


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# WELCOME, ANDY SNEDDON

# Award-winning journalist joins **County News staff**

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NORTHERN MICHIGAN -Charlevoix County News Publisher, Dave Baragrey, has announced the addition of award-winning journalist Andy Sneddon to the editorial staff of the County News and Weekly

Sneddon, 46, of Alanson will be covering sports with a focus on the schools in the northern region of the paper's large distribution area, including Petoskey, Cheboygan, Charlevoix, Inland Lakes, Pellston, Onaway, Alanson and Mackinaw City, among others.

Sneddon is a familiar name to area readers and a familiar face to prep sports fans. He previously served as a sportswriter at the Petoskey News-Review from 1999 to 2006 and then as sports editor of the paper from 2006-2012. "I'm very happy to join the staff

at the Charlevoix County News and Weekly Choice," he said on Monday. "I'm very familiar with

many of the communities in its coverage area, particularly Petoskey, Charlevoix and Cheboygan, and have enjoyed working with the coaches and administrators at those schools for a long

Sneddon, who earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in journalism and communication from Oakland University in 1990, has also served as sports editor of the Cheboygan Daily Tribune and the Sault Evening News and was on the staff of the Macomb Daily as a sportswriter in 1997 and '98. In addition, his work has appeared in the Detroit Free Press, the Detroit News, the Traverse City Record-Eagle and the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) website.

The native of Ferndale, Mich. has drawn praise and commendation through the years for his colorful and creative writing style and his accurate reporting as well as his warm personality and excellent relationships with coaches, players, parents and fans. He has won more than two dozen state and national awards during his journalism career, including several for sports feature writing and sports columns.

His years of service in northern Michigan have given Sneddon a unique insight into community values as viewed through the prism of high school sports.

# Civil War statue refurbished

BOYNE CITY - A group of Boyne City natives spent months and one Sunday morning to create an attraction to honor local and nation United States military veterans.

The project, which took three months to plan and six hours on a Sunday morning to complete, involved the Civil War memorial statue in Maple Lawn cemetery in Boyne City. The memorial statue was erected in 1916 in honor of Civil War veterans.

The project involved cleaning up the monument, adding two new lights, a flag pole and flag and electrical wiring running from a maintenance shed in the center of the cemetery to the statue.

Over the years, the statue had growths and dirt build ups that caused the monument to look far older than it actually is. After some research, the project organizers, who wish to remain anonymous, found products and cleaned that statue. From afar, the text engraved in the monument is hard to read, but overall the Civil War memorial


looks as if it were built that day. Organizers also cleaned up a number of graves directly sur-

rounding the statue. While the statue is nothing new, the addition of lights and the flag pole are new to the area. One of the lights is pointed at the Civil War memorial while the other is directed to the American flag, flying in the wind.

Additionally, an electrical outlet was added to one of the lights to be used during Memorial and Veteran Day services if there should be speaking events requiring audio equipment.

For the project organizers, finishing the project took six hours on a September Sunday morning. From 7 a.m. to 1 p.m., a small group of Boyne City citizens took to the cemetery to finish the project. Due to graves being in the way, the organizers were forced to trench down along the roadway in the cemetery and then follow the fence to bypass all the graves to the lights at the memorial statue.

About three months went into planning for the organizers to com-



plete this simple, yet honorable project. After raising funds through donations, they had to obtain equipment and tools necessary to carry out their plans.

A number of local figures and groups donated money to the project, which had a total cost of about \$1,500.

Donations form area businesses and individuals helped make this possible including ACE Hardware, American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, Ed's Electrical, Boyne City Area Veterans Memorial Committee, George Lasater and the City of Boyne City plus other anonymous donors.

# East Jordan welcomes fall with a bright outlook

EAST JORDAN—East Jordan city commission looked to the future at Tuesday evening's meeting as Mayor Peck presented his State of the City address.

Highlighting the city's ongoing efforts to think collaboratively, practice fiscal responsibility, invest in long-term infrastructure, and participate in Placemaking and quality of life improvements within the community, Peck discussed how the city has worked toward making East Jordan a better place to live, work, and enjoy leisurely activities over the past

"The city's EMS Department continues to face budget difficulties due primarily to reduced Medicare reimbursements, and increased number of people without insurance, and increased fuel and maintenance costs for our aging ambulance fleet," said Peck. "In response to these difficulties, the city is working collaboratively with the six townships in our service area to create an EMS Authority, which would be a separate entity governed by representatives appointed by its member governmental units."

Peck also drew attention to the diligent work that went into balancing the 2013-14 fiscal year budget and the efforts that are still being made to increase the general fund reserves.

"This year saw the completion of a large street reconstruction project on Division Street," said Peck. "The city secured state and federal grants to cover approximately \$240K of the \$300K needed for construction."

Other improvements within the city include the replacement of deteriorated sidewalks throughout town, the dredging of over 9,300 cubic yards of sand and silt from the harbor, the installation of highefficiency light fixtures at the harbor, and the new "single-stream" recycling collection program.

Looking to the future, the city will be installing a custom rack to store kayaks, canoes, and bicycles at the current boat launch after receiving a micro Placemaking grant. at 7 pm. The new rack will allow users to

secure their vessels, paddles and equipment while they enjoy a meal at one of our downtown restaurants or explore the nearby parks," said Peck Preliminary designs and funding

strategies for future waterfront upgrades at the Tourist Park are also underway, commented the Mayor, as well as a proposed new restroom facility at Elm Pointe. "Overall, this past year has seen

much progress in developing the kind of community we envision for both current and future generations," said Peck. "Indeed, East Jordan's future is quite bright, and we're not just talking about the new lights at the marina!"

The East Jordan city commission also approved discounted camping rates at Tuesday's meeting for the Tourist Park campground. The 4th Annual Pumpkin Festival will take place Saturday, October 19. For that weekend only, camping rates will be discounted by 50%. From Friday, October 18 until Sunday, October 20, full hook-up sites will cost only \$17, pop-up sites with cable \$15, pop-up sites without cable \$12, and tent sites only \$9.

The city is also offering a fall pickup free of charge from October 14 through October 25. City residents may deliver grass clippings and leaves in city bags or by the loose load to the transfer station located at 700 Nicholls Street on Tuesdays and Saturdays. For street collection, only biodegradable yard waste will be collected, and all clippings and leaves must be placed in biodegradable bags. Bags must be set adjacent to the street, not within the street area. For more information, call city hall at (231) 536-

In closing at Tuesday's meeting, City Administrator Chris Yonker encouraged the public to take a fall color tour from the sky, rather than the road. The East Jordan Rotary Club will be hosting airplane rides on Saturday, October 12, departing from the East Jordan airport on M-32. A rain date is set for Saturday, October 19.

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# Parent Support Partner helps families navigate "Back to School" season

The new school year is already well underway, but some families may still be struggling to establish their routine. According to Megan Cole, Preschool Team Social Worker for Char-Em ISD, it's normal for the transition to be an ongoing source of anxiety and stress for young kids and families.

"Every member of the household is affected during 'back to school' time," Cole observed. "Whether it's a preschooler's first year, or they are returning to structured school schedule, it can be a difficult adjustment for both the child and for his or her parents. There tends to be less of a formal schedule during the summer, so the start of school means that routines at home must change, which may be hectic for everyone."

Cole explained that structure is important to preschoolers. Parents should emphasize the positive and establish comfortable routines that include nightly preparation for the next day, a set sleep schedule, and a healthy breakfast. While it's normal for young children to have some 'back to school jitters', parents may want to seek additional support if their child starts to display physical symptoms like headaches or stomach aches, or if they are displaying disruptive behaviors at home or at school.

"Families who are struggling with adjustment to preschool and

whose children are having behavior issues can get free support from a Parent Support Partner," Cole advised. "The Parent Support Partner is a peer parent who has overcome challenges and obstacles to provide her or his own child with a positive, supportive environment, and is available now to help." She added that parents who work with Parent Support Partners tend to feel less isolated, more confident, and better able to cope with challenges for the child at school and at home.

Parents interested in working with a Parent Support Partner can get more information through the Health Department of Northwest Michigan's Early Childhood Behavioral Health Initiative. The program makes free parent support available to parents of children age 0-5 in Charlevoix, Emmet and northern Antrim Counties. # **Residents Voice Frustration with Roads**

ELLSWORTH—-Residents of Lakeshore Drive spoke out at the Banks Township Board meeting Monday, September 23 voicing frustrations concerning an ongoing problem of poor road conditions in spite of recent attempts to resurface the road by both Antrim and Charlevoix Counties. The board also approved a letter of consent to share in the expense of an ambulance upgrade and approved the townships updated master plan.

Lakeshore Drive was resurfaced with a lime based product called Afton stone last fall in a collaborative effort of Charlevoix and Antrim counties. A spokesman for the twenty-nine year round residents that live on the road which spans the Lake Michigan shoreline from near the Banks Township Day Park to Fisherman's Island State Park, told the board of concerns about the difference in appearance and durability of the road from one county to the next. "You can drive across it and literally see a color change," said resident Robert Dutcher. Township Supervisor Thomas Mann explained what he had been told by road experts that one end of the road is surrounded by more wetlands than the other and unless it

was widened good drainage would be impossible. Dutcher described one end of the road as sticky and washed out while the other remained in good condition. He also told of Charlevoix County maintaining their end having it grated five times this summer and Antrim only grating twice. "We were told not to expect more from a dirt road but if this is the case why does Charlevoix County feel the need to take such good care of their end of the road? If they were maintained in the same fashion would we have these problems?" he asked. Photographs brought by the residents to the meeting showed that there were no bumps and pot holes on Charlevoix County's side and Antrim County's end that was grated just three days prior was in much different condition. The board agreed to talk to the county road commis-

tion as to what can be done to remedy the problem. The Board approved the master plan. According to Trustee Tom Cooper the township's representative to the planning commission who spent six months updating the plan, "There were no major

The township pays \$8500 annually to have EMS service provided by the city's ambulance service but according to Mann the financially distressed service has used the annual fees for personnel and basic operations and no equipment upgrades have been made in a long time. The letter commits the township to \$5000 per year for four years. Banks will be one of six other townships sharing in the expense with the city.

The board discussed how unhappy they were with improvements made to the corner of South Dennis and Essex Roads. The road seems to be too shallow and drivers tend to cut the inside corner causing gravel to cover the road. "It was a safety concern, they didn't address the safety concern," said Trustee David Rassmussen. They agreed to hold the remaining payment until they could talk to the road commission.

Village President Hugh Campbell told the board that there is now a computer application that covers every activity happening in the 231 area code. Exp 31 is an app for Iphone and can be viewed at.

The next Banks Township board meeting will be held on Monday, October 21 at 7 P.M.

# Using Meditation to "Be Happy Again"

Meditation refers to any of a range of practices that emphasize periods of quiet thoughtfulness. Transcendental meditation is one of the most popular forms; mindfulness meditation is another. There are Zen, Taoist, and Buddhist meditative techniques. Prayer is another form of meditation. The goal of any of these approaches is to quiet the mind and reduce stress.

Extensive research has found a relationship between meditation and reduced stress and anxiety, reduced depression and insomnia. Physical benefits have also been found, such as: reduction in pain, reduced blood pressure, cardiovascular disease, reduced resting heart rate, cholesterol, congestive heart failure, metabolic syndrome (pre-diabetes), hospitalization rates, decreased medical care usage and hospitalization; and increased longevity in the elderly. Meditation can also help you to look better, as it promotes youthful skin and a youthful appearance. Meditation is related to cognitive benefits, such as: improved memory. moods, creativity, productivity and intelligence. Research in workplaces has found that practicing TM for three months was related to improved work and

personal relationships and increased personal and professional satisfaction.

Nancy Beaver began meditating regularly in 2008. Her son, Brian, died in January, 2007, at age 27, leaving his wife, Kristi, to raise their son, Aidyn and pregnant with twins. Nancy has two daughters, Lisa and Jess. Brian's older sister. Lisa, had survived a serious car accident in 2005.

Six months after his death, she was looking for answers. She recalls, "After 2 major incidents with my children, Lisa's accident and Bri's death, I needed to find answers, and peace. My identity was so wrapped up in the well being of my children, I needed to find myself again. I asked myself, 'who was I before I was a mom?' I set out on a journey of self-discovery. I needed healing. "

"In my search for answers, I read many many books, especially those written by Wayne Dver, John Edwards, and Jerry and Esther Hicks. All of them recommended meditation. I bought and used meditation CDs by each of these authors, and found I like the one by Jerry and Esther Hicks the best," Nancy ex-

She meditates daily. "Every day, after my morning coffee, I sit in my yoga room, in my father-inlaw's chair (whom I've never met,

he passed a few years before my husband and I started dating). On the back of the chair, is a quilt made by her grandmother, a wedding gift to her in 1974. "I listen to my meditation CD and focus on my breathing for 15 minutes."

She feels the daily practice helps to center her. "It prepares me for my day. It helps me to remember that I am in charge of my life. I choose what I think about, how I feel, the intentions I

set. It's all up to me. Starting my day this way sets me on a path of empowerment. Meditation is about quieting my mind, focusing on my breathing, thinking of nothing else, to allow my natural well being to flow. I personally believe that well-being is natural to us, and we muddy it up with worries and habits of negative thinking. "

"My recommendation to people just starting out would be to trust in the well being that is

natural to them, and find a method that allows that well being to flow. Some may prefer to listen to soft music, focus on a flickering flame, or listen to the purring of a kitten. The key is to focus on relaxing and quieting your mind, without falling asleep, she explains. "I have recommended meditation to people who appear to be struggling with worry and stress, but I find that many people are task oriented. They have come to believe they need to focus on issues and take action. Practicing meditation has helped me to feel centered and empowered even in a stressful environment. I can more easily maintain my focus and not get pulled into the negativity and chaos that may be occurring around me. '

It may sound too easy. Sitting quietly a few minutes a day, breathing deeply, without concentrating on any specific thoughts, can relieve stress, improve productivity, even find happiness after incredible loss. With so much to gain, what do you have to lose, but a few minutes of your

# Confused about Affordable Care options?

#### The Health Department is set to Enroll Northern Michigan

OCTOBER 1 - Amid the controversy and uncertainty of health care reform, the Health Department of Northwest Michigan has one clear objective: To help people across Northern Michigan navigate the complex but important process of enrolling in the Health Insurance Marketplace, which opens for business this week.

Twenty percent of adults age 19 to 64 in Northern Michigan are uninsured, second only to the number of uninsured residents in the Metro Detroit region of the state. Thanks to funding from the Northern Health Plan (NHP) and Michigan Consumers for Healthcare (MCH), the Health Department has launched Enroll Northern Michigan, an initiative comprised of outreach, education and enrollment activities, with a goal to enroll 50 percent of the region's low-income, uninsured individuals in the Health Insurance Exchange and Medicaid by September 2014. As part of the initiative, all staff members in the Health Department's toll-free call center have completed the training to become Certified Applica-

tion Counselors (CACs) to assist people with the enrollment process. They are available Monday through Friday, 8am-5pm by calling (800) 432-4121. One-on-one appointments for enrollment assistance, as well as small group classes, will become available in late October in local Health Department offices. Meanwhile, individuals and small businesses are encouraged to visit www.healthcare.gov for answers to common questions, and to learn about the enrollment

In addition, the Health Department is supporting agencies across Northern Michigan, including hospitals, Federally-qualified health clinics and others, who are gearing up to provide enrollment assistance. Pat Borowiak, Public Health Supervisor for the Health Department, has completed the extensive training required to become a "Navigator" - someone trained to help consumers, small businesses and their employees as they look for health coverage options through the Marketplace, including completing eligibility and enrollment forms.

"As the Health Insurance Marketplace goes live, we urge everyone to take their time in deciding which option will best suit their needs," said Pat Fralick, the Health Department's Director of Family and Community Health. "We're here to help." About half the uninsured will be eligible for the Healthy Michigan Plan, expected to be available in April 2014. Enrollment in the Health Insurance Marketplace is open between October 1, 2013 and March 31, 2014. Visit www.healthcare.org or call the Health Department at (800) 432-4121 for more informa-

# **Building Better Bones focuses on** Osteoporosis prevention

Osteoporosis can be a silent disease, one that causes the thinning of bones, which then causes bones to become fragile and more likely to fracture.

"It's a disease that people often don't realize they have until they fracture their hip, wrist, or ankle," said Linda Linari, RN, BSN, ONC, an orthopedic nurse clinician with McLaren Northern Michigan.

Linari will share information on osteoporosis prevention and treatment during the "Building Better Bones" class. It will take place from 6 – 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday, October 9 at the John and Marnie Demmer Wellness Pavilion and Dialysis Center located at 820 Arlington Avenue in Petoskey.

The program is free and open to all individuals interested in the prevention, early diagnosis, and treatment of osteoporosis. Bone biology, bone density testing, treatment options, nutrition instruction, exercise, and fall/fracture prevention will be discussed.

Linari, who will provide an overview of osteoporosis, will be joined by presenters Janet

Havens, a registered dietitian, and physical therapist, Anne Grimmer.

"(Anne) will go over exercises you can do to strengthen muscles, which strengthens bones and increases bone density, and ways to keep yourself safe so you don't injure your back, or slip and fall," Linari

Havens will educate attendees on making proper dietary choices to increase calcium intake. "And she will go over reading labels. There's a lot of information on food labels and it can be confusing. She will discuss how to read the labels appropriately," Linari said.

Women and men, particularly the elderly, can both suffer from osteoporosis, she added, though it does more commonly affect women.

"It's a disease we can prevent, or one that we can halt the progression of with appropriate medications and education," Linari said.
