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East Jordan Trims 2013-14 Budget and Appoints New Commissioner

EAST JORDAN—East Jordan City Administrator Chris Yonker and department heads got down to the nitty-gritty to produce a list of proposed budget adjustments presented at Tuesday's City Commission meeting.

Looking to balance the budget for the 2013-14 fiscal year (July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014), Yonker and city commissioners turned to department heads for recommendations after being unable to make significant headway at recent meetings.

"I challenged our department heads to offer suggestions on those service areas under their control, as well as other areas of the budget," said Yonker. "As Department Heads, they are responsible and held accountable for the management of their service area budgets. Therefore, they are the ones that know their budgets best and should be given the opportunity to make recommendations on possible adjustments."

In an attempt to reduce expenditures, Yonker and department heads found areas to trim without having to reduce any full-time positions.

"There will be no significant impact on services or any elimination of services at this point," Yonker commented.

With adjustments affecting nearly 30 departments, the majority of the cuts will focus on the general fund

From reducing payrolls and supplies, to cutting overtime, and postponing purchases, city employees are doing their part to help balance the budget.

Cuts, or simply trying to be more efficient, as Com-

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

"New Challenges, New Solutions" is the theme of this year's National Crime Victim's Rights Week

The week of April 21st through April 27th is officially recognized as National Crime Victim's Rights Week, recognizing the struggles of those whose lives have been affected by criminal transgressions, and advocating their rights in our justice system. This year's theme; "New Challenges, New Solutions," reflects the Office for Victims of Crime's initiative "Vision 21:Transforming Victims Services" strategy for the 21st Century, which began in 2010. That mission is aimed at addressing the many new challenges such as funding cuts, globalization, changing demographics, new types of crimes and changes brought about through advancing technol-

For example, in just the first half of 2010, spyware infections resulted in 617.000 U.S. households having to repair or replace their computers. Fully one in every 11 households surveyed reported a major problem with spyware infections. Also in 2010 -509,230 violent crimes by intimate partners were reported, and 61-percent of children age 17 and under said they had experienced at least one direct or indirect victimization incident during the previous year.

While these are just of few of many disturbing statistics, the number of victims these and other crimes involve is even more alarming, and the effects on their personal lives extends well beyond the specific crime incidents.

A 2003 study found that

crime victims experience a much higher lifetime incidence of posttraumatic stress disorder (PSTD) than those who had never reported being victimized. Another recent comprehensive study revealed that the lifetime prevalence of psychological disorders in both male and female crime victims suffering with posttraumatic stress was 88 percent and 79 percent respectively, with the most common disorders being depression, substance abuse and phobias. As this study demonstrates, the emotional impact of becoming a victim of crime can be both traumatic and chronic.

In a letter regarding National Crime Victim's Rights Week, Mark Mandell, Chair of the National Center for Victims of Crime, states, "Victims do not always receive the dignity and respect they deserve. Victims often absorb the physical, emotional, and financial costs of crime largely by themselves. Over the past year, a number of high-profile crimes have highlighted the scope of the challenges we face. The shooting massacres in Aurora, Colorado, and at the Sikh temple in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and the child sex abuse scandal at Penn State last year showed the public what we see every day—the searing impact of crime on victims and the inadequacy of our tools to meet their needs. Our work to ensure the rights of child sexual abuse victims, prevent future violence, and reach all victims has never been more urgent. Meeting these challenges requires insight and ingenuity.'

Victim's Advocates in communities throughout northern Lower Michigan and across the nation work to help crime victims work through what can be a very confusing process. That includes understanding the court system, explaining the intent and meaning behind a litany of processes such as the arraignment, pre-trial, preliminary examination or a scheduling conference. Crime Victim's Advocates also work with the victims to assist when they have suffered damages other than the emotional, and in filing restitution orders with the court. There are also funds available for crime vic-

To assist crime victims in their recovery, The Victims of Crime Act, which was passed in 1984, includes the establishment of the Crime Victims Fund, which appropriately, is financed by fines and penalties paid by offenders. As of September of 2012, the fund has grown to over \$8 billion and supports victim compensation programs nationwide.

While much progress has been made over the last 30 years, crime victims' rights are not universal and are often not enforced. Only a small percentage of victims receive crime victim compensation, which is usually limited to victims of violent crime. According to last year's National Crime Victimization Survey, more than 50 percent of violent crimes were not reported to police during a period from 2006-2010. In addition, a 2011 report called the "Use of Victim Services Agencies by Victims of Serious Violent Crime"

showed that only 9 percent of violent crime victims received needed services in the 1993-2009 timeframe.

National Crime Victims' Rights Week reminds us that many challenges remain.

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
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

Just Laugh

For Your Health

Just laugh – right now, wherever you are, just laugh. Out loud. Doesn't that feel good? How many times have you laughed today? Twice? Ten times? The average 40 year old laughs four times a day. The average five year old - more than 300. For the sake of your emotional and physical health, you should laugh

Is laughter the best medicine? There is considerable evidence that laughter is good for us, for many reasons. Laughter reduces blood sugar levels and increases glucose tolerance, whether you have diabetes or not. Laughter reduces pain and helps us to tolerate discomfort.

Norman Cousins was seeking a way to cope with inflammatory arthritis when he decided to watch Marx Brothers movies to distract himself from the pain. In his book, "Anatomy of an Illness as Perceived by the Patient" (W.W. Norton, 1979, 2001, 2005) Cousins claimed that ten minutes of laughter daily significantly reduced the pain and inflammation, allowing him to sleep for two hours without pain.

Laughter improves job performance, particularly if your work requires creativity and solving complex problems. Laughter improves the functioning of the heart and brain. Laughter actually helps your blood vessels function better, by increasing blood flow.

Research conducted by a cardiologist found that laughter was as beneficial as aerobic activity in a sample of 20 healthy adults.

Michael Miller, M.D., believes that the study results indicate that laughter may help maintain a healthy endothelium. The endothelium regulates blood flow and the ability of blood to coagulate and clot, as well as secreting chemicals in response to infection and wounds. Important in cardiovascular disease, a healthy functioning endothelium delays or prevents the development of atherosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries. How laughter helps the endothelium is not entirely clear.

Laughter reduces levels of stress hormones cortisol, epinephrine and dopamine and increases endorphins, neurotransmitters and antibodies while improving blood flow to the heart, leading to greater relaxation, improved mood and a positive outlook. The effect may be a result of

the exercise of the diaphragm muscles through laughter. At the least, laughter reduces mental stress, which damages the endothelium. Laughter shouldn't be considered a substitute for aerobic activity in avoiding cardiovascular disease. The two can work in tandem to improve heart health.

Laughter also plays an important role in relationships. Laughter estab lishes a positive emotional climate and creates an emotional connection between people through synchronizing, if only briefly, the brains of those involved. The power of laughter in intimate relationships is underestimated - laughing together - not at one another - keep a relationship together.

To improve your health - and your

mood - strive to laugh at least 15 minutes each day. You could achieve this by consciously guffawing for 15 minutes a day or watching situation comedies alone in your living room. However, since laughter is contagious and improves relationships, try to meet your laughter quota in the company of others. When others are laughing, join in!

We can all benefit from more laughter. As you work to laugh more, help those that are around you to increase their laughter quota as well! Today, spend at least 15 minutes laughing. You will feel happier right away. Make laughter a daily habit and you and your arteries will be feeling younger in no time.

Created by the Legislature in 1962, Char-Em ISD is one of Michigan's 56 educational service agencies

Saves money and resources for K-12 districts by providing consolidated support services.

Coordinates special education, alternative education, and career and technical education services across the region.

In 1963, the County School Districts of Charlevoix and Emmet counties consolidated into Char-Em ISD. This local event also marked a milestone for the state as Char-Em ISD became the first multi-county intermediate school district. A year later, Ellsworth and Central Lake public schools in Antrim County were annexed and joined Char-Em

Back then, Charles Robinson served as the first superintendent and the first organizational meeting of the "Consolidated Boards of Education" as it was called was held. Ten members were appointed until the biennial election of 1965 was held when the Char-Em ISD Board of Education members were elected by popular vote.

"Reflecting over the past 50 years, Char-Em ISD has much to celebrate," said current ISD Superintendent Rick Diebold. "Over the course of our history, it is evident that our staff and administrators have been committed to providing quality programming and services for students, parents and schools in our district which support and many times exceeds the vision of our founders.'

Diebold said he, too, is looking forward to seeing a large gathering of current and retired staff, board members and others at the open house celebration.

"As superintendent during this historical marker, I am extremely proud of the determination and dedication of our

founders, past and current staff, and Board of Education for holding true to our organizational mission and vision. Those who are part of our legacy should have confidence in a bright future for Char-Em ISD for many years to come.

missioner Cutler put it, will include a \$187,570 decrease in general fund expenditures and a proposed revenue increase of \$8,600. Departments most largely affected by the adjustments might include the Police Department and Fire Depart-

The Police Department will save the city \$32,760 by reducing overtime, DPW labor, part-time labor, supplies, gas, and equipment pur-

The Fire Department could potentially bring \$38,172 back into the general fund if the City Commission elects to eliminate the transferring of these funds to the fire equipment fund. Commissioners Timmons and Breakey expressed concern over this recommendation and asked the City Administrator to more closely examine how this will affect the Fire Department.

Yonker will present his evaluation at the city's next meeting.

Other proposed adjustments include a \$69,450 decrease in the Major Street Fund, a \$17,150 decrease in the Local Street Fund, and a \$20,634 net reduction in the Transfer Station Fund.

While commissioners at Tuesday's meeting approved most of the recommendations, they plan to further discuss their concerns over the Fire Department, along with topics concerning the purchase of equipment for the Parks and Recreation Department, and the proposal of reducing training for the administrator and commission.

To close the city's meeting on Tuesday, the city commission appointed Michael Burr to fill the vacated commission seat of Tinea Spence. The commission also accepted with regret the resignation of

Jerry Hepner from the DDA Board and wished him luck in his future endeavors. Filling Hepner's seat, the commission appointed Laurie Hodg-

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

Rally Highlights State's Commitment to Child Abuse Prevention

A garden of about 500 blue and silver pinwheels adorned the state capitol Tuesday as a symbol of Michigan's commitment to prevent child abuse and neglect.

With the theme "The Power of One," the rally called together those in the prevention community to draw attention to the 33,600 children who were reported to have been abused or neglected in 2012. Gov. Rick Snyder has proclaimed April as Child Abuse Prevention Month in Michigan.

"Through the strength of one action, one dollar, one person, one organization and, yes, one rally, we can make a positive difference in preventing child abuse and neglect in Michigan," said Michael Foley, executive director of the Children's Trust Fund, which organized the event.

Nationally, the total cost of child abuse and neglect is about \$124 billion per year, or about \$1,400 for each American family.

Other event speakers included: Rep. Bill Rogers, R Brighton; Rep. Terry Brown, D - Pigeon;

DHS Director Maura Corrigan; CTF Board Chairperson Lori Wortz; Director of the Child **Abuse Prevention Services** Department, National Exchange Club, Genevieve Stults and James Murray, parent leader of the Circle of Parents.

"By supporting the Children's Trust Fund, we're helping Michigan kids break free from abuse and neglect. When kids live without fear, they can be anything they want." Rogers said. "As a parent and grandparent myself, I want all Michigan kids to be safe and reach their fullest potential."

"It's critically important that we give each and every child the opportu-

nity to grow up healthy, safe and able to reach their fullest potential," Brown said. "Protecting our children from abuse and neglect is an issue we must all play a role in, and this rally is an excellent opportunity to shine a light on how we can make Michigan a safer, better place for every child and family.'

"We are proud, once again, for DHS to be involved with this worthwhile awareness event in the battle against child abuse and neglect in Michigan," Corrigan said, DHS Director. "Pinwheels for Prevention is changing the dynamic not only here, but nationwide and helping create an environment where children can lead happier, healthier and safer lives.

"Circle of Parents has helped me learn new ways to talk to my children. I've learned to speak to them in more positive ways and we share more together than ever before," said James Murray, parent leader for Circle of Parents. Circle of Parents is a parenting self-help group supported by the Michigan Children's Trust Fund.

Event sponsors included Dean Trailways, Grand Traverse Pie Company, The Exchange Club of Lansing, and the Lansing Area Black Social Workers Association.

The Children's Trust Fund was established by the Michigan Legislature in 1982 through Public Act 249 of 1982 and Public Act 250 of 1982. 
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

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
