

Be aware of the signs of autism

By Deb Hagen-Foley Charmayne thought her son was different from other children his age when he was only fifteen months old. The timing of her pregnancy and delivery was nearly identical to two other women who belonged to her church. Although Tyler was her first child, her friends' children gave her a convenient way to know what "normal" developmental milestones to expect. Her "mother's intuition" told her something was wrong, although she couldn't explain exactly what was wrong.

When he was two years old he had frequent ear infections. A series of doctor visits took them to a speech pathologist who advised Tyler be evaluated for a learning disability. This was the first time an "expert" confirmed what Charmayne suspected – her son wasn't developing normally. The observation confirmed what she didn't want to believe and told her she wasn't crazy in her beliefs about Tyler. Those thoughts moved closer to reality when her sister-inlaw, a special education teacher, suggested he might have autism.

When the diagnosis came, she felt as though they had been "pushed in a black hole." Richard, Charmayne's husband, recalls how they were told that Autism was a new label they had been given, but that Tyler wasn't changed by the diagnosis.

April is Autism Awareness month. Autism is a disorder that impairs a person's ability to communicate and relate to others. It is four times more common in boys than girls. Autism occurs more frequently than pediatric cancer, diabetes and AIDS combined. Just last month, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) revised estimates of the prevalence of autism to 1 in 88 persons. This represents at ten-fold increase in prevalence in the past 10 years. It occurs in all racial, ethnic, and social groups.

Research in the past five years is providing new answers to the question of what causes autism. Autism appears to be the result of both genetic factors and environmental factors influencing early brain development. Autism is of various levels of severity, ranging from 1 (mild) to 10 (very severe). Tyler's diagnosis was three to four on the spectrum, of mild to moderate severity.

Early diagnosis and treatment of autism is being recognized as important to the success of managing the disorder. Intensive behavioral intervention has improved learning, communication and social skills in young children with autism. These behavioral programs provide a structured, therapeutic environment and focus on the core areas affective by autism: social skills, language and communication, imitation, play skills, daily living and motor skills.

Autism is associated with rigid routines and repetitive behaviors, obsessively arranging objects or following specific routines. Tyler is has very rigid eating requirements. Some people have had success in treating autism with specialized diets. Charmayne won't try that approach. Tyler will eat chicken nuggets, chicken strips, French fries and cheese pizza. He loves bread and sweets. Recently, he has accepted peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, making school lunches much easier. For years, Tyler has carried frozen chicken nuggets to school and the school workers fix them for him.

Charmayne remembers the last meal he ate that differed from Tyler's eating regimen. The meal was fried deer steak and mashed potatoes. He was 18 months old. When he was younger, he also ate glue and plastic, including chewing his plastic toys. His restricted behaviors toward food go beyond dislike of different tastes, but reflect his need for sameness. Charmayne discovered that he finds green beans so offensive that she sometimes produces a can when he is misbehaving. He is quick to change his behavior so that she will return the can to the cupboard.

Tyler has acquaintances rather than friends. However, once he has made an acquaintance in a location he visits regularly, he seeks out those individuals in those locations in the future. Charmayne and Richard describe him as a "joy to have around." He is highly functioning and "lovable," and they worry someone might take advantage of his generally pleasant nature. He will, however, react immediately and strongly when touched the wrong way or by the wrong person.

Charmayne would like people to know that autism is a disability of social and communication skills. They continue to work with Tyler to improve his ability to respond appropriately in social situations. They ask people to be understanding of the occasional socially unacceptable behaviors that sometimes occur.

Tyler is fascinated by long broom skirts and likes to watch them move. His fascination took over when he reached out to a woman wearing such a skirt in a store a couple years ago. The woman reacted very strongly, seeing his behavior as threatening rather than curious.

Her advice for parents of children with autism is to do research on the internet, find a support group if available. If they can't find a local support group, online autism message boards are another option. Websites such as Autism Speaks (www.autismspeaks.org) and Autism Society of Michigan (www.autism-mi.org) provide resources and information for persons seeking to understand an autism diagnosis. Gluten sensitivity

Celiac disease is a digestive condition resulting from the consumption of gluten. Celiac disease impacts nearly one-percent of Americans, more than two million persons. Gluten is found in foods containing wheat, barley or rye. Bread, pasta, and cookies containing wheat, barley or rye have gluten. Gluten is also found in many unexpected places, like salad dressing and vitamins.

Persons with celiac disease who eat foods containing gluten experience an immune reaction in their small intestines, as the body attempts to digest the food. This immune reaction causes damage to the small intestines and leads to an inability to absorb some nutrients. Normally, the lining of the small intestines is lined with tiny, hair-like projections called villi. These villi absorb the nutrients from food and supply these as needed throughout

the body. Celiac disease results in damage to the villi, impairing the ability of the small intestines to utilize nutrients. Nutrients are eliminated from the body instead of being absorbed.

Symptoms of celiac disease include abdominal pain, diarrhea and bloating. Less obvious symptoms are anemia, joint pain, muscle cramps, skin rash and mouth sores. The causes of celiac disease are unknown. It appears to run in families, so if a relative has been diagnoses with the disease, there is an increased likelihood of close relatives contracting celiac disease. Untreated celiac disease is associated with a significantly higher risk for gastrointestinal cancers. Testing for celiac disease can be as simple as a blood test for specific antibodies or may require a biopsy of the small intestines. Celiac disease has no cure, but the symptoms can be effectively managed through dietary changes. Gluten-intolerance, a less severe version of the condition, has similar symptoms.

Treatment of celiac disease requires adherence to a gluten free diet. A gluten-free diet means avoiding products containing wheat, rye and barley and their derivatives. As the demand for more gluten-free products increases, more gluten-free options are becoming available. More restaurants are adding gluten-free options to the menu as consumers are requesting these choices. It is often difficult to know whether products contain gluten as no universal labeling currently exists for gluten.

Is a gluten-free diet right for you? Gluten-free diets are becoming increasingly popular for persons without celiac disease. According to one survey, 29% of 1000 respondents reported wanting to reduce the amount of gluten in their diets, the highest percentage since they began asking the question in 2009 (NPD Group, 2013). Celebrities such as Miley Cyrus and Gwyneth Paltrow have advocated a gluten-free diet. Eliminating gluten entirely for three weeks or longer will demonstrate whether you have gluten sensitivity and if a gluten free diet supports your health.




