EAST JORDAN--August 11 marked one century of life for Grandvue resident John Smith. To honor their fellow Rotarian and friend the East Jordan Rotary Club celebrated his 100th Birthday with cake, balloons and memorabilia.

ELLSWORTH VILLAGE MEETING, AUGUST 10, 2015 **Ellsworth Appoints New Planning Consultant**

ELLSWORTH - Village President Hugh Campbell gave an update on the progress of the **Community Square Crowdfunding** Campaign, a new planning consultant was appointed and a resolution to honor Good Samaritan Ministries 25th anniversary was approved at the August 10 Village Council meeting.

Campbell explained that the campaign is going well according to the Michigan Economic Development Corporation even though as of the 9th of August only 19 people had donated to the campaign online. "We've got 21 more days, we need to get more people involved," he said. According to the MEDC most of the funding typically comes in the last week of the campaign. The village is trying to raise \$26,000 to create a community square on a barren lot downtown. All monies raised will be matched by the MEDC. Landscape architect Jessica Spencer was appointed as the village planning consultant. The village has plenty of work for her to do. The Master Plan needs to be updated, the recreation plan and the village marijuana dispensary ordinance. "I'm flexible to accommodate whatever you need," she said.

Jerry Rassmussen informed the council that the St. Clair Fireworks Committee is in the process of changing their name and that they are considering having the fireworks display during the Pig Roast instead of the Fourth of July weekend. "That would make it the first local fireworks of the summer," he said. Rassmussen also stated that a group of citizens are working on getting the culvert at the mouth of the Ellsworth River and Lake Ellsworth converted to a covered bridge. They are in the process of getting input from all of the property owners on the lake. He also informed them that the community Christmas tree will be planted this year. The tree is being donated by Burt Farbman and planted by Ron Robinson. Campbell will be meeting with a security company this week to discuss placing security cameras at the Community Park, Ellsworth River Park, the pavilion and the Sports Park. "I want to talk to this guy and see what he can provide," he said. The next Ellsworth Village council meeting is scheduled for September 14 at 7 p.m.





BOYNE CITY COMMISSION MEETING AUGUST 11, 2015

Boyne City ready to play hard ball with Verizon

BOYNE CITY - The question of whether to stand up to a communications company that wants to obstruct the scenery in the city was discussed and funds were approved to make improvements at the wastewater treatment plant at the August 11 City commission meeting.

A request from ACD, a fiber optic communications company representing Verizon, to place 5 "poles" in the downtown area has caused the city staff and commission concern. "What they didn't tell us is that their poles are considered antennas," explained City Manager Michael Cain. The company proposed 5 locations for the antennas. "In my opinion the locations were just obnoxious," said Cain. The city countered with more appropriate, less conspicuous locations for the antennas and requested that they be compensated for allowing them to be placed in the city. The company stated that they are not willing to compensate and feels they have a right to place the poles in the city according to the METRO act which was created in November 2002 with the purpose of streamlining the right-of-way permitting processes between municipalities and

telecommunication providers. There was much discussion between the company and Cain but more questions as to the placement of the antennas still needs to be held. The antennas would increase communication speed and reliability especially during busy weekends like the 4th of July. There is presently not enough capacity in the system to accommodate those busy weekends. "We're basically becoming the test case for this if we chose

to be so and by saying no we're choosing to be so," said Cain. "There's some hard ball being played here in regards to this." The company needs an answer by the end of the month or they will come in and place some sort of antennas anyway. They believe they have that right under the METRO act.

City attorney Mike Watza, doesn't agree. "My stance has been that we get as much financial compensation as we can for the privilege of doing business here," said Commissioner Derek Gaylord. 



Make immunizations a part of your back-toschool routine

August's arrival marks the final days of summer vacation and sets the stage for a new school year. August is also National Immunization Awareness Month—a perfect time to catch up on your child's vaccinations to ensure protection in the year ahead. The summer months are an ideal time for parents and guardians to make appointments for immunizations.

Keeping up-to-date with vaccinations is vital to the health of the community, said Dr. Joshua Meyerson, Medical Director at the Health Department of Northwest Michigan. "School-age children are at risk of illness, and they can further spread disease to their families and other community members-including babies who are too young to be fully vaccinated, and people with weakened immune systems. Those who don't receive recommended vaccines are vulnerable to vaccine-preventable diseases, which can be severe and life-threatening. Every dose of every vaccine is important to protect your child and others from infectious diseases."

Childcare settings and schools are more susceptible to outbreaks of infectious diseases due to close contact of students. Immunizing students against preventable diseases will help keep them healthy and in school. Today's childhood vaccines protect against serious and potentially life-threatening diseases, including polio, measles, pertussis (whooping cough), meningitis, and chickenpox. Vaccination is a safe and effective way to prevent children from contracting these diseases, and will reduce the prevalence of serious diseases for future generations.

Dr. Meyerson also reminds parents and guardians about the recent change in Michigan's school immunization requirements. While medical waivers may be issued by physicians, those who want to claim a nonmedical waiver for their child must receive education regarding vaccination and disease through their local health department.

Parents are encouraged to schedule an immunization appointment with their child's physician, or call the Health Department at (800) 432-4121 for both vaccination appointments and waiver education. The CDC's recommended vaccination schedule is viewable at www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules, or visit the Immunization Action Coalition at www.vaccineinformation.org for more information. To learn more about immunizations and other Health Department services, visit www.nwhealth.org. Optimism is Good for Your Health

You know the age old question - is the glass half-full or halfempty? A pessimist sees the glass as half empty while an optimist views the glass as half full. Optimists have a positive outlook for the future while pessimists tend to focus on negative aspects. Can having a tendency to focus on the positive improve your life?

A mounting body of research indicates that yes, optimists have better physical and mental outcomes in a variety of ways. Having a positive outlook, despite external circumstances can lead to better physical and mental health. In more than 100 studies, researchers have examined the relationship between optimism and health. In a wide range of physical health outcomes, those persons with a more optimistic outlook had improved pain tolerance, immunity, heart health, pregnancy or cancer outcomes better survival from disease, and longer lives. Having an optimistic disposition can improve your physical health regardless of other factors, such as income

women over age 50, women who were optimistic were 14 percent less likely to die from any cause than pessimists and 30 percent less likely to die from heart disease after eight years of follow up in the study. The optimistic women were also less likely to have high blood pressure, diabetes or smoke cigarettes.

Optimists are more likely to have healthy lifestyles, including regular physical activity, eating healthy food, and getting enough sleep. It is unclear whether optimism leads people to engage in healthy behaviors or whether the behaviors themselves lead people to feel happier.

Having an optimistic outlook is also related to improved mental health outcomes. Results from a study of disaster victims in the Netherlands found that persons with a more pessimistic attitude were at a higher risk for severe depression, obsessive-compulsive symptoms, anxiety and sleeping problems than those with more optimistic outlooks.

Optimists also fare better in the job market. A study of MBA students found that the more optimistic MBA grads iound jobs more easily, with less intensive

job searches than their more pessimistic peers. In addition, the more optimistic employees were more likely to have been promoted in the two years following graduation. The researchers hypothesize that those with a more optimistic disposition are better at coping with problems and more flexible about trying different approaches if necessary. Think about it, wouldn't you rather have an employee with an optimistic outlook than one who views the future negatively?

We all know people who tend toward optimism or pessimism. People gravitate toward and are happier around those who are optimistic. Are we born optimistic or do we learn to have a positive outlook? While our family of origin and early upbringing can teach us to be more or less optimistic, we can learn how to have a more positive view of the future. Modifying your attitude is one of the best - and least expensive - things you can do to improve your life.



Notice of Finding of No Significant Impact

The USDA Rural Utilities Service (RUS) has received an application for financial assistance from the Charter Township of Filer, Manistee County, Michigan. As required by the National Environmental Policy Act, the RUS has assessed the potential environmental effects of the proposed project and has determined that the proposal will not have a significant effect on the human environment. An Environment Impact Statement will not be prepared.

The City of Jordan is planning a new mechanical treatment plant that utilizes extended aeration activated sludge for the treatment process. The collection system remains the same, with the majority of wastewater being pumped through the main pump station prior to being conveyed via force main to the WWTP. The manual screen at the main pump station may be removed. An oxidation ditch is in the form of a ring or oval-shaped channel (steel or concrete). This particular form of mechanical treatment plant uses rotors or discs to highly agitate the wastewater in order to provide oxygen to the biomass within the reactor. The oxygenated wastewater is then moved slowly through the channels in order to create an environment to reduce the organics and other parameters such as inorganic nitrogen and possibly phosphorus.


