East Jordan continues to discuss 2014-15 budget

The East Jordan City Commission met Tuesday night to discuss some budget concerns with a focus on the Jordan River Arts Council (JRAC) and the Harbor Fund.

The president of the Jordan

River Arts Council was present at the meeting and she discussed why it is important for them to purchase the building that they are currently in. They wish to buy the building from the city so they can make necessary changes and updates. The building, located at 301 Main Street in East Jordan, will be 100 years old in 2015 and JRAC has been there for 25 years.

They showed the City Commissioners what the new plans for the building would look like and explained that the original library would be left intact and the existing upper and lower levels

would be left as is. They hope to add a two story addition off of the back of the building which would double the gallery space. They would also add an elevator and two handicap bathrooms so the building would be more accessi-

The project stemmed from needs on various fronts to upgrade to a facility that represented either company better and to dedicate resources to their products on a larger scale. In addition, the new showrooms offer customers better service, with larger inventories and gorgeous state of the

art amenities.

"Our hope is that with rededicated focus to the GM and Chrysler brands individually... our customers will benefit from a greater selection and service experience," said Jeffreys.

The project was a costly and extensive investment into the dealerships and the community and took almost a year to complete.
The new facilities also created 4-6 new jobs for the area which are either in the process of, or have been, filled. Currently Fox is re-

Great Lakes Energy district elections overwhelmingly approved

By a nearly 7 to 1 margin, Great Lakes Energy members approved bylaws changes that replace voting at-large for directors with electing directors by district.

A total of 5,996 votes in favor of creating director election districts and 858 opposed were received by the March 20 voting deadline. GLE members received mail-in ballots with their February issue of Michigan Country Lines magazine.

"The change will allow our large 26-county service area to be more equally and locally represented by the nine members who serve on the board," explains board chairman Richard Walsworth. "Most of the electric cooperatives in the United States have director election districts."

As a consumer-owned electric cooperative, Great Lakes Energy is governed

ble. It is estimated that the project would cost \$300-400,000 and they hope to raise the money through fundraising.


There was a motion to sell 301 Main St. to JRAC for \$1 but Scott Beatty the City Attorney would like to see a formal resolution written up citing the benefits that this would have along with a factual background. The resolution would seek to answer the question of whether or not there is cultural and economic value in transferring this building to JRAC. There would also be a reversion clause that would state if JRAC ceased to use the building for art, the building

would revert back to the city. The motion was tabled for two weeks until the next meeting, and this will give time to formalize this motion.

There was also a 2014/2015 budget review where the city harbor and the Harbor Fund were a main topic of discussion. A budget adjustment was proposed that would decrease the expenses and ultimately save money, especially in terms of the Harbor Fund. Gas prices were discussed along with possibly cutting shifts to try to save money. A dredging grant was applied for but the outcome won't be known until April 15.

The next meeting will be held at 6:30pm on Tuesday, April 15 where the budget will continue to be discussed with a focus on the Water and Sewer Fund budgets.

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Women's Resource Center and hospitals assist survivors of sexual assault

Safety and support of the survivor is vitally important immediately following sexual assault, according to Mary Hotchkiss, a therapist with the Women's Resource Center of Northern Michigan (WRCNM). "The local hospitals call us when there is a sexual assault and a trained staff member is available 24-hours a day to go directly to the hospital to provide support to the survivor, survivor's family and to hospital personnel," Hotchkiss explained.

In Michigan, the legal term for sexual assault or rape is Criminal Sexual Conduct (CSC). It is defined as any form of unwanted sexual contact obtained without consent and/or obtained through the use of force, threat of force, intimidation or coercion.

Sexual assault survivors have the choice to undergo a forensic exam during which trained hospital personnel gather important evidence, including DNA, to establish that a crime has occurred. The collection of this evidence is helpful if the survivor chooses to pursue legal action against the perpetrator.

Michigan State Police provides the WRCNM forensic exam kits at no charge. Hotchkiss works with local hospitals to restock their supply on a monthly basis. The forensic exams are also provided to survivors free of charge using funds available from a state grant.

As part of the exam, the survivor's clothing is often taken as evidence. Hotchkiss explains that the Women's Resource Center also provides a survivor clothing kit which includes a shirt, pants, under-

clothes, toothbrush, toothpaste, mouthwash, comb and deodorant, supplied by the Assistance League of Southeastern Michigan.

"We appreciate that the hospitals work together with us at the Women's Resource Center because that continuity of care is so important when assisting survivors," said Hotchkiss. After the survivor leaves the hospital, the WRCNM continues to provide ongoing services that include free and confidential counseling, legal advocacy (court support) and support groups.

The WRCNM services the five counties of Antrim, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Emmet and Otsego counties and during the past fiscal year provided supportive services to 290 sexual assault survivors, 84 of whom were under 18 years of age.

The Commission on Aging is pleased to offer exceptional services to the seniors of Charlevoix County. Our services help to support independent living so that each adult can live a dignified and enriched life. Our goal is to provide a well trained staff to assist with the activities of daily living. These services will allow our older citizens to stay in their own homes as long as possible.

Below please find an explanation of the services that we provide in your home. These services may be for a short duration such as recovering from a surgery, rehabilitation from an injury or can be provided on a long term basis.

In Home Health Services begin with a health assessment completed in your own home by one of our skilled registered nurses. They will determine the type of services needed or requested as well as education or appropriate refer-

The Homemaker Program provides assistance with laundry, shopping and errands or routine light-housekeeping duties to help you maintain a clean and healthy environment.



Personal Care is provided by trained assistants that help with those activities of daily living such as bathing, dressing, grooming, toileting, transferring, ambulation, nail and hair care.

Foot Care is provided by a skilled certified foot care nurse for the purpose of treating high-risk homebound patients in need of proactive foot care. Monthly foot care clinics are also provided at the local senior centers by appointment.

Medication Management is a shorttermed scheduled assistance. The visits are with an RN, in your home. The purpose is to teach independent medication management.

Home-Delivered Meals can be arranged to arrive warm, directly to your home in heat enabled containers for our homebound seniors. The menus are supervised by a registered dietician and delivered to you by thoughtful individuals in each community. The meals are prepared at our local senior center kitchens

by our caring staff and are designed to be

well-balanced with old-fashioned comfort.



We are a fee for service agency but all in home services are provided on a sliding scale fee which is determined by the client's financial ability to pay. This allows everyone regardless of income to receive the same quality service.

The staff providing in home services is highly trained and professional. Each staff person has had a completed background check, receives extensive training yearly in areas such as CPR, diabetes, stroke, Parkinson's, dementia, mobility and all areas related to aging.

All staff is actively supervised by our Clinical Manager who is a Registered Nurse that maintains a high level of training and has multiple years of experience in the area of Gerontology. The Clinical Manager provides constant direction to the staff so they can effectively meet the needs of each individual we serve.
