83rd Annual Venetian Festival

t's the "big town festival with the small-town appeal," and from Saturday, July 20h, through the following Saturday, the 83rd Annual Venetian Festival will once again bring an amazing amount of music, athletic competitions, games, beach parties, food, fun and of course, a boat parade and fireworks, to the city of Charlevoix.

"While the number and caliber of events we offer at the Venetian Festival is more typical of what one would find in large metropolitan area," observes Dan Barron, who has served as the president of the Festival for 15 years, "we have always worked very hard to make sure the festival keeps its local flavor. This has truly become a Charlevoix homecoming celebration over the years."

The Venetian Festival began back in 1930 with a small parade of candle-lit sailing vessels circling Round Lake harbor in a post race celebration featuring members of the Chicago and Belvedere Clubs. Little did those participants expect that eightyone years later that lighted boat parade tradition would continue as the closing ceremony for the annual Charlevoix Venetian Fes-





Erma Johanna Eichler, of Frankenmuth, and formerly of East Jordan, passed away on Friday, July 12, 2013, at Nottingham Assisted Care in Midland, Mich., at the age of 98 vears

Erma Johanna Gatzke was born on June 24, 1915, the third eldest child and second eldest daughter in a family of eight siblings, to Julius and Emilie Gatzke of Chicago, Ill. Erma attended primary school at Immanuel Lutheran School in South Chicago and excelled in mathematics and literary skills, eventually graduating salutatorian of her class before moving on to secondary school.

After secondary school, Erma found employment as an office administrator working for the renowned Chicago estate litigator, Balford Quintin Shields, located in the Commerce Clearing House building. Shortly thereafter. Erma met her eventual husband Fred Eichler while studying piano under their instructor, Clara Gose. Erma and Fred married on Sept. 2, 1939, and made their home in south Chicago, near their families. While in Chicago, Erma and Fred welcomed into the world their sons Thomas. Lawrence and Richard.

Erma, Fred and their new family vacationed with relatives in Northern Michigan and came to love the area. In the interest of getting out of the big city, they moved to Boyne City in 1953 and made their home on a farm located on Dietz Road. The farm was without electrical service or running water for the years that they resided there. Long-standing friendships were formed in their church family as Erma became the full-time organist at Christ Lutheran Church in Boyne City. Erma and Fred collaborated on many occasions as the organist/soloist at weddings that occurred at the church.

Erma participated actively in the church chapters of the Ladies Aid and LWML and saw to the education of all of their sons via the Walther League activity and confirmation classes.

In time, Fred found employment at the East Jordan Iron Works and the family moved to the farm at the intersection of Rannev and Nelson Road, where their youngest three sons, Paul, Robert and Gary, were born and raised. The family bolstered their income by actively operating a dairy farm, which required Fred and the boys who were old enough, to milk and tend to the cattle prior to going to work and school. Erma tended the farm while the men were away during the day, and pitched in with the farm chores when needed.

In 1967 as the youngest of her sons became of high school age, Erma decided to re-enter the outside work force and found employment at the T.W. Ellis of Boyne Ski Shop, as a sales associate. Erma was employed for 20 years at T.W. Ellis and earned a reputation as "The Lady Who Could Fix Anything That Needed Sewing," doing on the spot clothing repairs for skiers who visited the store.

The East Jordan farm was the oft time weekend getaway place for her sons and their families whether it being skiing at Boyne Mountain or in the summer hosting cross country camps for her coach-son Larry, during which she provided the cooking for the campers from his high school cross country team.

In 1987, Erma and Fred sold most of their East Jordan farm, and moved to 152 Reif St., in Frankenmuth, to live out their retirement and to be nearer their sons. They became members of St. Lorenz Lutheran Church while there and Erma actively participated in the Meals on Wheels program delivering meals to the elderly. More friendships were formed in Frankenmuth and other time was spent with the growing grandchildren who spent summertime weeks with Grandma and Grandpa and attended basketball camps and swimming lessons.

In 1993, Fred preceded Erma in death and she lived out the rest of her years until the age of 96 at the Reif Street home enjoying the company of friends and visits from her family.

Surviving are: sister, Martha Gatzke Danke, of Upland, Calif.; son, Thomas (Gerda), of Elizabeth City, N.C.; son, Lawrence (Karen), of Hartland, Mich.; son, Richard (Alice), of Aiken, S.C.; son, Paul, of Lakeview, Mich.; son, Robert (Patricia), of Midland, Mich.; son, Gary (Denise), of Novi, Mich.; 13 grandchildren, and 12 great-grandchildren.

The funeral service will take place at noon on Wednesday, July 17, at the Cederberg Funeral Home of Frankenmuth, 590 N. Franklin St. The Rev. Joel C. Kaiser will officiate, with burial to follow at St. Lorenz Cemetery. Erma's family will receive visitors at the funeral home from 10 a.m. until the time of service on Wednesday.

CHARLEVOIX—The Charlevoix Spa which has been tucked discreetly in the corner of the Oleson's plaza for the last two years has moved to a more prominent space in the chain.

Boyne City resident Brenda Lamb, the owner of the Charlevoix Spa has been in the pampering business for twentyfive years. "I was told you'd never make it in Charlevoix and it's been fantastic," she said. "If it wasn't for the public this great new space wouldn't be possible."


Lamb began her career in her hometown of Boyne City with a spa called the Body Shop on Maple Street where she was called to help others who were opening salons. Two years ago she opened the Charlevoix Spa and although business grew so quickly she out grew the 400 square foot space before her two year lease, she still had people entering the spa asking if she was new. "People who shop at Olesons every week would suddenly discover us," she said.

Lamb is a fully licensed cosme-

tologist but you can't get a haircut at the Spa. "This isn't the typical eight nail technicians under one roof with hairdryers going, odd smells and gossip," she said. When a client enters to take advantage of the natural nail manicures, pedicures, face and body waxing, facials, buffs and massages they are almost completely alone in the salon. "When they come in it's just them and we have a treatment room for complete privacy and relaxation," she

The spa's licensed Massage Therapist, Alyssa Themm, is now offering ten minute chair massages for five dollars. This is intended to allow people on their lunch hour to get some relief. "Most people go for a second ten minutes," said Themm. The pair often double team to give the ultimate pampering experience.

The treatment menu is always expanding from a sixty minute massage for \$50 to a house party where you bring the Champaign and a few friends, and pampering can begin either at the spa or, in the winter months, they'll come to you.



Lamb has a desire to see more seniors and men come to the spa. For seniors she will do house calls. "Sometimes they are in a lot of pain and discomfort and no one thinks to bring them to the spa, they end up at the foot doctor," she said.

dard hair salon and typical nail place. "Here it's one on one, there's no women sitting around watching and I don't use girly stuff," she said. Lamb knows that it is as important for women that their men are well groomed and relaxed as it is for men to have a well groomed and pampered girl. "It feels good to look good and

smell good, it makes you feel sexy," she said.

New Medicare Rules for Purchase of Diabetic Supplies

Effective July 1, 2013, Medicare will implement a new set of rules regarding the purchase of diabetic supplies. The supplies affected by this change include glucose meters, test strips, lancets, and glu-cose meter calibration fluid.

If beneficiaries intend to use a mail order vendor, they will need to get their diabetic supplies from a Medicare contracted provider. This is a new requirement in order for Medicare to participate in the payment for these items. People should not assume that their current or future mail order provider has a contract with Medicare. The contracts are for specific models of diabetic items. For example, if a beneficiary wants a particular glucose meter or certain brand of test strip, they will need to make that mail order purchase from a supplier who is authorized by Medicare to sell that specific item.

Medicare beneficiaries who prefer to purchase their diabetic supplies from a local

pharmacy or busi-ness need to ask that supplier two important questions as follows:

Will the vendor bill Medicare for the items?

Does the supplier accept Medicare assignment?

If they do not accept assignment, then the beneficiary could be responsible for an additional cost be-sides the normal 20% co-pay. Worse yet, if the supplier does not bill Medicare, then the beneficiary could be responsible to pay for the entire cost of the purchase.

Beneficiaries who decide to switch to another supplier will need to make sure that the new supplier has a valid prescription from their physician. This should be set up prior to July 1, so the transition is seamless and there is no delay in obtaining their diabetic supplies.

One of the main reasons for these changes is due to the large amount of Medicare fraud that is tak-ing place throughout the United States. Diabetic supplies, particularly test strips, are very expensive. These and other higher end durable medical equipment items are under

close scrutiny as a means to protect the Medicare Trust Fund. Also, by using vendors that have contracts with Medicare, it will save the taxpayers' money because it is generally cheaper to use those businesses.

If beneficiaries have a difficult time understanding these new rules, they can call the Medi-care/Medicaid Assistance Program (MMAP) and receive free and unbiased assistance concerning this or any other topic related to Medicare and Medicaid. A MMAP counselor can be reached by call-ing 800-803-

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

History of Charlevoix Series begins at library

The Charlevoix Public Library is pleased to announce a series of programs highlighting the history of Charlevoix. The series will be hosted at 6:30 PM on three Tuesdays. Kicking off the series on July 16, David Miles, Co-Director of the Charlevoix Harsha House Museum, will feature the History of Charlevoix's Business and Industry. Mr. Miles will present a chronological history of the industries and businesses that made their home in Charlevoix from 1869-present. Channels were cut to connect Lake Charlevoix to Lake Michigan in 1869 and it blossomed into one of the most important commercial venues in northern Michigan due to its proximity to the Lake Michigan shipping lanes as well as being blessed with one of the most protected natural harbors on the Great Lakes.

Charlevoix was the conduit through which flowed most of the business of this region when fishing, lumbering, and iron ore smelting ruled the commercial sector. At the end of the 19th century, Charlevoix handled more maritime tonnage than any other port on the east Lake Michigan shore out-

side Chicago. Then, on July 30, An Evening with Castle Farms will be presented by Linda Mueller, the owner of Castle Farms and Kathleen Paterka, Castle Farms staff writer. Attendees will journey back in time as the origins of Northern Michigan's very own fairy-tale castle will be traced. Built in 1918 by Albert Loeb, acting president of Sears and Roebuck Company, Loeb Farms was originally designed based on the architecture of the castles in France, and was constructed as a working model dairy farm to showcase farm equipment available in the Sears catalog. In later years, the property was used as an

artist's studio, and for a twenty- year period was rock'n roll venue.

Purchased by Linda Mueller in 2001, the Castle property has undergone a complete restoration, and is now listed on both the National as well as State of Michigan Historic Registries. Castle Farms was recently named by AARP to their prestigious list of one of the "Top-Ten Must See" Castles in North America. The evening's presentation will include a brief pictorial overview featuring rare black and white archival photos and contemporary color images accompanying a historical narration by Kathleen Paterka, followed by a lively question and answer period with Linda Mueller. Co-authors of the Castle's recently published biography, Linda and Kathleen will be autographing copies of For the Love of a Castle following the presentation.

To round off our History Series, Michigan's Vanishing Railroad Stations: Architecture, History and Sense of Place, will be presented by Michael H. Hodges on Monday, August 5. In his new book, Michigan's Historic Railroad Stations, Detroit News art critic Michael H. Hodges photographs and profiles 31 depots across the state, from Detroit to Three Oaks to Charlevoix and Petoskey. In this lecture and slideshow, Hodges traces the evolution of the train station and the range of styles architects employed to both tame and exalt rail transportation. Touching on news accounts, literature and film, Hodges also considers the central role the Charlevoix Depot once played as the nation's principal crossroads — a much-used, much-loved public space that has no real analog in American life today. Round Lake Books will be selling copies of the book that Michael will autograph.



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Historic Dilworth Hotel sold to Boyne City investor

The historic Dilworth Hotel in the heart of downtown Boyne City has a new owner.

Tall Pines Investment, a Boyne City company, purchased the 101year-old property on Saturday, July 13. Terms of the sale were not made public. The 27-room Dilworth Hotel has been closed for nearly five years and struggled for years prior to that. Signs of its physical deterioration were evident with parts of the cornice falling off, the front porch in need of repair and the grounds unkempt. Looking at the deterioration of the building led Bob Grove, a Boyne City resident and president of Tall Pines Investment, to inquire about the historic hotel.

"I would drive by and I would see it getting worse and worse," Grove said. "Everyone could see that if something wasn't done to preserve it, this beautiful historic building that has meant so much to Boyne City would be lost to the community forever. I didn't want that to happen. I love historic buildings. I know how important they are to a community. The Dilworth was, and will be again, a historic asset for the community to enjoy.'

Tall Pines Investment's immediate goal is to secure the property so no further deterioration occurs. That will include roof, window and porch repairs. There will also be improvements to the landscaping. While that work is in progress the company will be working over the next several months to explore how best to return life to the property in a longterm sustainable manner.

Tall Pines Investment worked closely with the Boyne City Main Street Program to learn more about the Dilworth opportunity and facilitate due diligence. Kirk Jabara of Fulcrum Partners, a Boyne City business advisory firm, provided significant technical guidance over many months to help make this transaction the reality it now is.

"The goal of this project is to return the Dilworth to its historic use as a hotel and restaurant," said Hugh Conklin,

manager of the Boyne City Main Street Program, "but much work has to be done before a final decision is made. The immediate goal at this time is to secure the building so there is no further deterioration and begin to make visible, if small, initial improvements to this historic structure. While that is underway, Mr. Grove will work to build the best team with the right skills to help make this property successful. He is committed to completing the renovation in the best possible way."

Boyne City City Manager Michael Cain expressed his pleasure with this new beginning. "This is a huge step forward for not only the Dilworth but for all of Boyne City. The potential the Dilworth has in again becoming an important economic engine for our community can not be understated. I have been very impressed in what I have seen in Mr. Grove so far. It appears that he has the resources, skills and

heart to do what is needed for the long term success of the Dilworth. I look forward to working with him in the months ahead as plans are developed to bring the Dilworth back to life."

The Dilworth opened in 1912 and has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places since the mid 1980s. In recent years renovating the property has been identified as one of the

top community goals. A feasibility study funded through a Michigan Economic Development Corporation planning grant and the Main Street Program, was completed on the property in 2011 and provided valuable information for this transaction. No grant money or public investment is being used for the purchase of the Dilworth although the Main Street Program will help to secure all local and state incentives available to the renovating the Dilworth, Conklin said.

"This is great news for our community," said Boyne City Mayor Ron Grunch. "Mr. Grove's commitment to Boyne City and his investment in our community are very much appreciated. We are excited to work with Mr. Grove and we will do everything we can as a city to help make the project successful."

The Dilworth Hotel is one of the few buildings still standing that is constructed from bricks manufactured by the Boyne City Brick Company, according to documentation from the city's National Historic Register application, which was approved last December. The building received renovations and updating

over the decades, most often associated with changes in ownership, during the 1940s, the 1960s and the 1980s.

"The restoration of the Dilworth will be a tremendous economic boost for Boyne City. It will serve as a catalyst for our downtown, increase pedestrian traffic, vastly improve the entry into downtown, and will provide needed hotel accommodations," Conklin said.

The Wolverine Dilworth Hotel resulted from the vision of city fathers who desired first-class accommodations for visitors to the city, according to information published in "Settlers to Sidewalks in Boyne City," a history of Boyne City by Robert Morgridge. The Boyne City Hotel Co. was composed of 46 shareholders, and its directors read like a who's who of Boyne City's commercial elite: W.H. White was president and majority shareholder, and other directors included his business associates, William Martin and Ervan A. Ruegsegger. The grand hotel was constructed with locally-produced bricks from Boyne City Clay Products Co., and \$40,000 had been expended by the time of the grand opening, attended by 240 patrons, on February 1, 1912. It is the only surviving large hotel from Boyne City's lumber era.

In 1935 it was renamed the Dilworth Hotel after it was purchased by Wesley Dilworth. During the 1930s and 1940s it was the site of the Smeltania Ball and fish dinner that culminated the three-month long fishing event held annually during the heyday of lake and river smelt runs. Dilworth sold the hotel by the mid-1940s, but it retained its reputation for serving the area's best food and remained a favorite dining spot. The Wolverine-Dilworth was the place to stay when visiting the area through the mid-twentieth century, and among other guests, Ernest Hemingway is reputed to have stayed here.

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
