

Is Skydiving a Problem?

CHARLEVOIX: On Monday, City Council dealt with multiple hot topic issues, including a presentation from council member Luther Kurtz who was concerned about feedback his skydiving business was receiving.

Kurtz chose to recuse himself from a discussion on Airport Manager Qualifications and Documentation of Changes after acknowledging that he owned a business that operates out of Charlevoix Municipal Airport. Before Airport Manager Liz Myer presented that agenda item however, Kurtz requested an opportunity to address council regarding the issues his skydiving operation has encountered in recent weeks.

"I just want to say a few words about my skydiving company, there has been a lot circulating around town about it," stated Kurtz.

He then continued on to explain why he chose to bring his business to Charlevoix, the history his company has with the Charlevoix Municipal Airport, and the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA)

According to officials, citizens of Boyne have been asking for the fence to come down since the day it went up. Recently, two Charlevoix County men made it their mission to purchase the property and make it more user friendly for all in the community.

Co-owners Bob Grove and Mike Dow purchased the property in April and then offered a \$1 lease to Boyne City in the hope that the city would clean up the property, tear down the fence, and make the space open to the public. That lease was signed on June 10 and City Manager Michael Cain indicated that the fence would be down no later than July 4. City Staff, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Charlevoix County jail volunteers began clearing the land the day the lease was signed.

On July 2 the property becoming open space became a reality when Grove and Dow with assistance from city commissioners lowered the last portion of the



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Clayton Arthur Smith, 98

(NOV. 7, 1915 - JUNE 28, 2015)

At 98 Clayton could still tell

you where the biggest trout are caught and where the best beaver he ever trapped was caught. Clayton went home to be



with the Lord at 99 years of age.

Born in the Barnard section of Charlevoix, to Clyde and Vera Vance Smith, he came into the world in a country house and he will be buried at Barnard Cemetery not more than a $\frac{1}{4}$ mile from where he was born. Clayton was a selfmade business man, learning early that he could make a lot more selling fruit than picking it. He continued this tradition and supplied the Upper Peninsula with fruit that would not be available to folks unless he brought it up across the Straits. He would tell stories about how he would have a load of fruit and he could go to the front of the line to get on the ferry (pre Big Mac Bridge) and get his load across to be sold. Clayton was in the Civilian Conservation Corps and then joined the Merchant Marines to help support the war effort. He came home to Charlevoix to meet Kathryn Besemer and married her at Barnard Methodist Church. They were married 61 years before Kay died in December of 2011. They had four children Debby (Terry) Wright of Grand Blanc, Michigan; Randy and Elizabeth Smith of Kentwood. Michigan; Linda (David) Scovel of Higganum, Connecticut; and Gail (Richard) King of Port Penn, Delaware. Nine grandchildren: Daniel and Rachel Wright: Josiah, Cody, and Samuel Scovel; and Kathryn, Olivia, Patience, and Emma Smith and one great grandchild, Lily Rae Forberg. Clayton is also survived by his sister, Marjorie Warner, of Charlevoix. Clayton became an author at 75 years old, writing down his stories because he realized his grandchildren might not get to hear them all. He had to write two books of his stories to get them all in. He like writing down his story so much that he thought he should write down other Charlevoix patriarchs' stories. Nephew Mick Smith and Clayt would go find the old timers and get them talking and record the stories on tape, and another book was born. His books are in the Charlevoix Library. When he was not on his Ford tractor, plowing up the garden he would be carving an animal from a piece of oak or walnut board Kay used to say "He just can't leave a piece of wood alone!" Clayton's life will be honored at the Barnard Methodist Church where he first heard the stories of his Lord and Savior, whom he loved. His favorite hymn was "I come to the garden alone" and that is where he did most of his talking to the Lord.

The poker run event showcases 110 high performance boats from all over the country racing through the waters of Lake Charlevoix and Lake Michigan on a 130-mile excursion in search of the best poker hand. The Poker Run begins with a series of parade laps starting at 10 a.m. July 11 leaving from the Boyne City Marina. Veterans Park offers some of the best views for spectators.

Card stops include Northport, Elk Rapids, Harbor Springs, Bay Harbor, with a lunch stop in downtown Charlevoix The Beautiful. Boaters wrap up their day on the water with a final card stop near Horton Bay and a reception at Sommerset Pointe. The day concludes with a

dinner and an auction at Veterans Park where participants play their cards to see who has the best hand. In addition to the Poker Run, the

weekend offers activities galore in Boyne City, including a Friday night dinner for the boaters at the Veterans Park Pavilion and Stroll The Streets in downtown Boyne City. 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tinue to use their G.I. Bill benefits and receive in-state tuition rates when they return to campus this fall. Two state agencies collaborated to ensure student veterans, their spouses, children and other dependents can use their Post-9/11 G.I. Bill, Montgomery G.I. Bill and other educational benefits to pursue their educational goals at each of Michigan's 43 colleges and universities.

Under the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability Act of 2014 - also known as the Choice Act - public colleges and universities nationwide were required to offer in-state tuition and fees to all eligible individuals by July 1, 2015. In most states, a vote by the legislature could bring the entire state into compliance; however, under the Michigan Constitution, all state public institutions of higher learning are autonomously governed and each needed to adopt the revised Choice Act policies independently to be in compliance.


The Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency and Michigan State Approving Agency worked hand-in-hand with the VA Choice Act compliance staff and 43 public institu-

their G.I. Bill benefits interrupted regardless of which college or university they are attending.

"This was a huge undertaking, and it demonstrates Michigan's commitment to its student veterans," MVAA Director Jeff Barnes said. "No matter what college or university a veteran or their dependent attends, they will be able to utilize their G.I. Bill benefits. This is no small feat, and it could not have been accomplished without strong partnerships with each of our institutions of higher education."


Section 702 of the Choice Act required that schools adopt policies stating that all individuals using G.I. Bill benefits within three years of active duty be given instate tuition rates. However, many Michigan colleges and universities went above and beyond what the VA required by adopting policies that did not include a timeframe – meaning that whenever a veteran uses their benefits, they will be given in-state tuition rates.

There are multiple access points, as you can see on the map below. Please follow all safety guidelines and be sage. The trail crosses major highways, roads and driveways. Trail users do not have the right of way. Please see the safety guidelines below.

Guidelines for multi-use trails and paths

Paths and trails are often shared by users of all ages and abilities, including bicyclists, walkers, joggers, parents pushing strollers, rollerbladers, and pets. The great variety of users and their varying speeds and mobility can make trail riding more un-

predictable than riding in the roadway.

- Always wear a helmet and use safety gear.

- Ride to the right.

- Ride single-file when other users are present.

- Always yield to other, slower path users.

- When stopping for a rest or emergency, move completely off the trail.

- Avoid wearing headphones so you are aware of faster users approaching from behind.

- Control your speed, slow down, and use caution approaching or overtaking other path users.

- Before passing others, courteously announce your intentions by saying, "on your left," or ringing your bike bell.

- Don't "spook" children or animals; always yield to them.

- Obey all traffic signs and signals at road crossings.

- Use proper lights if riding before daylight or after dusk.

- Point to trail hazards and call out to riders behind you "gravel", "glass", etc.

- Use traffic hand signals when appropriate.

Paving on State Street will begin July 17

CHARLEVOIX: On Monday, City Council heard an update on the construction project on State Street, and approved several Venetian Festival requests.

The construction project that began in early spring has been pushed back another few week according to Interim City Manager Michael Spencer, the dates for construction are as follows: July 9 will see curbs put in, on July 14 sidewalks will be put in, and on July 17 paving will begin. Spencer stated that at this point they are not sure what has caused the delay, but that city staff will look into the issue to determine what has happened to push the project this far back.

Council also approved three agenda items for Venetian Festival this year. The first was to approve Mayor Gabe Campbell to sign the \$12,000 donation to the festival, and an additional \$3,000 for signs to create a partial road closure. The second was to approve the fireworks displays over Round Lake held on Friday, July 24th and Saturday, July 25th. The third was to allow the Venetian Tiki Tent in East Park. The Ten will be open Tuesday through Saturday from 6:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. The tent will offer alcoholic beverages, which violates the City Code. In order for the Tiki Tent to serve, council must waive the alcohol restrictions each year. All three of the Venetian related agenda items were passed.

In other council news, sign ordinance violations were discussed. Spencer stated that in the past several weeks numerous sign violations have been rectified and the ordinance has been enforced. Spencer expressed that the ordinance is enforced against each business equally in town.

Also, the Lake to Lake Trail in Charlevoix is officially open! The trail was part of the combined efforts between the City of Charlevoix and Charlevoix Township to have trails that connect multiple points in Charlevoix to each other. Second Adopt-A-Highway cleanup of the year

Thousands of Adopt-A-Highway volunteers will be back picking up litter along state roadways starting Saturday, as they've done each summer since 1990. Participants in the popular Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) program will clean highway roadsides from July 11 to 19 during the second of three scheduled pickups this year.

"This year marks a quarter century of outstanding community service from groups in the Adopt-A-Highway program," said State Transportation Director Kirk T. Steudle. "For 25 years, these volunteer crews have given a big financial boost to MDOT, and the entire state. They're performing an important job that we simply couldn't otherwise afford.

Every year, Adopt-A-Highway volunteers collect about 70,000 bags of trash, for a total of more than 2 million bags in 25 years. Last year alone, Adopt-A-Highway cleanups generated a \$5 million value for state taxpayers.

Getting involved in the program is straightforward. Volunteers include members of civic groups, businesses and families. Crew members have to be at least 12 years old and each group must include at least three people. Groups are asked to adopt a section of highway for at least two years. There is no fee to participate. Adopt-A-Highway signs bearing group

names are posted along the stretches of adopted highway.

When working in a highway right of way, Adopt-A-Highway volunteers wear high-visibility, yellow-green safety vests required by federal regulations. MDOT provides free vests and trash bags, and arranges to haul away the trash.

The year's final Adopt-A-Highway pickup is scheduled for the fall, from Sept. 26 to Oct. 4.

proof of his insurance policy and prove that he excluded the city from any liability. He also was asked to pay \$2,500 as a fee for operating from the airport.

"Last year I paid about a \$1,000 in jump costs and stuff like that with no insurance, this year Liz was hired and she required me to pay \$2,500 and name the city under the comprehensive liability policy. After improving the city's position extensively from last year, it all of a sudden seems there is a problem with my operation," stated Kurtz.

Kurtz stated that he felt Myer "did a great job enforcing" policies to keep the city safe from liability. However, he felt concern over "disappointing complaints" he had received via email. He cited an email from Island Airways who also operate out of the airport and who filed a complaint on Monday morning. According to Kurtz the letter indicated that Island Airways felt having jumpers land at the airport is a dangerous situation.

Mayor Gabe Campbell lent his support to the letter by commenting about an incident on Thursday of last week in which 2 skydivers were allegedly out of the pilot's vision for a period of time. He expressed his opinion that this type of situation was dangerous for both the skydiver and planes who could potentially collide with the jumper.

"You must agree it's pretty scary having people jumping out of planes with parachutes when you have planes coming and going," said Mayor Campbell. Campbell continued to explain that his main issue was worry over whether or not the city would be liable for

busiest weeks in recent history, she had received zero complaints up until the letter from Island Airways. In her opinion, the letter being filed as late "smells bad." Many in the audience appeared to be in agreement with her, as several of her comments met with applause.

A member of Island Airways was in attendance, but insisted that all of the concerns the company had were listed in the complaint. When asked if there had been a problem, she responded that there wasn't, but "there could have been."

Interim City Manager Michael Spencer stated that the issue needed more research and a special meeting before council could seriously address the concerns about having the skydiving operation land jumpers at the airport. Spencer advocated taking public comment and then scheduling a meeting once more facts were gathered.

Those in the audience took that time to express both support for skydivers landing at the airport and concerns over the safety of doing so. The first to speak, Don Seely, said that he felt having the jumpers land on busy days was "distracting" and "unsafe." Several others said that they supported Kurtz, and allowing jumpers to land. One member even commented that if larger airports such as the one in his hometown of Cincinnati could accommodate skydivers landing, then Charlevoix could most likely do so.

Ultimately, the issue was heated, but nothing was resolved Monday night. Spencer plans to gather as much information as possible about the situation and bring it back before council at a special meeting. The date for that has yet to be set. Council recommended getting City Attorney

tervention of Mr. Grove and Mr. Dow we are all here today...This site has been transformed and given new life," said Cain at the ceremony.

The crowd gathered cheered and clapped as the last portion was lowered, signaling that the space was open for public use. After the fence was lowered, officials uncovered a new sign that refers to the area as the Boyne City Open Space, and reads "Land with a View to the

Dangers of a sedentary lifestyle

Many of us have sedentary jobs. When we are not working, we are sitting down to dinner or watching television. The more time you spend sitting, the less you are physically active. Inactivity is a health risk responsible for more annual deaths than smoking.

Inactivity, sitting for nine or more hours per day, increases the likelihood of long-term disability. Using data from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Surveys, including health data for 2286 adults aged 60 and over, researchers found that people spent nine hours per day sitting, on average. Nine hours out of their 14 waking hours spent sitting, for almost two-thirds of the sample. The more time people spent sitting, the more likely they were to become disabled. Sitting for twelve hours per day meant a six percent risk of disability in this sample. Each additional hour spent sitting increased the likelihood of disability requiring assistance with activi-

ties of daily living.

Sitting is "the disease of our time," according to James Levine, an obesity specialist at Mayo Clinic. Inactivity results in health problems other than obesity. Estimates are that a sedentary lifestyle is responsible for 6% of cases of coronary heart disease, 7% of type 2 diabetes, 10% of breast and colon cancer cases. For every 2 hours that a person watched TV, accord-

current thinking is that moving more throughout the day, with a goal of 10,000 steps per day, is required. Purchase an inexpensive pedometer to track your steps. Work on increasing by 500 steps per day until you achieve 10,000 steps per day. Continue that level of activity consistently every day.



Research indicates a 40% decreased risk of colon and breast cancer mortality in persons who were physical active. Physical activity helps prevent insulin resistance, the cause of type 2 diabetes. Regular physical activity reduced the risk of dementia in older persons a whopping 50%.

At a minimum, the recommendations for physical activity are 150 minutes of moderate exercise per week. It was traditionally thought that getting sufficient aerobic exercise would offset the effects of inactivity for the rest of the day. The

currently perform sitting - talking on the phone, watching television, working on a computer - can be performed while standing. Pace while you are on the phone. Put the computer monitor atop a box on your desk so you are forced to stand. When you have a choice between standing or sitting, choose to stand.

It may seem odd at first, but with practice, it will seem normal to walk and talk or type. By integrating regular activity throughout the day, every day, you can overcome the negative impacts of a sedentary lifestyle. Keep moving!

The existing system has struggled to meet discharge and storage requirements the past few years as well as aging equipment that has become more costly to maintain. The proposed project includes improvements to three pump stations including; but not limited to; new pumps, electrical and controls. 



BOYNE CITY - The weather could not have been more perfect; the crowds could not be more delighted and the many smiles could not be counted at the Fourth of July Festival in Boyne City last weekend.

Family friendly activities kicked off the holiday weekend there on Friday, July 3rd with events in Veteran's Park and the surrounding downtown area, including an arts and crafts show, an inflatable bouncy alley and musicians strolling the streets in the evening.

A long list of planned Fourth of July festivities began in the early morning on Saturday with the Eagles community breakfast and the 39th Annual Independence Day Run. Mid-morning found downtown streets lined with hundreds of spectators for the Grand Parade and later that afternoon for the Commemorative Raft Race and the Boyne Area Chamber of Commerce 27th Annual Duck Race down the Bovne River.

Throughout the weekend, dozens of vendors and food trucks were stationed in Veteran's Park offering a wide variety merchandise, arts and crafts and foods from tacos and hot dogs to cajun pork and jambalaya.

It was the kind of Fourth of July weekend that Bovne Area Chamber of Commerce associate director Kim Altobello was hoping to see.

'There are just so many people here because of all the fun things we have going on," Altobello said, "It's been kind of crazv.'

If there had been an award for "kind of crazy" during the weekend goings-on, though, it may well have been won by brothers Marty and Scott Moody of Boyne City.

The two constructed a float for the Grand Parade that later also doubled as their entry in the raft race. The float was a giant, orange cereal box; a spoof of the Wheaties box from the 1970s that featured a picture of Olympic Gold Medalist Bruce Jenner.

While on their "Sweaties" cereal box float, each of the brothers stood on either side of their hand-painted, life-size image of Jenner, only calling themselves, "Two and a Half Men".

The box claimed Bruce Jenner says their cereal is "Guaranteed to Make You Half the Man You Used to Be!" and contains "Tasty Sugar for Even More Energy!".



Participants got creative in their float making during the raft race, lashing together anything from kayaks to barrels to tires.

After the race, the brothers deconstructed their float and re-purposed it for the Commemorative Raft Race. Their "Sweaties" raft, however, may have floated a little better in milk, as the brothers paddled past the finish line as one of the last entries. They were easily a crowd favorite, though, as the theme of their raft, like their float, brought cheers and laughter from spectators.

"I think they may have crossed the line a little, but not by very much," smiled one observer, who declined to give her name.

There were at least two people who were more than happy to give their names, though, so they could have the Chamber of Commerce write them a check for \$1,000.

Dearborn residents Melissa Pellegrino and David Zimmerman were thrilled to learn they held the winning number for the rubber duck that crossed the finish line first in the Boyne Area Chamber of Commerce annual duck race down the Boyne River. They won the \$1,000 Grand Prize but cash prizes from \$50 and up were also awarded.

Zimmerman, 29, grew up in Boyne City and now lives in Dearborn along with Pellegrino, 28. They are newly engaged and planning to wed in June, 2016.

"This (\$1,000) could not have come at a better time," Pellegrino said.

The Boyne City Fourth of July Festival as always was topped off by fireworks over Lake Charlevoix.

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




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














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
