Police Officer Wounded in Shooting in Boyne Valley

BOYNE VALLEY TWP: According to officials a police officer was shot on May 16 on M-75 between Boyne Falls and Boyne City when a suspect opened fire on police offi-

The suspect was stopped by police around 9 pm after a citizen observed him pass their location. The suspect was wanted for questioning regarding a recent vehicle theft. Multiple police officers responded to the report, and pulled the suspect over. However, what

may have been a routine stop abruptly became violent. Initially the suspect refused to exit his vehicle, however he eventually did exit the vehicle and pulled out a handgun and began firing. One of the shots fired hit Corporal Fred Hasty of the Charlevoix County Sheriff's Department in the upper right leg.

According to a press release given by the State Police, the officers felt that the suspect "posed a threat of imminent mortal harm to the police officers present." Four officers immediately returned fire and hit the suspect three times.

The suspect sustained wounds to his abdomen, hand, and leg. There were six officers on the scene, four from the County Sheriff's Department, one from the Boyne City Police Department, and a State Police Officer from the Gaylord Post.

After the suspect stopped firing, the police were able to arrest him and get Corporal Hasty into an ambulance. Hasty was transported to Munson Medical Center in Traverse City where his non life threatening injuries were treated. His recovery is expected to take several months.

As for the suspect, his wounds were also non-life threatening and he is expected to recover. He was taken to McLaren Northern Michigan Hospital. According to Sheriff Don Schneider, the suspect is a middle aged Boyne City resident. Currently, they are waiting to release his name until he is medically cleared by doctors, something that could take several



ELLSWORTH VILLAGE COUNCIL MEETING, MAY 11, 2015

Crowdfunding will be launched to help finance new Community Square

ELLSWORTH--Everything is in place to begin fundraising for a new Community Square and the possibility of eliminating the Tuesday evening farm market were topics of discussion at the May 11 Village Council meeting.

Village President Hugh Campbell announced that the Crowdfunding event to finance the new Community Square will be launched sometime this summer after Ellebration and before Paddle Antrim festivals. Crowdfunding is the practice of funding a project or venture by raising

monetary contributions from a large number of people via the internet. A goal of \$60,000 for phase one of the improvement of the lot next to the Township Hall is set with a goal of \$25,000 to be raised via crowdfunding. The MEDC will match any funds raised. For those who are not internet savvy but want to contribute to the project, the village have established an account at Charlevoix State Bank. "Now's the people's chance to step forward. People have complained about that corner for years," he

Campbell informed the coun-

cil that there may not be a farm market this year. After two years of holding the market which included hiring a market manager and only one vendor selling on a regular basis, Campbell is leaving the fate of the market up to that vendor. "I'll talk to Bob and see if he still plans to be there," he said.

The village is required to develop a policy concerning the freedom of information act. A written policy must be completed by July 15. Campbell suggested hiring Attorney Peter Wendling of Bellaire to write up the paperwork that will detail

any potential issues that could arise. "We've never had any trouble," he said. No decision was made.

Trustee Lynn Spearing gave report on the progress of the upcoming Pig Roast/Ellebration. She told the board that the festival would include new activities for teens. "One of the complaints when we had the group meeting was that there wasn't any events for teens. So it's good to see these things coming together," she said concerning the events the Pig Roast committees are working on. A motion to contribute \$250 to the Pig Roast and

\$1,000 to the fireworks was passed. Fireworks are scheduled for July 3.

Trustee Scott Sowers brought a concern about no visibility exiting the alley adjacent to the Front Porch when cars are parked too close to it. Conversation about the possibility of painting the curb yellow on either side of the alley entrance was held but no decision was made.

The Breezeway Garage Sale will be held May 22-23.

The next Village Council meeting is scheduled for June 8 at 7 P.M.

Veteran of the Month - May 2015

The "Veteran of the Month" for May 2015 is James Perry Bennett. Born Aug. 3rd, 1916 on the family farm in Antrim County, Mich. Bennett attended the Bennett School in Antrim, County, that was built by his grandfather, during the early grades, continuing his education through the 8th grade in Rudyard, Mich. He then worked on his father's farm until June 4th, 1934 when he enlisted in the Civilian Conservation Corps and was assigned to the 674th Company, Camp Hartwick Pines, Grayling, Mich. working in reforestation until Jan 17th, 1936 when Bennett was reassigned to the 2676th Company, Camp Simpson, Simpson, Ill. where he served as an erosion control worker until being discharge on Mar. 31st, 1936 receiving the project mangers report stating that Bennett was "A workman satisfactory in ability and performance". Bennett returned to his father's farm doing farm work and lumbering and on Sept. 18th, 1937 Bennett, in East Jordan, married Fern Virginia

Gee. In Nov. of 1944 he went to work for the East Jordan and Southern Rail Road as a locomotive engineer firing the boiler and operating the locomotive. On Mar. 1st, 1945 Bennett was inducted into the Army, entering into active service in Chicago, Ill., and following basic and specialty training, where he qualified expert with the M1 Garande rifle, Bennett departed the USA on Aug. 14th, 1945 arriving in the Pacific Theater of Operations on Sept. 8th, 1945 and was one of the first units of occupation in Japan following the dropping of the atomic bombs. He was assigned to Service Unit Company, 126th Infantry Regiment serving as a light truck driver and drove trucks up to and including 2.5 tons hauling personnel, supplies, equipment, serviced, cleaned, lubricated, maintained vehicles, did minor and road repairs on vehicles, did night driving and also drove a bull dozer. On Dec. 29th, 1945 Bennett departed the Pacific Theater of Operations arriving in the USA on Jan. 14th, 1946 and on Jan. 22nd,

1946, at the Separation Center, Fort Sheridan, Ill. Bennett received an Honorable Discharge, having attained the Non-Commissioned Officer rank of Private First Class and was awarded the following Decorations and Awards: The Victory Medal, The Asiatic Pacific The-

ater Medal and The Expert Infantryman Badge. Returning home Bennett worked at the East Jordan Canning Factory and in 1955 went to work at the East Jordan Iron Works retiring in 1978. Bennett was a member of the East Jordan VFW and the East Jordan American Legion Post 227 and enjoyed working bingo and serving in the Legion Honor Guard at funerals, was an avid bowler, enjoyed gardening, especially his tomato plants, sitting in the sun and spending quality time with his family and friends. On Sept. 8th, 2005 James Perry Bennett answered the final call and is being honored by his children and their fami-

Director of Mom and Tots focuses on Education

ELLSWORTH - The service based organization known as Mom and Tots has spent the last year in local schools in an attempt to meet potential clients before they have a need to visit the center committed to empowering individuals through education to make informed choices regarding pregnancy, sexual health and parenting.

Mom and Tots opened in 2001 because of a rising awareness of the needs of struggling mothers. The volunteer run organization utilizes a three tiered approach to helping the clients that visit the ranch style center that was built by the Charlevoix High School trade class.

Education is one of

those tiers. "The thing that we have really worked on since I've come here is the educational aspect," said Director Gayle Kroon. Since she became director of the center in July 2014, Kroon and the assistant director, Lorraine Eklund, launched an abstinence based sex education curriculum called 'Willing to Wait.' The program which meets all Michigan educational requirements was presented by the center's trained educators in 4 classrooms in 3 different schools this year. The 7 week course is intended to get young people to start thinking differently about sex before there is a need for the center's services. Of the many educational aspects they provide this curriculum is what Kroon refers to as their only proactive activity so far. "This is something we can do to make a difference before they walk through our

door," she said. The goal of

the educational aspect of the center is to teach parenting skills. "We want you to be the best parent you can be," said Kroon. Moms can earn strollers, cribs and other larger needed items by watching videos and a new counseling room downstairs is intended to provide a safe haven for Dads to relax

and talk to mentors. Relationships are the first of the three tiers. "We care, we ask how you're doing and actually want to hear the answer," she said. Some clients come to the center located on Pleasant Hill Road and stay for hours. "To get away from the chaos in life. They're not all pregnant teenagers, sometimes they just need a hand up," said Kroon. Building relationships with their clients allows volunteers to present struggling parents with

friendships and options they wouldn't otherwise have considered possible. "Every one of us comes with our own stories and who knows if that's the story that one of our client's needs to hear or the person who needs to listen," she said.

The third tier is resources. "When life gets hard 24 diapers can be a huge blessing," said Kroon. The center provides formula, diapers, and baby clothes. "We become that door opener to their life that is hopefully able to help them with their physical, emotional and spiritual needs, we care and these things are sometimes what you need to get over that bump in the road," she said., 231-588-2200.






Good Samaritan Resale Shop & Food Pantry

Serving families in need for 25 years

Back in 1990, Ellsworth resident Mary Peterson had an idea...or perhaps it was more of a calling.

"I was visiting a local resale shop and I saw people searching through the trash for something they could use," she recalls. "I just knew there had to be a way to set up a new system for distributing goods to those in need, so I began looking for people who could pursue that idea."

Twenty-five years later, the result of that inspiration; Good Samaritan Family Services, is

celebrating two-and-a-half decades of following a mission statement of "servicing the Lord by reaching out to those in need,' providing food and outreach programs to local families who could use a little help.

Petersen recalls, "When we began our mission, it was located in the old fire hall in town, we received support from local churches and it was ran by a small group of volunteers." At that time, about 30 families visited the facility each month.

Today, approximately 700 fami-

lies visit Good Samaritan's Food Pantry each month. Since the facility first opened they have served an astounding 78,827 families, primarily from Antrim County though about a quarter of those families are from Charlevoix County. A crew of some 95 volunteers helps to stock and distribute the food supplies, oversee the non-profit organization's Resale Shop, Good Samaritan Furniture & More Store, and assist new mothers at their affiliated Moms & Tots Center.

"The need has grown over the years," Mary relates. "People's stories tug at your heart. Our

senor population has grown and we are seeing more seniors seeking assistance here, though they can be reluctant to ask for help."

She adds, "Everyone who gets food also gets free clothing. People can visit once a month, and we try to give them enough to last a bit longer. A lot of our food comes from the Manna Food Proiect, which we receive at a very good discount, so we can really stretch dollars that are donated."

About a year ago, Good Samaritan Family Services added "Sammy's Shoes" at the Resale Shop, which offers a huge assort-

ment of new shoes in virtually every size, style and color. This newest addition was made possible through a Great Lakes People Fund grant and a grant from the YAK group at the Charlevoix County Community Foundati Families in need can pick up a brand new pair of shoe for a small donation or even for free if they are unable to afford the donation.

Mary notes that Good Samaritan is planning a celebration for their 25th anniversary on August 21st and 22nd, though details are still in the works. This coming



BANKS TOWNSHIP MEETING, MAY 18, 2015

Road improvements planned in Banks Township

ELLSWORTH--Roads were the topic of discussion at the Banks Township May 18 Board meeting.

A contract with the Antrim County Road Commission for crack fill and chip sealing of Banks Township Park Road, Brown Road, Jollife Road, Antrim Dells Drive, Doctor Road, Eaton Road, Old Dixie, US31, Atwood Road, and Essex Road was approved. The county once paid 50% of road work but now only pay 10%. The total cost of the maintenance is \$138,412. The township's share of the project is \$124,571. "That's a lot of money," said Trustee Tom Cooper.

Complaints about the condition

of seasonal roads in the township has provoked the board to look into problem roads with year round residents. North Dennis Road has been maintained by resident, Dave Draper who is an engineer by trade, for the last 18 years. After an exceptionally wet spring Draper approached the board because of the poor condition of the road with a proposal for the residents that live there to pay for half of the cost of having 3 inches of gravel spread on the road. "At this point we'd like to proceed with the improvement if the township will fund half of it and we fund the other half," said Draper. The total cost of the improvement is \$19,773. A motion to pay \$9,886.50 to have gravel

spread on the road was approved with the rationale that because of all the time and expense put into the road by Draper over the years, the assistance is only fair. Another letter from a landowner on Lakeshore Drive instigated conversation on what the township can do to help with drainage problems. "There's no way we can do something quickly with this," said Supervisor Thomas Mann. "At this point I don't know if we can do much more." Trustee Tom Cooper suggested spreading a layer of slag over the road as a short term solution. The board agreed to talk to Antrim County Road Commission Director Burt Thompson about the viability of that solution.

Jaris Rubingh with the Antrim County Farm Bureau spoke during public comment, informing the board that an Avian Flu outbreak has killed over a million chickens in Iowa and is spreading to other states. "Expect the prices to rise, the price of chicken is expected to double which is going to drive the price of beef up," he said. "We're just really hoping it doesn't come to Michigan, there's nothing you can do if it does except kill them." He added that the price of milk is expected to rise because of a demand for dairy products in China.

Village President Hugh Campbell asked the board if the township would contribute \$5,000 to phase one of the Community

Square project. They approved his request. Campbell said that the Crowd Funding campaign will be launched on July 1.

A joint meeting of the township Board and the Planning Commission to discuss amendments to land division ordinances was scheduled for May 27 at 6 P.M. the township zoning administrator, planning consultant and assessor will be present at the meeting.

Paddle Antrim is scheduled for September 18 and 19. Online registration should begin soon.

The next Banks Township Board meeting will be held on June 15 at 7 P.M.



MAY IS MENTAL HEALTH MONTH

Estimates are that more than 40 million adults in the United States have a mental illness in a given year, nearly 19% of adults. This statistic includes mental, behavioral, and emotional disorders. This does not include developmental or substance abuse disorders.

Approximately 4% of adults in the U.S. have a serious mental illness. Serious mental illness are those "resulting in series functional impairment, which substantially interferes with or limits one or more major life activities, cording to National Institutes of Mental Health. The costs of serious mental illness alone are enormous, more than \$300 million annually.

Three main categories of mental illness are: Anxiety disorders, mood disorders, and schizophrenia/psychotic disorders. While we all may experience anxiety in reaction to stress, an anxiety disorder is more persistent, difficult for the individual to control, and may negatively affect day-to-day functioning. In a given year, approximately 18 percent

of the adult U.S. population experiences an anxiety disorder, with 22.8% of these (4.1% overall population) considered severe. Women are 60% more likely to experience anxiety disorders.

Mood disorders are those having a persistent impact on person's emotional state. In a given year, approximately 10% of the adult U.S. population has a mood disorder. Major depression and bi-polar disorder, cycling between depression and mania, are mood disorders. Women are 50% more likely to have a mood disorder in their lifetimes.

Schizophrenia is a disabling mental disorder of deficits in thought processes and emotional responsiveness. Persons with schizophrenia may experience delusions, hallucinations, believe others are trying to read their minds or plotting against them. Approximately 1% of the U.S. adult population has schizophrenia annually.

Mental Health America is promoting the goal of "Changing the Way We Think About Mental Health." Compared to illnesses such as cancer, heart disease or diabetes, mental illness is

often untreated for years. Symptoms of cancer or heart disease are treated in early stages. A persistent cough or high blood pressure will prompt a visit to the doctor.

While nearly 1 in 5 American adults experience mental illness each year, only 41% will receive services. According to a recent mental health parity report, Michigan ranks 36th among all states in terms of availability of services for adults with mental disorders and 44th for availability of youth mental health services.

If you have racing thoughts, have recently had difficulty sleeping, or believe you may have a mental health condition, consider being screened for depression, anxiety, or bipolar disorder. Talk to your doctor or contact a local mental health organization, such as North County Community Mental Health, which serves Antrim, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Emmet, Kalkaska and Otsego Counties (1-800-834-3393). Treatment for mental illness is available and effective.

ered two other guns inside of the vehicle. According to State Police, all three weapons are believed to have been stolen.

Boater's Safety Classes to be held

The Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office will be offering Boater's Safety classes on the following dates;

June 6, 9:00am-1:00pm, Charlevoix Yacht Club

June 13, 9:00am-1:00pm, Melrose Township Hall

All classes are free of charge. Minimum age for class attendance is 10 years of age. It is recommended that students eat prior to class or bring a small snack to class. Due to the short duration of the course, there will be no meal time. Students receiving a satisfactory test grade will receive their Michigan Boating Safety Certificate at the conclusion of the

Completion of this class is MANDATORY for individuals: (1) born after December 31, 1978 to operate a PWC (jet ski) (2) and for anyone born on or after July 1, 1996 to operate a boat.

Please note that individuals must be at least 14 to operate a PWC. 14 and 15 year olds must be within 100 ft. of a parent, guardian or designee at least 21 yrs. of age to operate a PWC. Individuals must be at least 16 to operate a PWC by themselves. Individuals born after December 31, 1978 must have their boater's safety in their possession when operating a PWC. Individuals born on or after July 1, 1996 must also have their boater's safety in their possession when operating a boat.

Individuals can also take the boater's safety class on-line at the Michigan DNR website (www.Boaterexam.com or www.Boated.com) at their convenience. There is a fee for the on-line class. Upon successful completion of the on-line class individuals can print out their Michigan Boating Safety Certificate right at home.

East Jordan talks water meter upgrades and new policy

EAST JORDAN - It was all about water at the East Jordan City Commission's Tuesday, May 19 meeting, with talks of water meter upgrades and establishing a policy for frozen water and sewer lines.

In his short time as new city administrator, Tom Cannon has been busy tackling new projects and checking things off the todo list. Next in line: getting the city on a monthly billing system for water and sewer charges. And to achieve this goal, the city will need to upgrade the current water meters.

Currently, city staff has to physically approach each meter and scan it in order to get a reading. This time consuming process can take four to five days every three months to complete and takes an additional week to finalize billing. This method also makes detecting leaks very difficult.

"Doug Sineway was instrumental in getting the new (Sensus) meters years ago...but it's been too many years before we've taken the next step," said Cannon.

The next step might include one of Cannon's recommended options for more accurate and timely readings. One recommendation Cannon brought to the board for discussion was upgrading the city's current Sensus meters to RadioRead. With an upgrade installed at each meter, a powerful vehicle transceiver could read equipped meters from up to a quarter mile away. Staff would simply have to drive through city streets, and the transceiver would collect the readings wirelessly. Details could be accessed on the computer quickly, allowing for detection of leaks and timely billing. A process that currently takes up to two weeks might be completed in a single day.

Commissioners requested

that Cannon look into costs of RadioRead, as well as another option that includes having readings sent wirelessly using cell phone towers. If the city opted to use a network that would use cell phone towers to collect the readings, all water meters would need to be replaced, not simply upgraded.

With the harsh winter seasons northern Michigan has experienced the last two years, the East Jordan City Commission asked to have a water/sewer frozen line policy created. Cannon presented a policy Tuesday evening, establishing fees to take place effective July 1, 2015.

In general, the policy allows the city to charge for thawing of frozen lines under specific circumstances. If the freeze is a result of a homeowner not running water during a waterrun advisory, the city will charge the current overtime rate. If snow is intentionally removed from a water meter

cover and it freezes, the city will also charge the homeowner all labor costs. However, if a meter freezes at a residence when all city guidelines have been followed, the policy states that the city will provide one attempt to thaw the meter for up to two hours at no charge.

Cannon also announced that police chief Dale Boehm Jr. will be retiring this summer, with July 3 set as his last day to serve as acting chief. Cannon hopes to advertise the position in June for at least 30 days and would like to have a new chief hired by mid to late August. Many commissioners expressed their thanks and well wishes to Boehm in their final remarks at Tuesday's meeting.

The next regular meeting of the East Jordan City Commission is scheduled for 7 p.m., Tuesday, June 2, 2015.

CHARLEVOIX COUNTY COMMISSION MEETING, MAY 13, 2015

Benefits Explained / Public Hearings Set

CHARLEVOIX: At the semimonthly meeting of County Commissioners board members heard the report of the Department of Health and Human Services as well as set the date for several public hearings.

The meeting began with a report by Pat Simmons of the Department of Health and Human Services. Due to an order by Governor Rick Snyder, the Department of Human Services and the Department of Community Health merged together in April. This makes them the largest agency in the state with over 14,000 employees. Snyder gave the order in order to try and make the agencies more efficient while giving the employees more time to be in the field working on their cases.

Though the merger raises many questions as to whether or not layoffs are coming down the line to further simplify the agency, Simmons indicated that there are many in Charlevoix County who are benefitting from the agency at this time.

Simmons stated that at least 21%

of residents in Charlevoix County utilize some form of assistance. She shared some of the programs available in the area; including the Food Independence Program, Food Assistance Program, and State Disability Assistance. According to numbers from March 15, there are 10 families that rely on the Food Independence Program (FIP) in Charlevoix County at this time. The FIP program is one that offers the most assistance to families by supporting them financially but also through job training. According to Simmons, FIP is only available to those who are actively seeking work, have passed a 21 day orientation period, and who are able to abide by the programs rigid structure. FIP offers anywhere from an average of \$255 to \$350 a month depending on the family

In addition to the programs offered for assistance, Simmons also shared the current state of foster needs in the area. She stated that over 90 children are currently in need of foster care and that although that number fluctuates up and down, there is a growing need for foster families in the area. Of

the 90 children who need homes, at least 60% are babies. She expressed that the department is working diligently to show that fostering a child is a possibility for anyone. She also explained that the department is working closely with parents of children in foster care in the hopes of reuniting families more quickly.

"We are hoping to get kids home sooner," stated Simmons.

Ultimately Simmons report indicated that there is a need for foster families in the area, and that coming down the line issues with being understaffed and funding could lead to cutbacks in the department. However, at this point there are no slated plans for such to happen.

Also at the meeting, the commissioners set May 27 as the night of three public hearings. The first hearing is a Housing Grant Application, and the other two are to determine if the Dilworth Hotel and the property on Lake St. in Boyne City are eligible for Brownfield status. That meeting will be held at 7:00 p.m. in Commissioners Chambers.

Ellsworth Community Schools Scholarship Fund

ELLSWORTH--The most cited reason for graduating seniors not to go on to a post-secondary trade school, college or university is finances. Last year Ellsworth Community Schools Superintendent Aaron Gaffney and a group of concerned citizens took action to provide a means for the community to invest in the future of Ellsworth graduates through the creation of the Ellsworth Community Scholarship Fund.

They are still in the process of raising the \$2.5 million endowment that will make it possible to give each qualifying graduate an average of \$12,500 to be used to finance whichever field of study they choose. The money isn't just for college bound graduates but those who prefer a career in welding, mechanics or other trade related fields as well. "We feel it's extremely important that all students continue their education beyond high

school, whether it be community college, university or trade school," said Gaffney.

The creators of the endowment fund teamed up with the Charlevoix County Community Foundation to manage it and administer the scholarship selection process. The school provides the CCCF with a list of qualifying students at the end of each school year and those students are provided with applications. To be eligible a student only needs to have been enrolled in the district as a full-time student for 2 years and have a cumulative grade point average of 2.75. Along with the application, students need to provide the selection committee with a detailed record of community involvement and a letter telling how the scholarship will make a difference in their lives.

Recently the fund received the largest contribution to date. Dan and Debbie Edson of Traverse City gave a gift of \$100,000

towards the scholarship. Dan Edson's father taught and coached at ECS back in the 50's and is responsible for changing the name of the team mascot from the Flying Dutchmen to the Lancers. "Words cannot express our gratitude for their generosity. Mr. and Mrs. Edson's gift will help to support the post-secondary education of ECS students for years to

come," said Gaffney. The endowment fund is set up to give out 5% of the total every year. To date that equates to \$5,000. The first scholarships will be distributed to the class of 2016. "If every household in the school district pledged just \$10 per month, we would generate over onemillion dollars in less than 10 years. Every dollar pledged goes directly to funding the future education of the graduates of the Ellsworth Community School," said Gaffney.

Beaver Island Music Festival receives grant




