A significant reason for the budget shortfall is the deficit at the city marina. This isn't going to get fixed

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

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

Survivors have feelings of shame or embarrassment

The perpetrator is well known or in a position of power/authority over the survivor or in the community

The victim is threatened or manipulated into silence by the perpetrator

tim's own home by someone the victim knows or a person in a position of power or trust - a relative, friend, neighbor or other acquaintance.

You may wonder what you can do to help prevent sexual assault. The National Sexual Violence Resource Center suggests parents start talking to their children about healthy sexual development early on. Some suggestions might be:

appropriate information on reproduction and sexuality. This will let them know these issues are topics that can be discussed openly, without shame.

Encourage critical thinking and build the skills to differentiate fact from fiction in media images and representations of sexuality that young people are exposed to 24/7. Messages from advertising, films, television and video games provide a distorted view of normal, healthy relationships and sexuality and help create an environment for widespread and increasing violence against women and children. In addition to holding sexual assault offenders legally responsible for their behavior and actions, we must also do a better job of listening to and supporting survivors without blame. veyed said they had been raped or had experienced an attempted rape at some point in their lives. Every two minutes, someone in the U.S. is sexually assaulted with 44% of victims under the age of 18.

These numbers do not tell the full story. Sexual assault remains one of the most under reported crimes, with 54% still being left unreported, as stated in a recent National Crime Victimization Survey. Under reporting of sexual assault typically results because:

Survivors feel they will not be

Sexual assault is defined as any unwanted sexual act or contact that is attempted or completed by force, threat of force or coercion. In Michigan, the legal term for this type of crime is Criminal Sexual Conduct. Sexual assault and abuse may also include verbal, visual or anything that forces a person to join in unwanted sexual contact or attention such as exhibitionism and sexual harassment

Because of continuing misconceptions, it is important to stress a few basic facts about sexual assault:

It is a crime of violence and control, not an act of passion.

Women and girls of all ages, races, socio-economic groups, neighborhoods and lifestyles can become victims, as well as men and boys.

It is often committed in the vic-

Young children:

Teach body parts using the correct name for each. This builds knowledge, empowerment and helps avoid shameful feelings about one's body. Perpetrators will often use shame as a means to silence victims.

Teach appropriate personal boundaries and the difference between wanted/unwanted touch. This builds understanding of privacy, how to interact appropriately with peers/others, and that their body belongs to them and they can say no to unwanted touch.

Preteens:

Talk about physical changes during puberty and provide age-

Sexual assault is a difficult issue to discuss, yet if we choose to be silent we help enable its existence.



After freshman year he transferred to University of Illinois' highly esteemed engineering program to finish his bachelor's degree.

Gary then worked for Ford Motor Company in Michigan as a ceramics engineer while raising a family with college sweetheart, Joyce. They had four sons: Barry (Bear), Robert (Slob), Mark (Tark), and Jeff (Peff).

Gary later moved to the Bellaire/Boyne City area to begin his second career as a real estate broker. He was hotly pursued by second wife, Susie, a strict and rigid German/Irish Catholic who was captivated by his good looks, easy-going nature, and atheism. Her goal was to raise a family, and Gary acquiesced. Daughter Jennifer was first-born, so they tried again, finally achieving perfection with last-born daughter Elizabeth Diana.

Gary was known for his friendliness and laid-back attitude. He had many friends in Boyne City and enjoyed his job selling real estate. He was known by his family for his silliness and excellent sense of humor. He enjoyed watching comedies on TV and in movies. Favorite shows were Cheers, Hill Street Blues, and SNL. He delighted in giving quirky nicknames to friends and oddball names to pets. His children grew up with cats Squadcar, DeeDooDee and Tibitha.

Gary liked his downtime, qui-

ured, humped spine (kephosis and scoliosis) and compromised health because of it. He was teased often throughout life because of this, even into his later years, which hurt him deeply. He also suffered from heavy-metal toxicity, picked up generationally and from early living and working conditions. He was mislabeled as an alcoholic, which prevented him from getting proper treatment. Gary was persecuted by some people in his small town, but he was stoic in his suffering and did not impose it on anyone else. He dealt with it the best he knew how, since proper diagnosis and treatment wasn't available at the time.

In the 90s Gary moved to warmer weather in Florida, feeling he lacked the simplistic mindset necessary to live in small-town Boyne City, as well as the hardy physiology needed to survive the harsh winters.

Gary was an example to many, and taught his children life's most important lessons. He taught them to believe peoples' actions over their word, and to take everything with a grain of salt. He stressed the importance of research and checking facts, references and resources. He demonstrated being straightforward and to the point when dealing with others. He understood life at its deepest level and people at their shallowest, and wasn't duped by the fantasy of religion.

Those who will miss him most are his friends from Boyne City, who admired him, emulated him, and spoke of him often after his move to Florida, including the Karkosak family, Pauline Archambault and Susanne Johnson. They and many others looked up to him and saw him as many of us do: as a beacon of intelligence, self-honesty and courage.



An independent, nonprofit 501(c)3 animal shelter serving Charlevoix County area communities since 1974, the staff and volunteers at CAHS are dedicated to the protection and care of all animals. The organization has a mission "To practice and promote the principle that every life is precious. As such, we are committed to the highest principles of humane care and professional treatment of injured, ill, neglected or abused animals.'

Among the services offered by CAHS is a "Meet Your Match™" pet adoption program that assists those considering bringing a new pet home in finding a good match. Dogs at the shelter are temperament tested and evaluated before being put up for adoption, and all dogs and cats are spayed or neutered, updated on vaccinations, and implanted with an identification chip. Those interested in adopting a pet simply fill out a Meet Your Match survey and an adoption form to begin the process.

CAHS also sponsors Low-Cost Spay and Neuter clinics from April through October each year and offer vaccinations for just \$15 each. The clinics are offered twice a month in April, May, September and October, an once a month in June July and August. Cats can be neutered for \$30 or spayed for \$60, and dog spaying or neutering varies based on weight and gender, with fees that range from \$50 to \$60 for males and \$70 to \$80 for females.

Since CAHS is a non-profit organization, funding for their mission relies on donations and proceeds from fundraising events. Upcoming fundraising

events include:

- April 25th - The Charlevoix Area Humane Society will be at the Boyne Business Expo and will give away a free Spay or Neuter for one cat to one lucky visitor to their booth. 

Avoid portable generator hazards during spring power outages

Portable generators are useful when temporary or remote electric power is needed, but they can be hazardous. The primary hazards to avoid when using them are carbon monoxide poisoning, electric shock or electrocution. and fire. The United States Fire Administration (USFA) would like you to know that there are simple steps you can take to prevent the loss of life and property resulting from improper use of portable generators.

To avoid carbon monoxide hazards:

- Always use generators outdoors and away from doors, windows, and vents.

- NEVER use generators in homes, garages, basements, crawl spaces, or other enclosed or partially enclosed areas, even with ventilation.

Follow manufacturer's instructions.

- Install battery-operated or plug-in (with battery backup) carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in your home, following manufacturer's instructions.

- Test CO alarms often and replace batteries when needed.

- NEVER cook inside or heat your house with a gas, wood or charcoal grill.

- PAY attention to flu-like symptoms, especially if more than one person has them. Headache, dizziness, confusion, fatigue and nausea are all common symptoms of carbon monoxide exposure.

- MOVE outside to fresh air immediately if a carbon monoxide

leak is suspected. Go to the emergency room or call 911 if you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning.

To avoid generator electrical hazards:

- Keep the generator dry. Operate on a dry surface under an open, canopy-like structure.

- Dry your hands before touching the generator.

- Plug appliances directly into generator or use a heavy-duty outdoor-rated extension cord. Make sure entire extension cord is free of cuts or tears and the plug has all three prongs, especially a grounding pin.

- NEVER plug the generator into a wall outlet. This practice, known as back-feeding, can cause an electrocution risk to utility workers and others served by the

same utility transformer.

- If it's necessary to connect the generator to house wiring in order to power appliances, have a qualified electrician install appropriate equipment. Or, your utility company may be able to install an appropriate transfer switch.

To Avoid Fire Hazards: Before refueling the generator, turn it off and let it cool. Fuel spilled on hot engine parts could ignite. Always store fuel outside of living areas in properly labeled, non-glass containers. Store fuel away from any fuel-burning appliance.

overnight. Commissioner Tony Cutler said, "The reason for the deficit at the marina is because of the lack of available boat slips. Until this problem is fixed, the deficit is not going to go away."

Mayor Russ Peck read a letter from city commissioner Tinea

Spence. Spence informed the commission that she was resigning effective immediately due to limited time. She has begun new full time employment that limits the time needed to fulfill her obligation as a city commissioner. The commissioners thanked Spence for her dedication to the city and wished her well in her new employment. Spence's term expires November 15, 2013. She had filled the vacancy of former city commissioner Lee Symonds. The city commission will appoint someone to fill her position.

Commissioner Tom Breakey asked about the proceeds from the sale of the building formerly occupied by the city fire department. He said, "We should put the money from the sale of the old fire hall into an endowment fund to benefit the fire department or EMS."

The money was put into the city properties fund. Penzien said, "We lifted the restriction of spending money from the properties fund. In these uncertain financial times it doesn't seem to the right time to create an endowment fund in case we need




support to realize their potential. Girls need to clearly state their financial need, as well as describe a special interest that will spark their imagination, creativity, or follow a

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
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Roger Stoppel on Exhibit at Library

New teen cell phone ban takes effect on Thursday, AAA Michigan advises

A new state law banning novice teen drivers from talking on the cell phone while driving went into effect on Thursday, March 28th.

The new law, referred to as "Kelsey's Law," is named for Kelsey Raffaele, a 17-year-old Michigan resident who was killed while talking on her cell phone and driving. Under the law, which was signed by Gov. Rick Snyder on Jan. 8, teenage drivers with a Level 1 or 2 license will have to comply with cell phone restrictions.

Numerous studies have shown that new teen drivers are far more likely to be involved in cell phone-related crashes than older, more experienced drivers. AAA strongly encouraged passage of the law.
