#### Looking at the future of the **East Jordan Senior Center**

CHARLEVOIX —The Charlevoix County Board of Commissioners advised representatives from the East Jordan senior center advisory board, passed two resolutions and made one appointment to the Planning Commission at the Wednesday, August 14 meeting.

Butch Frye, with the East

Jordan senior center advisory board, approached the commission to discuss options for assistance with the purchase of a \$29,900, five and three-quarters acre pie of property located within East Jordan city limits. The property already has natural gas, city sewer and water on it and would be the site of a new senior center. The present senior center located on the corner of Mill and Main Streets is owned by the city of East Jordan and will not be rented to the senior center when their lease expires in September of 2017. "I'm just trying to get my ducks in a row," said Frye who is hoping that addressing the issue early will make for a better facility in the future. "I want to do it once and do it right, we have a lot of baby boomers coming," he said. The commissioners gave Frye advice on how to walk through the process of presenting the need and who to present it to. The senior center recently received its nonprofit status, which means it can begin raising funds to help purchase the property but that takes time, Frye hoped to receive some funds from the county to secure the property. "This is a really, really nice piece of property, I'd hate to lose it," he said. Even though Bryan Graham, civil counsel for Charlevoix County, said contributing to

## Lakes are clear of Invasive Species

ELLSWORTH—Banks Township Clerk made an announcement that the lakes were clear of invasive species and a contract for treatment of Phragmites was signed at the August 19 meeting of the Banks Township Board.

Township Clerk Donna Heeres announced that a representative from the lake and management corporation that treated Six Mile Lake for the invasive weed Eurasian Milfoil found nothing but native plants in Lake Ellsworth, Lake St. Claire and Wilson Lake. Heeres

said the representative from PLM went over the entire lakes in a boat and said there was no Eurasian Milfoil. However, there are a lot of native plants in the lake that can be legally treated by property owners who can contact the corporation individually. "That's the benefit of being downstream," said Heeres.

The township has been treating the six and a half miles of Lake Michigan shoreline in the township for the invasive weed, Phragmites for five

years. "There's a whole lot less Phragmites out there, the hope is that we can skip spraying

next year," said Heeres. The contract was awarded to Luke Britton who has treated for the township in the past. "He is very cautious to not have overspray on the native plants," said Heeres. Zoning Administrator Andy Veenstra explained that the township Phragmites spraying was a pilot program. "We had no idea if they could kill it or not," he said. Where there used to be solid masses of Phragmites there are now only spores and immature plants.

In an ongoing discussion of hall renovations, board members are arranging a list of improvements for the hall in

order of importance. The list isn't complete but discussion of putting bathrooms upstairs, making the building handicap accessible, insulating and updating the lighting as well as acquiring the property adjacent to the building for an addition that would accommodate a kitchen and bathrooms in the hall area upstairs and a courtyard which would make the hall a more desirable site for wedding receptions. The empty lot next to the hall is priced at \$59,000. "There are a lot of improvements that could be made to the hall for \$59,000," said Trustee David Rasmussen

who also stated at the meeting that an elevator to accommodate elderly guests was "not out of the question." All of these improvements must be completed without losing the historical integrity of the building and will eventually put into a multi year plan.

The next meeting of the Banks Township Board will be held on September 23 at 7 P.M.

In recognition of the unique character of Northern Michigan grapes, awards were presented for wines made using Northern Cold Hardy grape varieties as well as wines made from the traditional European varietals. Competing wineries included Mackinaw Trail Winery, Seasons of the North, Crooked Vine Vineyard and Winery, Pleasantview Winery, Harbor Springs Vineyards and Winery, Cellars of Royal Farms and hobby vintners, David Short and Christine Engle.

In the American Varietal Cold-Hardy Red wines, Mackinaw Trail Winery took double gold with Big Red; Seasons of the North received a gold and silver for their Cabin and Northbound respectively and Crooked Vine Vineyard and Winery claimed a bronze for their Marquette

In the American Varietal Cold-Hardy White wines, Crooked Vine Vineyards was awarded a double gold for their Frontenac Gris; Seasons of the North received a gold award for Burt Lake Breeze and a bronze for River's Edge and Pleasantview Winery claimed a silver medal for Moonstruck.

In the European Varietal Red wines, Mackinaw Trail Winery received a double gold for their Cabernet Franc 2011, a gold for their Cabernet Merlot 2011 and a silver for their Syrah 2010.

In the European Varietal White wines, Mackinaw Trails took a double gold for their Late Harvest Riesling 2012; Harbor Springs Vineyards and Winery received a gold for both their 2012 Pinot Gris and Chardonnay 2012 (tie) as well as a silver for their Semi-Sweet Riesling and the Cellars of Royal Farms received a bronze for Breezeway.

In the Fruit category, David Short, a hobby vintner, took a gold for his Raspberry wine, while Mackinaw Trails received a double gold for their Razzberry, a silver for Blackberry and a bronze for Blueberry.

In the Dessert wine category, Christine Engle, a hobby vintner, received a gold for her Maple wine, while Harbor Springs Vineyards and Winery took a double gold for Cherry Finale.

Judges of this year's competition were Robert Waugh with the Straits Area Grape Growers Association, Mark Ganchiff with Midwest Wine Press, Vern Hiar with Neath the Birches, Phil Parr with Inn at Bay Harbor, Robin Krause with Glen's North Fresh Market, Chris Bryant of Boyne Highlands, and Deanna Alfredo and Erik Bauss of Tee-to-Table. The judges rated the wines on six criteria: visual, aroma, texture, taste, finish, and price point.

Following the awards presentations, guests sampled wines offered by competing wineries and food donated by area restaurants.



## What term does he need?

Dear Dave,

I'm 24 years old, and I have a wife and child. We've been following your plan, and I'm about to buy life insurance. Should I get a 20- or 30-year term policy?

Derek Dear Derek,

I think the big question is how long will you need this life insurance. If you and your wife are planning on having more kids in the next 10 years, I'd suggest a 30-year policy. That could put you in a situation of being 34 years old with a new baby. That's not old by any means, but your wife will need 20 years' worth of coverage if this happens, because you'd want the kids grown and out of the house before the insurance term runs out.

But that's just one of your financial goals at this point. You also want to be debt-free. And you need to ask yourself some other questions. Are you going to have your house paid for 15 years from now? I sure hope you didn't take out more than a 15-year mortgage. Are your kids going to be grown and gone by then? Are you going to have a big pile of money in the bank by then? In other words, where are you going to be at the end of the term?

If 15 years from now you have \$700,000 in your retirement account, your house is paid for, and the kids are out on their own, then, if you die, your wife will be fine, financially speaking. But at that time, if you still have kids in the house and your home isn't

paid off, then you'd probably need a 20-year policy. That's how I would look at

That's how I would look at it. How much longer are you going to need life insurance?

## Buying a house with 403(b) money

Dear Dave,

Should I take advantage of a 403(b) withdrawal in order to buy a house?

Bryan

Dear Bryan,

I wouldn't do that because it really doesn't accomplish anything. The only money you can take out is what you've put in, and any growth you've experienced has to stay in there. Basically, it's a retirement plan, and I wouldn't monkey around with retirement money to buy a home.

My advice is to make sure you're debt-free and you have three to six months of expenses set aside in an emergency fund. Once you've taken care of those issues, you can pile up a bunch of cash in a money market account toward the purchase of a home. You won't earn a lot of money, but it's a safe place to park your cash when you're saving up for a big purchase.

When it comes to saving and investing, I'm a big fan of mutual funds. The problem in this scenario is that if you start sticking money in mutual funds, then the market is down when you're ready to buy, you could've lost some money. That's not the route I'd want to go if I'm in your shoes, Bryan. I'd forego the opportunity to make money in order to keep it safe for this goal.

#### MEDC announces farmers market grant winners



the senior center with county funds is legal the commissioners were hesitant to commit any funds right away. "We must be very careful," said commission chair Joel Evans. "If indeed we give to East Jordan, we have to give to Boyne City. I think we need to do some research." Suggestions were made to consider a millage to raise funds, turning to funding sources like the Charlevoix County Community Foundation or the Frye foundation. The commission on aging leases the building from East Jordan for a nominal fee and in turn has paid for \$140,000 in repairs of the building. That money comes from Charlevoix County, said Evans. Shirley Gillespie, executive director of Charlevoix County's commission on aging accompanied Frye and gave her support. "I think it's a great idea. It could resolve so many issues we're facing right now," said Gillespie.

A resolution renewing an inter-governmental agreement between the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office and the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians

was approved. The agreement is renewed every four years, and allows for mutual law enforcement assistance between the tribe and the county. The county has the same sort of agreement with the Lit-

tle Traverse Bay Band also. A second resolution to acquire credit cards for each county department was also passed. "Credit card usage has become much more prevalent, so many places won't let you do anything without one," said county clerk Cheri Browe. Presently the various departments within the county have shared cards. It has been difficult to track charges in a timely manner against each department's receipts causing the expense of service charges. "If they are not turning in the receipts in a timely manner it is impossible to know who to charge the interest to," said Browe.

Finally, the board appointed Ron Van Zee of Charlevoix to the planning commission. Van Zee will be filling the vacancy caused by the death of Tom Wieland who served on the Charlevoix County Planning Commission for 46 years, and died after a battle with cancer in June.

The next scheduled county commission meeting is set for Wednesday, August 28 at 7 P.M.


