




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4th Annual SOBO **Arts Festival...**

a Boyne City Main Street Event

The Arts will be celebrated in Boyne City at the 4th annual SOBO Arts Festival, June 28-29, 2013. Artists from New Orleans, Florida, Arizona, and all over Michigan will be featured at the two-day festi-

Music will fill the streets in Boyne City's historic downtown district as the festival opens on Friday evening, June 28, from 6-9 p.m. during the much acclaimed "Stroll the Streets" event. The evening will feature a variety of musicians and entertaining activities such as jugglers and magicians, business open houses, beer tasting at the Thirsty Goat, a "sneak peek" at artists exhibiting on Saturday, all culminating with an outdoor concert in the SOBO Arts District from 7-9 p.m. featuring the Bay Area Big Band. Back by popular demand, the 17member band builds on a proud tradition of the historical bands of Duke Ellington, Woody Herman, Count Basie and Glenn Miller and promises to be a great evening for dancing in the streets. The Bay Area Big Band is being featured thanks to a grant from the Wisser-Saworski Endowment for the Arts Fund at the Charlevoix County Community Foundation.

On Saturday, June 29, from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. the SOBO Arts Festival activities continue at nearby Peninsula Beach, a beautiful park with ample lawn and open space on the shore of Lake Charlevoix just a short distance from downtown Boyne City. The juried art fair will blend with art demonstrations and workshops, hands-on art projects for children, and a musical performance by singer songwriter Kirby featuring his newly released CD, "Kirby for Kids and childish adults."

A new event added to the festival is sand-castle building. "Be prepared, you might spot a Sand Pirate or two as children 'Dig into Reading,' a program we are presenting this summer at

His two greatest interests were international travel and his association with Rotary. He has traveled to more than 250 countries, including every continent, which has given him a world outlook. He was very involved in Rotary Club activities and was particularly interested in Rotary's World Community Service efforts. He had been active in a number of World Community Service projects with the Petoskey club including one which provided a number of workshops for street children in Lima, Peru, and another project which provided clothing for street people in Romania. One of the highlights of his life was to share the dais with the Dalai Lama at a Rotary meeting in Albuquerque, N.M. He had been the first to propose the Dalai Lama as a Paul Harris Fellow.

Mr. Carpenter had volunteered his services a number of times in such places as Vietnam, Poland, Peru, Kenya, Russia and Malaysia, where he taught English and made site evaluations for major Rotary International projects which were seeking funding in various countries.

He was very much concerned about world poverty and the lack of opportunity available to the youth of Third World countries where the majority of the people are chained to the eternal cycle of poverty and the lack of opportunity for advancement. To this end, he has devoted consid-

erable time and effort toward raising money for the Rotary Foundation to carry on its charitable work throughout the world.

Recognizing his lifelong service to others and his contributions made through Rotary over the years, Rotary International honored him with the prestigious "Service Above Self" award in 2007.

Reducing your risk of skin cancer

Memorial Day marks the unofficial start of summer. After the long winter months, we are all eager to get outside and enjoy the sunshine. It isn't surprising that May is skin cancer awareness month. Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States. One in five Americans will develop risk cancer in their lifetimes. More than two million Americans develop skin cancer annually. Knowing your risk of skin cancer and knowing how to help prevent


your risk. Your risk of skin cancer is greatly influenced by your genetic disposition and your reaction to sun exposure. Take the quiz at the end of this article to determine your risk. Add your totals for genetic disposition and reaction to sun exposure to find your Fitzpatrick Skin Type. The higher your number the lower your

If your total is 0-6, your skin is type I. A point value of 7-12 represents type II You typically burn following sun exposure, leaving you at high risk for skin cancers. . The recommendations for risk reduction are similar for both types. To reduce your risk, use sunscreen with a SPF rating of 30 or higher, and stay in the shade when you are outside. Check your skin monthly, head to toe, for unusual growths. Have your skin professionally checked an-

A point total of 13-16 indicates skin type III. Type IV is a score between 19 and 24. These types are at slightly reduced risk for skin cancer. The recommendations for these skin types, that tend to tan more easily and are less likely to burn is to use a sunscreen with an SPF of 15+ and to seek shade when outside during periods with the strongest sunlight, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Check your skin monthly and have a professionally skin check annually.

Fitzpatrick Skin Type V, 25-30 points, and Type VI, 31 points or higher, tan easily and rarely burn. However, it is still recommended that darker skin persons use sunscreen with an SPF of 15+ daily and check their skin monthly as well as having an annual professional skin check. Skin of this type is at risk for a very virulent form of skin cancer, which is often detected in advanced stages. It is more likely to appear on skin that is not regularly exposed to the sun, like the bottoms of

What to look for? In general, in your monthly skin checks look for changes in your skin. The lesions differ by the type of skin cancer. They might be elevated, rough feeling and appear as warts. The most common type of skin cancer, Basal Cell Carcinoma, can present as an open sore that lasts for a few weeks, heals and bleeds again. Something as subtle as a reddish, itchy patch can signal skin cancer. Also, an area that appears as a scar could represent skin cancer. It is important, if you notice a change in your skin, to consult your doctor. Skin cancer that is caught early is very treatable. Treatment often involves removing the growth. The sooner the growth is removed, the less the impact on your skin and your life.

Death by Toothpick: Why You Need to Watch What You Swallow

"Oh, no!" the lady gasped when I started to stick some toothpicks into the plateful of hors d'oeuvres I was arranging. "Please don't use those things. They're terribly dangerous."

Then she told about the time she attended a party where lots of toothpick-bedecked finger food was served. A few days later, a fellow partygoer developed a bellyache so severe that it sent him to the ER.

X-rays revealed nothing. Doctors were mystified. Sadly, within a week the man developed a raging infection—and he died.

An autopsy revealed the tragic truth, my mother-in-law said. A toothpick had punctured his intestines, setting the stage for the fatal infection.

Does this sound like a one-in-a-billion freak occurrence? Admittedly, death by toothpick is rare—but it does happen, more often than many people (even doctors) may realize. In fact, a medical journal report that highlighted the dangers associated with the accidental ingestion of toothpicks and other small, sharp objects.

The problem is surprisingly difficult to diagnose—which is why you must be aware of the danger so you can protect yourself. What you need to know...

SMALL OBJECT, BIG TROUBLE The journal article described a woman who had suffered-for months—from worsening stomach pain, weakness and loss of appetite. Her family physician was perplexed.

When the woman started spiking a fever and vomiting, she went to the emergency room, where doctors noted her racing pulse and disorientation. Then, within hours of arriving at the hospital, she developed respiratory distress, sepsis (blood poisoning) and multi-organ failure.

Suspecting an infection in her abdomen, doctors did an ultrasound scan and spotted what looked like an infected abscess on her liver. She was treated with IV antibiotics and had an operation to remove the infected tissue from her liver. That's when the culprit—a wooden toothpick—was revealed.

Apparently, this woman had unknowingly swallowed the toothpick, which pierced her stomach before

traveling to her liver. It then lodged in her liver tissue for months, eventually creating a life-threatening cri-

TOOTHPICKS AREN'T THE ONLY DANGER

It may seem strange that this woman's family doctor didn't know why she was getting so sick. But as the article authors pointed out, in most cases, finding a foreign object inside the body is a challenge. A wooden or plastic toothpick might not show up on a regular X-ray, and the symptoms such an object causes can easily be confused with those of other ailments.

This woman was lucky. A few weeks after her operation, she was as good as new.

But you would hate for the same thing to happen to you. So: Next time you're eating an appetizer or sandwich that is held or held together by a toothpick, whether wooden or plastic, be sure to remove that spike before taking a bite...or nibble very carefully and chew slowly so that the toothpick doesn't wind up being swallowed. Also be on the lookout for any broken bits of toothpick that might be lurking unseen in your food.

Other risky objects: Be equally cautious with similar small, sharp objects. For instance, never hold nails, sewing needles or straight pins between your lips—one could accidently slip down your throat. And be extra careful when eating chicken or fish so that you don't swallow any bones.

What if you ever do develop unexplained abdominal pain that lingers? Ask your doctor to consider whether you might have swallowed something sharp and request an imaging test. Caution: An MRI could be dangerous if you swallowed something made of metal because the MRI's powerful magnet could cause additional damage by making the object move around inside you or even ripping it from your body! So your best bet is probably an ultrasound and/or CT scan, which generally show more than an X-ray in such cases.





on route. We then traveled from Dearborn to Downtown Detroit's Greek town. About a fifteen minute drive turned into a near hour wait, surprisingly there are no bus parking spaces down in Detroit. Finally, we parked and explored Greek town Detroit. There are many places to in Greek town but we decided on a restaurant called Five Guys Burgers and Fries. I mean what better than a mouthwatering burger to fulfill your trip from a spectacular fast food place.

Our journey back home began around 7:30p.m. Sad that we had to leave but tired from a long exciting day. Still we had more than bunches of energy throughout the bus. The ride home was a long five hours but we found fun things to pass the time by. We sang, danced, talked, and just had a great bonding experience in general.



CHARLEVOIX—Pigs Eatin Ribs mobile smokehouse style vending and catering service has opened a brick and mortar eatery on the corner of M-31 and Marion Center Road in the building formally occupied by Mary Ann's restaurant. The quickly expanding business held their open house celebration on Memorial Day in classic American picnic style.

The black bus towing a mobile smoker seen around Charlevoix County is the brainchild of Adam Kline, Executive Chef & Pit Master and his wife, business partner and accountant, Jill. "Mobile eateries aren't anything new, they've been common in the cities for ages but I wanted to cater at these festivals and give the local people a little something other than the same old stuff," said Kline.

Kline spent a good share of his childhood in his grandmother's kitchen, graduated from Charlevoix High School in 2000, spent 6 years studying the culinary arts under Master Chef Garrett Scanlan at the Charlevoix Country Club, then attended the award winning culinary school at Schoolcraft Community College where he received national recognition. He moved to Charleston, North Carolina where he honed his culinary skills working in fine restaurants and as a private cook for the next three years. He then returned to Charlevoix to be closer to family. "I remember standing in a

restaurant two years ago thinking, there has to be something better," he said. Out of that discontent came Pigs Eatin Ribs award winning smokehouse style on site vending and catering service specializing in whole hog, ribs, chicken, brisket, and pulled pork.

Kline uses only the freshest meats, finest spices, and highest quality ingredients smoked slow and low on a custom built mobile cooker using 100% apple wood. The onsite catering service has booked so many graduation parties, wedding receptions, wedding rehearsal dinners, corporate events, backyard picnics, anniversary and birthday parties, summer picnics and other events that they



found themselves in need of a place to facilitate all the promises they made. The former restaurant was a perfect home base for prepping and organizing those obligations. "Since we are here we thought why not open the doors and sell here as well," said Kline.

The detail orientated Kline plans to stay in his home town and support Northern Michigan in as many choices as possible. The restaurant serves soda produced at Northwoods Soda and Syrup Co. out of Williamsburg and Traverse City made Moomers Ice Cream. "I believe business breeds business," he said. He also has a truck and smoker in downtown Traverse Cityparked at the Little Fleet, formally Jacks Market.

As far as the future goes for Pigs Eatin Ribs, Kline says he'd like to see some sort of collective group of restaurant owners whose goal is to better the food industry in Charlevoix. "I'd like to organize that and expand, but not too much," he said.


