

Council donates plots for organic garden, Changes plan for mural

CHARLEVOIX: On Monday, City Council decided to donate garden plots to a local citizen interested in growing food to donate to area food pantries, and discussed taking wording off of a mural that will be downtown this summer.

The first subject of donating garden plots was raised by Janice McKay, a local farmer who hopes to grow an organic garden whose produce will be donated to area food pantries. McKay asked council to donate 10 plots of land to her for this purpose. The city owns these plots, which are located north of Harbor Industries, and has rented them out for a \$25 fee to those interested in

gardening there since the 1960's. McKay requested that the council not charge her for the 24 ft by 24 ft plots, but that they donate them as the intention is to help others in Charlevoix. The cost if not donated would be \$250.

"This is creating a chance for people to have fresh vegetables. It helps in decreasing poverty, putting money someplace else, and being healthy," stated McKay.

The city contacted some of the local pantries, and verified that they would be willing to accept donations of fresh produce from these plots. Pantries such as Third Day Fellowship and the Charlevoix Community Food Pantry welcomed the donations as fresh vegetables are rarely do-

nated currently. Interim City Manager Mike Spencer indicated that the plots are available, and that this would be a nice way for the city to help those in need.

Later in the meeting the second issue regarding a mural that will be placed on the side of the Central Drug building was

brought up again, despite it's having been already commissioned. The discussion was led by Deputy Mayor Jeff Porter, who stated that he had no issues with the artistic aspect of the mural, but took objection to the wording that is currently in the plan for it.

The mural is a project created by the DDA, who received grant funding to help create art in a public space. The DDA commissioned muralist Katherine Larson to create the 5 panel scene that depicts various aspects of Charlevoix with the words "Welcome to Charlevoix the Beautiful" inscribed on it. According to Porter, the words make the mural a sign, and if it is a sign, then it violates the city's sign ordinance.

"If it looks like a sign, it reads like a sign, it is a sign," stated Porter.

He then spoke to Spencer about how the wording violated the ordinance, and voiced his de-

CHARLEVOIX--Bridge Street Blooms in Charlevoix will once again add a splash of glistening color to the landscape upon opening this week but now the eye catching foliage is spilling out of a larger, fully automated permanent greenhouse.

In 2012, Chris and Mary Hel-

strom took their knowledge of retail and erected a hoop house on the main drag through Charlevoix, filled it with healthy, aromatic plants and invited the public to browse and shop. Five years later the idea is a proven success, the hoop house has been replaced with a fully automated climate controlled greenhouse with a cement entryway that

mimics the look of dirt and moss. "Here we have retail at its best because when people walk through that door they are immediately happy and when they leave they are even happier," said Mary.

The building isn't the only thing that has expanded. They now sell trees, shrubberies, bulk

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

County Recycling program under review

Township Hall upgrades may cost over \$100,000

ELLSWORTH--A crowded Banks Township Board meeting opened with public comment on recycling, roads and the warning siren. The board examined blueprints of the proposed hall upgrades and election inspectors were appointed.

A committee established to research the costs and logistics related to making electrical and ADA upgrades to the hundred year-old Township Hall reported that they received an estimate of \$115,000 to reroute the front stair-

well and install a lift. "I would just like to get support of the board to get some bids on the project," said Township Clerk Donna Heeres. A motion was passed to direct the building committee to advertise for bids. A walk through for interested contractors will be set and blueprints will be available online and in the Township office. Bids are due by June 10.

Fire Chief Mark Groenink brought the siren that sits on the roof of the Township Hall to the board's attention. The siren hasn't been sounded in 8 years. When federal regulations changed emergency channels to narrow band the siren was not updated. "It kinda got forgotten, so it probably doesn't work," said Groenink who explained that if the township wanted the siren up

and running it would only be a matter of \$400-500. "It's just a matter of resetting the controller," he said. The board agreed to gather public opinion on whether people felt the siren was an important element of the community.

County Commissioner Dave Heeres attended the meeting to inform the board of the county's issues with the recycling centers. "Just like everything it costs a lot of money, it's upward of \$400,000. What do we do?" he asked. Heeres passed out a flyer discussing costs attached to recycling with four funding options. "I didn't realize we were taking such a hit," said Supervisor Thomas Mann. Heeres asked the board to get public input on the issue.

Options for the recycling centers include: 1) the county continuing to pay for the program out of the general fund, 2) a voter-approved county-wide millage, 3) a surcharge to property tax bills or 4) the end of the recycling program. He explained that while the costs of recycling and county operations are rising, the county's revenues haven't increased since 2007. "At some point we'd like a consensus or a feel from John Q Public," he said.

With the snow melted and spring in full swing, Lakeshore Drive residents are once again expressing their need for a solution to the road's slimy muck issues. "We felt the road's condition has reached an all-time low," said Jack Costolo a Lakeshore Drive resident. The road was resurfaced with Afton Stone in 2013 but the stone and clay mixture has caused new problems for the wet

road. Board members expressed concern for the plight of residents but have other roads in the township that are in equally poor condition. Discussion was left off with both residents and the Township Supervisor intending to talk to the County Road Commission.

A state election will be held this May 5 to vote on Proposal 1 concerning road funding. Nancy Zimmerman, Marilyn Ferweda, Irene Shooks, Judy Smith, Jim Maine, Debbie Ulrey Anna Austin, Brenda Powers and alternates Jeff Cook and Sue Tillotson were appointed to work the election.

The next meeting will be held May 18 at 7 P.M.





bark mulch, pottery, various gardening supplies and even more perennials. "These plants just love it in here," said Mary.

The building may look different but the policies have remained the same, knowledge and good service are number one. Chris' love for horticulture was discovered when he operated Bosman's Family Farm and Fleet. His favorite part of the store was the nursery. Mary's love of gardening was discovered closer to home. "My addiction started with my perennial beds," she said. East Jordan finalizes city budget

EAST JORDAN-The East Jordan City Commission wrapped up discussions for the 2015/16 fiscal year budget at Tuesday evening's meeting.

Final budget discussions revolved around a new policy concerning frozen water lines that city administrator Tom Cannon plans to put in place. The commission came to a consensus that when a "run-water" has been issued and a homeowner refuses to let their drain drip, the

city would charge the homeowner for having to service any frozen water lines.

In the past, the city has not billed homeowners for this service. Cannon hopes that this policy will deter homeowners from refusing to run water when the city has issued a notice.

Cannon also updated the commission regarding the restored siren at Tuesday's meeting. The siren will be fully operational within a couple of weeks, with the cement pad being laid this week. At its new central location, the siren will be ringing a 9:30 curfew call once again sometime this spring.

The 2014/15 Leadership Charlevoix County (LCC) class will be bringing new designs to the Little Traverse Conservancy pathway located on Echo and Erie Streets. Cannon says LCC is coordinating with the city to construct a parking/welcome area at the scenic pathway,

which runs near the Jordan River and goes to Rogers Road. The project is planned for completion by early

this summer.

For anyone looking to have a conversation with elected officials, Cannon has arranged for so-called office hours with State Senator Wayne Schmidt and State Representative Triston Cole at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, May 8 at City Hall. For more information, contact City Hall at (231) 536-3381.

The next regular meeting of the East Jordan City Commission is scheduled for 7 p.m., Tuesday, May 5, 2015.

Mi Drive traffic information app downloaded 40,000 times

Michigan motorists have a new tool to help them navigate around construction zones this year - the Mi Drive traffic information app. The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) says there have been more than 40,000 downloads of the free app since it was introduced in November 2014.

"The summer driving season is always hectic but it's no secret there's work to be done on our aging infrastructure," said State Transportation Director Kirk T. Steudle. "Part of MDOT's job is not only to do the best job we can maintaining Michigan's transportation infrastructure with the resources available, but also to keep motorists safe, informed, and mobile. Mi Drive does a great job of helping MDOT serve the public."

According to the Pew Research Center's April 1 report "U.S. Smartphone Use in 2015", nearly twothirds of Americans own a smartphone, and 40 percent of smartphone owners look up government services or information. Connect Michigan has found 1.4 million Michiganders access the Internet daily on their smartphones.

Mi Drive uses Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) technology, speed sensors, cameras and cell phone data to provide motorists with real-time information about factors that can affect travel. The site currently displays real-time traffic camera views, real-time color-coded speeds on major routes, message boards, work zones, rest areas and Welcome Centers across Michigan, MDOT carpool lots, and National Weather Service forecasts by city name or zip code.

"Everything about solitary is meant to dehumanize you and turn you against yourself and everyone else," says Shourd. "As I got worse, the limited time I was allowed with my fellow hikers became my lifeline and gave me the strength to fight against my conditions."

Participants will consider the consequences of loneliness and how they can avoid experiencing it.

Admission to the 60-minute event is free. Snacks and beverages are available. Lifetree Café is located at 401 S Park Street in Boyne City.

Health & Wellness Charlevoix Area Hospital stages disaster drill

Charlevoix Area Hospital and each of its eight off-site locations today took part in an area-wide emergency preparedness drill, simulating tornado damage to the area around the hospital with ensuing medical emergencies. While all departments of the hospital participated in the drill, real patient care remained unaffected.

Actors served as patients being admitted to the hospital's emergency department with critical, life-threatening injuries. One of the big "takeaway's" from the drill was the ability of all departments to have the opportunity to "think through" and formulate clear plans as to what their particular departments would do if presented with a real disaster in or around the hospital.

Throughout the drill, different scenarios (or IN-JECTS, as Homeland Security calls them) were presented to the Incident Command Center, at which time the Center's team of eleven members responded to each scenario appropriately, providing staff members with clear direction and support. After the drill was over, supervisors and managers were asked to have a conversation with each staff member about

how to handle such a scenario if it really occurred.

Sandy Bennett, Emergency Department Manager, and also an Incident Command Team member, was particularly proud of her staff for their quick thinking and response to the particularly challenging scenarios they faced. "We respond to emergency situations each and every day, but generally they are on a small scale and we are able to deal with them oneby-one. When faced with a 'disaster' of this scale, our entire team has to be organized and able to quickly respond appropriately. 'Going the extra mile' is

crucial, and I'm proud of my team for stepping up to the plate."

These drills, which are essential to patient and staff safety, play a large role in the preparedness of the hospital.

Chris Wilhelm, Chief Operating Officer and part of the Incident Command Team explained, "Employees understand that if you work in a hospital or medical office, sooner or later you are likely to be faced with 'unusual' or 'crisis' situations in which you have to think on your feet and make a few critical thinking decisions, following an Incident Command


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
