

Operation Petunia Plants in its 34th Year

CHARLEVOIX: In its yearly effort to keep the city of Charlevoix a gorgeous place, the Keep Charlevoix Beautiful group planted flowers along U.S. 31 for the 34th year in a row on Thursday, May 28th.

The group gathers volunteers each year to plant more than 60,000 petunias around the city. Volunteers line the sides of U.S. 31 for a 5 mile stretch in order to

plant the brightly colored flowers that Charlevoix has come to be known for. Once planted, the flowers are maintained by the group whose founder, Dale Boss, is still an instrumental figure in the aesthetic beauty of the city.


The Keep Charlevoix Beautiful effort originated in 1982 when the first meeting of the group took place; there, Boss and several others worked on ideas that would enhance the city. Boss suggested a plan to line the streets from city

limit to city limit with boldly colored petunias. To finance the plan, Boss suggested selling license plates to those in the area. Boss

Help for Home Repairs discussed by commissioners

CHARLEVOIX: At their recent meeting on Wednesday, May 27, Charlevoix County Commissioners approved of applying for a grant that could offer financial assistance to those in need of home repairs in the area this year.

The funds could come from a grant application that will be filed with the Michigan State Housing Development Authority. If approved, the grant will be administered through the Northwest Michigan Community Action Agency (NMCAA). The renewal of the grant, which required the Boards approval, is being filed for a total of \$200,000 worth of funding that will give financial assistance to those living in the area that need significant home repairs but are unable to afford them. The NMCAA gives financial support through deferred interest free loans that enable homeowners in the county to have either one significant repair done or entire home repair projects completed. The grant could allow for 7 full home repairs and 4 "emergency" repairs to be done in the county this year. "It's been a successful program...this has been a lifesaver," stated Joel Evans, Board Chairman. The NMCAA offers the repair program to those in Charlevoix County based on numerous factors; those include being a homeowner, having lived in the home for at least one year, being current on all home related payments, and having an income less than 80% of the median income for Charlevoix County. The NMCAA uses the federal funding in order to bring homes up to HUD standards. This may include helping a home owner install or repair a septic system, replace or repair heating or electric systems, repair structural support, or numerous other issues that are significant enough to warrant action.

We wish all graduating students continued success as they pursue their dreams.



News City of Charlevoix approves contract for new City Manager

CHARLEVOIX: At their regular semi-monthly meeting on Monday, City Council approved the contract of Mark Heydlauff as the new City Manager.

The need for a City Manager arose when Rob Straebel headed to Petoskey to hold a similar position in March. The city has been interviewing candidates for the position since then, and has had several good candidates apply including Interim City Manager Mike Spencer. However, in the hopes of bringing fresh eyes to the city, Council chose Heydlauff who is the current City Manager for Bronson, Michigan.

Heydlauff has worked in Bronson since 2010 as the City Manager and Planning/Zoning Administrator. During his time there he took care of daily City operations, staffing and administration of City Departments, and made recommendations to Bronson City Council for projects.

He holds a Master of Public Administration from Western Michigan University and a Bachelor of Arts from Taylor University in Indiana. He is expected to begin his time with the City of Charlevoix on July 27.

"I think he seems like a good guy, council was en-

thusiastic about hiring about him, and I think we will do well with him," said Mayor Gabe Campbell of Heydlauff.

The annual salary for City Manager in Charlevoix is \$84,000. The contract is a 3 year term, which can be renewed by council at its completion. A retirement package, benefits package, and professional development allowances were also discussed at the meeting.

"I appreciate the confidence the Charlevoix City Council placed in me by appointing me to be their next manager. Charlevoix is a great community and one of the gems of the Lake Michigan coastline. My goal is to work with Council and staff to continue to build on the strengths of the community...I am eager to get started and to meet the community," said Heydlauff in an email after the meeting.

Take Care of Your Pets

Memorial Day signals the unofficial start of summer. With temperatures this week expected to reach nearly 80 degrees, it is a good time to ask, Are your pets ready for summer? Here are a few tips for helping your pet stay healthy in hot weather.

Don't leave your pet in the car. You probably know the dangers of leaving a child in a car on a hot day - in 2013, 44 children died of heatstroke as a result of being left in a car. Since 1998, at least 500 children have died after being left in a vehicle during summer months. Don't leave your pets in the car either. If your pet can't come with you when you get out of the car, leave your pet at home. On a 90-degree day, it takes only 10 minutes for the interior to become 110 degrees. Even on a moderately warm day, the interior temperature of a vehicle can rise rapidly.

According to a study by The Animal Protection Institute, a temperature of 82 degrees in a shaded area at 9:00 a.m. resulted in a temperature of 109 degrees in a closed automobile. And, it isn't enough to crack a window - the interior temperature will quickly rise to a hazardous level. You know the feeling of entering a car on a hot summer day. How long could you tolerate that heat if you weren't able to cool off? Imagine how it would feel to your pet, stuck in that heat while you are shopping! The combination of heat and humidity is even more dangerous

for your pet. Humidity makes it even more difficult for your dog to cool off. Four-legged pets perspire around their paws and rely on panting to help cool off. Trapped in the enclosed space of a car or truck, the panting adds to the heat when the pet exhales and the pet only gets hotter. Pug-nosed dogs are more prone to heatstroke because their smaller nasal passages make it even harder to cool down by panting. Overweight, younger and senior animals are particularly limited in the ability to regulate their bodily temperatures. In fourteen states, including Minnesota and Illinois, it is illegal to leave a pet in a parked car. If you can't take your pets with you when you get out of the car, leave them safely at home.

Heatstroke can result quickly if an animal becomes overheated and is unable to cool off. Your animals are at risk for heatstroke, just like people. Your pet shouldn't be let outdoors without shelter from the heat and sun. Be careful not to over-exercise your pet take extra breaks to allow him or for longer than a few hours, ensure they have access to sufficient water and are able to move to a shady location during the hottest time of the day.

Protect the Paws! On hot days, pay attention to where and when your dog is walking. The bottom of a dog's feet will burn if the dog walks on hot pavement. To avoid burns, walk the dog in the early morning or evening and walk the dog on the grass when possible. If you need to walk a dog on the pavement, help prepare the dog for hotter summer days by frequently walking the dog on cooler days. This will help toughen the dog's paw pads. Follow this guideline - if the pavement is too hot for you to comfortably walk barefoot for very long, it is too hot for your pet also.

Check before opening a window in your home. The ASPCA reports an increase in "High-Rise Syndrome" during summer months. This refers to pets, mostly cats, falling from some height, out of a window or door. These falls can lead to serious in-

her to cool down. Keep them indoors as much as possible on very hot days. The signs of heatstroke in an animal include: Panting, rapid heartbeat, staring, fever, and warm, dry skin. Heatstroke can be fatal and requires immediate medical attention.

Dehydration can happen quickly if a pet does not have adequate water and/or is left outside in the sun, such as in a cage and unable to move to a shaded area. If you are leaving your pet alone juries and can be fatal. To avoid these falls, keep unscreened windows and doors closed and making sure that screens are tightly fastened.

Follow these tips to keep your pets safe and healthy all summer long.

10 Personal Finance Tips for Job-Searching College Grads

Many 2015 college graduates are basking in the glory of wrapping up their degrees this month. However, in many instances, their downtime will be shortlived, as they face even more responsibilities, ranging from landing that first job to preparing to start paying off their student loans.

"Graduates need to realize how much an impact their credit history can have on their future," said Kathryn Bossler, GreenPath Debt Solutions counselor. "As more hiring departments take personal finances into consideration, recent college graduates need to make sure their credit and debts are in order."

To help make the transition from college to the work world go smoothly, GreenPath is providing a top ten financial checklist for recent college graduates.

1. If you do not already have a job lined up, contact your student loan servicer(s) immediately to ask for a six-month deferment. Most loans will do this for you right after you graduate without much difficulty. The last thing you want is to start getting negative marks on your credit right away for not making the student loan payments on time. 2. Pull a free copy of your credit report at www.annualcreditreport.com and review it to make sure you are aware of all your existing creditors and debts.

sure to identity theft. However, keep in mind that it is good to maintain at least one active credit card account, which you use and pay in full every month, to build your credit score.

4. If a prospective employer requests a copy of your credit as part of the application process, be prepared to be up-front about any negative marks on your credit. Employers will want to know that you are aware of the negative marks and that you have a plan for dealing with it. "You can also add a personal statement to your credit report, to explain the circumstances behind any negative marks on your report," said Bossler.

5. Check with the registrar's office at your school to make sure you do not owe anything to the school (library fines, parking tickets, etc.). Sometimes these debts can cause the school to can really pay off.

8. Develop a budget – your spending plan – early on. Decide how much you'll spend in different areas including groceries, dining out, and clothing. Once you begin receiving a paycheck, it is likely that you'll have more income than you've ever had before. But it can be very easy to quickly wind up with the cash slipping away, without a clear idea of where it has gone.

9. Once you land that first job, start to develop good saving habits. Start a direct deposit into savings. Sign up for your employer's retirement plan – especially if there's a match. In addition, if you're carrying credit card debt, begin aggressively reducing those balances to minimize the amount of interest you're paying.

10. Speak with a non-profit credit counseling agency, if you are paying high interest rates on your credit cards, if you're struggling with the amount of your minimum payments on credit cards, or if you need help in developing a game-plan for your finances. These agencies will help you develop a budget and action plan to tackle your debt. 6. If you are moving after graduation, be sure to let the post office and your creditors know of your new address. Otherwise, you may miss important statements or letters regarding your student loan, credit cards, or other debt, and that can lead to missing payments and negative marks on your credit report.

7. Keep your expenses as low as possible while you are getting started. Don't rush out and buy a new car within two weeks of your first job offer. Don't feel the need to take on larger expenses in your budget such as an apartment of your own right away. Staying with your old roommates or parents for a period of time

and a friend, Bruce MacArthur took out a \$1,000 loan from the Charlevoix State Bank and purchased the license plates to be sold. Boss' wife, Marilyn designed the plates and students from Charlevoix Schools went door to door selling them. Within hours \$3,500 was raised allowing the group to purchase 6,000 flats at a price of \$5 per flat.

Flower beds had to then be created by scooping out the rock and filling a 24 inch wide space with soil which was fertilized and tilled before the petunias could be planted. Planting day came and petunias were placed into their new beds within three hours. Boss and his family then cared for the flowers by using a rigged up flat bed truck with open water tanks to water the flowers each day during the summer.

Though the group has seen many changes since the 80's, the focus of keeping Charlevoix visually stunning has only gained momentum. Now, hundreds of volunteers turn out to plant the petunias, including school classes, business people, residents, and visitors. Brightly clad volunteers lined the streets this year around 5 p.m. to plant the flowers under the direction of Block Captains who showed first time planters how to plant the petunias and directed veteran planters to their areas.

"It went very well, we got the city planted quicker than we ever have, especially on the north side of town," said Aaron Wilkin, President of Keep Charlevoix Beautiful. Wilkin

added that the large hanging baskets of petunias, of which there are 135, will be placed downtown within the next two weeks.

After the planting was complete a picnic lunch was served in East Park where volunteers gathered to feast on hot dogs, apples, chips, and yummy cookies donated by many area businesses.

Two weeding dates are also set to keep the petunias looking gorgeous through the summer. The first date is June 24, from 4-7 p.m. and the second is the week before Venetian Festival on July 16. Volunteers are needed for both days and anyone is welcome to join the effort.

The materials, equipment, and bed preparations were sponsored by several area residents and businesses this year including; Artform Fabricating, City of Charlevoix Fire Department and Pat Elliot, Joe Shear Services, Terry Taylor, Joe Vogelheim, Todd and Pam Wyett, Bruce Wood, Fox Motors Charlevoix, and Bridge Street Blooms.

Health Department receives Community Foundation grant

The Charlevoix County Community Foundation recently awarded the Health Department of Northwest Michigan a \$1,900 grant, based on a recommendation from the Charlevoix Women's Circle. The grant is supported through the foundation's Charlevoix Area Memorial Cancer Fund, and will finance outreach efforts for the Health Department's Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program (BCCCP).

"The Health Department is honored to receive this grant from the Charlevoix County Community Foundation," said Joy Klooster, BCCCP coordinator at the Health Department. "We are so pleased that the foundation recognizes the great services provided by BCCCP, especially since they're so important for a healthy community. With this funding, we can really get the word out about this program."

BCCCP provides breast and cervical screenings at no cost to uninsured and under-insured women ages 40-64 who fall within certain annual income guidelines. Clients younger than 40 years old may also benefit from the program if they have abnormal screening results. The program offers clinical breast exams, Pap smears, pelvic exams, and mammograms, as well as referrals to area healthcare providers for follow-up of abnormalities. If additional treatment is necessary, women may be eligible for Medicaid coverage through the Medicaid Treatment Act.

It's imperative that every woman get screened for these cancers every year, said Klooster, in order to catch them as soon as possible. Through regular annual screenings, women who have breast or cervical cancer will be identified at

Study: Rumble strips saving lives on rural highways

A recently completed study shows that rumble strips are proving to be an effective and low-cost way to reduce crashes on Michigan's state highways. The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) started a major rumble strip program for two-lane high-speed rural highways in 2008. Centerline and shoulder rumble strips were installed on all MDOT rural, nonfreeway highways with posted speed limits of 55 mph and appropriate paved lane and shoulder widths. To date, MDOT has placed 5,700 miles of centerline rumble strips and 1,700 miles of shoulder rumble strips.

The study, conducted by the Wayne State University (WSU) Transportation Research Group, found significant reductions in several targeted categories of crashes, including head-on, sideswipe and run-off-the-road crashes. In the categories examined, the study showed a 47 per-

cent reduction in total crashes and a 51 percent reduction in fatal crashes.

"This study is one of the largest and most comprehensive investigations of effectiveness of any safety countermeasure that has ever been performed at a state level," said Tapan Datta, a WSU civil engineering professor and principal investigator of this research project. "Analyzing all of MDOT's two-lane high-speed highways with rumble strip treatments targeted to alleviate lane departure-related traffic crashes makes the results real and reliable. They can be used by other states to establish their own rumble strip programs."

Datta said future research should focus on use of rumble strips on two-lane county roads and multi-lane non-freeway high speed roads.

"Rumble strips are a proven and cost-effective countermeasure to lane departure crashes brought on by driver drowsiness, distraction, and/or inattention," the report said. "We can project ... this initiative in Michigan will result in an annual reduction of 337 crashes, saving 16 lives, and 62 serious injuries each year."

These safety gains aren't coming at great cost to taxpayers. The report's economic analysis of the rumble strip program showed a high benefit-to-cost ratio. Depending on how the cost was spread out over time, the ratio was between 58:1 and 18:1. Researchers estimated a total safety benefit of more than \$79 million over three years.

In another facet of the study, researchers surveyed road users to gain insight into the public's perception of rumble strips. The survey indicated strong public support for the use of centerline rumble strips. And the experts agreed: a survey of MDOT pavement design and maintenance personnel showed the majority

of staff strongly agree that the installation of centerline rumble strips improves safety.

A previous rumble strip study, completed in 2012, found that the presence of centerline rumble strips improves driver performance in most conditions. Drivers position themselves more centrally in lanes, leading to fewer encroachments over centerlines and shoulders, thus increasing safety. And while drivers generally tended to ride onto or across the centerline when passing bicyclists, they did so less frequently when centerline rumble strips were present. They also found that centerline rumble strips did not contribute to short-term cracking in asphalt pavements. Further, rumble strips typically produced no more noise than that made by tractor-trailer trucks traveling on normal highways.


