyers noted the property contains critical forested wetlands, and even serves as a habitat for iuvenile eagles.

The commission also had a second reading of a Fireworks Ordinance amendment, designed to bring the existing ordinance in accordance with Michigan Fireworks Safety Public Act 256 of 2011. The State Act allows use of consumer fireworks during three-day periods surrounding 10 designated annual holidays. While the State Act prohibits the purchase of consumer fireworks by a minor, it is unclear regarding the use of fireworks by a minor, which is a provision the Boyne City Ordinance amendment includes. A vote on the Ordinance amendment was postponed until City Staff can investigate if this provision is in conflict with the State Act.

The next regular City Commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, April 9th, at 7pm.

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Deer Creek Junk Repurposes with Passion in East Jordan

Clever creativity meets castaway furnishings at the newly opened space of Deer Creek Junk in East Jordan. Located at 320 State Street in what was once the community's EMS building, Deer Creek Junk serves as a working studio and warehouse.

Owner Karen Brennan says customers can discover an assortment of items at her storefront, with "everything from salvage finds to finished, repurposed, one-of-a-kind items to inspire your cottage, vintage, or industrial style."

Working out of her home since 2003, Brennan takes trash and turns it into treasure. Her ecofriendly, functional art uses old doors, fences, windows, and tables and reinvents them into purposeful, shabby chic benches and more. From chandeliers made out of vintage soda bottles, to shopping carts re-envisioned as crafting supply carts, Deer Creek Junk repurposes it all.

"Even though an object may have ended up in the junk pile, it still contains the essence that gave it character," says Brennan.

And sometimes it is the very essence behind an object that inspires a transformation.

"Everybody has a piece of cool something in their basement or garage, whether it is a piece that has memories for them or not," noted Brennan.

Repurposing such objects can bring a memorable piece from someone's past out of storage and allow it to be seen and used on a daily basis. It is this kind of custom work that Brennan hopes to do more of at her new location.

In addition to custom design and building and finishing services, Deer Creek Junk will also offer do-it-yourself workshops for individuals or small groups and monthly JUNK-A-PALOOZA events.

"I want to focus retail sales on a once a month event," said Brennan.

At these monthly JUNK-A-PALOOZA events, Brennan will open her doors for three consecutive days for a special sale. Up

for grabs will be a selection of architectural salvage pieces and raw materials, such as doorknobs, wire, crates, and bottles for the do-it-yourselfer, as well as Brennan's repurposed designs.



Charlevoix City Council votes to move forward to finalize new community fireplace design

At the Charlevoix City Council fireplace meeting held last Monday, March 18th, the City Council voted to move forward in finalizing a new design for an outdoor community fireplace to be constructed in Plaza B in East Park. The revised design will follow the following parameters:

- Incorporate an oval shape - Minimize the height of the fireplace to protect Round Lake views
- Develop seating around the

- Pursue and energy-efficient operational design
- Optimize safety through design standards
- Fireplace must be self-funded for operation and maintenance

There were two motions at Monday's meeting regarding the community fireplace. The first, which received unanimous support, was to move forward with the final design phase. The second, which was to specify the

fireplace be fueled by natural gas, was supported by all with the exception of council member Shane Cole, who abstained from voting as his wife is a DTE Energy employee.

Approximately 25 people were in the audience at last Monday's meeting, and public comments about the fireplace focused primarily on concerns over costs and possible environmental impact.

The motion to proceed with fi-

nalizing the new fireplace design is contingent upon the benefactor paying for future design costs and reimbursing the City for invoices paid for past work in the amount of \$13,494. The City Council directed staff to approve Richard Hitz and Mark Buday to revise the fireplace design.

There will be future meetings where the public can comment on the design when it is completed.

Easter Changes Everything

We are now in March madness, the season of the NCAA finalfour basketball tournament. I love watching basketball games that go back and forth

- buzzer-beaters. It's usually one key move that changes everything. Sometimes it's a pass underneath to a big guy who slam-dunks, or it's a 3-pointer that clinches the victory. Or maybe it's a steal from the pointguard for an easy lay-up in the final seconds. One critical play changes everything!

Easter changes everything. It represents one key move that changed everything. Easter, or the Pasch, as some have called it, is linked to the Jewish Passover. In many languages, the words for "Easter" and "Passover" are etymologically related or homony-

The Bible teaches that at one time in Israel's history God rescued them from 400 years of Egyptian slavery. You can check out the book of Exodus and the story of Moses in the Bible. Just before they are freed by Moses leading them out-of Egypt, all the Israelite people were to sacrifice a Passover lamb, and put the blood of the lamb on each side of their door frame and above the door (Note: If you drew lines, it would form a cross) Then with their shoes on and just before leaving they would enjoy a family "pass over meal." If God's angel saw the blood on the doorframe, then it would "pass over" the home. However, if the angel didn't see the blood on the doorframe then the assumption would be made that it was an Egyptian home, and the angel would take the life of that family's firstborn son as a penalty for Pharaoh not letting God's people go.

This is unique and radical method God used to extract or "save" Israel from slavery in Egypt. He rescued them by way of the "Passover Lamb". Do you see the foreshadowing? A few thousand years later God uses a Passover lamb to extract people from slavery in the New Testament of the Bible as well. His name is Jesus. He extracts people from sin and hopelessness.

So here's the big picture of the Bible. The world was created "very good" by God. Then sin entered it and made a mess. Death, disease, divorce, fear, insecurity, hiding, depression, hurt, anger, became some daily struggles that any of us battle. But God made a rescue plan from sin, and it's black cloud consequences. Without tampering with our free will, he provided his Son Jesus Christ to come and rescue us from sin, selfishness, rebellion from him, or self-leadership.

Jesus died, and rose again on the third day in order to bring us that new life rescue! He gave us a way to be 100% forgiven of past, present, and future sin, and gain his new-found perfect leadership for our lives. Because he lives, we can live in him if we choose.

Why did they do this? Why all the sacrifice? Because they believed 100% that Jesus Christ is our winning shot to clinch the victory. His resurrection changes everything for a person. When a person puts their faith and trust in Jesus Christ's death and new life on their behalf, then they can know his forgiveness (he wipes the slate clean). They can know his help and power to live a new life and become more of who they really want to be as a husband, wife, parent, son, daughter, worker, neighbor, etc. I've seen many come to Christ and put their faith in him for a brandnew life. Their desires change. Their face lights up. They begin to experience a deep peace and joy no matter what their lives were once like. They soon learn that it's not easy to follow Jesus, but there's life in following him -- the best life! He forgives us, and helps us.

What was the game-winning shot? It was his resurrection of Jesus. He gives us the opportunity to rise above this world and win the game with him. He was

the Passover lamb who conquered death so that a person can begin to enjoy eternal life the moment they choose to truly pray to God and put their faith in his Son

At one time I prayed an Easter prayer. My life was a mess. He gave me a new life. If you haven't yet, then you can pray an Easter prayer to find new life today too.

Dear God, I have been trying to lead myself. I have been selfish and rebellious. I turn from rejecting you, your ways, and your Son Jesus . I receive your Son Jesus Christ as my Forgiver and Leader. I put my full faith in him for dying on the cross on my behalf, and rising from the dead so that all my sin may be forgiven and I might have a new life in him. Thank you for your great love for me. Help me grow in my new faith in you. In Jesus name, Amen.

If you prayed this prayer with sincerity then you are now able to celebrate Easter in a whole new way. You are no longer a spectator of Easter, but a participant on the team. And Jesus has already won the game for you by hitting the buzzer-beater shot by rising from the grave to new life!

Expansion of methane gas considered as alternate fuel resource?

Methane gas is everywhere. A byproduct of the digestive system in all living creatures as well as the decomposition process in disposal areas such as landfills, scientists and ecologists alike have been promoting that methane gas emissions, along with carbon dioxide, are primary contributors to climate change. The good news is that methane may just be breaking wind in the alternative energy arena.

For several years, the U.S., and countries such as Sweden and Germany, have been converting methane into biogas, using gases emitted from landfills and livestock operations to fuel natural gas vehicles. As of April 1st, proposals will be considered to push the envelope on capturing methane gas for expansion as an alternative fuel resource

Airborn University research professor, F. Art Ufton states, "Think of it. Every school-aged child has an understanding of the potent and flammable qualities of methane emissions. Drive by any livestock farming operation during warm weather and the vast potential of methane is hard to miss. This is a virtually free, completely natural fuel resource that is right under our noses."

Capturing and re-using methane gas is a windwind scenario; it not only reduces methane emissions into the atmosphere, it offers a plentiful, self-generating and renewable energy resource on a worldwide scale. Exciting developments such as in-home methane capture systems are being explored by a national builder institute, and some automotive designers even see the possibility of developing methane retention systems within vehicle interiors of the future.

EAST JORDAN CITY COMMISSION MEETING

City looks to remain fiscally sound

EAST JORDAN – As costs increase and property tax revenue declines the East Jordan city commission is facing some difficult decisions how to balance the 2013-14 budget.


The meeting began with a commendation to Donald R. McKinnon for service to the city. He served as caretaker of Elm Pointe and the city extended thanks and appreciation to McKinnon for his service and dedication to the city.

City administrator, Chris Yonker presented the commissioners with a 22 page report on how he thinks the commission should approach the budget decisions for the coming year. The preliminary budget forecasts a decrease in property tax revenues of about 5.5% and an increase in spending of about 5.5%. The spending increase includes operational costs, capital spending to improve roads and paying down debt. The fiscal year begins July 1.

"As it stands now, we are looking at using a significant portion of the fund balance in order to balance the budget," Yonker said. "I am not advocating that."

Yonker proposed changes and cuts to the budget in order to reduce deficit spending to the commission. These items are for discussion only at this point. Some of those changes include postponing renovations on the city hall building, reducing city and staff memberships, allowing payment in lieu of health insurance for employees with duplicate coverage through another source and review nonmandated services such as brush and trash pick-up to be modified to save money or eliminated and eliminate non-essential boards and committees

Yonker also suggested the board consider some items to share cost or increase revenue. Some of these items are freezing non-union wages for this year, consider a fire/rescue

cost recovery ordinance to establish fees for the services, having city businesses share in the cost of added services such as snowplowing of parking lots, striping, lighting and cleaning and review cost sharing of EMS services with townships that use the service.

Commissioner Tom Breakey suggested the city consider reinstituting the fire equipment millage. That millage was eliminated last year after the board agreed that it had been collected incorrectly. City Attorney, Scott Beatty suggested that if the board considers this that it is proposed to override the Headlee amendment. This .5 mill would provide approximately \$38,000 that is earmarked for fire equipment.

Yonker also suggested the city replace aged street, alley, parking lot, park and marina lights with energy efficient LED lights and consider additional interior and exterior improvements to city owned facilities to reduce the energy costs.

The city's budget problems stem from falling property values and lack of growth in new housing. Taxable value in the city of East Jordan fell 5.25% in the last year. Residential values fell 8.88%.

The city commission will meet in special session on Wednesday, March 27 at 6:00pm to further consider the budget. The next regular meeting of the East Jordan city commission is scheduled for April 2, 2013
