November 12th Local citizens and 28 members of the 2014 East Jordan High school senior class attended the annual State of the Community event at the Harvest Barn where town officials discussed the triumphs and needs of the community.

The East Jordan Chamber of Commerce hosted the event with 5 speakers including; superintendant of East Jordan schools Jon Hoover, Sarah Christensen of the Northern Lakes Economic Alliance, Sylvia Walworth of the East Jordan River Arts Council, Kim MacMaster, wife of State Representative Greg MacMaster and Chris Yonker, East Jordan City Administrator.

The event opened with the local barbershop group, Harmony Hunters, singing the National Anthem. Lunch was served by the East Jordan Public Schools Chef Gretchen Bender. East Jordan Superintendent of Schools Jon Hoover started the speeches by

discussing lower than average school enrollment and how East Jordan Public Schools plan to combat the effects on their budget.

"We are going to spend our way out of trouble...to cut your way to prosperity is simply not an economic model I believe in," stated Hoover. He explained that the school has begun to fund Advanced Placement programs, and developed a scholarship program that enables students in those AP classes to receive a scholarship of \$500 or more. Hoover then praised the senior class for having the

highest ACT scores the district has ever seen. The speech rallied citizens to build enthusiasm for the community of East Jordan so that declining enrollment can be reversed.

Sarah Christensen then took the podium to discuss the Northern Lakes Economic Alliance current projects. The goal of the Alliance is to create and retain jobs for local entrepreneurs. The Alliance met with local manufacturers to assess their needs, and found that a lack of skilled workers was a problem. They plan to meet this

challenge by using a mobile training program that will run out of a trailer and will train anyone from unskilled high school students to those already possessing jobs and desiring to improve their skills.

The substantial savings in energy costs was what first attracted White to the solar panels but he found additional savings by utilizing the opportunity of tax credits and depreciation to supplement the majority of the cost of the solar system.

The late Edward Petrowski named Veteran of the Month

The Boyne City American Legion Veteran of the Month for November 2013 is Edward Stanley Petrowski. Born on Nov. 8th, 1913 in Chicago, Ill., he started school in Chicago and soon after moved with his family, in the early 1920s, to a farm near Petoskey, Mich. Petrowski attended Petoskey Grammar School until 1925 when he left school,



after completing the sixth grade at the age of twelve, going to work to help support his family. On Feb. 10th, 1942 he was inducted into the Army entering into active service at Fort Custer, Mich.

Following basic and specialty training Petrowski departed the U.S.A. on Dec. 12th, 1942 arriving in The North African Theater of Operations on Dec. 26th, 1942 and was assigned to the 351st Infantry Regiment, 88th Infantry Division serving as a Light Truck Driver. He participated in battles and campaigns in Tunisia, Rome-Arno, Northern Apennines and Po Valley and on Sept. 9th, 1945 Petrowski departed the European, African and Middle Eastern Theaters of Operations arriving in the U.S.A. on Sept. 25th, 1945. He was reassigned to the Indiantown Gap Military Reservation, Penn. and on Oct. 4th, 1945, at the Separation Center, Petrowski received an Honorable Discharge, having attained the Non-Commissioned Officer rank of Technician Fifth Grade, and was awarded the following decorations, citations and badges: The Bronze Star Metal (awarded, to then Private First Class Petrowski by Major General W. D. Crittenberger, IV Corps Commander, for meritorious service in direct support of combat operations of the IV Corps in pursuit of the enemy north of Rome in Lt. General Mark W. Clark's Fifth Army Italian campaign), The Good Conduct Medal, The European, African and Middle Eastern Service Medal with Four Bronze Battle Stars, The Motor Vehicle Drivers Badge and Five Overseas Service Bars (each representing six months foreign service).

Returning to Petoskey, Ed went to work for Penn Dixie Cement Plant and on May 17 th, 1948, at Saint Thomas Aquinas Church in Elmira, Mich., he married Caroline Figiel making their home in Petoskey. Leaving Penn Dixie Petrowski went to work for The Michigan Tanning and Extract Company, in Boyne City, Mich. and when the company closed he went to work at Chimney Corners Restaurant in Petoskey retiring on Nov. 8th, 1975.


Petrowski enjoyed fishing, hunting, wood carving, camping, gardening, mushroom picking, playing the piano, organ, guitar and harmonica, but he was always available to help his children with projects and enjoy time with his grandchildren.

On Jan. 5th, 2000 Edward Stanley Petrowski answered the final call and is being honored by his wife Caroline, his children and their families.

Homelessness and Domestic Violence linked

"Why doesn't she just leave?" This question is often asked when discussing the dynamics of an intimate relationship where domestic abuse is present. The reasons she doesn't leave are many including fear for the safety of herself or her children, family pressure, a hope that her partner will change, economic dependence and lack of alternative housing. The reality is that many survivors of domestic abuse do leave, which often times results in them becoming homeless. According to a one-day snapshot

survey conducted by the National Network to End Domestic Violence, over 35,300 women and children in our country were housed in domestic abuse shelters or transitional housing because they were forced out of their home by the abuser's behavior.

National Homelessness Awareness Week, November 16-24, 2013 is a time to raise consciousness about this ongoing crisis affecting more than 633,782 people in the U.S. every day. People become homeless for a variety of reason including domestic abuse, mental health, loss of employment, substance abuse and housing foreclosure. Although the reasons for homelessness vary, there are

consistencies in how our society can work towards solving this epidemic. Solutions include providing affordable and decent housing in our economic centers, offering year-round jobs that pay a living wage, ensuring quality health care for all, breaking down barriers around transportation and providing an ample selection of safe and affordable child care options.

Significant percentages of homeless women report domestic violence was the immediate cause of their homelessness. Many survivors are in highly controlled relationships and lack resources to leave the home they share with an abuser. Without access to money, transporta-

tion or a support system, they must choose between staying in an abusive relationship and living on the streets. Locally, the Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan (WRCNM) provides support, counseling and safe shelter to survivors at the Safe Home. Last year, 652 survivors and their children utilized WRCNM domestic abuse services; 119 of whom sought safety at the agency's Safe Home and 64 made use of transitional supportive housing.

Domestic violence is a crime. It is a serious national problem that affects us all – in every neighborhood, work place and school. Homeless victims of domestic abuse need the support of family, friends and community.

Instead of asking "Why doesn't she just leave?" we should be asking "Why does he feel it is okay to abuse his family and force them out of their home?"

You can help put and end to domestic abuse and homelessness in our community! Support, listen to and believe survivors, and speak out against domestic abuse. Volunteer at the WRCNM's Safe Home, your local homeless shelter or housing agency. Help others become informed about these issues by inviting the WRCNM to speak to your organization, group, school or workplace.

Health Department to observe Great American Smokeout on Nov. 21

NOVEMBER 5 - Tobacco use remains the single largest preventable cause of disease and premature death in Michigan, killing more than 14,500 residents each year, yet many Michiganders still use tobacco. This includes 23.3 percent of Michigan adults and 14 percent of the state's youth. More than half of these tobacco users have tried to quit for at least one day during the past year. Because tobacco products are highly addictive, most users make several attempts to quit before they are successful.

The Health Department of Northwest Michigan will join the American Cancer Society to mark the 38th Great American Smokeout on November 21st. Smokers are encouraged to use it as the date to quit, or to plan in advance and quit smoking that day. By doing so, they will be taking an important step toward a healthier life - one that can reduce cancer risk for themselves and their loved ones.

"The Great American Smokeout is

a reminder to encourage tobacco users to quit, and to support them in their efforts," said Linda Yaroch, Health Officer for the Health Department. "There are resources available to help with quitting, and we want to make sure that people are aware of those resources.3

Research shows that a combination of therapies, including nicotine replacement, counseling, self-help materials and a strong support network of family and friends, can help smokers quit. There are numerous resources available to Michigan residents:

The Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) Tobacco Quitline, (800) 784-8669, provides free telephone coaching for the uninsured and those with Medicaid and Medicare, and free nicotine replacement medications for those who qualify. Information on quitting smoking and a free printable Michigan Smoker's Quit Kit are available through MDCH by visiting www.michigan.gov/tobacco.

BecomeAnEX.org is a free, interactive Web site that shows smokers how to re-learn life without cigarettes. The site, developed by Legacy and Mayo Clinic, offers a free, personalized plan and an online support community to help people prepare to quit and stay off tobacco for a life-

When Every Breath is a Struggle

Petoskey - The commercial doesn't lie: COPD really can feel like an elephant is sitting on your chest. COPD, or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, refers to lung diseases that restrict airflow and cause significant breathing difficulties. And, the condition is irreversible. What's more, chronic lower respiratory disease, which includes COPD, is the third leading cause of death in the United States. Over 15 million Americans have been diagnosed with COPD, though experts believe the number is underreported. According a 2011 survey by the Center for Disease Control, "8% (age-adjusted = 7.4%) of Michigan residents" have COPD with northern Michigan showing some of the highest rates. "It's clearly a problem, but usually a preventable one," Karen Doherty RN-BC, Clinical Supervisor Cardiovascular and Pulmonary Rehabilitation for McLaren Northern Michigan. "Smoking is the main cause, and people who smoke, as we know, have difficulty quitting." Ironically, only 20% of smokers will develop true COPD, but it is still a very dangerous disease because it usually isn't diagnosed until it is in the advanced stages. Smokers are not off the hook, however: they are all prone to other serious lungrelated conditions and diseases.

ness of breath at rest, frequent infections, and overall reduction of quality of life. Stage IV (very severe) significantly impacts quality of life, as breathing is difficult with simple tasks such as talking, eating, or dressing.

Causes and Risk Factors

While tobacco use is the main cause of COPD in the United States, other environmental pollutants, such as heating fuels, secondhand smoke, dust, gasses, fumes, and sometimes, a genetic predisposition, can also lead to COPD. Those with the disease must stop smoking, if applicable, and reduce or eliminate exposure to pollutants.

Do I have COPD?

Diagnosis of COPD is fairly straightforward for patients who exhibit symptoms and have a history of exposure to cigarette smoke and other lung irritants. Spirometry (pulmonary function test) involves blowing into a large tube connected to a machine which measures the capacity of the lungs and the speed with which the patient can expel the air. "Spirometry can detect COPD before the patient presents symptoms, and it is also useful in measuring the progression of the disease and the efficacy of the treatment plan," explains Doherty. Additional diagnoses are derived through chest x-rays, CT scans, and arterial blood gas analysis, a blood test that measures the capacity of the

lungs to bring oxygen into the blood and to remove carbon dioxide.

Treatment Options

Though incurable, COPD can be managed, and treatments and lifestyle changes can control the condition and prevent further damage. In addition to smoking cessation or elimination of other harmful toxins, medications are also useful. Bronchodilators, or inhalers, can offer considerable relief for mild and moderate COPD, as can steroids and antibiotics. Oxygen therapy varies from patient to patient; some use oxygen when they leave the home for errands or activities; some while sleeping; and others use oxygen around the clock. Currently, oxygen therapy is the only treatment proven to increase life expectancy. Pulmonary rehabilitation programs use counseling and education, physical training, and nutrition to guide the patient to a higher functioning level. For the appropriate patient, pulmonary rehabilitation can increase quality of life and improve the ability to resume regular activities. More serious cases of COPD benefit from surgical interventions; lung reduction surgery removes damaged portions of lung tissue, creating extra space in the lung cavity and allowing the lungs and diaphragm to work more effectively. Lung transplant is an extremely serious procedure and appropriate only for those who meet stringent criteria.

Living with the Disease

Professional services, individualized for the benefit of each patient, are available through VitalCare and the John and Marie Demmer Wellness Pavilion and Dialysis Center, both affiliated with McLaren Northern Michigan. Pulmonary rehabilitation programs assist the patient with breath training and retraining, breathing positions, and controlled coughing. Physical therapy increases strength and stamina, nutrition education boosts overall health and immunity, and counseling addresses the anxiety and depression to help patients deal with the emotional challenges of living with COPD. For the appropriate patient, pulmonary rehabilitation can increase function and quality of life and improve the ability to resume reguprimary care provider for details and a referral for treatments options suited for individual conditions.

A free community lecture about COPD is scheduled for Monday, November 18 from 6 – 7 p.m. at the John and Marnie Demmer Wellness Pavilion and Dialysis Center. Pulmonary and Sleep Medicine Specialist, David Knitter, MD, will provide insight for those facing COPD. The event is free. Visit northernhealth.org for more information about COPD and other health-related topics.

What is COPD?

Emphysema and chronic bronchitis are the two most common forms of COPD, but some cases of asthma can also fit the criteria. Emphysema results from the progressive destruction of the air sacs (alveoli) located at the end of the small air passages (bronchioles) in the lungs. Chronic bronchitis is continuous inflammation of the bronchial tubes, which allow air to flow into and out of the lungs.

Pay Attention to Symptoms


Symptoms common to both emphysema and chronic bronchitis include chronic cough and phlegm production; shortness of breath while performing physical activities, especially activities that used to be routine; chest tightness and inability to take deep breaths; wheezing; the need to clear the throat upon waking; frequent respiratory infections; blueness of lips or fingernail beds; and lack of energy. Advanced cases of COPD can also exhibit unintended weight loss.

The Stages of COPD

To understand the progression of the disease, it is helpful to think of it in stages. Stage I (mild) presents a chronic smoker's-type cough and mucus. Stage II (moderate) includes the cough and mucus plus shortness of breath with exertion. Stage III (severe) exhibits short-

program is requested. Sylvia Walworth spoke next about the effect the Jordan River Arts Council has on the local community and who it brings to the area. place. The event ended with East Jordan Chamber President Mary Faculak thanking everyone for attending. The speakers stayed after for those who had any questions.

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
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New management is on the menu at Murray's Bar & Grill

EAST JORDAN—Celebrating 10 years of business on Lake Charlevoix's South Arm, Murray's Bar & Grill of East Jordan brings new energy to downtown under the management of Brandon Brimacombe.

Lesser Hodgson, Brimacombe took over as general manager on one of Murray's busiest days of the year, the Saturday of the Jordan Valley Freedom

"We did 360 covers that day alone," said Brimacombe.

Brimacombe is from
Cheboygan but has worked
throughout many Northern
Lower Michigan cities. His
resume includes six years
with Michigan Management,
kitchen experience at Apache
Trout Grill of Traverse City,
and bartending at Odawa
Casino of Petoskey.

"[Brandon] came in and whipped the kitchen and the front of the house into shape," said Hodgson.

Assisting with the front of the house is marketing manager Jennifer Burr.

"[At Murray's] everyone gets along," said Brimacombe. "This helps move things a lot more fluently. It's a lot easier when you're not battling the back of the house and the front of the house."

Along with great food and friendly people, Murray's offers all of the biggest games on television.

"We have three TVs and will be adding more," said Hodgson. "We have the Charter sports package with all of the games."

While looking to beef up the sports bar, Murray's is also enhancing lunch with the addition of pizza to the menu. Eat in or take out, Murray's has the standard "build your own pizza," along with many specialty pizzas, including "Pulled Pork" that has pork, caramelized onion, smoked gouda and BBQ sauce, as well as "Chicken Pesto" that has chicken, tomatoes, spinach, shredded parmesan, and house-made olive oil pesto sauce.

The pizza lineup includes a "buy 10 pizzas, get a 3-topping pizza for free" special. Save take-out box stamps and/or get a pizza punch card to earn the free pizza. "We bought the building next door (113 Main Street) about two years ago," said Hodgson.

The building, with its original tin ceiling tiles and exposed brick, is primarily being used for food storage in the back half, while the front half is currently undergoing a remodel. The space, which is connected to Murray's Bar & Grill through an interior door, will be used for dining overflow and will be able to seat 50–60 people. It will also be a space that people can rent out, according to Brimacombe.

The original hope was to have the new space completed by hunting season, but the renovation is a bit behind schedule, said Hodgson.

Burnette Foods, Inc. will be

among the first to use the new dining space for their upcoming Christmas party. Hodgson also hopes to work with neighboring business, MI RootsWear to possibly provide a place for local musicians to perform.

Murray's Bar & Grill is located at 115 Main Street, serving lunch and dinner daily. Come by car or snowmobile for new beers on tap and the biggest games on television.
