30.77% of registered voters in Charlevoix turned out at the polls. Specific to Charlevoix County were some interesting races highlighted by the race for Charlevoix County's 33rd Circuit Court between five candidates, Edward Engstrom, Roy C. Hayes, Mary Beth Kur, Tom Schraw and Valerie Snyder. The top two vote getters will face each other in the November 4 general election for a seat on Charlevoix County's Circuit Court left open as the Honorable Judge Richard M. Pajtas ages out of the position.

Those two are Roy C Hayes and Mary Beth Kur.

Results of the race are: Roy C. Hayes - 2,326 Mary Beth Kur - 1,596 Valerie Snyder – 1,396 Tom Schraw - 837 Edward Engstrom - 406 The county also determined candidates for the November 4 general election for Charlevoix

County Commissioner Districts. In District one Republicans George Lasater defeated Shirlene Tripp. Lasater had 590 votes compared to Tripp's 316 votes.

In District two, Republican Chris Christensen ran unopposed.

In District three Ronald Reinhardt (R) will face off against Tim LaCroix (D) in the general election.

In District four, Republican Joel Evans ran unopposed.

In District five, Nancy Ferguson defeated incumbent Richard Gillespie for the Republican candidate in the general election. Ferguson had 684 votes

Disc Golf Issues Plague Council

CHARLEVOIX: At the regular meeting of City Council on Monday the issue of Disc Golf at Mt. Mc-Sauba came up yet again when City Manager Rob Straebel explained the measures that City Staff have taken to fix problems that came to light after a walk through with several council members on July 29.

The issues ranged from safety concerns to erosion problems according to Straebel who indicated that some on council had also felt that damages had occurred to property at Mt.McSauba as well. Straebel stated at the meeting that measures had been taken to rectify each concern after the walk through. Namely, certain holes are closed during camp hours to ensure safety of campers and hikers, Hole 10 has been closed due to erosion problems, and Holes 4, 5, and 6 will see erosion mitigation throughout the remainder of the summer.

As for damage done in the area, Straebel explained that the lights above the skating rink will be taken down in the summer when the Disc





New Ministry Open: Sammy's Shoes

ELLSWORTH-The Good Samaritan Furniture Store has outgrown the building it has been occupying for the past two years and moved next door to the building recently occupied by MI Farm Market.

The Good Samaritan Ministry serves between seven and eight hundred families through their food pantry each month. The number of needy that benefit from the resale shop and furniture store is unknown but the ministry has continued to grow and provides quality furniture and home décor. "It's all donated and it comes from all over," said Mary Peterson, Director of the Pantry/Resale Shops who began the Good Samaritan on her kitchen table in 1990.

When the Good Samaritan first opened the furniture was sold out of the resale shop then moved to the Center Street location. "We needed more room, it became overwhelming, so we moved next door, the windows are so nice and we have some ladies that come in just to dress the windows," said Peterson. The volunteer driven ministry has 122 volunteers that perform a variety of tasks such as picking up food and donated items, sorting clothing, helping folks fill out forms, hauling furniture and stocking shelves.

The new store also houses appliances and flooring donations. All the proceeds from the furniture store come back to the food pantry.

The ministry whose official mission is serving the Lord while reaching out to those in need is also affiliated with Mom and Tots whose goal is to equip young mothers with the means necessary to raise healthy and happy children and His House, a mentoring program for young men. "We're here to support families," said Peterson. "Sometimes they just need somebody to listen, It's just not always a fi-

tened to," she said about the ministry that provides help with emergency needs like shut off notices, propane fill ups or "the guy who comes in with his face all swollen with a trip to the dentist," she said.

And now a new segment of the ministry has opened just in time to outfit kids for school, thanks to a \$3,000 grant from the Great Lakes People Fund and bargain shopping on Peterson's part. Sammy's Shoes takes up space in a small room in the back of the original resale shop and contains over 700 pairs of brand new tennis shoes. The shoes sell for \$5 for the smaller sizes and \$10 for the larger. "Some of these kids have never had new shoes," said Peterson. Anyone with a Bridge card or who qualifies for the free and reduced lunch program qualifies for Sammy's Shoes.

group dropped the petition with 674 signatures off with City Clerk Cindy Grice right on the state deadline, Tuesday, July 29. The group needs 558 signatures to have the issue placed on the ballot. "We've got a lot of good here that we are trying to accomplish and I think we done it," he said.

Sixty year old VanDomelen has repeatedly said the movement to get the issue on the ballot is for the families of Boyne City. "If you have a man and wife both making \$12 an hour and it comes down to paying the electric bill and taking the kids to the dentist they are going to pay the electric bill," he said.

Originally, there was concern that procedural matters may prevent the issue from getting to the voters until February but after researching the matter Grice discovered there was no August 12, 4 p.m. time deadline to notify the County Clerk whether the issue is to go on the ballot, as previously reported. "The date is still the 12th but I can notify the County Clerk after the meeting and let her know if there is something coming," said Grice. She explained that as long as she gave them some notification she could take until the 14th to get the information to the county. Grice was given the information after talking to the County Clerk and an election specialist at the bureau of elections Wednesday.

The petitions reads, "For the purpose of promoting public health through prevention of dental disease, the city manager is hereby directed to establish

gan. The city manager shall establish a testing program that accurately shows fluoride levels in the public water supply on a monthly basis and those results shall be posted within 30 days after the test results have been obtained."

According to law Grice has fifteen days to verify the signatures on the petition after which the petition will be presented to the City Commission at their next meeting, August 12 at 7p.m. "We want to get them done as soon as possible because, well, we have other things to do so we are trying to get them done within the next few days," she said on Thursday.

There has been no Fluoride added to the city's water supply since shortly after the May 13 meeting where a 3/2 vote of the City Commission decided the matter after residents brought questions about the safety of Fluoride to the Commissioner's attention.

Boyne City has two well fields one well has 0.35 parts per million of fluoride naturally occurring in the water, half of the 0.7 parts per million that the Center for Disease Control recommends. The other well has 0.15 parts per million. The city has been adding hydrofluosilicic acid in the water since 1973 to bring the naturally occurring fluoride up to recommended levels. At that time the question was decided by a vote of the people.

After the initiatory petition is presented to the Commission they have 30 days to adopt it as submitted or submit it to electors as a ballot issue according to section 7.21 of the City Charter. Health ONLINE AT V Reducing your risk for cataracts

August is cataract awareness month. A cataract is a clouding of the lens of the eye. The normally clear view appears more like the foggy bathroom mirror after a shower. Cataracts are slow to develop and are not immediately noticeable. In the early stages, stronger lighting and more powerful eyeglasses will allow you to adapt to cataracts. Over time, the impaired vision may require surgery to correct.

In addition to clouded vision, other symptoms of cataracts include: increasingly impaired night vision, sensitivity to light or seeing halos around lights, frequent changes in eyeglass prescriptions, fading or yellowing of colors, and double vision through a single eye. If you are experiencing these symptoms or notice any sudden change in vision, see your eye doctor.

Cataracts may develop in one eye or both eyes. Cataracts form in the lens of the eye, which is located behind the colored portion. The lens focuses light and creates a clear image on the retina. A cataract scatters the light coming from the lens, preventing a sharp image from forming and resulting in cloudy vision. Cataracts can be congenital, the result of an infection in utero. More often,




Clouded image as seen by someone with cataracts.

cataracts are caused by changes to the tissue of the lens, as a result of injury or aging. With age, the lenses become less flexible and begin to break down, resulting in the cloudy image of a cataract.

If your eye-care professional does diagnose cataracts, you

may or may not require immediate surgery. Cataract surgery is generally safe and effective. The surgery is generally done on outpatient basis using a local anesthesia to numb the area around the eye (yes, the patient stays awake during the procedure). In the surgery, the dam-

aged lens is removed and replaced with a new, clear, artificial lens, which becomes a permanent part of the eye. If surgery is required in both eyes, the surgeries will be completed on separate occasions, one or two months apart.

Age and family history are two causes of cataracts that are beyond our control. Diabetes, high blood pressure, obesity and smoking will increase the risk of cataracts. In addition, excessive exposure to sunlight and excessive use of alcohol are risk factors for cataracts. Maintain a healthy weight, stop smoking, manage blood pressure and/or diabetes and reduce your exposure to sunlight to improve your eye health.

EIGHT WAYS TO SAVE YOUR HEARING

you of stimulation. That's bad news for your mood and your mind. Isolation can lead to depression, anxiety, foggy memory, slowed-down thinking and even brain shrinkage. Compromised hearing can make walking more difficult (you miss tiny clues that help you stay balanced), and sure to sounds louder than 85 decibels -- that's common cacophony for lawn mowers, rock concerts, video arcades and even noisy health clubs -- damages the tiny hairs in your inner ear that convert sound waves into electrical signals. Dr. Mike pops his earplugs in on airplanes before take-off. Wear them when running yard equipment, at sporting events and during loud movies. You'll still hear the dialogue.

No. 2: Dial down the volume when you wear earbuds. One in three adults and three in five teens who use portable music devices crank 'em up too high, endangering their hearing. Keep the volume set at 50 percent or less so that you can hear other sounds around you. Give your ears frequent bud-breaks.

No. 3: Put down the cotton swabs.

twice as likely to have hearing loss as people with normal blood sugar levels. Prediabetes? Your risk is 30 percent higher. The connection could be glucose-related damage to the inner ear.

No. 5: Lower your blood pressure. High blood pressure can speed up age-related hearing loss by reducing the flow of blood to your inner ear or even to brain areas involved with hearing.

No. 6: Recognize early signs. Don't wait! If you notice you're saying "What?" a lot, need the TV turned up louder or have trouble hearing on the phone, ask your doctor if you need to be referred to a hearing specialist for tests. One survey of more than 3,000 people with hearing loss found that hearing aid users had less depression and worry, and were available than ever before.

No. 7: Check your meds. Some 130 prescription and over-thecounter drugs, from ibuprofen and diuretics to certain antibiotics, can muffle hearing. Most of the time, hearing returns when you stop taking the med. Talk with your doc.

No. 8: Watch your weight. If you're more than a few pounds over your ideal weight, your risk for hearing loss could be 17 percent to 25 percent higher than normal. Add walking to your stay-slim program; two hours per week can significantly lower your risk for missing out on the beautiful sounds of the world.

Some factors are beyond your control, but not all. Here are eight ways to save your hearing today.

No. 1: Keep ear plugs in your pocket, purse, car and toolbox. Expo-

Earwax, a common cause of temporary hearing loss, forms on the outer third of the ear, but when you twirl cotton swabs in your ear canal, wax can get stuck deep inside. An earache, fullness, muffled hearing, even itching can be signs of wax blockage. Follow directions on waxremoval products or call your doctor.

No. 4: Aim for healthy blood sugar. People with diabetes are

more socially active. In another, hearing aid use even improved cognitive function. Yet hearing aid users wait, on average, 10 years before getting help.

In District six, we are projecting that Republican Shirley Roloff narrowly defeated Larry Sullivan. Roloff led Sullivan with 567 votes compared to Sullivan's 523 votes.

There were also some millage issues on the August ballot.

In Melrose Township there were three renewals, the Fire Department Operations millage to reestablish the one half mill for operation of the fire department, a renewal of the half mill Fire Sinking Fund and the 1 mill Road Millage.

Fire Dept, Operations -193 yes 38 no Fire Dept. Sinking Fund -174 yes 55 no

Road Millage - 183 yes 47 no Boyne Valley Township had one renewal on the ballot, 1 mill for the fire/rescue. This millage passed 189 yes to 36 no.

Norwood Township's Road Millage is up for renewal to levy up to 1 mill for the purpose of providing funds for road construction and maintenance. This millage passed 158 yes to 92 no.

Eveline Township asked voters to renew a Road Millage for 1 mill. This millage passed 395 yes to 106 no.

Wilson Township Ambulance millage asked for a renewal of the 1 mill fire and ambulance millage as well as their Road millage for 1 mill.

Fire & Ambulance -241 yes 50 no Road -230 yes 63 no

Peaine Township had four renewals on the ballot. To restore the township's Fire millage at 1, the Transfer Station Millage which will permit the township to restore the 2 mills for the op-

Multiple municipalities voted on a new proposal on the ballot to levy up to $\frac{1}{2}$ (.5) mills for the purpose of providing funds for the operation and maintenance of the emergency medical services provided by the newly formed Jordan Valley Emergency Medical Service Authority. We are projecting that this passed. Antrim county results were not posted at press time but Charlevoix county voters in the City of East Jordan and South Arm Township were approving the proposal by a 3 to 1 margin.

The City of Charlevoix has placed a proposal to amend the city charter to change the office of city clerk to an appointed office and a renewal of a recreational authority millage to renew an existing levy up to 1/3 (.33) mills for the purpose of providing funds for operating, maintaining and improving the Charlevoix area community pool for ten years 2015-2024.

Voters passed both proposals by wide margins. The City Clerk proposal passed with 60% of the vote. The Recreational millage passed with approximately 67% of the vote.

On a regional level there were 3 Republican candidates looking to replace the State House of Representatives 105th District seat held by Greg MacMaster who is vacating his house seat to run for state senate. The

It appears that State proposal 14-1 will pass. At press time the proposal was passing with 69% of the vote with 51% of polls reporting. The proposal is actually a referendum on Public Act 80 of 2014, which was approved with bipartisan support by the Legislature this past March. The amendment is intended to make sure schools, local communities and libraries don't lose revenue during the historic phase-out of the Personal Property Tax (PPT). Michigan's PPT is a tax that businesses pay on items such as machinery, furniture and other equipment. The use tax will be a companion to the sales tax, levied on the use, storage and consumption of certain tangible personal property, like telephone services, used auto sales and hotel rooms.



Backpack giveaways send kids to class with confidence

CHARLEVOIX: This school year local business owner Justin Michaeu and his team of volunteer driven employees set out to accomplish the goal of sending kids to school with all the supplies they might need regardless of what income bracket their families may fall in

Michaeu, the owner of 5 branches of The Cellular Connection (TCC) including the one located in Charlevoix, took part in a large grassroots program called "The Culture of Good" which gives away thousands of backpacks each year on August 2nd to students whose families may struggle with the costs of purchasing the supplies required. "The Culture of Good" is supported by employee and customer donations each year. Whatever is donated at TCC will be matched by the owner of the business to raise funds for the backpacks and supplies. Michaeu explained that the program is not merely business based, but rather a way for anyone interested to make a difference. "Culture of Good' is each person contributing to make a difference and start a movement. It's not all about business, it's actually getting people involved; all of us independent business owners involved, staff involved, and community involved. We can do something really big together," said Michaeu.

for the program explains that families spend anywhere from \$50 to \$100 each year to send their children to school with the basic supplies needed such as; a backpack, pencils, a notebook and folders. The goal of the Backpack Giveaway is to lower that cost for families enabling them to spend the money in other places.

According to Michaeu over 900 stores participated in the Giveaway this year, with a goal of handing out 100,000 backpacks filled with the needed supplies to students of all ages. For this area, the five locations owned by Michaeu handed out 50 backpacks per store for a total of 250. Students in Bellaire, Petoskey, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, and Kalkaska benefitted from the program. Areas such as Kalkaska and Cheboygan saw an immediate influx of students ready to grab their backpacks, while here in Charlevoix a few backpacks will be donated to area schools for those who may have missed the August 2nd Giveaway. Michaeu hopes that the families who were able to get a free backpack will be able to use the money saved in other ways to help strengthen their children's education or increase their happiness. "They could take that money to spend on things that are being eliminated in schools, like theatre and music...or go out to eat ...whatever it is that makes the kids smile," said Michaeu.

Michaeu explained that the spirit of volunteerism and giving back is highly value at TCC in more ways than the Backpack Giveaway. Employees are given two paid days to volunteer at whatever organization they choose; such as The United Way or Big Brothers Big Sisters. Employees and owners of TCC alike hope that this leadership in volunteering will spur others to do more in their own communities.

"I would like to see more locally owned businesses do what they can; whether it is \$5 or \$500 toward something meaningful like this. If everybody helps just a little bit, like members of the community donating a \$1 here and there, it can really go a long way and make a difference in people's
