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Charlevoix City Council Bars Sullivan from taking office

CHARLEVOIX: City Council decided to bar Larry Sullivan from taking the elected office of City Clerk on January 6th at a special meeting held January

The decision to bar Sullivan comes after months of debate, in which two issues were raised concerning his choice to hold both the position of city clerk and to remain a Charlevoix County Commissioner. The first issue concerns the Incompatibility of Office Act which requires

a ruling by the attorney general to decide if holding both is a violation of state law. The second is that Sullivan holding both offices may violate the city charter.

Because the attorney general has vet to respond to the Incompatibility of Office issue, the January 2nd meeting focused on whether the city charter would allow Sullivan to take the city clerk's position.

City attorney Bryan

Graham was asked at the

the Charter. He cited Section 2.16 which states: "Except where authorized by this Charter, no elected official shall hold any

other office or City employment

during the term for which elected."

The city charter also states that council has the legal authority to decide if someone is qualified for office. Mayor Norman "Boogie" Carlson Jr. explained that because the charter was violated this rendered Sullivan unqualified, but said they had no other problems with him.

"I just don't want you to feel this is a personal thing against you. This is to protect the city from anything that comes down the road," said Carlson to Sulli-

Sullivan expressed that he understood it wasn't personal, and said he would be willing to wait to take office until a decision came from the attorney general. Council explained that in the case of the attorney general finding nothing wrong with Sullivan holding both offices they would reevaluate their decision to bar

"A charter cannot supersede or change state law. Our city charter says (he) cannot hold two elected offices. If the state comes

Two Killed in **Plane Crash**

At around 7:15am a single engine airplane took off from Boyne City Municipal Airport with two male passengers. The plane went down near Addis Road between Boyne Falls and Boyne City. Both the Pilot and the passenger were killed in the crash.

Area residents reported they heard the plane go over followed by a loud crash. The Melrose Fire Department and Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department along with EMS arrived on the scene to find a flaming downed aircraft.

The site of the crash is about 400 to 500 yards off the road, which made making it difficult for crews to reach the scene. Extreme weather conditions made getting the victims from the site difficult. Until a road was paved by the road commission, the crash site could only be reached by foot or snowmobile.

A Detroit TV station reported that family and friends confirm 51-year-old Todd Lloyd and his partner, 38-yearold Christopher Neumann, died in that crash. The plane, described as a Mooney Model M20R, was registered to Chaircovers and Linens, a business in Madison Heights. We

Allen C. Sevener of Petoskey, passed away quietly in his sleep at his home on Friday, January 3,

He was born June 14, 1923, Flag Day, in Bay County, MI, the second son of Austin and Ethel (Rentschler) Sevener's five children. In his youth he was an avid musician skilled with a variety of instruments including clarinet, saxophone, piano, and violin. He often played in bands at dance clubs around the Bay City area.

During WWII he served as a radio operator in the US Army Air Corp's 426th Night Fighter Squadron, 14th Air Force supporting P-61 Black Widow night fighter planes in the China-Burma-India Theater. He marked his jeep trek across China to Shanghai with Cpl. Kimberly as one of the most interesting experiences of his life.

After the war, he returned home to marry Claramae Barnikow June 2, 1946 and raise six children. He attended Bay City Junior College and then the University of Toledo.

He began his career with Consumers Power Company soon after he was married. After working in coal fired power plants, he was selected to join a pioneering group often referred to as the First Twelve, an elite group that was to begin learning the operation of nuclear power plants in the private sector. He studied for and attained Nuclear Regulatory Commission operating licenses for the Dresden nuclear plant in Indiana and for a GE plant in California. After vears of intense training. he added an NRC license for Consumers Power's Big Rock Point Nuclear Power Plant project at Charlevoix. He was the first person licensed to operate a nuclear plant in Michigan. Big Rock was Michigan's first operating nuclear power plant and was then under construction. Big Rock operated under Allen's NRC License until he retired as the Operations Superintendent

Allen worked diligently for years on behalf of the people of Bear Creek Township and oversaw the development, financing and construction of the sewer system and the creation of the Bear Creek -

Springvale Sewer Authority. From his first house, which he built himself while in his early 20's, to the house he passed away in, which he built with his family, he took pride in his lawn and gardens. Whether vegetable gardens, flower gardens or his lawn he was often seen making sure his landscaping and lawn were at their best. After moving to the Petoskey area, he bought a farm so his family could have a farm life. The family raised prize winning Charolaise cattle, which he was very proud of. In 1976, Allen and Claramae began operating the concession at Young State Park, at Boyne City where Robert and his future wife Becky had been working. Sons Allen David and Steven soon followed with operations at Petoskey, Burt Lake and Otsego Lake State Parks. Allen and his sons joined forces to maximize the concession operations and to bring a higher level of

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

back and says that he can hold both offices that supersedes what our charter says," said

Despite this, the decision to adopt the resolution was unpopular with several Council Members who felt it would be best to swear Sullivan into office on January 6th.

"I don't think we can disenfranchise the voters by not swearing Larry in," said Jeff

Council member Shirley Gibson supported Porter's comments and expressed frustration that legal counsel had changed their opinion several times. Bryan Graham explained that the difference of opinion stemmed from consideration of the two different issues. As far as legal counsel had found initially it would not be incompatible, but upon closer inspection the city charter was disqualifying Sullivan.

The resolution was also unpopular with citizens who came to the meeting to voice their displeasure with the choice to stop someone from taking office when they had been voted in by the public.

"You are violating the vote of the people if you don't allow him to take office Monday," said audience member Bob Bergmann.

Council ended the meeting by voting on the resolution. The vote was split, which required Mayor Carlson to cast the tie breaking vote. He voted to adopt the resolution to bar Sullivan from taking the clerk's office on January 6th.

At the January 6th council meeting Sullivan was present, and asked council to keep him carbon copied in on any correspondence between them and the attorney general. He also resigned from his positions on the Zoning Board of Appeals and the Historic District Commission.

Be Prepared For Winter Disasters

There is no mistaking that winter is upon us, especially up here in Northern Michigan. Unfortunately, even with all the snow, ice and chilling temps, we still haven't seen the worst of it. Just a few weeks ago those in the southern parts of the state suffered power outages that lasted for days, due to an ice storm. When it is cold outside it's especially important to be prepared for winter weather and power outages. Here are some things to keep in mind, and in your home or car, to help you be prepared for a winter disaster.

In The Home

When it comes to winter storms there are numerous problems that can arise. You can end up snowed in, your

power could be out, or snow and ice on your roof could cause a collapse. You can be prepared for all of these issues though, and experience a safe winter no matter the weather conditions.

One of the most important things to have on hand is a generator. When the power goes out a generator can be the thing that saves you from freezing, and losing all of your food. There are many sizes of generator and it really depends on how much work you will need it to do to chose what size you need. You'll also want t have some gas on hand to run it.

If a snow storm is on the way you should stock up on food and water. Get items that don't need to be refrigerated, frozen or cooked (unless you have an outdoor grill or some other way to cook if the power goes out). Water is important, and you will want to make sure you have enough for everyone in your house and be sure it's enough to last at least a week. It was more than a week many people went without power over this Christmas. Canned foods are good to have on hand, as well as crackers and other snacks. You can easily eat canned fruits, and canned veggies don't even have to be cooked.

Make sure you have extra blankets to help you stay warm. Plastic to cover your windows, if they haven't already been covered for the season, as this will help keep out some of the cold. It also helps if you have a heater of some sort that doesn't require electricity, like a kerosene

In The Car

If you get caught in a snow storm out in your vehicle,

whether you just get stuck in a snow drift or find yourself in a ditch, there are some things you should have with you to make it through the chilling ordeal. Many items may be similar to what you want to have on hand at home, like some water and some food. Keep a gallon jug or two of water in your vehicle, as well as some snack foods like dried fruit, nuts or snack bars.

It also helps to have a blanket or two and some extra warm clothes, like snow pants and gloves. You will want to do everything you can to stay warm and if you have to get out of the vehicle and get wet you will want something warm to change into. A snow shovel may help in a pinch too, if you're just in a drift.

It's About Time . . . Yours!

If you made New Year's resolutions in 2013, odds are that you did not accomplish your goal. If prior research is a useful guide, as many as 25% of us have already abandoned one or more of our 2014 resolutions. More than 80 percent of adults report they have attempted lifestyle changes without success. A 2010 survey found that fewer than one in five adults (16 percent) report success at losing weight (20 percent), starting a regular exercise program (15 percent), eating a healthier diet (10 percent), or reducing stress (7 percent) in the prior

Making a lasting change is more than a one-time resolution. The best intentions start to fade in the reality of behavior change. As anyone who has tried to change a habit will tell you, maintaining behavior change is difficult. In the 2010 study mentioned previously, 78 percent of participants attributed their failure to obstacles such as: willpower (33 percent), making changes by themselves (24 percent), and too much stress (20 percent). Lack of time is often cited as a reason for not maintaining healthy behavior changes, particularly for those seeking to incorporate regular exercise into a busy schedule.

Whatever your goals may be, do you blame lack of time for your lack of progress? Here are some tips for getting better control of your time.

Think about how you would like to spend your time, that is, what activities would support your goals? Is there time in your current schedule for those activ-



ities? If achieving your goals is important to you, you will find time for them. There's a saying, "If you want something done, ask a busy person. The more things you do, the more you can do" (Lucille Ball).

Busy people don't have any more time in their days, but they find time for the things that are important to them. We all have 24 hours in a day, 168 hours in a week. How much of that time do you

use in support of you goals? Start by examining how you spend your time. Pay attention to how you use your time for an entire week. Record your activities every 30 minutes. You can download a template here: http://lauravanderkam.com/site/wp-content/uploads/2012/01/168-Hours-Log1.pdf. Keep an honest accounting for a full week.

At the end of the week, review your findings. Any surprises? How much time do you spend watching television or playing video games? How much of your time is committed to supporting your goals? Can you see where you can find time for exercising or incorporating another healthy activity?

Now that you have a better idea of how you spend your time, it is your choice. Sure, you can continue to spend three hours per day in activities that don't add to your life, it is up to you. How do those activities support you? Do you use that time for stress relief? Perhaps you need to find better ways of dealing with stress. Maybe you discovered that you spend 30 minutes every morning looking for your car keys.

How could you improve your organization skills to "find" more time? It is likely that this activity has shown you that you have more time that you realized to apply toward your goals. Perhaps you discovered that you could get up 30 minutes early to fit in your workout. You may decide not to change how you use your time, but, you can you honestly say that it is the lack of time that is preventing your progress?



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Little Traverse Conservancy reports 2013 highlights

HARBOR SPRINGS - Little Traverse Conservancy has released a summary of the organization's 2013 accomplishments throughout its five-county service area.

In 2013, the non-profit land trust passed a milestone, surpassing 50,000 acres of land protection in its 41 years of existence. This amounts to 78 square miles, which represents about 1.8% of the land in the organization's service area of roughly 4,400 square miles. The protected lands include more than 130 miles of lake, river, or stream shoreline. More than 1,100 acres of land were protected in 2013 alone.

"The volume of land protection is one way to measure the success of a land trust," said Executive Director Tom Bailey. "So is the number of members who support it, and the amount of money that is raised each year or for a particular project. Yet protecting land in its natural state and making it available for public use and enjoyment comes with many other intangibles that can't be statistically measured."

For example, the Conservancy offers year-round education outings and community field trips.

In 2013, more than 3,700 students participated in a Conservancyled nature outing and 551 people participated in seasonal community field trips led by staff and volunteers. Almost all of these programs are offered at no charge, and funds are available to help with bus transportation costs for classrooms. While the value of these field trips cannot easily be measured in numbers,

it has long been the organization's belief that participation in nature outings inspires an interest in caring for the land in the future.

The Conservancy also reports that 15 miles of new trail were added to their nature preserve trail systems. All told, the organization manages and maintains 90 miles of trails with the help of hundreds of volunteers.

In Charlevoix County, some of the organization's 2013 land highlights included the following:

A five-acre addition to the Nick Adams Preserve on Pincherry Road brought the preserve size to 44 acres and added 350 feet of Horton Creek frontage.

Also along Horton Creek, a 33acre preserve with 3,200 feet of creek frontage was purchased with donated funds to become the Horton Creek Wetlands Preserve.

A 1.5 acre addition to the Petritz Preserve on Beaver Island was added thanks to funding from the J.A. Woollam Founda-

A small addition was donated to the Six Mile Lake/St. Clair Lake Natural Area along the northern Chain of Lakes. Over many years, this protected region has grown to more than 192 acres and is a joint project of both Little Traverse Conservancy and the Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy based in Traverse

Several work days were held at numerous preserves in Charlevoix County with new trails created at the Barney's Lake Preserve on Beaver Island as well as the Taylor-Horton

Creek Preserve, Wisser-Saworski Preserve, and Darnton Family Preserve.

The Conservancy partnered with Friends of the Boyne River to offer a series of Family Nature Discovery programs at the Boyne River Nature Area and The Hill Nature Preserve.

More than ever, the Conservancy is engaging volunteers to help with their work. In 2013 nearly 550 volunteers assisted the organization with a variety of tasks ranging from office mailings to trail monitors. More than 1,500 volunteer hours were donated to LTC in 2013. Based on the national volunteer value estimation of \$22.14/hour, the value of these hours is \$33,210.

By the end of 2013, more than 3,200 people had downloaded the Conservancy's free nature preserve smart phone app. The app provides interactive maps and updated information about LTC's most user-friendly nature preserves and is an excellent way for residents and visitors to the region to quickly get information about preserves and trails.

CHARLEVOIX: At the regular meeting of City Council on January 6th approval was given for the transfer of a liquor license in the location which was once Whitney's to a new fine dining establishment.

David Campbell, a representative for the owners of the future restaurant named Quay Restaurant and Terrace Bar, requested approval of a liquor license for the 301 Bridge St. location from the council as the owners were unable to attend due to weather.

Eric and Dana Hodgson have established joint ownership of the restaurant and are hoping to open it in April of this year. The owners live on Beaver Island and have three other successful restaurant businesses under their control. Campbell expressed that the owners are hoping to make Quay's a sought after locale for locals and tourists alike.

The goal is to put down tablecloths, make good groceries and appeal to everyone...to be a fine dining establishment," said Campbell.

Council did approve of the liquor license, but expressed some concern over the atmosphere that the Terrace Bar end of the restaurant might create. Council person Shirley Gibson

asked whether or not the excessive noise which made Whitney's problematic for some would be an issue

Campbell assured council this was not the intention of the Hodgson's and that while entertainment may at times be featured at the open bar atop the building it would never be rowdy

or invasive to downtown residents. "That is not their intention, they want to be a fine dining destination restaurant," said Campbell.

In other council news, the time and dates for a budget work session and the public hearing with the results of that work session were announced. The public hearing is set for February 17th, at 7:00 pm in Council Chambers at City Hall in Charlevoix.

Council members also voiced the desire to begin examining the City Charter to potentially put amendments to a vote of the people at the November elections of this year. This concern follows issues with the wording that have caused drawn out debates over wording in the charter. Mayor Norman "Boogie" Carlson Jr. supported this idea and made plans to discuss the matter further at the next meeting of council which will be held January 20th at 7:00 pm.

Winter Weather Calls for Vehicle Preparation, Reports AAA Michigan

With the weekend weather forecast of record cold and snow across the state, AAA Michigan advises motorists to take special precautions before driving.

Motorists can help keep their vehicles on the road by doing the follow-

*Check your vehicle's battery strength. Faulty batteries cause more car starting problems than any other factor. At 0 degrees, a good battery has 35 percent less starting power.

*Park your vehicle in the garage. If you have no garage, put a tarp over the hood or park protected from prevailing winds.

* Keep the gas tank at least half-full to avoid fuel-line freeze-up.

*Be sure your vehicle has a winter survival kit, including ice scraper and brush, snow shovel, tire traction material such as sand or cat litter, food and blanket, jumper cables, cell phone and cell phone charger, flares or reflective triangle, flashlight, boots, gloves and hats.

Before driving, follow these tips: *Clear snow and ice from vehicle, including hood, roof, trunk, front and back windshields, headlights and tail

*Go slow — slow down when visibility and road conditions are impaired.

* Anticipate danger — be ready for ice on bridges, hidden lane markings, stalled cars and poor visibiity. Increase following distance between vehicles.

*Put the lid on skids — ease off the accelator and don't lock up the brakes. Carefully steer in the direction you want your vehicle to go and straighten the wheel as soon as the car begins to go in the desired direc-

* Monitor weather reports. If you must travel and become stranded, stay with your vehicle. It provides shelter from the cold and makes it easer for rescuers to locate you. Make sure your exhaust pipe is snow free.

* If your vehicle becomes disabled, never step into the line of traffic.

Since January 1 through late afternoon Jan. 3, AAA Michigan has assisted more than 12,500 motorists, with spin outs, vehicles in ditches and dead batteries among the winter-related issues.

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

Jim and Terri Green moved to Charlevoix back in 1987 after three years of serious consideration and prayer. "I have always loved the Charlevoix-Petoskey area. William "Bill" Grice was one of the most caring, loving, and fun people I have ever met. He treated his friends like family. Money didn't matter to him. He would give up every cent he had just to help somebody out. He enjoyed reading, music, art and writing.

Bill was born in Denver, Colorado on June 17th 1987. He moved to Boyne City at a young age. He went to school in Boyne City and graduated there. After graduating in 2005 he was one of the first kids our age to get his own house.

His first job was at the Red Mesa Grill in Bovne City. he started there when he was 14 and was very loyal to that job. When he was about 21 he moved to Florida with Garrett Stackus and Adam Looze.
