### Vigil set to remember area victims of tragic accident

CRAWFORD COUNTY -News of the catastrophic accident that claimed the lives of the Grayling High School boys golf coach and one of the team's student-athletes Monday, April 29, was quickly communicated on social media websites, including Facebook, as residents of the Grayling area and supporters of the high school's athletic teams posted their shock and sadness over the tragedy, as well as asking others to keep the golf team in their prayers.

The two were among the three persons killed in a tragic two-vehicle accident Monday, according to Michigan State Police reports.

MSP officials stated the accident occurred shortly before 11:25 a.m. Monday on County Road 612, at the intersection with Crawford Lake Road, in Kalkaska County's Excelsior Township. Seven other victims transported and admitted to the Munson Medical Center in Traverse City.

A press release issued Monday night by the MSP stated the preliminary investigation

indicated a white Ford Windstar van was eastbound on County Road 612 and a silver Ford Freestar van was northbound on Crawford Lake Road NE, approaching the intersection and stop sign at County Road 612

Six members of the Grayling golf team and their coach occupied the Freestar

According to police, the two mini-vans collided in the intersection, sending both vehicles off the roadway into an open yard on the northeast corner of the intersection. It is unknown for certain, MSP officials reported, if speed limits and/or traffic control devices were observed.

The county roadway was closed for several hours Monday afternoon, as MSP officials investigated the crash and an accident reconstructionist was called to the scene to assist those already on site.

MSP officials reported the Ford Windstar was driven by 45-year-old Rhonda Mitchell,





### Walking is the best way to exercise

More and more people seem to be doing hard-core workouts these days. Some people sign up for some "boot camp" style exercise programs. You do not have to exercise like a maniac to achieve amazing results.

There also seem to be more infomercials on TV for extreme workout regimens such as P90X, the program made famous by vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan last summer, and the Insanity workout, which is so hard to do, its creators say, that it will "push you past your limits."

Even on the TV show The Biggest Loser, the trainers have the contestants working out to the point that they're literally falling off treadmills.

But is it really necessary to exert yourself in such an intense way to greatly improve your health and fitness? Many people believe that the answer is yes—and for this reason, these people don't exercise. And that's terrible!

Because in fact, the best exercise for most people is one that's already quite familiar and quite enjoyable—and much less physically taxing than those sweat-till-you-puke workouts that some people are putting themselves through.

Get back to basics

The best exercise is...walking! People have the right to topple off a treadmill in exhaustion if that is what it takes to provide motivation. But Mark Fenton, MS, an adjunct associate professor in the John Hancock Research Center on Physical Activity, Nutrition, and Obesity Prevention at the Tufts University School of Nutrition Science and Policy in Boston, author of two books on walking and the former host of the America's Walking series on PBS television, is convinced that the simple activity of putting one foot in front of the other is the ideal exercise for most people. Here's why...

You're less likely to feel pain or get hurt. The reason is that you're operating within a very natural range of motion for your body. "You're not asking your muscles or joints to do anything that they're not used to doing, and so the likelihood of soreness or injury is very low," said Fenton. Plus, unlike running and other high-impact sports. walking is low-impact, so the load that you're putting on your body's joints when you walk is much less.

It's convenient. Walking is such a flexible activity, said Fenton, You can do it anytime and anywhere. You don't need a partner or teammates, as you do with tennis, basketball or soccer. It's also easy to fit walking into a busy schedule because you don't have to do the entire workout at once. "Unlike taking, sav. a 30minute fitness class, where you truly need to spend 30 consecutive minutes exercising, you don't have to do 30 consecutive minutes of walking," said Fenton. "You can break it up into three 10minute walks and still get the

benefit."

It's free. Perhaps best of all, you don't need to pay for a personal trainer, fancy equipment, a gym membership or anything else. You just need a comfortable pair of shoes.

It's suitable for any fitness level. If the last time you broke a sweat was in high school gym class, then walking is the perfect workout for you. For inspiration, just look at Michael Moore, the documentary filmmaker who is famous for (among other things) his, well, potato-like look. Even someone as overweight and out of shape as he is has been able to commit to walking-and has grown to love the activity. In fact, he shared on Facebook that he's been walking 30 minutes a day, every day, since March 18 of last year, and that walking has had a healthy domino effect on his life, helping him sleep better, feel better and take better care of himself.

Walking is also great for people who are already moderately active. That's because you can speed up your walks, walk uphill or walk for longer periods of time whenever you want to intensify the workout, Fenton pointed out.

What about people who are already quite active and fitis walking good for them, too? Admittedly, if you're already, say, an avid runner or tennis player, then a typical walk may not be enough of a workout to make you even fitter. But that describes a small fraction of people, said Fenton, and even those people could benefit from about one day a week of gentle walking to give their muscles a break—especially in the early stages of training for a race or tournament, when doing too much too soon is a common cause of injury. However, Fenton said, "Walking at high intensity is actually an effective workout for more fit individuals. For example, race-walkers cruising at six to 10 miles per hour—yes, a jogging pace for most people—burn as many calories as someone taking a jog. And elite race-walkers have aerobic fitness levels comparable to elite runners. So walking truly can take your fitness to any level."

You're more likely to stick with it. For all of the reasons above!

# Health Department warns food establishments of phony inspector scam

Public health officials are warning local food establishments of a scam involving a phone call from someone identifying himself as a food inspector. According to Scott Kendzierski, Director of Environmental Health for the Health Department of Northwest Michigan, health officials elsewhere in the state have indicated that at least one such scam is being reported by a food establishment in their area, although there have not vet been any such reports in Northwest Michigan.

In that instance, the male caller claimed to be planning to inspect the food establishment, and gave an employee instructions to await an automated call. The food establishment employee then received text messages including a special code and a link to a Craig's List

"We want to remind all food establishments in Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego Counties that the Health Department and your local food inspector will always contact you personally," Kendzierski said. "Someone identifying himself or herself as a food inspector should be able to provide you with proper credentials. You will never be asked to respond to any automated calls or provide special access codes. If you receive a call like this, please let us know immediately."

Kendzierski recommends asking for identification if someone stops by or calls claiming to be from the local Health Department, Department of Agriculture, or federal food agencies that you don't know. If the individual cannot provide proper identification or if you suspect that the ID may be invalid, do not allow the person access to your facility. Contact your food regulatory agency immediately and report it. He adds that food establishment employees should never provide sensitive or confidential information, such as a social security number, as food inspectors would not ask for that information.

"We work hard to develop excellent relationships with food service operators," Kendzierski explained. "We will be working closely with local law enforcement officials to address any concerns."

Food service operators who have suspicions about the identity of an inspector, or who believe they are victims of a scam, should call Mike Jones, Environmental Health Supervisor, at (231) 547-7641.

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan is mandated by the Michigan Public Health Code to promote wellness, prevent disease, provide quality healthcare, address health problems of vulnerable populations, and protect the environment for the residents and visitors of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet, and Otsego counties.

As of late Monday night, MSP officials reported two of the seven victims transported to Munson as being listed in critical condition, with two more in serious condition and three listed in fair condi-

According to other news reports, students at GHS were told of the tragedy Monday afternoon, with other events and team practices being canceled. Classes were set to be held Tuesday, with crisis counselors on hand.

Just hours after the accident, a Facebook page, "Community Vigil For The Grayling Golf Team," was posted Monday afternoon by Rachel Greenway and Hannah

"As many of you know, our local Grayling Golf team was involved in a terrible car accident today on their way to a golf meet in Kalkaska County," the page reads. "Six players and the coach were in-

"It is time for our community to come together and help each other get through this heart breaking event. I have gotten clearance to hold a vigil in the clubhouse of the Grayling Country Club. Please feel free to bring candles, keepsakes of those involved, pictures or anything else you would like to remember and honor our students, friends and family members."

While the names of the other injured players were not released by the MSP, the Facebook page states that golf team members Mason Krey, Tyler Summers, Jake Hinkle, Gunner Metzer and Dallas Johnson were also involved in the fatal crash.

According to the Facebook page, the vigil is scheduled for 6 p.m. on Thursday, May 2, at the Grayling Country Club, the golf team's home course, located on the I-75 Business Loop in Grayling.

# Banks Township Planning Together

ELLSWORTH—Thirty leaders in the Banks Township community gathered Monday, April 29, at the Township Hall in Ellsworth to give updates on past and future plans for the community. Supervisor, Thomas Mann, guided discussion at the Third Annual Planning Together session as representatives from nearly every vocation and leadership role in the community shared their contributions for the upcoming year. Burt Thompson from the Antrim County Road Commission addressed the group of community leaders about transportation funding in Michigan and Antrim

Thompson began his address by informing those present that Antrim County is in need of thirty million dollars in maintenance for paved roads. Thompson explained that the Antrim County Road Commission (ACRC) receives about \$3.3 million from the Michigan transportation fund (MTF) each year. The MTF is funded through gasoline tax (19cents per gallon), diesel tax (15 cents per gallon) and vehicle registration fees. In 2012 the fund received \$1.9 billion which was distributed to the Michigan Department of Transportation who in turn distributes to the state's road commissions according to a complicated formula. Antrim County's current revenues are about the same as what was received ten years ago. "We're dealing with

but of course outgoing expenses have increased dramatically," said Thompson. Thompson is concerned about a recent proposal by Governor Snyder. This proposal would increase funding by \$1.2 billion through a combination of wholesale fuel taxes and vehicle registration fees. However, the proposal will funnel more money to state highway and urban areas. "We may not see any increase if the Governor's plan goes through, said Thompson. The Governor proposes that rural areas raise funds through local mileages but Antrim County

is already generating \$1.3 million in local

road mileages and Thompson is doubtful

that residents will agree to an increase. While Thompson's address seemed dismal all other leaders gave reports of cheerful expectations for the upcoming year. River, a well-loved stream that flows into Lake Superior. It was impacted by - and is recovering from - the 3rd largest fire in Michigan's history this past May-June.


According to Fletcher, "You don't have to be a paddling enthusiast to enjoy the program, but you may become one by the time the evening ends."

### Missing Boy Found

Sheriff W.D. (Don) Schneider reports on April 27, 2013, around 09:21am a six year old autistic boy had become separated from his mother at the Fisherman's Island State Park in Charlevoix County. The boy had ventured off toward Lake Michigan in the general direction of the St. Mary's Cement Plant.

Deputies made contact with the cement plant manager who advised his staff via radio that there was a missing child in the area. The cement plant manager then halted operations at the plant and asked employees to assist in the search. They utilized pickup trucks and all-terrain vehicles to access the outer areas of the property in the location where the boy was last

Pavel Silkovskiy, an employee at the cement plant, was traveling on a lower road near Lake Michigan when he spotted the boy near the water. As he started to walk towards the child, the boy ran into the water. Mr. Silkovskiy was able to get to the boy and remove him from Lake Michi-

Sheriff's deputies, along with fire personnel, met plant staff and the young boy on the shoreline. The child was cold because of the water but unharmed. He was reunited with his parents a short time later at the state park.

On behalf of the family and the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office, we would like to thank St. Mary's Cement and their employees for their quick action. Their staff saved critical time and removed the child from imminent danger.

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office was assisted by the Charlevoix Police Department, Charlevoix Township Fire, Charlevoix EMS and the Department of Natural Resources - Parks Division.

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# Significance of the National Day of Prayer

The National Day of Prayer has great significance for us as a nation as it enables us to recall and to teach the way in which our founding fathers sought the wisdom of God when faced with critical decisions. **Historical Summary** 1775 – The first Continental Congress called for a National Day of Prayer

1) There have been 139 national calls to prayer, humiliation, fasting and thanksgiving by the President of the United States (1789-2012).

2) There have been 61 Presidential Proclamations for a National Day of Prayer (1952-2012). Gerald Ford (1976) and George H. Bush (1989-91) are the only U.S. Presidents to sign two National Day of Prayer Proclamations in the same year.

3) Every President since 1952 has signed a National Day of Prayer proclamation.

4) 34 of the 44 U.S. Presidents

have signed proclamations for National Prayer. Three of the Presidents who did not sign a proclamation died while serving in office. Two Presidents, not included in the count - William Howard Taft and Warren Gamaliel Harding, signed proclamations for Thanksgiving and

5) Records indicate there have been 1,126 state and federal calls for national prayer since 1775 and counting.

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

### Letter to the Senate

Letter From the NRA Institute for Legislative Action Executive Director Chris Cox to the United States Senate on Background Checks

Dear Senator,

I am writing regarding the National Rifle Association's position on several firearms-related proposals under consideration in the Senate.

S. 649, the "Safe Communities, Safe Schools Act of 2013", introduced on March 21, contains a number of provisions that would unfairly infringe upon the Second Amendment rights of law-abiding gun owners. This legislation would criminalize the private transfer of firearms by honest citizens, requiring friends, neighbors and many family members to get government permission to exercise a fundamental right or face prosecution. The NRA is unequivocally opposed to

In addition, the NRA will oppose any amendments offered to S. 649 that restrict fundamental Second Amendment freedoms; including, but not limited to, proposals that would ban commonly and lawfully owned firearms and magazines or criminalize the private transfer of firearms through an expansion of background checks. This includes the misguided "compromise" proposal drafted by Senators Joe Manchin, Pat Toomey and Chuck Schumer. As we have noted previously, expanding background checks, at gun shows or elsewhere, will not reduce violent crime or keep our kids safe in their schools. Given the importance of these issues, votes on all anti-gun amendments or proposals will be considered in NRA's future candidate evaluations.

Rather than focus its efforts on restricting the rights of America's 100 million law-abiding gun owners, there are things Congress can do to fix our broken mental health system; increase prosecutions of violent criminals; and make our schools safer.

During consideration of S. 649, should one or more amendments be offered that adequately address these important issues while protecting the fundamental rights of law-abiding gun owners, the NRA will offer our enthusiastic support and consider those votes in our future candidate evaluations as well.

We hope the Senate will replace the current provisions of S. 649 with language that is properly focused on addressing mental health inadequacies; prosecuting violent criminals; and keeping our kids safe in their schools. Should it fail to do so, the NRA will make an exception to our standard policy of not "scoring" procedural votes and strongly oppose a cloture motion to move to final passage of S. 649.



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### **Essential expenses**

Dear Dave,

I'm following your plan, and currently I have \$14,000 in my emergency fund. What are essentials for three to six months of expenses?

Dear Brian,

Basically, you should ask yourself this question: What would it take to operate my household for a month? There are several different things that could be classified as "essentials." but if you take those things and multiply the number by three, four, five or six, you'll see how much money you need to have a fully loaded emergency fund of three to six months of expenses. This is Baby Step 3 in my plan.

Some people get really technical about exactly how many months of expenses they need to save in this range. And that's okay. You can take a little time to evaluate things before moving on to Baby Step 4, which is investing 15 percent of your household income into Roth IRAs and other pre-tax retirement

Believe me, it's a great feeling to have a big pile of cash sitting there just for a rainy day. You don't want to go nuts and make it so big that you sacrifice retirement or other important aspects of your life, but after a point you shouldn't be too concerned whether you have three months or six months of expenses or somewhere in between—saved just for emergen-

Having a nice emergency fund, along with no debt, creates a wonderful sense of financial peace!

### She stole his identity

Dear Dave,

If a wife takes out a credit card in her husband's name without his knowledge, and they get divorced, can the husband claim identity theft? Nancy

Dear Nancy, Absolutely! Unless they have power of attorney, anytime someone opens an account in a name other than their own, they have stolen an identity. Being married to someone doesn't give you the right to sign their name to a document.

I knew a guy in the real estate business years ago who was doing a lot of property deals under his own name. Occasionally, the title company would require his wife's signature, and he would sign her name on the papers himself. Sometimes he signed her name after calling her up and explaining what was happening, and she was okay with the situation. Then, he signed some papers she didn't know about, and it came back to bite him. He was charged with criminal

You cannot legally sign your spouse's name without first having power of attorney privileges. If you do, it's called identity theft. It's a crime anytime you lie to get money.
