



# **Leadership Charlevoix County makes** 'Wheels to Water' a reality for Whiting Park

Whiting Park on Lake Charlevoix will soon be the first public beach in Charlevoix County to offer complete universal access into the water for all residents and visitors, thanks to the fund-raising success of the 2013 class of Leadership Charlevoix County.

A ribbon cutting ceremony will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday, June 15, at Whiting Park on the shore of Lake Charlevoix between Boyne City and Ironton. The public is welcome to join in the celebration as the park unveils the MobiMat RecPath and a floatable chair to allow access to the beach and water for those with mobility challenges - just in time for the 2013 summer season.

Whiting Park was chosen by this year's Leadership Charlevoix County class as their community service project. The class, in partnership with the Disability Network of Northern Michigan and the Charlevoix County Parks and Recreation Department, has been working since September 2012 to achieve complete universal access into Lake Charlevoix. The MobiMats are specially designed to allow

easier access across the sand for individuals in wheelchairs and families with strollers.

The Leadership Charlevoix County class raised more than \$11,000 to purchase 150 feet of mat and the chair. Major contributors included Red Mesa Grill, Boyne River Inn, Pat O'Brien and Associates, Charlevoix County Community Foundation, Char-Em United Way, Charlevoix Rotary Club, Boyne City Rotary Club, Kiwanis Club of Boyne City, Charlevoix Kiwanis Aktion Club, Boyne Valley Lions Club, East Jordan Rotary Club along with several individual donations. As part of their project, the class successfully wrote grant proposals, attended local business expos and spoke to area service clubs.

"It was amazing how the surrounding communities came forward to help raise the funds needed to purchase the accessibility equipment," said Lisa Luebke, a LCC class member. "Once we got the word out to the public, the response was incredible. Several local businesses held fundraisers, area service clubs contributed, and many individuals donated as well. It was just an outpouring of generosity!"

Located at 05820 Lake Shore Road near Boyne City, Whiting Park was chosen for the universal access equipment because of its existing accessible campsites, bathroom and canoe/kayak launch for those with mobility challenges.

Leadership Charlevoix County is currently accepting applications for the 2014 class, which will start in September 2013. The program aims to identify, encourage and educate new and emerging leaders. Participants spend nine months (one day per month) gaining in-depth exposure to the county, its organizations, leaders and resources. Upon completion, the participants are eager to carry out a more powerful, positive, and lasting impact within their organizations and communities.

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# **Boyne City Commission** approves functional art for Downtown

BOYNE CITY—The Main Street Art Bike Rack Project was given the go ahead, the Redevelopment Ready Community Resolution was signed and a horse trail at Avalanche Park was approved at the June 11 meeting of the Boyne City Commission.

For several months the Main Street Design Committee has been working on a project that combines bike racks into works of art. After considering several options the committee has selected four for the first phase of the project. The entire project is expected to cost \$4,000. Much of the funding comes from a Northwest Michigan Council of Governments grant intended to help create placemaking in communities. "One of the things that was a challenge was that the grant was for art in Boyne City, the bike rack is secondary," said bike rack designer Aaron Place of the Wood Shop. "We tried to create elements that people will want to have their pictures taken next to and to draw people downtown," he continued. The functional art is expected to generate conversation and assist in the creation of a unique down town.

One of the requirements to proceed with the Redevelopment Ready Community Certification was that the City Commission pass a resolution of support to proceed with the evaluation process and sign a memorandum of understanding with the Michigan **Economic Development Corporation.** 

"There are a lot of ingredients that go into making Boyne City. I'm impressed with the process that has taken place so far and this is another option to grow and grow wisely," said Mayor Ron Grunch.

Certification in the program will allow the city to receive assistance in promoting sites within the community and help in marketing the community to the public. This certification is also a non-binding collaboration that is based on an understanding of the community's responsibilities, like providing personnel to attend training and MEDC's responsibilities to provide training among other things. "Things are going to get more competitive and this will be just another feather in our hat," said Main Street Director Hugh Conklin.


After considerable deliberation on the part of the Parks and Recreation Committee a recommendation to allow Boyne Valley Equine Tours and Services to offer horseback tours at Avalanche Park was sent to the City Commission for consideration. A new trail was created for separation from other activities that will begin at the warming house in Avalanche Park. Rides will have to be prescheduled because the horses will not be kept at the park and issues like soil erosion and horse droppings were addressed. The rides are being offered by the same business that conducts the carriage rides downtown. "This is another attraction that will bring people to Boyne City," said City Manager Michael Cain. The City Commission gave approval for the service.



CHARLEVOIX-Many have noticed the color returning to an industrial section of M-66 across from the post office. Charlevoix's ACE Hardware has expanded to accommodate more home repair needs as well as providing extensive gardening options.

When the opportunity to expand presented itself Mark Greyerbieh, owner of Charlevoix ACE, felt it was a good time to increase the amount of building materials and live goods to better serve the community's needs. "I don't want to be a lumber yard but it's silly to have to go all the way to Petoskey for a piece of plywood," said Greyerbieh. When it's complete a road will connect the garden center with the present ACE building and there will be a drive through lumber center and a building they call the 'shady house' to keep plants that require less direct sunlight, between them. Presently, an annual greenhouse is filled inside and out with every gardeners dreams and the garden center, outfitted with a glass door to provide more light to the plants when the store is closed

and a better view of what's inside to customers, is filled with seasonal furniture and garden amenities like fairy garden supplies and wind chimes tuned to

play Amazing Grace. Greyerbieh is in the process of adding hydroponic gardening supplies and increasing the candle and gift selection. When the Greyerbieh's first came to Charlevoix they had a little hardware store downtown. It sold the usual ACE brands and necessities but also appealed to the tourists and sold what Greyerbieh calls "foo foo" gifts. With the added space they are hoping to reach back into that market again.

They will eventually have a 'pint sized planter table' for children so when parents are shopping the kids can be experiencing potting their own plants which

they can take with them when they leave. The store also will have displays from both Cedar Log Homes Co. and MDC Rosetta Stone of Charlevoix. "They don't have a retail presence, so we can showcase some of their products and they will provide us with some beautiful displays," said Greyerbieh. The shared promotion is part of a local initiative the Greyerbieh's hope to continue. "I don't see bringing a lot of stuff in from out of state at all," he said. They hope to have a local foods section open soon, featuring all Michigan made foods.

As a result of the expansion they were able to hire eight new employees, two of them will soon be full time. "It's a work in progress, there's stuff coming out every day," said Vicky Greyerbieh.

# DNR announces \$1 million Forest Legacy Program grant for Charlevoix County

The Department of Natural Resources on Tuesday, June 11, announced that approximately 750 acres and nearly three-quarters of a mile of Thumb Lake frontage in Charlevoix County will be protected, available for public use and managed as a working forest thanks to a Forest Legacy Program grant award.

The project, known as the Gitcha-nini Nebish Forest (Ottawa for "Big Finger Water"), includes the state acquisition of a conservation easement on 750 acres of rolling northern hardwood forests that is strategically positioned to connect larger blocks of protected lands and habitats. The property is adjacent to state forest land on three sides and contains the Thumb Lake frontage on the fourth

Bill O'Neill, chief of the DNR's Forest Resources Division, said state acquisition of the conservation easement means that the property will stay in private ownership, but will be open for public recreational use and will be managed as a working forest under a forest management plan approved by the state forester.

"Whether you enjoy hunting, fishing, bird watching, hiking or one of the many other recreational opportunities our forest land has to offer, this project ensures this area will be sustainably managed for the enjoyment of current and future users,' said O'Neill, who also serves as Michigan's state forester. "In addition to protecting the recreational values of the land, this project also takes into account protection of wildlife habitat and ensures sustainable timber management continues on the property. This is great news for all forest stakeholders.'

Along with sustainable forest management and public recreational access, the Gitcha-ninj Nebish Forest project will:

☐Help to protect a portion of the tri-county fall color tour area along Thumb Lake Road (County Road 48);

□Protect the drinking water quality in the area, as the property is located in a high-ground water recharge area; and

□Offer the potential for hikers on the North Country National Scenic Trail, located on nearby state forest land, the opportunity to hike to

Thumb Lake. The purpose of the Forest Legacy Program, which is providing 75 percent of the funding for this project, is to ascertain and protect environmentally important forest areas that are threatened by conversion to non-forest uses. The Forest Legacy Program seeks to promote forest-land protection and other conservation opportunities. The program, nationally competitive and administered by the U.S. Forest Service, is funded through the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

O'Neill said that with the grant funds now awarded, the DNR will begin the detailed work with the landowner and project partner, Little Traverse Conservancy, so that the project can be successfully completed.

# Neighbors Ban Together to Save Waterfront Landmark

IRONTON—The Landings Restaurant won't miss a day of the peak tourist season in spite of its closing, potential demolition and hap-in-stance sale. Thanks to concerned lake residents who were traumatized about the potential loss, the Ironton Cove Landings will open under new ownership on June 21.

The previous owners Lyle Miller and Tom Sheridan had decided after sixteen years that it was time to move on. Their plan was to turn the property into a luxury motor home complex, a plan that called for the elimination of the restaurant. "This restaurant has been part of the boating culture ever since I could remember," said new owner Bob Berg. "The neighborhood was panicked about the idea."

Berg approached Miller with the idea that if folks on the lake could round up the money, would he be interested in selling. As with all good causes only Berg and Preston Parish, a neighbor and near stranger who lives across the lake from Berg, were serious enough about the project to follow through. "Parish asked if he could be a part of it, he's interested in preserving the area for the benefit and beauty of the lake itself," said Berg. It took the winter for the legalities to get worked out then a month ago the pair recruited Adam Guerriero and his wife Renee to run the restaurant.

"We tried at first to get a group of restaurant owners to come together and run it for the betterment of the lake but that fell through," said Berg. Sheridan suggested the couple because they were very familiar with the Land-

ings. Renee is a high school art teacher but has fifteen years in the restaurant business. She and her extended family have been associated with the Landings for years. "It's right in our backyard," said Adam. He has a degree from Monroe County Community College Culinary School and has been the Chief de Cuisine at the Grey Gables Inn for six years.

The four are concerned about the source of their products and have made a commitment to use as many Michigan grown products as possible. "It's important to us to have responsibly sourced ingredients," said Guerriero. The restaurant will be purchasing all of its produce from local farmers like Kiteley's Farm in Charlevoix. "I don't think there's any place in the country that's going to have better produce than this restaurant," said Guerriero. In the tradition of waterside dining establishments Guerriero will be reaching out to both coasts for traditional favorites. Like Lobster Rolls from the East Coast and Dungeness Crab from the Pacific. "Its still going to be just like eating local because were going to have it flown in fresh," he said. He is also connecting with local farmers to get a custom burger blend made just for

the Landings. "It's going to be really top notch, I'm real excited about it," he said.

The vision is to eventually keep the restaurant open year round. Soon they will begin catering and they are putting together a plan to use the marina as a setting for weddings. "I don't think there's anything around here as beautiful as that," said Guerriero.

"You won't be able to get a better burger or a colder beer than at the Landings," said Berg. Opening the first day of summer, June 21.



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
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# **Second Officer** Hired to Patrol Ellsworth Village

ELLSWORTH—A new police officer was hired and updates to the Woodenshoe Park bathhouse were approved at the June 10 Ellsworth Village Council meeting.

Antrim County Police Officer Kevin Hoch was hired to assist Officer John Morris in patrolling Ellsworth Village. The officers are hired to work a total of forty hours each month over and above their regular Sheriff's Department duties so a second officer is necessary to provide full coverage of the village. Hoch has been with the Sherriff's Department for fifteen years, served as a detective for a few years, is on the dive team and is currently working road patrol. "The reason I selected Hoch is that he's a good community guy, real dedicated to community," said Morris.

Sinks and showers that were installed at the Woodenshoe bathhouse in 1985 will be replaced and mixers installed to regulate water temperature as mandated by law. "We replaced some last year and people just raved about them," said Hugh Campbell, Village President.

# **Charlevoix's Centennial City Band**

CHARLEVOIX—Over a hundred years ago East Park was the home stage of the very first Charlevoix City Band. It is one of the oldest city bands in the nation, and is currently one of the largest. Of course, the band members have changed and the music has evolved, but the band as we know it is indeed over a century old. Having a band with that kind of history in this community, is not only a privilege but an honor for the musicians as well as the audience. The seventy-five member band will begin this year's summer session the first Tuesday in July and continue until the third Tuesday in August.

The first known band in Charlevoix was in 1876. It wasn't until 1926 that it became known as the Charlevoix City Band. "They've gone through three or four band shells and nine band directors but there has always been a band in East Park," said Ev Wujcik, a trumpet player who has been with the band for fifty years. People from all walks of life and many different professions have joined the group because of an enjoyment of music.

The band has many off-shoots that perform separate from the larger body. A sax quartet, Castle Brass, a quintet, and the Pine



River Jazz Band. These groups are seen all over the community at the Breezeway Cruise or local Christmas celebration as well as weddings, fundraisers, and festivals. "But the small groups you see out and about are all part of the City Band," said Wujcik. The smaller Winter Band plays at places like Sunnybank, Boulder Park, Meadowbrook and the Friendship Center once a week all winter to keep tuned up for the summer sessions as well as spread the fun and joy of

The present band shell in East Park is named after the 28 year director of the City Band, Clarence Odmark. The present director is Gary Stutzman, who has been invested in the band since his high school days. Wujcik has been with the band since the eighth grade. "I don't know why exactly we have been lucky enough to keep the band as an important part of the community, maybe it's because of the location of the park, they've always had a waterfront place for people to congregate and that's

probably one of the reasons the band was started," said Wujcik.

The band also welcomes guests that just might happen to be in town vacationing with their family or enjoying the beautiful harbor facilities on their boat. Whatever brings a person to Northern MI, if they are a musician, they are welcome and encouraged to join the band for their 6:30P.M. rehearsal followed by the 8:00P.M. concert in the park.

# Five Creative Ways to Use Containers in Your Landscape

Container gardens have long been used to add a spot of color by a front entrance or expand planting space in city lots, balconies and decks. Don't let past experience and tradition limit your vision. Try one or more of these attractive, fun and functional ways to include containers in your landscape, large or small.

Add vertical interest to any garden or garden space. Select a large attractive container filled with tall plants like papyrus and canna. Or elevate a small pot on steppers or an overturned pot for added height. Create height with smaller pots and plants by strategically stacking and planting them into a creative planting. Try setting any of these planters right in the garden to create a dramatic focal point.

Create a privacy screen or mask a bad view. Use an arbor or other support for hanging baskets and then place a few containers below for an attractive screen. Or create a garden of containers to provide seasonal interest using a variety of plants. Use trees, shrubs, and ornamental grasses for height. Save money by purchasing smaller plants. Elevate these on overturned pots for added height and impact. Mask the mechanics by wrapping the pots in burlap. Then add a few colorful self-watering pots in the foreground for added color and beauty. Fill these with annuals or perennials for additional seasonal interest.

Bring the garden right to your back door for ease of harvest and added entertainment. A self-watering patio planter, windowbox,

or rail planter reduces maintenance and makes harvesting herbs as easy as reaching out the window or backdoor. Plus, guests will have fun harvesting their own fresh mint for mojitos or greens for their salads.

Define outdoor living spaces within your landscape. Use containers as walls and dividers to separate entertaining and play areas from quiet reflective spaces. And consider using pots with built in casters or set them on moveable saucers to make moving these pots easier. This way you can expand and shrink individual spaces as needed simply by moving the pots.

Create your own vacation paradise. Use planters filled with cannas, bananas, palms and New Zealand flax for a more tropical flare. Add some wicker furniture to complete the scene. Or fill ver-

tical gardens, an old child's wagon, metal colander or wooden and concrete planters with cacti and succulents. Add some old branches and large stones. You'll feel as though you've hiked into the desert.

All you need is a bit of space and creativity to find fun new ways to put containers to work for you in the garden this season.



# Ellsworth Students Build Greenhouse

ELLSWORTH—Ellsworth Schools has constructed a greenhouse in the side yard of the high school to enhance their agriculture program.

The thirty by seventy foot hoop house was designed, built and organized by the students enrolled in a relatively new vocational agriculture program that gives students training in the field of Agri-science. The program covers areas of machinery, welding, and the plant and animal sciences and is closely affiliated with the new Ellsworth chapter of the Future Farmers of America which focuses on honing skills in leadership and business management.

Students are anticipating a ten month growing season and will raise flowers and vegetables to sell to local restaurants, farm markets and to the school itself. "Some of the vegetables we're growing here will be going back to feed the students," said Christopher Randall, Agriculture teacher.

The greenhouse will help the program which will be run like a business to become self sufficient and allow the program to be integrated into the middle school science program and the elementary school botany studies. One goal is to not use




Students Cody Brown, Luke Seaney, Kevin Eggers and Jake Neuman take a break from framing raised beds to pose for the camera.

any power at the hoop house which is designed to be self cooling. "If we can keep the soil over forty degrees, we can grow," said Randall.

The hoop house was an investment the students opted to make after a garden the class maintained last summer didn't yield anything but weeds. The plot of donated land next to the community park didn't have a

water source and the soil was poor. Both students and instructor are excited and confident that the size and location of the greenhouse will give a more successful yield. "I think it's going to be successful and a great contribution to our community," said Cody Brown, Agriculture stu-

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# Determination is Key to Surviving Life's "Curveballs"


June is the month for graduations. About 3.4 million students will graduate from high schools and more than 900,000 are expected to graduate from colleges and universities in the United States this year. More than 30% of adults age 25 and over have completed a Bachelor's degree. In Michigan, the rate of adults with at least a Bachelor's degree has risen to 35.6%.

Lisa O'Keefe had been out of high school for ten years and was raising seven children and stepchildren ranging in age from 15 years to 10 months when she decided to begin work on a nursing degree. She was working full time as a nursing assistant and attending classes.

In November 2005, eight weeks into her coursework, she was driving to work at 5 a.m. when hit by a drunk-driver. The driver of a large pickup ran a stop sign, struck her vehicle and left the scene. Nearly every bone on her left side was broken - collar bone, ribs, collarbone. left femur, forearm and hand. Her spleen was lacerated and pancreas bruised. She lost four units of blood and the total blood volume in her body is estimated at five units. Her broken front teeth were suctioned out of her trachea.

Four months later, after multiple surgeries and extensive physical therapy, she resumed classes. She graduated from the LPN program with honors in December 2006. She began work toward an RN degree, but she required a hip replacement in May 2007, three days after completing her first semester. Her doctors warned that her spine and hip wouldn't tolerate the long hours of standing and the heavy lifting. She continued work toward the RN for five years against medical advice, since it was her dream. She realized they were right. Her new reality was that her body would never be what it was before the accident.

Lisa's son, PJ graduated from high school this month. PJ was 10 years old when the accident hap-

pened. He blew out the candles on his eleventh birthday cake in Lisa's hospital room. Her throat was raw from having just had her breathing tube removed, so she wasn't able to sing Happy Birthday to him.

Lisa describes him as "determined." He needed an overload schedule to finish the courses and credits he needed to graduate. He got all A's and B's in his senior year courses. He has been playing baseball for a B league team and a 19 and under Legion baseball team. He is a pitcher and helped the Legion team win the State championship in 2011 he was the youngest player on the team.

He forfeited his high school baseball season in favor of helping a friend whose mother was ill. He ran errands, transported her four daughters to and from school and activities, babysat and did yard work around his classmate's house. He will be trying out for the Kansas City Royals later this month.

Lisa has had near-constant pain since November 2005. She wasn't able to live pain-free, despite several rounds of medication. "The pain I felt couldn't be healed by meds. What has finally helped me to feel

that I'm healing is raw foods, specific anti-inflammatory foods, lots of vitamin C and D, and forgiving my body and learning to love it through the pain."

She no longer takes pain meds, anti-depressants, and anti-anxiety meds - the first time since 2005. She manages pain with meditation and yoga, rest and an occasional aspirin. She now hopes to earn a degree in nutrition, in order to help others learn about the healing qualities of nutrition.

On the way to the graduation ceremony, Lisa was telling PJ how amazed she is with how he take life's difficulties in stride, and what a great trait that is to possess. PJ said, "I remember what my classmate Mitch said about baseball, and I apply it to life. Always expect the fastball, but prepare for the curveball."

She asked him what that meant. He said, "Anyone can hit a homer off of a sweet fastball, but you always gotta be ready for that wicked curve." Mother and son appear to both have perfected the ability to respond when life throws you curveballs!

# **Ellsworth Schools Superintendent Retires**

By Tina Sundelius

ELLSWORTH-In a short six years lifelong educator Lynn Aldrich Spearing took Ellsworth Schools from potential closings to a successful and state recognized district.

When Spearing came to Ellsworth in March of 2007 she stepped into a school suffering from declining enrollment and declining revenues. "We were struggling with declining enrollment as were all districts. It was imperative that we convince our community that our school was doing the best possible job of preparing our students for the future," To bolster the school Spearing supported the addition of some programming. They began by developing true middle school programming and instruction for sixth through eighth grade students as opposed to treating them as mini high schoolers, started the area's first vocational agriculture program and procured State approval for it (along with it they charted an FFA Chapter), began a broadcasting program, secured a grant to fund Club Lancer, a 21st Century Community Learning Center program which offered extended-day learning opportunities for students in grades K-8, began participation in the MiBLSi program, Michigan's Integrated Behavior and Learning Support Initiative which enabled the district to enhance the literacy skills of elementary students as well as the instructional skills of teachers, piloted multi-age programming at the elementary school, instituted a Farm-to-School lunch program, and a summer breakfast and lunch program. "We greatly expanded our free, on-site college offerings. Some students have been able to graduate as much as a vear early from college as a result of our collaborative relationship with Baker College and we were able to secure funding for our Little Lancer Pre-School and have maintained full enrollment since its incep-

One of Spearing's most effective accomplishments has been the institution of the Lancer Leap program. "We began the Lancer Leap for students in grades 6 to 12. Its purpose is to devote a short period of time at the end of the school year to special elective courses," said Spearing. Lancer Leap addresses the needs of two very specific groups: those who are behind or have not successfully completed this year's courses, and those who have met all of the learn-

tion," she said. As a result

ing objectives in their core classes and deserve a chance to take some demanding hands-on elective classes. Students who have struggled in one or more classes, as well as those that have failed a class, get a chance to get extra help and to get credit for the classes they have failed. All students get to take classes that enable them to hone their skills in math, science, English and social studies by engaging in hands-on instruction. Lancer Leap courses also offer students a chance to explore the areas in which they have interest such as: art, music, physical education, creative writing, photography, and wood-working. It is designed to take place only during the last month of the school year. "This year we won the MASA (Michigan Association of School Administrators) Winners Circle Award for our innovative Lancer Leap programming," she said.

Spearing also worked to strengthen the programs they had, upgraded many of the existing facilities and introduced new technology to the classrooms like IPads and smart boards. "We focused on some programs that would set us apart from others and tried to increase and improve our communication with our community," she said. "We nave been named one of the best schools by U.S. News and World Report and we have outranked others in our region in the State's top to bottom rankings."

She has worked in the field of education for the last thirty-nine years in one capacity or another. For a lifetime educator like Spearing, stepping away from the field won't be easy. "My husband, dad and I plan to remain in Ellsworth. Tom and I are both musicians and will continue to be active with local musical groups. Our kids and grand-kids live in Leelanau County so we hope to be more available to spend time with them. I will have the "Garage Sale of a Lifetime" sometime in July. Then I will consider my options for some sort of part-time employment in the field of education," she


