Nuisance Ordinance introduced to Charlevoix city council

CHARLEVOIX—The Charlevoix City Commission held a public hearing to gather response to the expansion of the Round Lake Marina, introduced a new Nuisance Ordinance and was surprised by the resignation

of the city airport manager at the August 18 meeting.

Two conceptual plans for the Marina expansion were provided to the City Council. One plan included the extension of the shoppers dock and addition of seven 80 foot slips while the other the shoppers dock extension and the

addition of five 80 foot slips. Both the Planning Commission and DDA sent recommendations to the Council that they approved the installation of seven 80 foot docks. The estimated cost of the project is \$500,000 and does not include the infrastructure work needed to accommodate the Ke-

weenaw Star. The new docks are estimated to bring in between \$58,000 and \$83,000 annually for the city. The majority of the comments from the audience expressed concern that the new docks would impede navigability in Round Lake. In a letter from Margo Marks, President of the

Beaver Island Boat Company she wrote, "It has been clearly demonstrated the navigable area in which you proposed to build these docks interferes with the approach our vessels have to our established dock area." Retired

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

East Jordan begins the process of planning for the future

The city of East Jordan has begun the process of developing a five-year plan to guide the future of the city. Resilient East Jordan is a process of planning for the future that leads the community to grow with input from community members while preparing to handle both positive and negative events that may impact the community.

The city hosted a presentation and planning meeting August 14 to kick-off the Resilient East Jordan program. Attendees listened to two hours of presentations from various planning experts. Dusty Christensen of LIAA gave a presentation on the Resilient East Jordan project, community resilience, and the master planning process. Daniel Brown of GLISA gave a presentation on historical and projected future climate

Yonker, Cutler Resign

EAST JORDAN—The East Jordan City Commission meeting started with Commissioner Tony Cutler resigning as Deputy Mayor, contained the resignation of City Administrator Chris Yonker in the center and ended with Cutler resigning as a City Commissioner. In between resignations they approved the purchase of a tractor, set a public hearing and made an appointment to the Housing Commission.

City Administrator Chris Yonker ended his Administrators report "on a personal note" stating that on the cusp of his two year anniversary as City Administrator he needed to offer his resignation. Yonker offered distance from his children and grandchildren as well as aging parents as a reason for the action. "There isn't any one thing making this decision, we want to reevaluate where we're at in our lives," he said. Yonker offered to give whatever length notice necessary to make the transition easy and smooth. "You've been good to me I want to be good to you," he said. Appreciation from both Yonker and the Commissioners was expressed and a motion to tentatively set Yonkers resignation for October 3

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New massage therapist joins Chellos

EAST JORDAN - Chellos of East Jordan has added a new amenity to their spa options. Licensed Massage Therapist Kathy Moblo has set up shop at the salon on M-66 and is offering introductory pricing in celebration of her official opening.

Moblo has 21 years experience as a massage therapist. She received over 1000 hours of official training back in 1993 before licensing was mandatory and has continued to work in the field at high-end salons and spas including Bay Harbor. "Everything I've learned I'm bringing to the small town, the same product line and expertise for a fraction of the cost," she said.

Services that Moblo provides include deep tissue massages for those who need isolated areas worked up, the Swedish massage intended for total relaxation and the sports massage that improves range of motion and stretching capacity as well as giving attention to injured areas. "The most popular massages are the deep and Swedish. Some people want the deep for some areas and the Swedish to fully relax, most masseuses don't offer a mix," said Moblo who will combine the techniques to give her clients the ultimate therapeutic experience.

Reflexology is acupressure performed on the bottom of the foot. "You can get a whole



body massage just by working on the bottom of the feet," said Moblo. The foot simulates the body with the head at the toes and the sciatic at the heel. The only difference between

the right and left foot is that the heart is represented in the left and the liver in the right. "Acupressure has been an art for thousands of years, it's just something we're starting to use again," she said.

Moblo has specific certification in prenatal massage. She emphasized that a massage should never be done in the first trimester and that it should always be done by a trained masseuse. "The body is changing so much, everything is growing you want to protect the pregnancy until you're sure you're carrying the baby well," she added.

Of course treatments to enhance massage such as body scrubs and hot stones are part of her repertoire as well.

She is happy that Michigan's deadline for mandatory licensing of massage therapists is near (October 31) and is proving her commitment to continuing education and professionalism with more training. "It gets rid of the riff raff, you will be required to keep your license current with continuing education," she said.

By the beginning of October, Moblo will have an additional 24 hours of training for certification in Bellanina face lift massage. "My emphasis is relaxation, quiet and a calming atmosphere," she said.

Waterspout season on Great Lakes

The weather phenomenon results from temperature changes on the water

GAYLORD – Waterspouts represent an intriguing sidebar to the Michigan weather story. It's a sidebar that's worth a look, as we move into waterspout season on the Great Lakes.

Look a Lot Like Tornadoes


Waterspouts look a lot like tornadoes in photos and videos, but only some waterspouts are really "tornadoes over water." Sometimes a true tornado forms over land before heading over the water and becoming a waterspout.

The majority of waterspouts on the Great Lakes are like the other lake effects we see in Michigan: they result from temperature differences between the water, and the air or nearby land. The National Weather Service usually predicts waterspout activity when water temperatures are warm, the air is cool and moist, and winds are relatively light. That is most likely to be the case in late summer and early fall when the lakes are at their warmest, but we can get blasts of colder air.

Tracking Waterspouts

Meteorologists, led by the International Centre for Waterspout Research, are just beginning to track waterspouts closely and to predict them. The Centre counted a new record of 154 waterspouts for the Great Lakes in 2012. When observers on Lake Ontario logged a single day global record of sixty-seven last October, Centre director Wade Szilagyi said there had probably been even more that simply weren't seen or recorded.

I mean, we're really talking about private property here. If you have \$100,000 in a retirement fund, and they say they're going to take that away from you, it's like taking a person's home. I just don't see that happening.

The big question, I think, is this: Are they likely to take away some of the tax benefits — like the 529 plan's ability to grow tax-free? As in, they just come in and say they're making it all taxable to pay the bills they've accumulated up in Washington, D.C. from all their stupid behavior. That kind of thing actually could happen.

When it comes to mutual funds, you shouldn't be jumping in and out. The key is to find good ones with long track records of success and stability. Then, leave the money alone for several years and let it do its thing!

Dear James,
Sallie Mae student loans, or federally insured student loans, are insured by the government. Translation, the bank is going to still get paid 100 percent by the taxpayers, because the government is guaranteeing the loan. They have no reason to settle with you.

They're not going to settle with you on the principal amount or the interest, James. You might be able to talk them down on the collection fees. They jack those way up. But the original amount you borrow, plus the actual interest that hasn't been paid, is guaranteed by the government. They'll get it from one of you!



Adopting Dietary Changes for Diabetes

Dietary changes are an essential component of treating diabetes. Typically, the diagnosis of diabetes includes nutrition classes to learn the how and what to eat to minimize blood sugar fluctuations. My husband, Tim, was diagnosed with diabetes in 2001. He completed a series of nutrition courses where he was to learn the standard recommendations are to restrict portion sizes and limit the amount of carbohydrates. The eating recommendations are intended to improve the food choices that contributed to the presence of diabetes. Many of those with diabetes struggle with compliance with a restrictive eating plan.

Tim will tell you that his eating habits were poor. He ate many processed foods, fast-food meals whenever he could get them, regular (not diet) soft drinks and plenty of chocolate bars. After the warning from the doctor and visits with a nutritionist, who explained the diabetes diet restrictions, his dietary choices

did not change. He continued to eat fast foods, high-fructose soft drinks, and chocolate bars (almost daily).

By 2008, he weighed approximately 350 pounds. A healthy weight for a male of

his height and age would be less than 190 pounds. He was experiencing constant and excessive ankle pain and regular attacks of gout, a type of inflammation caused by the buildup of uric acid. Organ

meats, bacon, and being overweight are all contributors to gout. He had high blood pressure, despite multiple medications. His blood sugar continued to be high.

At that time, he began walking more frequently and revised his diet slightly, attempting to make "better" choices at each meal. He continued to drink soft drinks containing high-fructose corn syrup, roughly a 12 pack each week. He didn't think it was possible, or necessary, to give up the soft drinks.

In 2010, the doctor wanted him to begin diabetes medication. He had lost 70 pounds at that point, the ankle pain was somewhat reduced and the gout was occurring less frequently. He had not adopted the recommendations for a diabetic eating plan, but continued to regularly eat ice cream, potato chips and chocolate. Of course, the soft-drink habit continued. He avoided the diabetes medication for the time being. Next week, how the diabetes medication let to dietary changes.

TAME STRESS BEFORE IT GOES TO YOUR MIDDLE

TEveryday events can cause you to feel stressed -- and that's not all bad. Brief blasts of stress can focus your attention, motivate you to strive harder, even delight you with the joy of competition. And there's some research that shows that those super-charged, fleeting moments may improve your memory and strengthen your immune system.

But chronic stress that cranks up your tension without relief?

That's a whole other ballgame. And, according to a new study from Ohio State's Institute for Behavioral Medicine Research, when you combine chronic tension (that you cannot or do not dispel) with even one high-fat, high-calorie, comfort-food meal a week ... screech! ... you slow your metabolism enough to cause an 11-pound weight gain in just one year. (This study looked at women, but we think the phenomenon is worth watching regardless of your gender.)

Turns out having a stressful day, then overeating or downing comfort food (36 percent of you say that's your stress response) sends a "make more insulin" message to your pancreas. Researchers say these insulin

spikes slow down fat-burning in the body and send excess calories into fat cells for storage!

So if you've had to deal with a major high-anxiety event in the past year or you find that chronic stress is interfering with your life, listen up! You can change how stress affects your health, happiness -- and waistline.

Step No. 1: Remind yourself that stress is trying to help you. A growing stack of scientific research (in humans, not lab mice!) reveals that how you think about stress plays a role in how harmful it is, or isn't. In several studies, people who saw stress as their body's way to gear them up for a difficult task, and not as a health threat, had lower levels of the stress hormone cortisol, and that's good, because cortisol makes you want to eat high-fat, high-carb, high-calorie food.

Step No. 2: Use stress as fuel for physical activity. Exercise is one of the best ways we know to help you manage your response to a stressful event. Whether you've got five minutes for a brisk walk or 30 minutes for some strength-training moves, take advantage of these opportunities to release tension. You'll burn

calories, feel energized, calm food cravings and avoid a metabolic slowdown.

Step No. 3: Practice profound relaxation. Find a quiet place to meditate at least once a day. Just 25 minutes of easy mindfulness is all it takes to tame tension, says a new report from Pittsburgh's Carnegie Mellon University. Sit comfortably or lie down; close your eyes and gently breathe in and out. Focus on your inhalations and exhalations. When your mind wanders (it does for everyone), refocus on your breath. Start by practicing this technique for three days in a row. In the study, that was enough to keep levels of cortisol lower even when you encounter stressors later.

Step No. 4: Go for a stress- and waist-reducing diet. Instead of reaching for a food felon (any sugary, fatty food) when you feel tense, pull out fresh veggies -- just like Dr. Mike does. Chop them into medium-size, equal pieces, toss with a little olive oil mixed with seasonings (we recommend garlic, oregano and rosemary, but any spices you love would work). Spread on a lightly oiled cookie sheet or in a roasting pan; then roast in a 275-degree oven

for 45 minutes. Flip the veggies over halfway through cooking. Dr. Mike's favorite: Fresh asparagus. Great idea: Exercise, meditate or both while your favorite veggies are cooking.

Step No. 5: Tackle your NUTs -- that's Nagging Unfinished Tasks! Don't underestimate how NUTS they can make you. A month's worth of unfiled paperwork; the lawn that's gone to weeds; the thank-you notes unwritten -- as they pile up, chronic stress rises and rises. Do what we do: After steps 1 through 4, make a personal list of what's driving you NUTS. Tackle them one at a time. You'll feel serene instead of stressed.

with the option to revisit the date depending on whether his services were needed to facilitate the transition to a new administrator or with unfinished projects.

On the same note Commissioner Tony Cutler opened the meeting by giving his resignation as Deputy Mayor and immediately after it was "regretfully" accepted he nominated Commissioner Mark Penzien to the position, Penzien was approved. As the final speaker of the meeting Cutler explained that his job will be taking him to Iowa and although he will return in November he would be missing many meetings. "We owe it to the citizens of East Jordan to have somebody who's going to be here," he said. He concluded stating that he would be back in November. "Maybe I'll run again," he said.

Commissioners voted to finance half of the \$102,500 cost of a new Trackless 4WD Diesel Articulated Tractor and pay cash for the other half. As of the end of June the equipment fund only had \$121,000 and the city still has outstanding loans for the dump truck and front-


end loader. The split financing arrangement will prevent the depletion of cash reserves. The tractor comes with a high capacity snowblowing attachment and an angled power brush attachment. There is only one planned future purchase of equipment in the fund in the current 5-year Capital Plan. The commission voted to finance the \$51,250 through Charlevoix State Bank for 3-Year IPA at 2.25% interest.

A public hearing on the possibility of vacating part of the public alley south of Water Street, running east/west between Lake Street & McKenzie Street was set for September 2 at 6:45 just prior to the regular meeting. The hearing was set at the request of residents Tom and Sally Gilmore who desire to purchase a burned out home on McKenzie Street but are running into zoning and ordinance issues.

Joyce Chanda was appointed to the Housing Commission Board for the remainder of the 5-year term expiring December 31, 2016. The seat was vacated by Scott Skop.

The next East Jordan City Commission meeting is set for Tuesday, September 2 at 7 p.m.

Acacia Commander Keith Bills addressed the council, "At first glance it looks like the navigable concerns are real, 5 slips may be doable, you need to pay attention to what the slip operators are saying sometimes you do need a wide angle of approach," he said. Other public input comments ranged from hoping the city will give residents first option to the slips to what will be done with the income generated from the slips. After questions arose concerning the need for the slips Harbormaster Hal Evans stated that during the 6 peak weeks of summer he turns away on average 4 sixty foot or larger vessels a week because there is no place to dock them. There were comments made about the Marina expansion committee and Councilman Shirley Gibson stated that the committee that consists of 2 council members and city staff is "inappropriate." No action was taken. Another public hearing will be held at the September 2 Council meeting.

An FAA grant to complete phase three of the ramp rehabilitation and expansion of the airport apron was accepted. The final project is scheduled to begin spring 2015 and is required due to deteriorating asphalt. A bid to Elmer's Crane and Dozer in the amount of \$1,549,066 to begin construction and an engineering contract with RS&H Michigan, Inc. in the amount of \$151,000 were also ap-

proved. Immediately afterward, Airport Manager Scott Woody informed the council that he was retiring as of this coming Saturday. "I was made a promise by Mr. Straebel that I would not be micromanaged, that has happened and today he told me my heart is not in this job," he said as explanation. "This is not good, we need to get to the bottom of this," said Council Member Gibson. Woody left the meeting room immediately and the meeting proceeded without pause.

Present City Clerk Joyce Golding was officially appointed as Clerk based on election results. The option placed on the ballot to make the position an appointed rather than elected position passed 521 to 345.

A new Nuisance Ordinance was introduced by City Planner Mike Spence. "At this point since it is a fairly substantial change we'd like to allow a month for the public to hear about it," he said. The ordinance is intended to clarify language and add a legally sound process for addressing dangerous and dilapidated buildings in the city. Spence stated there were presently 4 buildings that would be affected by the ordinance. "We know this is not the perfect ordinance at this point we are looking for some constructive comments," said City Manager Rob Straebel. A public hearing on the ordinance will be held at the September 15 meeting.

The next City Council meeting is set for September 2. Please note the meeting is on a Tuesday due to the Labor Day holiday.



types to use, what materials are to be used, what colors, in what sequence and by what methods they are to be assembled on the hook. There are thousands of possible fly patterns to use.
