

County Agrees to buy the White House

CHARLEVOIX—County Commissioners heard excerpts from this year's annual report from the Area Agency on Aging and passed resolutions to allow for the purchase of the a historic house in Boyne City and repair a twenty year lease with the Health Department at the June 26 meeting.

The board authorized the county's land bank authority to purchase a piece of property and historic home at 417 Boyne Avenue in Boyne City known as the White house because it was built by William H. White, "the lumber baron of Boyne City," in the early 20th century, for \$85,143.09. The County will then sell the home to Northern Homes Community Development Corporation to be restored to its original 1903 exterior appearance and turned into four senior citizen apartments. The property will be purchased using \$65,000 in tax sales and the remaining \$20,000 will be paid for by the land bank. The house was converted into a five unit apartment building in the 1970's and has been abandoned since 2008.

The East Jordan City Marina is Open Next Step is to build diversion wall

EAST JORDAN—This year the state of Michigan had to literally dig most of the state's marinas and harbors out of potential ruin. Because water levels in Lake Michigan and Lake Huron are at all-time lows and are expected to continue dropping, the Michigan State Waterways Commission adopted an emergency dredging plan that provided zero-match grant funding opportunities for harbors of refuge, recreational boating harbors, marinas and boat launches most affected by the low water levels. But for the East Jordan Marina, the low water issue isn't the problem and since it is an economic catalyst for the city. Its importance to the community cannot be understated according to Parks Director, Tom Cannon.

"Our problem isn't just low water. It's the sediment issue from the Jordan River. Until the recent decade it wasn't that noticeable because the sedi-

ment was being distributed differently," said Cannon. Out of the nearly \$21 million the DNR Parks and Recreation Division spent toward keeping Michigan's waterways operational it redirected nearly \$8.8 million of Waterways funding from existing appropriations including a grant to assist in the construction of a diversion wall that would divert silt and sand entering Lake Charlevoix's South Arm. East Jordan City staff, City Commission and the Parks Department have been working to find a solution to the problem since 2006 but funds needed for the temporary fix of dredging have prevented a more permanent solution from coming to fruition. "We have been very proactive, attending lots of meetings and communicating with the Waterways Commission, we know these types of plans don't get done overnight," said Can-

Seven years of scrambling to prevent potential closure as a result of accu-

mulated bottom sediments Rocks piled to slow the influx of sand and silt from the Jordan River

that prevent adequate navigational depths has put a strain on the community. "Shutting down the marina is like shutting down another highway to downtown. It's hard to even put a number on how many dollars get pumped into the city from marina traffic," said Cannon. As a result the city has paid out as much as \$200,000 and as little as \$100,000 for dredging five times in the last seven years with state assistance

three of those years.

When a fifty/fifty grant from the Waterways Commission to build a steel sheet piling where an old wooden retaining wall built in the 90's once stood was approved, it seemed that a solution was finally found. Then the DNR took all of the 2013 infrastructure

grants to finance the emergency dredging. However, there is no need for the city to apply for the grant again. "We are at the top of their list, they are very much aware of what's

going on here," said Cannon. But to speed up the process the city has hired Gosling Cuszak, an engineering firm out of Traverse City, to complete the required engineering study.

Over 12,000 yards of sand was removed from the East Jordan harbor this year. Similar quantities have been removed five times in the last seven years.



"All the dredging is proof, even without an engineering study you could see we need a wall," said Cannon. But the grant has requirements that must be met and no one is willing to wait until the last minute to begin building once the funds become available. The longer it takes the more silt and sand pours into the marina and the more dredging will need to be done. Cannon expects the project to be complete sometime in 2014. "After the wall is constructed we are aware that future dredging will need to be done to keep the channels open but year to year the entire harbor won't need to be done," said Cannon.

approved lease and sublease agreements with the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. The health department has been located at 220 West Garfield Avenue in Charlevoix for the last twenty years and has either leased from the county or owned the building as a nonprofit periodically throughout that time. According to the lease they will continue to lease the building from the county for \$1,000 per month. The health department will then sublease a portion of that same building back to the county for the offices of the Charlevoix County Commission on Aging. The county will pay \$1,750 per month according to the sublease.

"This lease clears up a twenty year mess," said Kevin Shepard, Human Resources Coordinator who negotiated the agreement. All commissioners and Shepard commented on how distasteful the unavoidable agreement was. Both leases expire in February, 2016 with the county owning the building once and for all. The board's vote on the lease was 4-1, with Commissioner Chris Christensen voting against. The vote on the sublease was 3-2, with Commissioners George Lasater and Larry Sullivan voting against. "Somehow, something underhanded took place (over the years)," commented Commissioner Richard Gillespie after the meeting concerning the unusual relationship the Health Department has had with the property.

The Area Agency on Aging services 4,700 square miles in Northern Michigan and has been around for thirty-five years. "Northwest Michigan has the fastest growing elderly population in the state and they are the hardest to serve because of isolation and so on," said Bob Schlueter, Executive Director of the Area Agency on Aging. Schlueter's main message to the Commissioners was that new ways to work with key players in the health care industry needed to be explored and strength-





ening old relationships while developing new partnerships that would allow the agency to respond effectively to the increasing demands are priorities. "I've never seen so many things in flux and so many things coming down, everything is going in a good direction," he said. Schlueter discussed long term care support services and Meals on Wheels as well as the agencies provision of techni-

cal training. Service providers in Charlevoix County receive a total of \$615,727 from the commission, 7% of their total budget.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the County Commissioners will be held on Tuesday, July 10 at 9:30 A.M.

Nearly 1.4 million planning July 4th travel, reports AAA Michigan

Nearly 1.4 million
Michigan residents will
travel on vacation during
the upcoming Fourth of
July holiday, down about
one percent from last
year — due to the holiday
falling on a Thursday and
a day less than last year's
holiday period — reports
AAA Michigan.

Nationally, AAA projects 40.8 million Americans will travel 50 miles or more from home during the Independence Day holiday weekend, a 0.8 percent drop from last year. The Fourth of July holiday travel period is defined as Wednesday, July 3, to Sunday, July 7. This year, July 3 and 7 are expected to be the busiest travel days.

The anticipated dip in travel is due to a shorter holiday period. Last year, when the patriotic holiday was on a Wednesday, many travelers extended their vacation plans to a week or longer.

In Michigan, the July 4th holiday period is traditionally the busiest time of year for the iconic family road trip. This year, an estimated 87 percent of travelers will go by vehicle the same percent as last year, while five percent will fly and eight percent will go by bus or train. Those traveling by vehicle will find Michigan gas prices 11 cents higher than last year —\$3.81 (on June 20). The average distance traveled by Americans this Fourth of July holiday period is expected to be 613 miles, down 110 miles from last year and reflective of the shorter holiday. Median spending is expected to be \$747, on par with last year. Transportation is expected to consume some 29 cents of every dollar. Travelers expect to spend 20 percent on meals, and 22 percent on lodging.

Many travelers said they will stay with friends or family and visit beaches and outdoor events. Michigan state campgrounds, lakes and resort areas will be busy this holiday, with colorful parades, snap-crackle-pop fireworks and summer festivals drawing visitors to cities across the state. Among the largest festivals is Traverse City's National Cherry Festival, from June 29 through July 6, with some 500,000 visitors anticipated. Fishing derbies and boating activities add to the list of outdoor fun in many Michigan communities.

Those who opt to stay at AAA Three Diamond lodgings this holiday will find prices averaging \$164 per night. Weekend daily car rental rates will average \$58. According to AAA's Leisure Travel Index, airfares increased six percent, with an average lowest round-trip rate of \$228 for the top 40 U.S. air routes.

This holiday period, AAA Michigan will again partner with the Michigan State Police (MSP) in supporting Operation C.A.R.E. (Combined Accident Reduction Effort). Yellow banners will be posted at rest areas, with many sites offering free coffee and refreshments.

AAA reminds motorists to keep their mind on the task of driving. Michigan State Police report during last year's July 4th holiday period, four were killed in four traffic crashes. Although none of the crashes were alcohol-related, one crash involved a pedestrian, one motorist was unbelted and a motorcyclist and an ORV rider were not wearing helmets.

AAA's projections are based on economic forecasting and research by IHS Global Insight.

Fall Turkey Applications Available

LANSING - The Department of Natural Resources reminds hunters that applications for fall turkey hunting licenses are on sale from now through Aug. 1.

A total of 51,850 licenses are available; 5,150 general licenses that may be used on public or private land and 46,700 licenses for private land only. Eleven wild turkey management units, totaling 44,943 square miles, are open to fall turkey hunting during the Sept. 15 - Nov. 14 season, including most of the southern Lower Peninsula, Beaver Island, five counties in the northern Lower Peninsula and the entire Upper Peninsula.

'We are in the first year of a three-year period of stabilized regulations that were developed by working with turkey hunting groups," explained Al Stewart, the DNR's upland game bird specialist. "Regulations are generally similar to last year with the only change being the re-opening of turkey management units J, T and WA."

Hunters may apply for a turkey hunting license at any authorized license agent, at DNR Operations Service Centers or online

at www.michigan.gov/huntdrawings. The application fee is \$4. Drawing results will be posted online beginning Aug. 15.

If any licenses remain after the drawing, unsuccessful applicants may purchase one leftover license at any license agent or online for a one-week period beginning Aug. 19 at 10 a.m. (EDT). Any licenses that remain as of Aug. 26 at 10 a.m. (EDT) will be available for purchase over the counter by any hunter. The licenses will be sold until the quo-

Hunters have an additional opportunity to get a turkey license by applying for the 2014 Pure Michigan Hunt drawing. Each application is \$4, and hunters may apply as many times as they like. Three lucky winners will receive a hunt package that includes an elk, bear turkey, and antlerless deer license. For more information, go to www.michigan.gov/puremichiganhunt. Did you know that three U.S. Presidents died on the Fourth of July? John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe were three of America's leading men who left us on this day. Soon-to-open Joppa House to provide mentoring, housing for the homeless or those facing homelessness

There are people living in Northern Michigan who resemble Leigh Anne and Sean Tuohy, the couple made famous after taking in Michael "Big Mike" Oher. They welcomed the homeless boy into their home and helped place him on a path that led to Oher becoming an offensive tackle for NFL's Baltimore Ravens. The 2009 movie depicting Oher's experience is called "The Blind Side."

In Northern Michigan, the issue of homelessness is not one most people see. Yet, there are people opening their homes to women and children who have nowhere else to go.

Currently, while a young mother is going through substance abuse rehabilitation, a Charlevoix couple is caring for her two young sons—reassuring them of their mother's love and helping them adjust to a healthy routine. A soon-to-open shelter/transitional home in Charlevoix called Joppa House would be the perfect place for her to land when she's ready to take that next step back into society. She could live there with her sons while getting help to secure transportation, a job, and even confidence.

At another local home, a single woman is providing love and shelter to three girls—each of them strangers until she welcomed them through her door. She has already helped a mother with a baby successfully transition from her home to independence.

"Homelessness is such an epidemic here in Northern Michigan," said Ginger Stevens, Director of Joppa House and Third Day Fellowship, a sister ministry operating a food pantry and public gathering place in Charlevoix. "The economic downturn, underemployment and emotional or mental issues all contribute to the growing number of homeless women and children. They are often couch surfing—staying as long as they can with different friends or family—but they eventually run out of options and end up on the streets. There just aren't enough local shelters to meet people's needs."

According to the Michigan Coalition Against Homelessness, homelessness in six of eight regions in the state is decreasing, yet in Northern Michigan, it's increasing—from 4,329 families in 2010 to 4,486 families in 2011.

Joppa House will help women and children who find themselves homeless or facing homelessness. The shelter will use a basic life skills curriculum called Stepping Stones, which has been developed by Stevens and three professional social workers to train women in the skills they need to sustain independent living.

The shelter involves: Housing for up to 18 months. Onsite daycare.

Individualized counseling and personal goal-setting. Employment skills.

Connections for continued education.

Instruction in nutrition and cooking.

Mentoring in areas such as finances, budgeting, and schedul-

"We seek to assist families in bettering themselves and their life situations," said Doug Seaney, Board President.

Joppa House is supported by private donors and future resident contributions. Recently, an anonymous donor committed to a \$10,000 fund match to inspire other donors. Every \$1 donated between now and July 31 becomes \$2 through the match.

To date, there is less than \$50,000 of the original \$300,000 needed to complete renovations on the house, which is located at 801 State Street. The land and the original Catholic Convent House were both donated to Third Day Fellowship to serve as a regional shelter.

Joppa House, a Christian ministry, is a 501c3 non-profit organization open to people from all backgrounds and personal beliefs. Residents will be mentored and encouraged to make permanent lifestyle changes, but never expected to do so on their own.

"We hope and pray Joppa House will produce many productive citizens in our community," Stevens said. "This is a time for the church to step up and help take care of our people."

The Boyne City Police Department was assisted at the scene by the Boyne City Fire Department and the Charlevoix County Sheriffs Department.

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
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Something for everyone at this year's South Arm Classics

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

A live theater Production of "Poe's Last Night" featuring professional stage and film actor David Crawford will be presented in the gothic atmosphere of the King's Indoor Chapel at Castle Farms on July 9th at 7pm, two performances on July 10th – 4:30 pm and 7 pm, and a final performance at 7 pm on July 11th.

David Crawford developed the solo play "Poe's Last Night" portraying Edgar Allan Poe. The play débuted at the 2012 Edinburgh, Scotland, Festival Fringe. David presents seven of Poe's poems and stories that connect to his life and fascinating mind – ending in his last hours on the streets of Baltimore Maryland.

Following his death, Edgar Allan Poe, father of the modern mystery, was idolized by the French Symbolists for his romantic poetry. He brought depth to the tale of horror and was a literary critic and editor. Poe was his own most gripping mystery.

Reviews of the play have been excellent, including:

"Stunning story telling by American actor David Crawford, who as Poe himself took us from catacombs to chamber doors as the atmosphere whizzed through the hairs on our heads" Dark Chat.

David Crawford has been a professional actor since 1980 when he earned his Actors' Equity card playing First Murderer in a production of Macbeth. He immediately put his union membership to work, playing Friar Laurence in Romeo and Juliet at Three Rivers Shakespeare Festival, followed by nearly 200 other roles in American regional theater. Most recently he played Selig in August Wilson's Gem of the Ocean at the August Wilson Center in Pittsburgh, PA.

He had trained with the likes of Cecil Kitcat of Carnegie-Mellon University, who had trained with Maria Ouspenskaya, who had trained with Constantin Stanislavski, which puts him at Three Degrees of Separation from the legendary Russian master. Another of his teachers, Lilene Mansell, went on to fame as a voice and speech coach in New York and co-author of the acclaimed Speak With Distinction.

His film work reached a peak early on, with the role of Dr. James Foster in George Romero's zombie masterpiece Dawn of the Dead. That assignment, along with roles in several subsequent horror movies, have earned him appearances as a guest at horror conventions, where the talk often turns to such masters of horror as Edgar Allan Poe, and where Crawford was inspired to develop a solo show portraying Poe.

The result was a 50-minute production called Poe's Last Night, which debuted at the 2012 Edinburgh, Scotland, Festival Fringe. It was later expanded to an hour and 20 minutes.

For the past 12 years, he has worked as a coach and judge for Pittsburgh's Public Theater's Shakesperare performance contest. During part of the year, Crawford teaches acting at Civic Light Opera Academy in his home town of Pittsburgh. The Academy is a training ground for musical theater performers. Crawford has worked in regional summer stock playing Fagin in Oliver!, Pickering in My Fair Lady, Basingstoke in Jekyll & Hyde, and many others. This July, he will teach a pre-college class at Carnegie -Mellon University.

Stargazing at the Headlands with grand sextile

Explanations of celestial phenomena and solar maximum will be presented

July's First Saturday Stargazing Series at the Headlands International Dark Sky Park arrives with flair on Saturday, July 6, from 9 to 11 p.m. during an evening devoted to celestial phenomena that are sure to put a sparkle in the summer.

Headlands Program **Director Mary Stewart** Adams will explain the rare and historical planetary configuration known as a "grand sextile" that occurs this month involving seven planets. Additionally, aurora borealis photographer Shawn Stockman-Malone will speak to this year's solar maximum and tips on how to catch the northern lights.

"Both of these phenomena are the type of events you need to know about before you can see them, so this evening's program will be rich with information about how to do just that," said Adams.

Every 11 years the Sun goes through a cycle that includes an increase in the activity of sunspots, and the year 2013 is a solar maximum year.

"So far it's been a pretty low maximum, but things are about to get exciting and Shawn will tell us why," Adams said. "It is worth noting that Shawn is fresh from the wild success of her recent time-lapse video of the Northern Lights over Northern Michigan, called 'North Country Dreamland' which includes footage

from March 2013 of Comet PANSTARRS as it set over the horizon at the Headlands."

During her portion of the evening, Shawn will demonstrate how she masters her art. The evening's program will include an indoor presentation of Stockman-Malone's photography, followed by outdoor, naked-eye and telescopic night sky viewing. Meet at the Beach House first.

The program is free and open to the public and no reservations are needed. Even though it's summer, it's advised that guests dress warmly as it's typically cooler along the Lake Michigan shoreline than inland. And if you bring a flashlight, please be sure it has a red filter, as the white light of flashlights and smart phones disrupts the night vision.

The Headlands became the 6th International Dark Sky Park in the U.S. and the 9th in the world in May 2011, and each month free programs are held for the public. Visit www.emmetcounty.org for 2013 programs and more information about the park. The county sends regular email blasts as well with information about night-sky observation opportunities and celestial events; to register, use the contact information above. 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


